The main purpose of our demos is to provide community outreach – to share our enthusiasm about fiber arts and "show and tell" what we individually and collectively enjoy doing. The time we donate to community outreach helps maintain the guild's nonprofit status. If you wish to practice or learn a new technique, this is a

perfect way to spend a few hours sitting with friends who can give you tips and guidance as you practice. It may surprise you to learn how many visitors think that knitting, spinning and weaving are "lost" arts that no one practices anymore – we get to show them that these activities are alive and well! As we have a one-on-one conversation

BOARD MEETING MINUTES

Board Meeting

August 25, 2018

Members Present: Trish Boone, Sue Carneal, Maria Conti, Mary Humme, Christine Hunt, Deanna Ikeya, Ann Ormiston, Elaine Rowles, Paula Rudnick, Karen Stromberg, Lisa Takata

Members Absent: Helene Couture Hall, Sue Garber, Ruth Greenspan, Sara Jenkins, Beki Welsch

Christine Hunt called the meeting to order at 10:10 am.

Mary Humme reviewed the program schedule for 2018-19, which includes Katie Lewis/Finger Loop Braiding (October), Rick Rao/colcha embroidery, pine needle basketry or eco printing (November), Silent Auction (December), Galena Mihaleva/eco fiber (tentative for January), Paula Rudnick/Scholarship grant recipient (February), Maria Conti/Tapestry (March), Spinning topic TBA (April), and Special Interest Group Presentations (May).

Karen Stromberg reviewed workshop plans for Rick Rao/eco printing and pine needle basketry at Ann Ormiston's home (Friday, November 2 – Sunday November 4) and Tom Knisely/4 Shaft Rag Rug variations (March 9-11, 2019). Karen noted a maximum enrollment of 15 people for the Rao workshop and will suggest that he specify a maximum fiber weight for students to bring for dye samples. Both visiting teachers will stay overnight with guild members to minimize costs. Karen suggested that an email blast go out to members in September with registration deadlines for the Rick Rao and Tom Knisely workshops. Karen stated she is working with Deanna Ikeya and Ruth Greenspan on a Fall 2019 workshop on cotton spinning with Joan Ruane, as well as a possible workshop collaboration with Telarana in 2019. It was noted that Mary Snyder is willing to host another knitting workshop for our guild at her home in Payson if there is interest.

Paula Rudnick announced that the Wednesday Fiber Arts special interest group is planning a field trip to the Verde Valley Archaeology Center in October. Space is still available for guild members on a first-come first-served basis at a cost of \$30 per person.

Christine Hunt suggested that we actively recruit guild members to assist with our committees and will announce that at the October meeting. She said volunteers are also needed for a committee to help plan a 75th anniversary celebration for our guild. She suggested that the Board consider raising membership dues \$5 and holding those funds in reserve for the anniversary celebration in 5 years.

Sue Carneal distributed copies of the guild budget and profit and loss statements. She asked board members to let her know of any proposed changes for the coming year and said she will email a revised budget to the board.

Trish Boone reported that 60 people have paid their dues for 2018-19 and said she will send an email blast to remind people about renewals after Labor Day. Board members discussed membership categories noting that student memberships are only available to full time students. Ann Ormiston noted that the Handweavers Guild of America has an intern program and suggested that student members to ADWSG could be asked to serve as volunteers at guild events. Christine Hunt suggested that some kind of youth program could also be developed in the future. Trish said she has a list of guild members eligible for life membership, for board consideration at a January or February meeting. Deanna Ikeya suggested tracking officer and leadership participation to help determine eligibility for life membership. Trish agreed to manage the guild email blasts.

BOARD MEETING MINUTES (continued)

LISA TAKATA, SECRETARY

Ann Ormiston stated she is recreating the newsletter format in Microsoft Word and that articles are due on the 15th of the month. She will call current advertisers to ask about renewing their ads for \$50 per year. Christine Hunt suggested reprinting articles of interest from past newsletters. Christine Hunt suggested that individual board members contribute articles explaining why they got interested in fiber arts.

Board members discussed the guild's donation of gift certificates as prizes in the state fair Home Arts competition. Board members recommended that gift certificates from the Fiber Factory and Cotton Clouds, a local online vendor, be offered.

Christine Hunt will talk with Helene about hiring someone to redesign the guild website and would like to put this discussion on a future board agenda. Board members noted that Sylvia Fitzgerald, Karen Stromberg and Sue Carneal are available to help proofread webpage entries as needed.

Christine Hunt has been researching options for the sound system for the meeting room, and the board agreed that the tables near the front of the room should be immediately reserved with signage for "easy listening" for those who have difficulty with the meeting room acoustics. Mary Humme will further investigate sound system options and report back to the board.

Board members will provide refreshments for the October guild meeting, including a cake to celebrate the Guild's 70th anniversary this year. Ideas such as a UFO fashion show and community based event or project were discussed as possible events that a committee could plan for the 75th anniversary.

Motion to adjourn the meeting was made by Karen Stromberg and seconded by Sue Carneal . Motion passed unanimously and the meeting adjourned at 12:25 pm.

WEAVING AND SPINNING AT THE PIONEER LIVING HISTORY MUSEUM

ADWSG has two members that are trained docents at the Pioneer Living History Museum, located off Rt. 17 in Phoenix. For nine years, Elaine Rowles and Sue Carneal have volunteered their time every Thursday, October through April, to recount the history of the Northern Cabin, and demonstrate the arts of weaving and spinning.

Literally hundreds of children and their teachers pass through the Village on any given day. On Thursdays, as each group of children and adults arrive at the Village's Northern Cabin, which was originally located in Flagstaff, they are initially greeted by Elaine. Elaine explains about life in the 1800's, clarifying why a pioneer would need a spinning wheel. She shows samples of both cotton and wool - from cotton boll and sheep fleece to finished skein. Using her spinning wheel, Elaine spins cotton collected from Glendale, and identifies the parts of the wheel and how they work. Cloth and glove samples as finished products are passed among the group.



Next the visiting groups enter the cabin where they are greeted by Sue, who gathers them around the two-shaft Union Loom No. 36 built in Boonville, NY. Sue explains why a loom was a necessity for a family. A colorful

warp is wound on the sectional beam. Sue throws picks on the loom, explaining the parts of the loom and how they work together to weave an actual rug. A large fully finished rug is on display near the loom so the children can understand the effort required from beginning to end of the process. Other finished rugs are sold in the Museum Gift Shop.





Many of the children who tour the cabin have never seen either a spinning wheel or a loom before, and are quiet with rapt attention as they grasp the concept of how clothing is made from (literally) the ground up!

Great job, Elaine and Sue, and thank you for making such an important contribution to our Guild's community outreach!


