BLAST FROM THE PAST: THE START OF IT ALL

My 1st predator hunt was in 1983 or 1984 with then member Ed Stingley. Ed was a neat guy who was very active in the Club and also a past president. As you will read we had a good weekend of memories.

On our 1st hunt we went to the desert country around Gila Bend, then out more West and back. I can still remember the very 1st stand that I ever took part in. Ed was calling with one of his rubber band-style calls that he made himself with 2 pieces of walnut tied together with string. He put a small dish in the middle of the 2 pieces then put a rubber band around the whole deal. You called by blowing and changed the pitch by biting down on the thing. It sounded good and worked on the coyotes just fine. He wasn't too long into the stand when all of a sudden a coyote showed up coming in at a pretty good pace. Somehow I managed to shoot and miss that coyote twice! Once coming in and once going out! We hunted hard the rest of that day and called in a couple of other coyotes which were also missed. No matter, after that first stand where I'd managed to miss twice, I WAS HOOKED!!!

The next day found us again out in the desert country with Ed calling with his homemade rubberband call. In the meantime, I was sitting there minding my own business when I heard a commotion (a big ruckus) Looking over I saw a coyote running right towards Ed at a very accelerated rate of speed! The problem was that the coyote was right between Ed and myself! Ed was more or less shouting for me to shoot, shoot, shoot! Only I couldn't get a clear shot. Do you know that coyote came on in and got so close to Ed that it knocked his stool over on the way past! On the way back to the truck we hit fresh fox tracks in the dust of the road. The tracks headed right for the truck then actually went up onto the truck's hood! It was plain to see that the fox had sat down upon the hood then jumped down & walked away on the other side of the truck! It was all very plain to see yet to this day still unbelievable. What we came up with was that the fox was probably looking and laughing at us while he watched us let that coyote get away.

Yet another stand found us sitting back to back in an area of thick mesquite. Ed was again calling and it wasn't very long before I saw feet coming and caught a coyote sneaking in closer and closer. I got the shotgun up undetected and just waited. That coyote got a full load of #2 shot right in the face! My first harvest, was I happy!

Around towards evening Ed called in a badger which advanced very quickly towards us. Are they tough? I shot this critter 3 times in the face with #2 shot and it still kept on coming! Finally Ed finished the critter with a shot from his rifle.

What a weekend we had together with memories that will hopefully stay with me forever. Well that is the story of my 1st hunt and the TALE of HOW I GOT HOOKED ON PREDATOR CALLING. May your hunts, experiences and good memories be good to you.

THE ULTIMATE DREAM STAND WITHOUT RESULTS

While out javelina hunting on the recent H.A.M. hunt I came across the fresh tracks of 3-4 javelina in the mud and decided to follow them. The tracks went across 2 or 3 creek drainages and took me 1-1/2 to 2 miles from the road. I eventually came to a big deep wash with a small-sized mesa on the other side. Walking on top of the mesa I noticed the wind was in my face and decided to see if I could call in these pigs. Setting up in a small grove of mesquite trees I took out my Pee Wee Critter Call and did what Ed M. calls a surprise for about a minute. I silently counted to 200 before calling again for about 30 seconds. All of a sudden I saw 3 coyotes about 150 yds. out hauling buns racing towards me each trying to be first! I kept whimpering on the call and when these dogs were 100 vds. out I noticed more movement and looked to see 2 pairs of doubles racing each other towards me on my right! Then they all saw each other and I had the ultimate dream stand with 7 covotes running towards me at once! I had a Thompson Contender .54 Cal. muzzleloader on the ground and my .357 revolver in my lap. About 40 yards out one of the coyotes came to a stop and looked at me. I focused on it and pulled up and took a shot with my pistol, BOOM! At the shot the covote spun around once and was gone out of there! The other coyotes went everywhere, some running behind, around and in front of me. I couldn't get another shot off. When the mud settled I went to check the shot



and found no blood but I did find a deep set of running tracks which I followed for approx. ½ mile. I gave up & went back to the truck after that as there was still no blood and the tracks were still going strong. Now I've called up to 5 coyotes at one time before but NEVER 7! The sight of those 7 coyotes all coming at me at once is a sight I think I shall never forget!






WHERE: The Boot Camp campsite will be at Vincent Ranch (See map & directions below)

ARIZONA BLACK BEAR HUNTING/CALLING (Some Strategies To Consider) by Eddie M.

The next time you see the shoulder, full or rug mount of a bear, know that in most cases, it didn't come easy. Arizona is blessed with a decent bear population & with a little strategy, planning, preparedness, know-how & skill it is really possible that you could put the tag on one here. Pre-season scouting is very important though. So much so that I say one of the best ways to not get a bear is just show up on opening day and start hunting.

When serious I usually begin my scouting in July. My favorite areas to hunt are Wilderness areas. Here the rules are you can walk in or ride a horse/mule ONLY. No motorized vehicles or bicycles are allowed. Hunt Units w/Wilderness areas often have higher bear numbers & you usually have the country to yourself for a good reason. This Wilderness hunting with you miles from civilization & living out of your backpack or saddlebags with often no cell service is simply NOT for everyone. Be Warned: Mother Nature is very unforgiving & before going you'd best know how to take care of yourself in the Outdoors in all types of situations or be with someone who does before trying this way is considered. The competition outside of the Wilderness areas, where you can still come back to your vehicle & camp is how most people hunt however the hunt pressure can be really heavy in these areas with multiple hunters often after the same bear.

My scouting begins at home going over topo maps. One of the best ways to observe wild bears in Arizona is to glass them when they drop down to eat the prickly pear fruits in the high desert. This usually happens around mid August through mid September. The bears love these pears & will gorge on them with gusto. I have held up stomachs that weighed a full 30 lbs! On the topo maps I'm looking for elevations from 3,200 to 4,800 feet with 4,500 to 4,800 really being ideal. Anything lower seems to be too hot unless the bear is desperate. Anything higher & the brush is too thick for effective glassing/calling. How a bear responds to your calling is better known when it's seen. I'm also looking for South & East facing grassy slopes where the cactus grows better. A bear must also have shade & needs to be able to walk up into higher brush or down into a deep cut or canyon where there are big trees or shady cover to rest. Water is another must have. Waterholes esp. close to canyons, rivers, creeks, springs & seeps should all be noted. How close/far are they from the elevations you're looking at? Then before the season opens, go in & take a look at the place. Make sure the place is still there & not ashes! Then look to see how the (food supply) fruit is doing. With pears the bears don't eat the pads, they eat the fruits & the better the crop of fruits, the more apt you are to find a place that'll hold bears & bring them back year after year. Look for sign, especially old scat. Go higher & check for beds, tracks & scat, check the water sources. Once good areas are found, glass the areas from a distance & try to stay out of them upon returning. Try to find some bears BEFORE the season opens. This'll put you Way ahead of the game.

Now bears also live in the Manzanita (May-June-July-Aug-Sept) & eat the berries that this plant produces. These areas are thick, thick, thick though which is why the bears like it here. I know of at least one bear hunter that glasses this Manzanita & finds bears. The shots are often long & getting to the critter & getting it out after the shot is a LOT of work. We also had one bear hunter (Keith I.) talk to us one year. He also hunted the Manzanita by breaking his way into the stuff for a long ways. Then he'd sit & wait a couple hours letting things settle before he started calling right in the middle of this thick stuff. He only used a bow & had arrowed a few bears and a few mountain lions doing this!

Acorns cannot be ignored. In fact when there's a really good acorn crop not as many bears will drop down for the prickly pear fruits & when the acorn crop is poor you'll often see more bears in the pears. The scrub oak is 1st on the table (July-Aug-Sept) & the bears will even eat the green ones. Then later (Late Oct-Nov) the big oak trees in the woods have their acorns. Elk, deer, bear, turkey, squirrels, almost everything eats acorns. When in the woods, try dropping over the edge on the shady side of a long ridge filled w/oaks. Go 100 yds. down or more & try the fawn or rabbit distress.

During the November & December Coues season in Coues country I've observed bears under the dark blue berry juniper trees, just feeding & resting all day in areas where glassing was possible. I can imagine they are also in the thick stuff where you can't glass. Find a vantage point & try calling where there are a LOT of junipers w/those blue berries.

When predator calling for bears Do Be LOUD! Bears live in BIG COUNTRY & won't respond if they can't hear you. I've had more luck with the fawn distress however the late Reed Petersen used a jackrabbit call & called in over 100 bears. Don't pause more than 30 seconds was his advice. Be sure you have a good backstop behind you so that you don't get mauled & have a plan to get the meat & hide out. By law, you have 48 hours to report a kill. 1800970BEAR is the phone.

Well I'm probably the last person in the hunting world to own a Trail camera. The allure has been there but I just didn't embrace the technology. These days every camera manufacturer & binocular maker has a complete line to choose from. A good friend of mine is quite serious about his Coues Deer hunting so much so that he sets up a series of Trail Cameras in different areas during the summer to "scout" for deer & lion. I was quite impressed with what he was able to accomplish. After the cameras sat all summer we waded through the pictures. Interesting results. One of the cameras was doing well



until a ground squirrel chewed through the Para cord holding it up. We did get a good picture of him though. Looks like it is time for me to get on the bandwagon & get a Trail Cam! Well I got a nice one made by Bushnell for Christmas from my wife Cindi. Once I read all the instructions I went to the Internet & did some searches on Tricks & Tips for Trail Cams. Believe me there's quite a bit out there. Apparently people are sick & tired of having there cameras stolen. An entire secondary market has popped up on how to protect these expensive high tech gadgets from would be thieves. I decided

to make my own metal box to contain the camera. Cindi bought me a cable made specifically for the camera with a lock attached so I incorporated it into the design. It took me all day but I came up with something I was quite proud of. If they want the camera they better bring a hefty set of bolt cutters & a ladder to get it out of the tree.


There is no shortage of critters in my neighborhood. When the weather is nice we sleep with the windows open and the coyotes wake us up when they howl in the early morning hours. It's not unusual to spot them in the valley below the house either. There is a herd of deer in the area too and they come to the only water source around at the bottom of the hill. It's time to set up this camera & get the "real picture." I decided to put it halfway up a hill in a Palo Verde tree. Just below the camera and out in front I put a javelina skull from my 2016 archery season. After a couple of weeks I retrieved the camera and took a look at the contents. Well I got pictures of me setting up the camera and nothing else. The strange was that the skull was gone! I guess that is part of the learning curve or setting these cameras up. My 2nd set up was in April. I decided to pick a spot with water. Luckily there is a retention spot after it rains and the water stays in a low spot that create a pond. I carefully trimmed a thick bush and locked the camera in place. The water in this little desert creek only runs when we

have a big rain and the small pond evaporates in about 2 weeks. Sounds like a good set up to me! I walked around the pond knowing the camera should be taking my picture as a test. It worked will so I set it up and walked away. Two weeks later the camera had 9000 pictures on it! Well another lesson I learned was to secure the camera to a sturdy tree or rock. The bush I locked it to was susceptible to wind and moved quite a bit when he breeze blew hard enough. Most of the photos had to be deleted BUT some were very interesting. To say I got a lot of bird pictures would be an underestimation. The camera is so sensitive I even got pictures of lizards moving on rocks 20 feet away! The night



pictures were fun. You can see the glow of the animal's eyes in the picture before you can make out the body in later pictures. I sorted through the good pictures and here are two I really liked. Something came in every night. I have photos of: Vultures, ravens, quail, lizards, Mule Deer, Javelina, coyotes, bobcat, domestic dogs, children, a photographer, a Motorcross rider. 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


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
