# From the President Desk Merlyn Heck

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Howdy, fellow Guild members!

With so much talk recently about artificial intelligence (and the way it's popping up in just about every sector of technology these days), I was reminded about a blog post I read back in 2018. A machine learning researcher had given an AI algorithm a training data set of knitting patterns and told it to generate new patterns based on them. The algorithm—dubbed "SkyKnit" as a tongue-in-cheek reference to the homicidal Skynet AI from the Terminator movies—produced patterns that were barely knittable, with names such as "Lacy 2047," "Paw Not Pointed 2 Stitch 2," and my personal favorite "Pitsilised Koekirjad Cushion Sampler Poncho." A community of online knitters took on

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
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the challenge of bringing some of these procedurally-generated patterns to life, and the results could largely be described as spectacularly mind-melting and sometimes a bit terrifying.

There have been some major leaps in AI technology in the past 7 years, so I decided to check in on its current pattern-generating capabilities. Of the many AI systems available, I chose ChatGPT for this experiment because it's well recognized and I could give it one free prompt to answer without giving it my email address. ChatGPT is a chat bot that people often use to generate code, write corporate middle-management emails, and sometimes look up information (never use ChatGPT to find information, it's not designed for that and will just make up convincing misinformation).

When I gave ChatGPT the prompt to "generate an amigurumi crochet pattern of a dragon," it responded with something that looked very much like any free crochet pattern on the internet. It included a list of materials, defined abbreviations used in the pattern, instructions for all the pieces needed (head and body, 4 legs, tail, 2 ears, 2 wings, and 4-6 spikes), and instructions for assembling it. Everything I read made sense and looked complete. I could see the pattern would make the kinds of simple shapes I would expect from an easy pattern for beginners. If I hadn't been the one who just told the computer to create it, it would have looked like any other free crochet pattern that human artists write up and post for fellow crocheters to enjoy.

It began to look suspicious as I finished each piece. The body and head, worked in one piece, were just an oval with no definition. The tail was long and slender, like a cat's instead of a dragon. The ears were pointy, also like a cat's. In fact, if not for the wings (simple half-circles) and spikes (also half-circles), the result was very much just a cat. While it is cute, and a complete project that makes visual sense (unlike the creations of SkyKnit), it's clear that ChatGPT does not





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And of course it doesn't. A chatbot is software designed to analyze patterns in language and reproduce them, the computer doesn't comprehend what it writes. What it produces is essentially babble, based on what real humans have written and made available on the internet. I think the reason this pattern became a cat instead of a dragon is because there are so many free cat crochet patterns available for the algorithm to absorb and copy. It took the most common words and phrases associated with the words "crochet pattern" and "amigurumi," then tacked on some wings and spikes that are associated with the word "dragon." The fact that it produced something that resembles what a human would write is a testament to how much training data it can access and how far AI development has come in recent years.

There are much larger conversations around AI than what I can address here, but I do wonder what kind of impact it could have on fiber art communities as it becomes more entrenched in our everyday lives. There are already AI-generated books being advertised towards beginners, who don't know enough about weaving to tell that the instructions don't make any sense. The human artists whose patterns became training data were never asked permission for their work to be used this way. The computing power required to generate these prompted answers is a massive source of pollution and waste. And does AI even have a place in activities where the appeal is often in doing something manually that is typically done by machines? I personally have satisfied my curiosity; I don't feel like this particular tool adds anything to my own artistic process.

This month I am highlighting another four books that are available in our Guild library. The library is available for any Guild member to use. Check out books, magazines or DVDs for the month. Suggestions of new titles to add are always welcomed.

**Weaving on Gourds** by Marianne Barnes teaches you how to combine basket weaving and gourd art with instructions to make five different projects. The book covers preparing the gourd, weaving techniques, strengthening the rim and adding embellishments. Lots of photos of completed works offer inspiration for creating your own works.

**Krokbragd:** How to Design and Weave by Debby Greenlaw brings together traditional aspects of krokbragd with a fresh, contemporary approach. Explore the structure and design of krokbragd for the floor, table and rigid-heddle loom. In addition to traditional single krokbragd, exciting variations such as double point krokbragd and turned krokbragd are also covered.

**Craft of the Dyer: Colour from Plants and Lichens** by Karen Leigh Casselman is a complete guide to making and using dyes from a wide variety of plants – from acorn to zinnia. For each plant the book includes suitability for dyeing, parts to use, processing, availability, fastness of dye and more.

Boro and Sashiko, Harmonious Imperfection: the Art of Japanese Mending and Stitching by Shannon Mullett-Bowlsby shows you how to created dramatic, unique designs and embrace imperfection, admiring the utilitarian beauty of every stitch.
