I started drinking when I was 15 years old, my 1st big drunk I passed out in the middle of the road, and a fire truck that was returning from a fire stopped to help me. Thinking fast, I told them a car had hit me. The next day, there I was on the front page of the newspaper, picture of me sitting up and leaning on the fire truck getting oxygen. By this time I had been drinking heavily for many years and I had 3 children and 2 failed marriages. I would drink until I passed out then as soon as I woke up I would vomit so I could continue drinking. One time I woke up in a jail cell and had no idea how I got there or what I had done, I was told I had sliced my friends husbands arm. To this day I don't remember and they didn't press charges. I also hated any mirrors when I was drinking, I didn't want to see myself, so if I saw one I usually broke it, I hated seeing myself. I went to a psychiatric hospital for a stay after drinking some poison. My counselor there gave me someone's number in A.A. to call for help, I called this man Ray I and went to my 1st A.A. meeting with him, he was chairing the meeting that night. I attended a few months but eventually stopped. They told me life would get worse if I went back out and boy did it

I came from an abusive home and always found abusive relationships. This one man I was with was very abusive and after a few months I threw him out. He came back to my house and broke in and came up to my bedroom and stabbed me 23 times. One of the stab wounds put a hole in my heart. After I was stabbed the guy jumped out of the window and was on the ground below hurt. Police were called to the scene and an ambulance arrived to take care of him and transport him to the hospital......

Step Nine

Made direct amends to such people whenever possible except when to do so would injure them or others.

Making amends may seem like a bitter pill to swallow but for those serious about recovery it can be good medicine for the spirit and the soul.

Step nine is another one of the 12 steps, that initially appears most difficult, but the rewards of putting this principle into practice can be immense. The spiritual principle involved is that of forgiveness, not from others but forgiveness of self, which can bring healing to both parties.

IT'S SIMPLY BUT NOT EASY

But those making the amends find many times that the person to whom they have harmed is more than willing to forgive and forget. Regardless, spiritual progress for those in recovery depends on doing their part right and making direct amends. This step does carry a condition-except when doing so would injure them or others. The benefit of making amends to the recovering person does not outweigh the need to do any more harm, (if the act of making amends will open old wounds or create new harm, then making direct amends should be avoided).

What does making amends have to do with Sobriety? If your goal is to remain sober, then it's important to take this step to make amends when possible, because if you fail to do so, it could come back to cause you harm later. If you know that you caused harm to others during your drinking days or you borrowed money and never paid it back, and you don't try to set the situation right, then there is a very good chance the issue will arise again and again and when it does it could be a trigger for a relapse. On the other hand, if you deal with the situation from the past then there is no way for it to come back and bite you later. You have to deal with it properly, you've kept your side clean and you've put the mistake from your past behind you. Alcoholism is a fatal disease, don't let putting off making an apology or paying a debt you owe become a bigger problem in the future that could cause you to pick up a drink.

Tradition Nine

The least possible organization, that's our universal ideal, No fees, no dues, no rules imposed on anybody, one alcoholic bringing recovery to the next; that's the substance of what we most desire, isn't it? But how shall this simple ideal best be realized? Often a question. We have, for example, the kind of AA who is simplicity. Terrified of anything organized, he tells us that AA is getting too complicated. He thinks money only makes trouble, committees only make dissensions, elections only make politicians, paid workers only make professionals, and clubs only coddle slippers. Says he, lets get back to coffee and cakes by cozy firesides. If any alcoholics stray our way, lets look after them. But that's enough.

Simplicity is our answer.

Quick opposed to such halcyon simplicity is the AA promoter. Left to himself, he would "bang the cannon and twang the lyre" at every crossroad of the world. Millions for drunks, great AA hospitals, batteries of paid organizers, and publicity experts wielding all the latest paraphernalia of sound and script; such would be a promoter's dream. "Yes, sir" he would bark "My two year plan calls for one million members by 1950!"

For one, I'm glad we have both conservatives and enthusiasts, they teach us much. The conservatives will surely see to it that the AA movement never gets overly organized. But the promoter will continue to remind us of our terrific obligation to the newcomer and to those hundreds of thousands of alcoholics still waiting all over the world to hear of AA.

We shall naturally, take firm and safe middle course. AA has always violently resisted the idea of any general organization. Yet, paradoxically, we have ever stoutly insisted upon organizing certain special services; mostly those absolutely necessary to Twelfth Step work.

All or Nothing?

Acceptance and faith are capable of producing 100% sobriety. In fact, they usually do and they must, else we could have no life at all. But the moment we carry these attitudes into our emotional problems, we find that only relative results are possible. Nobody can, for example, become completely free from fear, anger, and pride.

Hence, in this life we shall attain nothing like perfect humility and love. So we shall have to settle, respecting most of our problems, for a very gradual progress, punctuated sometimes by heavy setbacks. Our oldtime attitude of "all or nothing" will have to be abandoned.

Rough Roads is a medium size group with oodles of long term, solid sobriety. The topic of the meeting I attended was "Easier, Softer Way".

Most of us have tried and failed, until we became honest with ourselves. For some reason, we choose to fight our disease, rather than surrender. We have to learn how to live with the changes we have to make in order to be happy, joyous and free. We need to watch our triggerschanging playgrounds and playmates- our Serenity depends on our degree if willingness to thoroughly work the AA program.

Everyone spoke with elegance and ease, and I felt so comfortable at Rough Roads. I was left with this thought, "I will accept the struggles on the road to sobriety-anything I get is worth keeping". AA is not for people who need it, its for people who want it. What a GREAT meeting!! During all that no one knew I was upstairs in my bedroom critical. After he had been taken away, one of my daughters came into my room and found me, she went screaming outside and was able to get police and an ambulance for me. I was in critical condition and was brought into a local hospital that didn't have critical care, but fortunately for me there was a heart surgeon on call for another patient and was called in for me to perform emergency surgery. Today I believe I am truly a miracle!!!

I would love to say I got sober after this but I continued for several more months to drink. On one of those occasions I hit a cop while drunk and went to jail. While in jail I tried to kill myself and was sent back to the hospital that had saved my life months before. This time I was praying for God to help me and save me from this hell.

On November 23, 1986 my journey began and I started going to meetings and listening. I began getting involved and helping. I found a sponsor and began my journey.

I was 3 months sober when I faced this man in court with the support of my sponsor, I was able to make it through. He got 7-15 years for what he did to me.

I would love to say I stayed sober but years later after shoulder surgery I started abusing pain pills, I never stopped going to meetings or being involved so when I was confronted on what I was doing I looked up and there was a sign that said "The truth will set you free" I fessed up and changed my sobriety date. I struggled several more times, but have remained sober now for years. In my daily readings I added "Came to Believe" and "Footprints" Today I truly believe I am a miracle.

Nearly two centuries before the advent of Alcoholics Anonymous, John Wesley established Methodist penitent bands, which were organized on Saturday nights, the evening on which members of these small groups were most tempted to frequent alehouses. The hymns and teaching provided during the penitent band meetings addressed the issues that members faced, often alcoholism. As a result, penitent bands have often been compared to Alcoholics Anonymous is scholarly discourse.
