LAM "DEFINITELY AN ALCOHOLIC"

Joanne has been sober for over 8,776 days (March 25, 1997). Joanne arrived in AA to avoid jail. Joanne began her drinking career in high school and continued to drink while obtaining her Associates Degree and then her Bachelor of Arts degree. Still drinking, she was accepted into a Masters program, but, because of budget cuts, she was forced to return to her hometown in New York. She was successful in several different jobs in her field, but her happiness came from drinking after work with her friends at the local bar and playing softball for the bar, where she met the man who would become her husband.

Joanne was arrested for DUI in the 70's and arrested again for DUI in the 80's. Her and her husband decided it was time to settle down, so they got married and had a beautiful son. For a few years Joanne's drinking slowed, her husbands did not. Joanne quit her DUI classes and her license was suspended, unbeknownst to her. Cunning, baffling and powerful, always out there waiting, alcoholism took over and Joanne's drinking escalated quickly. Before school, after school, making dinner and when her family fell asleep Joanne had "1 or 2 drinks." It was not until Joanne was in treatment that she realized her daily "1 or 2's" added up alcoholic drinking.

In 1997, Joanne was arrested for Driving with a suspended license after walking to the local bar to drive the family car home since her husband had left it there. Because of her priors, she was facing 4-7 years in prison. She received 2.5 years of probation instead. Yet the "ism" still prowled. Joanne planned to begin drinking again after she completed probation.

Joanne and her family then moved to Spring Hill, 20 years ago, and it was then when she finally found her true home; in the rooms of AA. It was then when she started introducing herself as Joanne and I am "definitely and alcoholic." She got a sponsor and went to 2-3 meetings a week. When her father passed away, she went to more meetings and when her mother passed, she went to even more meetings. For Joanne, when unforeseen circumstances befall us all, like it will, she makes a choice to turn to the tools AA freely gave to her and not to a bottle. She decided to ask for help and gave back to others instead of allowing the "quicksand to to stretch around her in all directions."

Joanne was married for over 30 years when her husband passed away last year. Joanne did of course feel despair, but she refused to "fall into that bitter morass of self-pity." She drove to a meeting. She does the steps and lives them in her daily life. On top of it all, the pandemic hit. Meetings closed, fellowship declined. Instead of allowing alcohol to become her master once again, Joanne chose to keep moving towards sobriety and not towards a drink.

In fact, every Saturday night at 7:00 p.m. in the parking lot in front of the Intergroup office, Joanne makes sure an alcoholic has somewhere to go, rain or shine. The Fresh Air Group was formed. This writer remembers a specific Saturday night when a meeting was desperately needed. It was pouring outside but Joanne was there, and I knew she would be. The perfect part was that there was also newcomer who needed help. He was too afraid to attend a Unity meeting and had nowhere else to go. We had a meeting inside of the office. Me, Joanne, another solid AA woman we call the "AA Whisperer" and the newcomer sat together just like Dr. Bob and Bill W. did in the lobby of the Mayflower Hotel in 1935 and we helped each other not take a drink that night.

Joanne sums her life up like this: I don't pick up a drink no matter what, I go to meetings rain or shine, I do service work and sponsor other women and I try to trust G-d, who I choose to call my higher power, and I try to do the next right thing. She met calamity with serenity.

What is the difference between defects of character in Step Six and shortcomings in Step Seven, according to Bill W., there is no difference, he just did not want to repeat himself and he wanted to change the topic from self to others by stressing humility and a personal change in attitude in Step Seven.

This is one of the many list that name Character Defects and Shortcomings:

Resentment, Anger Fear, Cowardice Self pity Self justification Self importance, Egotism Self condemnation, Guilt Lying, Evasiveness, Dishonesty Impatience Hate False pride, Phoniness, Denial Jealousy Envy Laziness Procrastination Insincerity **Negative Thinking** Immoral thinking Perfectionism, Intolerance Criticizing, Loose Talk, Gossip Greed

Beginning with Step One, each of the steps is designed to help us learn the value of humility. Bing humble is keeping the ego right sized. When you think that you are humble, you're not.

There is a God today, and it is not me.

Bill Wilson stated, "the attainment of greater humility is the foundation principle of each of AA's twelve steps." Bill W. in the Twelve and Twelve later expanded the definition of humility to be "the clear recognition of what and who we really are, followed by a sincere attempt to be what we can be."

Step Seven like Step Six is not a once and done effort. Recovery is the journey, not a destination and the act of being right sized, thinking of others instead of self is an ongoing practice, one day at a time, for the rest of our lives.

Seventh Step prayer: My Creator, I am now willing that You should have all of me, good and bad. I pray that You now remove from me every single defect of character which stand in the way of my usefulness to You and my fellows. Grant me strength, as I go out from here to do Your bidding. Amen

Eventually, to gain self respect, the groups paid the bills, realizing that the rent had to be paid, coffee was not free and the literature needed to carry the message, even at cost, was still more than nothing in the hat

Today, the central offices and their Hot Lines have made themselves invaluable in carrying the message to the still suffering alcoholic.

Attend your groups business meetings, go to the Intergroup monthly meetings, go to the Districts monthly meetings and see how the money is spent.
