

It's been ten, long years since her abrupt departure, and, with a cryptic voicemail, 28-year-old Pittsburgh writer Charlotte Sutton finds herself back in her hometown of Lakeside, Ohio. Only this time, her estranged father doesn't recognize her, and a surprise half-sibling has taken her place.

Chuck Sutton—newspaper editor, retired baseball player, and the town's most beloved celebrity—is thought to have Alzheimer's disease. The community newspaper is also on the verge of closure, and a childhood friend holds a decadelong grudge. Despite all this, there is Lakeside. The quaint waterfront community, flush with ivy-covered cottages and vintage charm, hasn't changed even as everything else in Charlotte's life has shifted. She intends to stay only long enough to get her father's affairs in order.

But, to reconcile her past and unearth family secrets, Charlotte must reconnect with Chuck through his Alzheimer's diagnosis and reevaluate her own misconceptions about growing up in the small Ohio town that still holds her heart.

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

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

Literary Titan REVIEW

In Finding Sutton's Choice, Brenda Haas delivers a heartfelt and layered story about Charlotte Sutton, a young writer who returns to her quaint hometown of Lakeside, Ohio, after ten years away. A mysterious voicemail and concerns about her estranged father's health, possibly Alzheimer's, bring her back to a place she swore she'd left behind. As Charlotte steps into the chaos of her father's declining memory, a struggling family newspaper, and a surprise half-sibling, she's forced to confront old wounds, unspoken truths, and what it really means to go home again.

This book hit me square in the chest. Haas writes with an intimacy that doesn't just paint a picture, it lets you walk the streets of Lakeside with Charlotte. Her prose is straightforward, not showy, but rich with emotion and charm. The dialogue felt natural and real, and the pacing kept me invested. I especially loved the way memory and identity were woven through the story without beating me over the head. And Charlotte, who is blunt, flawed, and sharp, was someone I could root for even when she was a mess... What really stuck with me was the raw honesty about family. The father-daughter dynamic wasn't whitewashed, and the complicated layers of resentment, love, and misunderstanding rang painfully true. Watching Charlotte navigate a relationship with a father who might not remember her, and then discovering a brother who took her place, was heartbreaking in the best way.

Finding Sutton's Choice is a beautiful story about forgiveness, second chances, and finding home in unexpected places. If you've ever wrestled with family messes or avoided going back to the town that raised you, you'll enjoy this one. I'd recommend it to readers who enjoy emotionally driven fiction with depth, especially fans of Ann Patchett or Elizabeth Berg.

Getting published in today's market: a writer's journey

Brenda discusses her winding path from journalist and public relations consultant to debut novelist (finally). Presentation touches on the basics of querying and the differences between traditional publishing, hybrid publishing, and self-publishing.

Memories on the page: writing the personal essay

Everyone has a story to tell. This interactive presentation explores writing slice-of-life moments in personal essay format. Discussion will cover essay structure, themes, and preparation for possible publication submission.

Novel Writing Month: take the challenge

Creatives strive to write 50K words in one month. This presentation outlines how to prepare for writing a first draft OR for editing a drafted project. Customize for any time of the year and as a 1-day/3-day/week/month-long session.

Spread the word: publicity for nonprofits

Learn best practices for making a good public impression (without a lot of \$\$\$). Presentation includes basics of writing effective press releases, posting on social media, drafting newsletters, etc.

Get to know the many "characters" in your life. Put pen to paper while creating character sketches of someone from your imagination, someone from your past, or even someone influencing you each and every day.


Writing the Lake Erie story

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Book Jup Jiscussion

- 1. Charlotte left her small-town home right after graduation, with the intent of stepping out of her father's larger-than-life shadow. How did her independence help her grow? How did it not quite meet her social and/or career expectations?
- 2. Charlotte did not allow herself to get emotionally close to anyone after leaving Lakeside, including Elliot, her on-again, off-again boyfriend. Why do you think this is?
- 3. Charlotte said she returned to Lakeside simply to do her duty as Chuck's daughter. Franco asked Charlotte what she *really* wanted to accomplish by returning. Discuss.
- 4. When Charlotte first came in contact with her half-brother, she was visibly upset. We saw little of Adam's reaction. What do you think he was feeling in that moment?
- 5. Why was "big city" Charlotte reluctant to see the good in "small town" Lakeside, Ohio? What are some misperceptions she had about her small-town upbringing?
- 6. Children do not come with directions. What are some different choices Chuck might/should have made while raising Charlotte? What are some unreasonable expectations or perceptions Charlotte had of her parents, either individually or as a married couple?
- 7. Alzheimer's disease greatly impacts patients and caregivers. Discuss. In *Finding Sutton's Choice*, how does the diagnosis change Charlotte's relationship with Chuck?
- 8. What are some aspects of the after-story that surprised you most?
- 9. What do you see in the unwritten future for Charlotte? For Adam?
- 10. Discuss how the characters of Lakeside made you feel. Who were you rooting for? Who did you feel most connected to? Who did you recognize in yourself?

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
