

GOOD COYOTE DAY by Eddie M.

I originally joined the Club to learn to hunt predators. Way back when I was normal, there was an interest in hunting the hunters yet I didn't know how. I heard **PVCI** Member Lew Early calling at a **PVCI** Booth one Sunday & he literally called me to his table. I remember looking at him & cocking my head to the left & to the right & asked him, "So that is what it is supposed to sound like?" He made some comment & told me about the **PVCI** Meeting (back then at a Grade School on Indian School Rd.) I looked at his photo album & showed up at the Meeting where I joined that night. Why? The friendly atmosphere, an interesting topic & story plus there was a hunt coming and I could and did go, the Late Skip Avery asking me if I wanted to go hunt and if I did to paint my gun. He didn't know me from Adam yet there I was on a hunt with Skip & another novice. We slept on the ground that night had some whiskey and learned how to smoke up.

The reasons I stay in the Club now are many. The friends you make, the camaraderie & the mostly friendly competitions we have however the main reason is, like Skip did I try to help the new member get on his feet & show them how I hunt predators. Is it the best way? Probably not as I get beat quite regular anymore in the competitions however that's prone to happen when you have new members on your team & like Skip I always try to have at least one.

I met Chris B. at one of our Monthly Meetings. He was new, so like I do I probably went over & shook his hand saying my name. Then I probably gave him a photo album showing what has happen to me & others & can happen to you. I like to hunt the Club Hunts and may ask you if you want to go even if I don't know you. Some have this hang up with only hunting with people they know when it concerns guns. I am NOT one of those people. The first couple of times I believe he had other plans. Eventually we did go out for one day & saw one coyote. At least he knew what to do now.

Finally, a Club Hunt with Chris B., Tim N. and I. We left early in the morning & drove to our destination. We stopped & got dressed and ready, then drove to our 1st calling location. Since I drove I had the first stand. I placed Tim downwind, Chris upwind & I am off to the side. The conditions are fairly quiet so I opt to use my high-pitched cottontail call hat has worked here & there. Oh probably 7 minutes go by and I catch movement! A coyote is coming in on my left side! When it gets behind some thick brush I get the shotgun up. Did it catch the movement? The coyote continues running on my left side, 30 yards out. I swing & shoot, BOOM, just as it crosses where it would go behind me if it was closer. Well I either got him or I didn't & get back on the call. I'm calling & pausing, calling & pausing. In one of the pauses a 2nd coyote comes slowly sneaking out of the brush from the same place that the 1st coyote came from. It is very cautious and takes very slow steps, then looks & repeats this several times. I do a closed-mouth burp & the coyote looks my way and then turns its head to look away. The shotgun is up, my cheek is on the stock and the bead is on the coyote. I pull the trigger, CLICK! What! I cycle the pump and the coyote actually starts running towards me. Click again! It wasn't until I reached for a shell in my pocket that the coyote ran away. I call for a few more minutes then end the stand. My teammates walk over & I explain what just happen as I walk to check my 1st shot. There is one coyote lying on the ground, I did get him. We are on the Board with one! Oh we should have had two. I'd only put one shell in the shotgun.

Chris B. has a Good Sound when he calls. I have told him if we ever have a Calling Contest again (remember those?) that he should enter. He is up next & I split the upwind with him & Tim each taking the front & some side while I watched the downwind. Chris had only been calling 2 or 3 minutes when the shots started ringing out. What I believe happen is that a coyote came in that Tim knocked down. Then one came in to Chris that he wounded & emptied his shotgun on. He was out & said so. Then Tim started shooting at it also & the coyote ran off. In the meantime, a coyote came in from downwind in front of me that I shot & dropped. I tied a red bandanna high up on a bush where my coyote was & went to help search for the coyote that had run off. It took a bit but we did find it. Chris had called in a triple & all 3 were on the ground! We now had 4 on the Board! Both Tim & Chris B. each went on to call in & kill one more coyote each that day! We returned home that night for the Birthday Party of a 10year old girl named Saige, Russ's daughter & ended the Hunt with 6 coyotes for 3rd Place. Chris now had 4 coyotes on the books & needed one more for a 5-Pin. He has since surpassed that.

*** NOMINATIONS BEING ACCEPTED <u>NOW</u> FOR PVCI OFFICERS & BOARD of DIRECTORS*** YOU CAN MAKE PVCI HISTORY? (CLUB ELECTIONS IN APRIL) by Eddie M.

Yes it is that time of year again, the time when nominations for the **PVCI** Officers & Board of Directors comes to be. Every **PVCI** position is annually up for re-election in April except for some of the Board Members. The **PVCI** Officers & Board Members are the decision making core of **PVCI** & besides the duties that each position represents they are also required to attend one extra Meeting on the third Thursday of each month. There is a certain amount of prestige associated with being a Phoenix Varmint Caller Officer or Board Member & you will go down in history as having been elected. The **PVCI** Presidents especially not only have a place in history but there can also be some FAME that goes along with the position. This is after all a fine Club that is known. If you would like to nominate someone, anyone to be elected into this "Special Group" please do feel free to do so when the nominations are opened at the next few Club Meetings. **You are of course more than welcome to also nominate yourself.** Here is a brief breakdown of the positions:

President: The Head Honcho, the Main Man. Responsible for running both the regular Club Meeting & the Board of Directors Meeting & shall direct the activities of this Club.

Vice-President: Assist the President in running meetings & business, also in charge of meetings if President absent.

Corresponding Secretary: Responsible for all club correspondence with the outside, the press, the other clubs, etc. He shall keep a complete file of this correspondence. Also presents documents prior to mailing for Officer & Board approval & submit proof of all mailings. This person needs to have some **PVCI** letterhead in his possession. This person assumes the President's position in case of emergency or the absence of both the President and Vice-President.

Recording Secretary: Accurately records all club minutes at both the regular and board meetings. These minutes contain among other things, the type of meeting, date and place and time of the meeting, a list of the officers and directors present plus any motions or amendments. Keeps this record in a safe place and can furnish past minutes if needed.

Treasurer: Receives all dues and other funds coming into this club then deposits them to this club's account immediately upon receipt. Keeps accurate records of all receipts and disbursements and is able to render an annual financial statement. Also prepares a monthly report that is entered into the club's minutes during the meetings. The Treasurer keeps the Club's checkbook and he/she pays all the bills incurred by the Club including rent, trophies, locker, mailbox, etc. and responsible for the club's non-profit status and records. The President, Vice-President and Treasurer shall be authorized to sign checks, two (2) signatures being required.

Board of Director Member(s): Must be able to attend two (2) meetings per month, the regular and the board. Votes on issues discussed at board meetings. Also helps in planning and organizing club events, helps decide on the direction of the club and usually chairs at least one committee for the major club events. The Board of Directors is a 3-year term. All 5 officer positions are 1-year terms.

APC/KARA'S JUNIOR JAVELINA /SMALL GAME/PREDATOR CAMP by Eddie M.

I recently went to volunteer & give a helping hand at one of the Junior Javelina Camps that were going on in the state (there were 2 of them). I chose the APC Camp that Kara had mostly because I've known her over the years (she's good people) plus since I had a free weekend it might be a chance to possibly make a difference to someone in introducing them to something new. Also to me this was part of the Partnership that Steve C. and Ray E. had talked about where the different Clubs, the AZ. Turkey Federation, the AZ. Elk Society, Kara is an AZ. Predator Caller, etc. all help each other on Events just like this one. I decided to do this on the spur of the moment & did not register on-line, something that everyone who is going to help at one of these Events should do. I also went completely by my memory & faith finding my way to the Camp. Since I have no cell phone & pay phones seem to be very hard to find anymore there was no way to call or look up where the Camp was located instead pure memory was used on the what/where Camp was located from reading at work.

The Event was scheduled for Friday, Saturday & Sunday & after work Friday I headed towards the Camp but was so sleepy a place to sleep for the night had to be found. Next morning I arrived just as everyone was headed out for the morning Hunt. I said Hi to Kara & the Breakfast (Red Mtn. Outfitters) Crew & told her I was here to help. She told me that 3 Javelina had come in on Friday, that all the groups were gone for the morning & to grab some Breakfast. Lunch was at Noon & she was going to get some sleep. Since I was unfamiliar with the area, I went to do some hunting & scout the area. I saw bobcat & coyote tracks in the washes & thus did some predator stands. I also saw 5 rabbits, missing a jackrabbit & killing a cottontail. Returning before Lunch I joined the crowd, saw the skinning rack, thought about it & tied the cottontail to the rack with some paracord. The rabbit was then cleaned while a good crowd looked on. I received many thanks from the adults for the cleaning demo. Then we ate Lunch. After Lunch the AZ. Game & Fish guys came in with a Javelina that they had helped one of the youth find. One explained that he was going to butcher the Javelina using the gutless method & that if anyone wanted to watch to come on over. That also drew a crowd & I learned how to get the tenderloins out without gutting the critter. Then I talked to one of the Dad's that had been out with one of the other Mentor's that morning & had no action. The Dad had 2 sons, Max & Alex that had never been hunting. Dad use to hunt years ago back in Pennsylvania but had stopped since marriage/kids. He wanted his sons to experience what hunting was like so he'd brought them here hoping to get into small game. Since I'd seen some small game we agreed to hunt that afternoon. Then another kid with a Javelina showed up in camp & there was a story of a girl who had missed one.

Well Dad, Alex & I went out that afternoon (Max was asleep) & we all had action & got shots at rabbits but didn't kill any. Alex had gym shoes on which I warned him about as far as cactus. He learned not to wear gym shoes in the field the hard way by getting stuck a few times. Still when we were back at the truck he said, "That was Fun." Referring to the hunt action we'd had. I of course also brought up predator calling. Back at camp there were 3 jackrabbits on the skinning rack & the other mentors & I helped show the hunters how to clean them. That night Dinner was good & afterwards Kara had a drawing where all the youth received 2 or 3 prizes each! I can remember one of the young girls running up to her father almost shouting, "I won a knife, I won a knife!" She was so happy! Then she won something else! This Dad had 2 young girls in Camp & drove from Calif. I took their picture and e-mailed it to him when I got back to work. He was very thankful.



The next morning Dad, Alex, Max & I all went out to hunt small game. As there were 4 hunters & only 3 guns, I gave up my shotgun to Dad. We separated with Dad & Max going one way & Alex & myself the other. Alex, who had on boots this time right away missed 2 shots at a close jackrabbit that jumped up right at his feet. We continued to have action while the other side had none. When we met at our spot, Alex only had 3 shells left (16ga.) We stayed together then & soon after Dad killed a jackrabbit! Then we got into some quail. Max got shots. Eventually I got Alex on a jackrabbit that he also killed. The Camp was a Great Success with many happy kids & parents! This is what these Camps are all about & I encourage you to help out whenever you can. There are also Camps for predators, deer, elk, turkey, dove, etc.




DVD REVIEW BOB BRENHARDT CAGE TRAPPING by Eddie M.

There's also a DVD trapping in NC & PA.









SPRING GOBBLER HUNT- THE TIME IS GETTING CLOSE!

Gobble, Gobble! Gobble! Gobble, Gobble, Gobble! For many, many outdoors people this is the most exciting sound that they will hear in the woods come springtime, the sound of a wild turkey gobbler gobbling to attract female hen turkeys to his location. You see in the wild turkey world, breeding season comes around but one time a year, in the spring. Yet unlike many other critters the female (hen) is attracted to & goes to the male turkey (gobbler) by the sound of his gobble. In other words, if a gobbler wants to attract & breed hens, he'd better gobble & since there are usually multiple gobblers in the woods gobbling also, he'd better be loud! Now when we call to turkeys we usually make sounds like a hen however to be successful we must reverse nature & fool the gobbler into coming to us.

It was the evening of day three of the season. So far, it'd been a tough hunt. The gobblers were henned up meaning that they were only gobbling for a very short time in the morning (until the hens got there). Then they would shut up & stay with the hens all day or if one did keep gobbling, once out of the tree & on the ground, if you followed & called to him, he might

answer you back however he & the hens would keep walking away from you, the hens not wanting to share. It was either that or the mornings and/or evenings were quiet. Camp was a little discouraged. To me a gobbler's greatest friend is distance. They can be gobbling their heads off however if you are too far away to hear them then you won't. A gobbler's 2nd greatest friend is the wind mostly for the same reason, you can't hear them. My tactic under these circumstances is to get out & find some different places. My theory being that somewhere on the mountain, there is a gobbler gobbling his head off with no hens close by & he will usually be very interested in your hen calling. I was out now in a different place trying to roost or locate a gobbler that was gobbling. I'd seen some J-shaped gobbler droppings & tracks earlier in the day along with some popcorn-shaped hen droppings & knew that there were turkeys in the area somewhere. There was a BIG Burn on the right side of the road yet quite a bit of good habitat on my left side. After hearing the gobbles, I silently closed the distance & actually saw the gobbler (no hens) cross the road from the burn to the good habitat in the distance. He gobbled some more & disappeared into the tree line headed for his roost in one of the many trees around. I closed the distance again & half-heartedly tried to call the bird in but to no avail. He flew up into a tree & gobbled into the dark. I quit calling when I heard him fly up & tried my best to pinpoint the area he might be in, then walked back to the road & marked both where I wanted to park my truck & where I wanted to head into the trees the next morning. My goal had been accomplished. I had a place to start in the morning.

I woke up at 3:00AM the next morning & gobbled with my voice to wake up the other hunters in camp. Soon the lanterns were glowing. We talked briefly, some eating breakfast, others drinking coffee & then one by one, sometimes two, we were off like the spokes of a tire each person or group going to a different location to hunt. I had over 10 miles to drive plus a walk into the area to get to what I thought was close to the gobbler all before it got light enough to see. I finally reached the road, found my markers, parked & marked the truck, then strapped on my canteen & fanny pack, loaded the shotgun & headed in the dark towards where I thought the gobbler was roosted. My goal, to get close (80-120 yards) to the gobbler's location & find a suitable tree to sit at before it got light. Why? The gobbler was roosted high up in a very tall tree & would start gobbling before light to attract hens. Once it got light he would also be listening & watching for approaching hens or predators before he flew down. You can see a lot from up high & if something isn't right he will shut up & either fly down later or to a different area. There he's gobbling now! It's still somewhat dark however so I can adjust my walk & get closer. Now I can see the tall tree he might be in. If I can see it perhaps he can see me, better pick a tree soon. Got it, now get in position, put the diaphragm call in the mouth and take the aluminum slate out. He's gobbling again & again. Wait, wait & now let's try a single cluck. Instant gobble, he heard me! Now a very light yelp or tree call to tell him there's a hen in the area. Oh, listen to him gobble now however we stay quiet. To pour the hen talk on now might make him stay in the tree longer looking for you, so we we'll stay quiet & let him think, "Where did she go?" There's more gobbling, then the pitch changes as he flies out of the tree to the ground. There is silence. The next gobble is further away so on the slate we Cluck, cluck, purr, cluck &yelp. Then we scratch the leaves & cluck again, then do a yelp & cluck w/more leaf scratching. The gobbler turns & is on the way! You can tell because his gobbling is getting closer & closer! You scratch the leaves & cluck & purr again then hide the slate between you & the tree & raise your shotgun where you think he'll show. The gobbler comes into view, beautiful, big & all fanned out! He gobbles again, (man are they loud) looking & getting suspicious, where is she? That's when you give a couple clucks with your diaphragm. He hears & comes closer, then fans out again! He's so close you can hear the drumming. Concentrate, get your cheek on the stock & put the bead on his neck (not the head, it moves too much) about halfway down. Squeeze the trigger, BOOM! You got him! This is the way it is supposed to happen! Good Luck on your hunt!
