WHAT ARE WE TO DO IN THE OFF-SEASON???

Well it will soon be the end of turkey season & the true dog days of the long hot summer will soon be upon us. Soon, even the idea of cold temperatures & handling longhaired fur from the critter you just killed will seem like a fairy tale that never happened. Instead sweating, excessive heat warnings, staying hydrated & seeing the wild critters in their bikinis will be the norm. What is the up & coming predator caller/hunter who cherishes in the thrill of seeing some wild critter briefly appear before it tries to run in and eat you, what are we to do? It's too hot to go outside plus most seasons are closed anyway. True, coyote is open all year however most of us are purposefully letting the coyotes raise their pups and only going after the dogs in the antelope areas and/or if invited somewhere. Do not fret my friends, there are plenty of things that can be done during these hot summer days. Even though you may not be killing wild dogs & cats, you can still stay practiced up and keep your fun competitive spirit plus make new contacts & stay prepared for the upcoming season.

For starters I would attend each & every Club Event that happens in this time period. These Club Events have been going on for many, many years and are not accidents. Instead they are designed to Help You the predator caller/hunter make it through these long HOT summer days. All of these Events are family-oriented, designed so that you might bring your family and/or friends & introduce them to the other Club members & their family & friends. Once a weekend is spent with others doing things together like having meals together or having friendly competitions (having fun) against each other, just maybe they will learn that we're not blood thirsty killers but hunters with an addiction (smile). Hunters that will bend over backwards and do most anything to help their fellow person succeed and have a good time. Once the wife & family get to know some of the folks you may be hunting with it may make it a little easier to get away come hunting season. Also the competitions at these Events are designed to keep your competitive spirit in tune and keep you practiced up. Trust me, in most of these competitions, if you don't practice, you won't win or even place.

Another GREAT benefit of these Club Events is you the caller getting to know the other callers that participate better. You see them, they see you, you interact and good things can happen. Plus anytime you get around a fire at night like say the BIG community fire at the BBQ (or the grill w/fire restrictions) or the Fishing Contest or Trail Clearing, if you keep your ears open, you can learn things. Invariably there will be hunting stories told, hunting tips given out on what methods worked for this or that, hunting questions answered, etc. Events like the Arizona Trappers Association Convention and the Southwestern Fur Harvesters Rendezvous and our own George Knox Memorial Boot Camp are other GREAT places to hear this kind of talk. Of course you will also hear hunting/trapping seminars at these 3 Events.

Volunteer on a Work Project or a Youth Camp: Did you know that the AZ. Game & Fish Dept., the Arizona Elk Society, the Arizona Deer Association, the Arizona Bighorn Sheep Society, the Arizona Antelope Foundation, Arizona Turkey, Outdoors Unlimited and other Outdoor Organizations have planned camps & projects for both youth &adults? From introduction to the outdoors in general to having teaching how to shoot & hunt camps to habitat improvement & restoration projects and ALL of these functions need VOLUNTEERS to help make the event a success. Pick up a copy of the 2014/2015 Fall Big Game Hunt Regulations and look through the youth section and/or get on the AZGFD website or Go to the Calendar of Events to see a schedule of what is planned.

What else can be done during the long HOT days of summer? **Go fishing!** I like catfish at night in the rivers and lakes in the desert and bass & cats in the daytime. Trout of course are king in the high country lakes however there are also catfish & northern pike and even walleyes for those that know how to fish for them. Do not forget the Indian Reservations for fishing either. Both the White Mountain and San Carlos Reservations have lots of fishing opportunities and the limit on trout for instance is still 10 fish and not 6.

Look for dropped antlers: Every year 99.8% of every deer & elk in the state lose their antlers and grow a new set. These things are worth money so there is competition for them yet there are still plenty of antlers out there that have not been found. Looking for these dropped antlers is fun and can help you to learn some new country and what it has to offer.

Most of the desert & high country is miserable in the summertime. The heat & biting flies & gnats in the day & mosquitoes at night can drive you insane. Still **scouting new country by foot, horse or vehicle or checking on the old country can be worthwhile.** Find your antelope, deer and elk or bear now. Ever thought about braving the heat to watch the desert bighorns rut in July? Don't forget practicing your shooting, patterning the shotgun & sighting in all the rifles. In fact now is also a good time to replenish your stock & order in whatever it is that you think will make you better. The point is that between fishing, volunteering, scouting & getting ready for the upcoming season, there is plenty to do. **ALSO DON'T FORGET the Annual Arizona State Varmint Calling Championship.** This Traditional Event is designed to keep you blowing on your predator calls. The only difference is that you will be calling to human judges instead of predators. This is the same yet this is also different and a CHALLENGE and FUN. There are categories for Experts and Novices. Obviously those that practice will probably do better. In the Expert category the competition is usually pretty fierce yet even the first time Novice caller should not be intimidated. We have had kids as young as 6 or 7 enter the Novice category and though they didn't win, they did compete and did okay (they were not last).

ARIZONA GAME & FISH OUTDOORS EXPO REPORT by Eddie M.

March 29-30, 2014 were the dates for this years Arizona Game & Fish Outdoors Expo. The Event was held out at the Ben Avery Shooting Facility off of the Carefree Highway. This Event transformed the Shooting Facility into the largest hands-on Outdoor Expo in Arizona with outdoor adventure and fun for the entire family! As in years past admission and parking were totally free, as were the shuttles to and from the parking to different points of the event. Once inside you had the unique opportunity to test various firearms and archery equipment on the range and talk to the manufacture's reps. There were demonstrations on speed shooting, skeet shooting, backpacking, game calling, competitive shooting, four-wheeling, dog retrieving, etc. plus demos at the fish tank. There were also many, many workshops and exhibition booths displaying wildlife and the shooting, hunting, fishing & outdoor sports.

The Campground was a buzz with hopeful youth (approx. 78 total) eager to learn how-to then go turkey hunting. Meals were provided by Youth Outdoors Unlimited & seminars given by various individuals. Then teams were matched up and away everyone went turkey hunting. Some birds were killed too. Scott B. of PVCI estimated that around 20 or more birds were taken! I will bet that more than one of these youth PLUS even some of the parents are now "Officially Hooked" on turkey hutting and will come back to hunt another day, probably introducing someone else to the sport also. 
MORMON LAKE LODGE OUTDOOR FESTIVAL - NATIONAL GET OUTDOORS DAY - JUNE 14, 2014



There has traditionally been a Jr. Calling Contest however we need some youth present to participate. In between the shooting look forward to some really good food and having a cool good time up in the pines. Hope that you and the family and friends can make it. Member Tommy M. has graciously accepted to head this Event again! Other volunteers will also be needed to run each shooting event. If you run the Event, you make the rules for the most part. Volunteers will also be needed for various other duties. Route #1: On Hwy 87 go through Payson ,Strawberry, & Clints Well. Stay onHwy87 to the first right (Fr 95) Past the Blue Ridge Range station. Take FR 95 South go approximately 1 mile to FR 513. Camp on the East side FR 513

Route #2: Go north on I -17 to camp Verde
Turn right on either Exit 287 or 288
Go East on Hwy 260 to Hwy 87.
Turn Left on Hwy 87 and
follow Route #1 Instructions

PLEASE only camp on the right side of FR 513 as you drive in. According to the NEW Coconino Forest Rules, Please DO NOT camp more than 100 yards from the main road. Shooting will be on the left & again according to the New Rules Please DO NOT park more than 10 yards from the main road on the left side. * **Keep ALL dogs on a leash** * Portable toilets will be provided. * Please clean up your camping area before going home. Pack out all trash. * Please drown your ashes w/ water & dirt & scatter the camp fire ring rocks. * Please bring canopies or tarps for shade & extra ice.

REMEMBER GUN SAFTEY: No loaded firearms in camp. Please No alcohol & guns. SHOOT ONLY when directed to do so & in designated area. Use the proper firearms for targets.

REGISTRATION For Target Shooting Events: See Tommy M. Cost is \$2.00 per shooter per event. All shooting events to immediately follow each other. Times may vary.

NOTICE: All events are shooting what you brought, all Optics OK – except no magnified optics for jug shoots. A Red-Dot sights (no projected laser beams) is considered the same as an iron sight as long as there is no magnification

SPRING TURKEY HUNTING – NEW MEXICO 2014

Hi my name I Eddie M. and I've been an avid passionate predator caller for many years. However in the spring when the predator hunting starts winding down a new passion takes over called spring turkey hunting! Spring turkey hunting can be a blast! Usually the birds are vocal, the temps are tolerable & often you may have more than one opportunity per day IF you really apply yourself & keep hunting. To help PVCI raise money for the last 2 years I have offered the highest bidder a chance to go turkey hunting with me. Now I'm not a guide & this isn't a guided hunt (the Club gets the money). You see when we go I'm not just trying to help you get a turkey, I'm also trying to teach you how to become a turkey hunter so that you might also be able to call & kill your own gobbler someday through books, DVD's & actual hands-on experience. So much happen that I may not be able to tell the whole story & I caution you to continue reading AT YOUR OWN RISK! This spring turkey hunting can be addictive & when the BUG bites it can be hard to come back! Seriously marriages can be ruined, etc. The 2 years that I've done this have added 2 new turkey hunters to the mix, Jared last year and Ryan this year. Both can't wait for next year! I will tell you about the first few days of the 2014 season.

DAY ONE: This year's hunt took place in New Mexico & we had action from the start. We arrive, get dressed & head up the hill, looking for sign & sounding like hens. Near the top of the hill we hear 3 gobblers in the distance. The closest is HOT and did show himself a little too quickly. Ryan had a bad shot & I had the call in my hand when it showed. It walked away gobbling & eventually went quiet (saw something it didn't like). Back to the truck to drive to the camp road. A flock of hens & gobblers are spotted heading uphill on the way. A walk about afterwards yields some action, no birds. We check another location finding sign here & there. Some time is spent wiping out the sign so others don't know. Ryan and I do a Ridge-Walk. Ivan stays in the truck, a little tired & sickly. I thank him in advance because when he stays I've killed before. The Ridge-Walk yields nothing until we round the corner of it. A gobbler answers our yelping and is soon on the way! Ryan quickly sets up in front & downhill a bit. Turkey talk can be heard and approaches Ryan's location. The gobbler is also getting closer. Boom, Ryan shoots! Immediately there is a gobble up on my level. I make some clucks & the bird comes into view all fanned out! It relaxes & goes behind a tree. My gun is up when it reappears. Only the head & neck are in view. Boom, I shoot and the bird goes rolling down the hill with me in pursuit. I eventually get to him & grab a leg then the other & hold it up with the chest to me until it quits flapping. I do this so that the bird stays pretty but the hill beat this one up a little. My shot was 31 steps. Ryan missed but is excited that we got a bird! Yelping on the way back to the truck, we get another answer when we arrive. Both Ryan & Ivan gun up & head towards the bird. It provides excitement only. One far off bird is heard at roosting time. We drive to the camp spot and setup in the dark.

DAY TWO: I wake up late! It is already daylight! The others are quickly woken up. We listen, listen. I ask Ivan to go the camp hill drop-off and start yelping there, then walk back this way. Go back & forth. He does & while walking past us, I tell Ryan that he could sound a little more excited. Just then Ivan does some loud purrs and a gobbler goes off directly behind camp a little ways off. It advances quickly. Again both Ryan & Ivan gun up & head towards the gobbles. I stay back & call very sparingly. One of these guys should get this bird. Boom, Ivan is the one that kills! I grab a camera & run to where they are hearing a distant gobbler in front of us on the way. Ivan is holding the bird correctly, the bird's chest towards his. The gobbler is beautiful! Pictures are taken, the story told, then I ask Ryan to walk & start yelping. He walks away going downhill. Ivan and I head to the truck. I strike the call there and hear 2 birds in front of us. Where is Ryan? Ivan finds him & Ryan & I head towards the 2 birds. They are a little ways out. We walk & walk throwing them a yelp here & here then going quiet & closing the distance. When real close I pour the turkey talk on. They are together & they are coming. Quickly we setup, Ryan is in front shotgun up. I am behind him looking & have no gun, it is Ryan's turn. He doesn't have to wait long. Two birds appear. Crouched behind Ryan, I only see one bird. Boom, Ryan shoots then I notice him with his head down. The gobbler I'm looking at jumps at the shot then turns broadside. I thought that maybe Ryan had missed again and had his head down because he gave up. So I jump out from behind and point at the still standing bird saying, "You can still get him, you can still get him!" In reality, Ryan did kill his bird and was so overcome that he'd killed one that it never even occurred to him that he could shoot the other bird. The gobbler takes off. We now had 3 gobblers in 1 day and a morning. We break camp & head for our Main Location deeper in the woods where member Larry M. is located. He has one hanging also when we get there. The day after Ryan goes home, I kill another bird the next morning & Jared shows up to hunt that evening. Then another whole set of adventures happen! Five guys killed 8 birds!











UPCOMING EVENT: PAYSON WILDLIFE FAIR – MAY 10, 2014

On May 10, 2014 the town of Payson will host the 20th Annual "Payson Wildlife Fair." The Fair is held at Green Valley Park and brings wildlife awareness to the whole town. Admission is free. For the Event, the Lake in the park called Green Valley Lake (one of the Urban Lakes) will be over stocked with 800 lbs. of trout (including some HUGE incentive fish) and open to all to fish for free from the hours of 9:00a.m. to 3:00p.m. Normally an Urban Fishing License is required. There will also be many wildlife booths and displays, games, prizes, some virtual shooting sports, free fishing poles, gear & bait plus instructions for the kids and much more. Smokey the Bear also makes an annual appearance.

Now in the past, PVCI has had a booth at this Event promoting the sport of varmint calling. There is ALWAYS a LOT of interest! Volunteers are needed to help run the booth. You could even make it a weekend to keep trying for turkey?

UPCOMING EVENT: PVCI ANNUAL FISHING CONTEST – JUNE 7, 2014 FREE FISHING DAY!!!

PURPOSE: To find the BEST Fisherman in the Club in both the adult & kids category.

WHERE: ASHURST LAKE in the Coconino National Forest

DATE: Saturday June 7, 2014, FREE FISHING DAY. TIME: Daybreak until 5:00 p.m. You can check-in anytime during the day however the FINAL check-in will be at 5:00p.m.

ENTRY FEE: None, in fact a fishing license is not even required as this is Free Fishing Day and no license is required to fish on all public state waters except on the Indian Reservations.

CONTESTS OPEN TO All PVCI members PLUS their families and friends who may be interested.

There will be 2 categories: Adult – ages 14 and older and children – ages 13 and under. 1st Place prizes will be awarded for the longest fish and the longest stringer. The longest stringer will be the total of all the fish caught. There will start with a limit of 1 prize per person so if the same person has both the longest fish and the longest stringer, he/she will choose their prize and the 2nd longest fish gets the 2nd prize. NOTE: All fish species in Ashurst lake are eligible for the Contest. The trout limit is 6 fish. Boats are okay yet do remember that there is an 8hp limit on the Lake. In addition to the prizes for longest fish & stinger, there will also be a Free Members & Guests Raffle! You need Not fish in the Contest to be eligible for this Raffle however you DO need to be present.

As soon as we get the fish officially measured & the fish & Raffle prizes are all given out, it's time for our **Potluck/Fish Fry Dinner** at one of our pre-determined campsite locations **This is a Potluck too so please remember to bring a dish. Also an extra frying pan, fish batter, aluminum foil, etc. to help with getting the fish fried up would be nice.** We have really had some wonderful dinners in the past & many consider this the BEST part of the day, eating & mingling with the other Club members & company.

There is a small fee to stay overnight at a campsite on Ashurst and once inside the Recreation Area you must stay in a campground. If you sleep in the National Forest outside of the Recreation Area you won't be charged. There are good bathroom facilities at the Lake.

*** One way to get to the lake is to take I-17 North to Exit 339. Turn right onto Forest Highway 3 (Lake Mary Road) and go southeast about 20 miles. Turn left onto FR82E and drive east about 4 miles to the Lake. Another route would be to take I-17 North to Exit 306 (Stoneman lake Road). Turn right onto Stoneman Lake Road and drive 16 miles to FH3, then turn left & drive to FR82E, then turn right and drive 4 miles to the Lake. Refer to the Coconino Forest Map.


