This month I would like to share 'a day in the life of a Ways and Means helper, so you, dear reader, get some insight into a small fraction of *what makes our guild go* on a month to month basis. The Ways and Means function of the guild orchestrates the rental and sales of fiber equipment and supplies to offset the guild's expenses (for example, the storage unit where we keep supplies that support our community).

The guild is contacted regarding materials for donation and depending on where the previously loved holdings are located, a pickup can be coordinated. Loom in Sun City? A guild member with a truck generously offered to help me pick it up. A loom in Lake Havasu or Prescott? Hopefully someone closer can help it find its next home.

All the materials contributed to support the guild wind up in our storage unit (except for a 48" 4H Schacht that's in my den. Needs a little work, but... interested?). The day of our Saturday meetings, we arrive at the storage unit at approximately 8 am, culling items we think will make a successful raffle, as well as bringing the sound system to the meeting. All must be returned after the meeting. We've been fortunate that Roxanne has offered her time and skill to organize our December event, and that folks have been so helpful in handling the very bulky sound system with/for me on meeting days.

On occasion, trips are made to the storage unit 'off schedule' to coordinate the drop off or pick up of materials.

It's incredibly gratifying to help with the Ways and Means Committee: seeing members enjoy a drum carder or try weaving on a Schacht loom without breaking the bank, the excitement of the raffle, and getting to talk with everyone all along the way.

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KNIT, SWIRL! KNIT ALONG (KAL)

Hello to the Knit, Swirl! Knit Along Gang!

At the last meeting, I suggested picking your pattern and yarn for the December meeting.

The most difficult skills you will employ in knitting this sweater:

- 1. Casting on hundreds of stitches (513 in the picture below). I place stitch markers at every 20 stitches to keep myself straight.
- 2. Joining your cast on stitches (after knitting three rows) without twisting your stitches.

After that, you'll be cruising through the pattern. The rest is pretty much rows of either knitting or purling. I've knit more in the past four months than I have in ages, simply because of how easy it is to pick up/put down this project.

This month I am going to highlight three very different books by Bobbie Irwin. All are available in our Guild Library.

The Spinner's Companion

The definitive tool for spinners, this handy pocket-sized guide is filled with common spinning terms, tips on how to maintain wheels, and lessons on how to process fiber and spin yarn. Appropriate for spinners at every level of ability, this book presents clear, concise instruction on topics such as basic carding techniques, how to dress a distaff, and creating uniform yarns. This instructional guide proves as practical as it is comprehensive. (from Amazon)

Weaving Iridescence: Color Play for the Handweaver

Iridescent fabric shimmers and glows, changing colors depending on how the light hits it. Different colors appear in the folds and pleats, adding surprising layers of color to fabric. To the uninformed it appears magical and difficult, but the truth is that weaving iridescent fabric is accessible to any handweaver who knows the tricks. (from Amazon)

Twined Rag Rugs

Twining rugs is not the same as weaving and does not require a floor loom. This book has complete instructions for building the basic equipment plus step-by-step diagrams and photographs for twining round, oblong and rectangular rugs. There are tips for designing your own rug from old blue jeans, sheets, wool, and more. Irwin has brought this almost lost craft back to life with this book.

CRAFTING A CREATIVE MEMOIR

Interested in exploring a different side of your craft? Announcing "Crafting a Creative Memoir," a creative writealong.

"Crafting a Creative Memoir" is a multi-month guided group project with the goal of helping each of us tell the stories of ourselves as makers and creatives. The project will run during the guild year, from October through May, and at the end, participants will have seven pieces of creative work exploring their origins, values, and aspirations as a maker.

Each month, I send out a theme with a short excerpt or reading, some guided reflection questions to get you thinking about how you relate to the theme, and suggested approaches for the month's "assignment." No previous writing experience is required - this is a chance to explore.
