INTERVIEW with PVCI MEMBER CRAIG B.

by Eddie M. Well I did an interview with the person I consider to be the BEST CALLER in the CLUB, Mr. Craig B. Past President Craig is usually quiet & soft-spoken but will also let you know how he feels. Craig really enjoys varmint calling, has had MANY experiences & has LOTS of stories to tell. Hopefully Craig I got the stories below mostly correct.

1) How did you become interested in predator calling? It started off after meeting somebody. His Dad did some calling in the 1967-1968 timeframe. We went out a few times but nothing happened. Still it was intriguing. I didn't see my 1st coyote coming in until 1971! His Dad was good. We would go calling in places where others had been. They would kill things however I never saw them coming in as I was always on the wrong side. I got involved with another guy. We went calling out by Florence Prison during a freak snowstorm. We called in 6 coyotes & killed 3 of them! That got me hooked!

2) How long have you been calling? Let's see I started actually calling around 1970. I guess approximately 47 years!

3) What are some of your accomplishments as far as critters called/ harvested? I have called in about everything that you can call here in Arizona except maybe buffalo. I'm joking. Let's see skunks, 1 ringtail, rabbits, squirrels, aliens out of the brush in some places & right to me in others, ranchers. Deer, elk, antelope, javelina & all the predators plus birds of prey (Once I had 2 golden eagles fighting over top of me) and one prairie dog came out its hole and got pissy with me until a hawk flew over, then the dog went down its hole. Craig has a 300-coyote pin, 1 bear and 2 lion pins has killed over 20 bobcats has taken over 15 coyotes with various handguns and has 1 archery coyote he shot broadside at 15 yards!

4) Name three of your favorite calls that are always in your pocket? A Crittergitter, the Circe Calls, Cottontail preferred yet will use the Circe Jackrabbit on windy days to get the sound out here. Also, Tweety.

5) What is your favorite predator gun/load combination? My all-time favorite is a Mini-14 shooting a 55 gr. HMR bullet with a Remington tip. That combo has accounted for most of my kills over the years.

6) What is your favorite predator to hunt & why? I absolutely love fooling a covote. There are enough of them, they do dumb things & they can make you laugh. They're like a clown in disguise yet wily. I like fooling them at their own game.

7) Describe your most successful stand or day? (This story Craig told me about) I once called in 16 coyotes that were counted and shot 6 of them. (This story I remembered) I remember Craig talking about calling a coyote, bobcat, lion & bear all on the same stand on San Carlos some years back.


8) Describe your most disastrous stand or day? The scope on the Mini-14 got broken, the crosshairs were off. I would have had a 10-coyote day yet missed them all due to that broken scope.

9) Describe your closest encounter or most frightening moment? I once called in a covote that ran in, got close and grabbed hold of my boot! It actually had its teeth in my boot when I shot it! Another time myself and another were sitting together between 2 rock pillars. I was calling when all of a sudden, a mountain lion sailed from one pillar to the other right over the top of us! I can remember seeing the back legs and tail go over the top! This caused us both to react and we ended up bumping our heads against each other pretty darn good. The Big Cat landed on the rock pillar on the other side and took off running! I also remember calling in my 1st bear. I was hunting with a guy that was still learning. We found a bear & I put him on a stand behind me & started calling. This guy saw another bear & we actually quit calling to the first bear for this 2nd bear. I could see the bear about 1/2 mile away. I started calling & the bear started coming. I kept calling, it kept coming!

When the bear got to about 50 yards I figured it was close enough & stopped calling. I looked through the scope & could see the bear's eyes & had to force myself not to look at them but instead pick a spot. It was an intense time! I waited for a shot. Twenty seconds went by; I was not going to let the bear get away. Boom, I shot & dumped the bear! Then I chambered a round in the 30.06 & went over to the spot where the bear died while looking for the guy I'd left. He was not there! He'd gotten up & left! Then as I'm standing there I hear the brush crackling & breaking below me. Is it another bear? No, instead out steps this guy! Changing locations like he did is a Big NO, NO!

10) What is your favorite camouflage pattern? I like stuff that looks like creosote. It is not so much the pattern but stuff that catches my eye, again stuff that looks like creosote and Palo Verde. I go to my dark Ghillie Suit a lot. It has drab green, drab brown & drab black. It is also light and not heavy, it breathes.

11) What do you consider to be the greatest threat to predator calling? People that don't know how to. That plus the group that Ray warned us about. They have something to do with the Humane Society, something to do with the humane treatment of wildlife. They scare me. I think that they have Big Teeth.


NEXT UPCOMING EVENT: PVCI ANNUAL TRAIL CLEARING JULY 29-30, 2017

PVCI members mark your calendars for the weekend of July 29-30. This will be the dates for the Annual PVCI Trail Clearing. The actual work will take place on Saturday Aug. 29th however many members use this Event as an excuse to spend the whole weekend out of the desert HEAT! The plan is to meet the Forest Service person or our person-in charge at the top PVCI sign off of FS Road 300 (where the See Canyon Trailhead begins) at 9:00a.m. on Saturday morning. Here we will pass out the tools and take a PVCI Trail Clearing group shot by the PVCI sign! PVCI will be offering water & Gatorade for refreshments at the Trail's end. Campers need to bring all other supplies, gear, food & water for weekend. Fire restrictions permitting, we will be camping off of FS Road 84. This Road is on the Rim Road or FS300 past the Woods


WHO: PVCI will conduct a "Varmint Calling Seminar" covering all aspects of calling in critters.

PVCI ANNUAL FISHING CONTEST REPORT



WILDERNESS BEAR HUNTING!

Arizona is blessed with a fairly good black bear population and there are a number of ways to harvest a bear. The way that I prefer & the one that has worked the best for me involve a combination of glassing, spot-n-stalk and calling. These are usually the easier aspects of my method; the harder part is getting both your vehicle & yourself into the country



where these critters live & living with them while you're hunting for them. Many hunt units in Arizona have bears with some having more than others. Ultimately the units with the highest populations are units with Wilderness areas. For me, hunting the Wilderness areas makes the hunting experience more enjoyable as there is usually no competition once you walk in 2 or 3 miles or more. If you have ever hunted some of the popular bear spots outside of the Wilderness areas, pressure can be a 4-letter word. The guys on the ATV's together with people both on top & on the bottom of the hills all using radios. I'm not knocking their methods, they must sometimes work yet it is sometimes hard to compete with these guys when you are trying to do things the fairest way (though not illegal the use of radios makes vour critter ineligible for the potential Record Book). Bears getting shot out from under you, your calling attracting the attention of other humans who will shoot what you call in, getting way back or up somewhere and finding ATV's already parked there. This is why I prefer the Wilderness (walk or horses or mules only) areas, practically no competition yet the Wilderness & bear hunting in general in Arizona is tough. The heat, the terrain where the critters live, the size of the animal, the sometimes lack of water and many other factors make bear hunting in Arizona a challenge even for those that use hounds and especially if you put on a backpack. Even in the Wilderness there is no guarantee for success.

Pre-season scouting (going up and checking things out BEFORE the season begins) makes the difference in most big-game hunting situations and Wilderness bears are no exception. One exception to the scouting rule might be if you are going to an area where you have found bears before, say some prickly pear covered hills. Many time if the bears, especially multiple bears have been there in the past, they may be there in the future BUT don't forget where we live. This is Arizona and things can and often DO change. Water dries up; there is an unsuccessful pear crop, the food or bedding areas burns up or the whole mountain or country burns. These things can change everything for many, many years. When should you do your pre-season scouting? NOW! The 1st season for Arizona black bears opens on August 11th followed by another season on August 25th! These two are followed by a couple others later in the year. Waiting until the season opens before you start looking for bears is a recipe for failure!

The Wilderness can be a deadly place if you are not prepared. You need a plan of some sorts and you need to answer some honest questions. If you don't have horses or mules (if you do, have you ridden before by yourself?) then you will be walking. My usual distance is at least 6 mountain miles each way. 1) Have you ever walked 4 or more flat miles? Mountain miles are different than flat miles. Can you do it in the heat? Most times I arrive and walk in at night. It's still warm then; the biggest problem usually is dodging the rattlesnakes on the way in. 2) How do you feel about snakes? 3) Water: You can take some with you but at 8 lbs. a gallon you can only carry so much. Many plan on packing water in and stashing it in strategic places during the preseason. I just take one of the water filters and like an animal, count on finding my own water then using the pump. 4) Do remember that you will be carrying a load. The idea is to go in as light as you can because you are planning on coming out with a load (bear meat, skull & hide). A wet freshly skinned bear hide can weigh over 50lbs, by itself! Traditionally the hunter carries the hide & skull out and often it is all that they can do to carry their original load, plus rifle, plus the hide & skull. 5) Shelter & bedding can be one of your heaviest items next to food & water. Tents are nice but heavy, the same with most sleeping bags. If I take a tent it is a tube tent. It weighs as much as a trash bag & takes about as much space. For bedding I take 2 or 3 space blankets, not the flimsy emergency ones but the real ones that have a real color on one side & are silvercolored on the other side. These things have space-aged technology and are great for a variety of purposes. They even show up on radar supposedly. Make a hip hole with your boot heel, fold one blanket in half length-wise and lay it on the ground. Then your lightweight foam pad. Keep your clothes on, lay down, place your hips in the hole, tuck the blanket under your feet, silver-side towards you and cover up. It works great and is so lightweight. 6) Food: I eat trail mix & take one can of ravioli per day I plan on being out plus one extra can. I eat the ravioli at night, cold. I don't bring a stove or fuel for the stove.

Other things to consider: Know the bear phone number, 1-800-970-BEAR. You have 48 hours to report your kill after a harvest. Bring a camera, an alarm clock, a beanie cap for the evenings. I use the space blanket for rain instead of a poncho. Don't forget game bags & rope. My pack is a freighter pack. They are made to pack out game. My bag is big enough that on elk I can usually pack out a front and rear quarter at the same time. Take enough rifle, know bear anatomy, take enough bullets and don't forget your tag! TELL SOMEONE WHERE YOU ARE GOING and when you plan to return. If you do get in trouble or want to mark a location, those space blankets turned silver side up can be seen for a long way. Be careful and have fun. It is going to be an adventure! Again, go out during the pre-season and spend some nights out to get a feel for things. Predator calls will call in bears and other critters. Having a mountain lion tag on you in this Big, Wild, country is wise. Remember to pick a spot & I like to have hair in the scope on my 1st shot.

P.S. I am NOT an expert. I do have a bunch of pictures in my Bear Book & lots of slides also that I'm looking to convert to something else like power point but how? If you have questions I'll try to answer. I'll start bringing the Bear Book at the Aug. Monthly Meeting. WARNING: HUNTING BEARS THIS WAY IS NOT FOR EVERYONE! Be Honest with yourself. 
