VARMINT CALLING WEEKEND by Eddie M.

Well here I go again, since I have no input or stories from you the Membership, I will tell another one of my stories. I hope that you enjoy. One thing before I start. Being able to get out & hunt varmints/predators is important to me. I go for the fun of being out there, breathing the outside air, taking in the breath taking scenery, enjoying seeing different types of wildlife and yes being able to pet and admire and take pictures with that wildlife every once in a while. I also enjoy the competition aspect of what we do, the thinking and strategizing, the pushing of your limits, all again for the fun. If you want to hunt & aren't doing it or if it has been a while since you went out, if you are physically able, why not go again and take another member with you? There are a lot of new faces that may be shy yet are very eager to learn.

It was another one of those Club Meetings where I couldn't find anyone to hunt with? The 1st Tuesday of the Month is always the Meeting and the weekend after is the Club Hunt. Most everyone knows this & if you want to hunt then of all the weekends in a month, you should have that weekend free yet all that I asked either had a partner already or weren't going because they had other things (honey-do's) to do? Well I will go by myself in ½ a heartbeat so I signed up.

I left the house early Saturday morning & arrived at my destination a little later than I planned. I put the hunting clothes on next to the truck, grabbed the stool & shotgun, slipped under the fence & walked out a ways from the truck.

1st Stand: I stuck my camouflaged self into a pocket of brush where I blended in & had a good view in front of me & tried one of my bite-down calls that I'd purchased when I lived in California & never really used. The sound was a cottontail distress all the way. After about 3 series I spotted a coyote standing & looking my way in the distance. It was just off to my left enough that I had to turn my butt towards it some on the stool to get a good shot. I got away with the slight movements because of the camo working for me by blending with the brush. I then slowly raised the shotgun & put the bead on the coyote, mentally not just pulling the trigger but trying to line everything up & make the shot actually count. BOOM, at the shot the coyote went crazy, rolling around. I got up & advanced a few steps then shot again, BOOM! There was more rolling around & I got closer & shot once more, BOOM! The coyote lay still. I went to the coyote and after seeing that it was dead gave my thanks to it by scratching it behind the ears and patting its belly and telling it thank you. I then took some pictures to help honor the animal. The distance was 68 steps with a 12 ga. shotgun with a modified choke shooting 3"- #4 buckshot! Instead of walking back to the truck now I wanted to walk in deeper so I took out a red bandanna (I always try to carry 2 or 3 in my cargo pants pocket) bent over a high branch, tied the bandana to it then let it fly high so that I could re-find this location. In deeper I went.

2nd Stand: Since the wind was still good I walked deeper yet angled away from where I'd shot. I finally picked a spot & stuck myself in front of some shaded vegetation that was big enough to cover me. I had a good view in front of me with no obstructions. I began calling with the same cottontail sounding call that I had used on the 1st stand, at first just a plain scream, WAA, WAA, WAA then I added some more pain and got frantic, WAAAA, WAAAA, WA, WA, WA, WAAAA! I caught the movement of the approaching coyote almost too late; it was running in so fast! My eyes saw the coyote; it registered in my mind and by the time I moved to react and take a shot the coyote was almost upon me! At 4 steps the coyote caught my movement and changed his course from towards me to GET OUT OF HERE! My shot, BOOM, dropped the coyote in a small depression and judging by the kicking it was doing, it wasn't going anywhere. 23 steps was the count.

3rd Stand: The last 2 stands were my 1st and 2nd. This was not my 3rd stand but my 3rd successful stand of the day and the weekend. I made a couple of unsuccessful stands then found a tree and hung up both coyotes to cool before I skinned them. I made something to eat and probably even had a short nap. Before skinning I reasoned that I had been here a while without making any noise. Why not make a stand first? Some #4 buckshot was quietly loaded into the shotgun, the wind checked and away I went into the wind and away from the truck. I chose a spot where I could hide in some brush and where the coyotes would have to come out of the brush of the desert and cross a small open to get me. Then using the same cottontail call as previous proceeded to call some then pause some. Call some, pause. I saw 2 coyotes coming but only one veered towards and came straight at me. I let it come on in, closer, closer then it angled to the left slightly. I slowly raised the shotgun, tracked it and pulled the trigger, BOOM! Down the coyote went and it was over! What a problem to have; now I had 3 coyotes to skin!



No other coyotes were called that day. The next day I saw 2 coyotes approaching in the distance only then never saw them again, saw one coyote that backdoored me (no shot) and missed one close coyote. I received double hunt points on the hunt (that hunt Only) for taking the time to skin the coyotes and got 2^{nd} Place for that Club Hunt.



PVCI ELECTIONS ARE IN APRIL

The Annual PVCI Club Elections are in April and Club nominations for the various Board and Officer positions should begin soon. During these nominations if you would like to be part of the PVCI Board of Directors or a PVCI Officer then please stand up and express your desire, as you can nominate yourself. If there is someone else that you have observed and think that they might be good for the job then nominate them. Being a PVCI Officer / Board of Directors Person means that you must make one more meeting per month. You will most likely help run one of the Events that we put on during the year.

Being a PVCI/BOARD Member has its perks. One of these is the Board Party, held in June or July and is privy to only the Elected Officials and members that help the Club. You are usually in the company of and rubbing shoulders with some very good Varmint Callers. Here is a short list of the positions: **President**: the head honcho, main man, Responsible for running both the regular club meeting and the board meeting. **Vic-President**, **Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary, Treasurer, & Board Member**.

All Officer Positions are one year terms. The Board Member is a three year term.

IMPROVING YOUR PREDATOR CALLING/HUNTING SKILLS

Okay hunting season is finally here. The purpose of your hunt is to have an adventure/experience and hopefully kill some critters. A lot of money will be spent on a lot of things in order to make these hunts happen. Gasoline, gear, food, snacks, etc....and yet more often than not (especially with rifle hunters) (just saying), when the time comes to take the shot you miss because the firearm isn't hitting where you are aiming! Things to do to correct that:

Rifle Hunters: If you are going to use a scoped rifle to hunt anything with, then you should MAKE SURE THAT THE RIFLE IS HITTING WHERE YOU ARE AIMING! This is just COMMON SENSE however listening to the hunting stories that I have heard over the years, especially with novices, this COMMON SENSE rule is abused regularly. If you use a rifle, <u>**Go To The Gun Range and Shoot Your Freak'in Rifle**</u> to make sure that you are zeroed in! EVERY rifle hunter should do this EVERY season during the offseason or before the regular season begins. My hunting rifles are a .270 & a .222 Savage. With both I will start at 25 yards and make sure that I'm shooting dead center. Then I move out from there. This is the West here, shots can be long so with my .270 I want to be zeroed or dead-on at 200 yards which means according to the ballistics chart I should be about 3 inches high at 100 yards and the bullet will drop 6 inches at 300 yards. So by holding dead center on a deer-sized target from close range to 300 yards I should kill the animal and I have. My .270 has killed foxes at 4 steps & shot the heads off of cottontail rabbits and I have also killed antelope at 300 plus yards by holding dead center with that same rifle. On my .222 I want it zeroed for 100 yards and hitting dead center at 25 yards.

Pattern your shotgun: The non-hunting public all too often finds it hard to believe that you can miss when shooting a shotgun! Well being mainly a shotgunner myself let me tell you that you can miss with a shotgun. The main reason that I miss with a shotgun is by not fully shouldering it especially the 1st shot or by stopping my swing on a moving target instead of swinging through. Another reason you could miss is by using an improper load for the critter that you are hunting. Example: Though 00 Buckshot will kill a dove it is not the correct load as the 9 pellets inside the shell will leave big gaping holes at 40 yards that a dove can fly right through.

Shooting Sticks make your own: One way to improve your long range rifle shots and for some all their shots is to use a shooting aid called a shooting stick. Here is how to make your own Shooting Sticks:


Home MADE SHOOTING STICKS

Tired of missing coyotes at 100 yards with a rifle that can shoot 1 inch groups or less? Been thinking about buying a bipod or some shooting sticks? Good idea but they cost more than a few bucks. What if you could make your own shooting sticks for under \$10? Better idea?

You will need 2 pieces of wood. I used 1/2" x 1" oak that were 38" long for mine. A bolt, washer, and wingnut will hold the two sticks together. A hole will need to be drilled into both sticks for the bolt. The location of the hole and length of the sticks will vary depending on what you may or may not sit on during a stand. Callers sitting on stools will need longer sticks than those that sit on theground. I put a healthy bead of silicone in the crotch of the sticks where the rifle rests to reduce noise. Rocky Taylor split some garden hose to slip over his sticks where the rifle rests to quiet them down. For a bit of concealment a few splotches of camo paint won/t hurt.

I hope you experience fewer misses as I have while using your home made shooting sticks. Keep the hits up and the misses down.

You then go into the dealer and ask for the contact telling him you are a Phoenix Varmint Caller & pick out the vehicle you are interested in. They will give you the best price. The Club will receive the Referral Fee.

Despite almost sucking my lips off mouse squeaking, I never see him come out of the brush.

Now, I have called in many hawks, ravens (since I have never pulled a trigger on them), owls, buzzards and one golden eagle. This is the first hawk to sit there quietly, and then announce that a coyote is coming in. The next time this happens, I will be looking down the barrel, ready for a fast moving target! As far as I could tell, the coyote was convinced that the hawk must have the rabbit down and was therefore going to lose his lunch to the hawk.
