PREDATOR CALLING RE-BOOT (HOW DO YOU SPELL FRUSTRATION) by Eddie M.

How do you spell FRUSTRATION? Let me count the ways. Whether you are new to predator calling or have been at it awhile, FRUSTRATION can come in many ways however there is probably no frustration like going out time after time and not calling any critters in period that you know of or worse hearing coyotes & knowing they are in the area, yet they plain flat ignore you. 1) What is the reason? 2) Is it something that I'm doing? 3) Is there anything that I can do to turn things around? Well first let me say this; My #1 Rule when it comes to predator calling is: Rule#1) There are no hard & set rules when it comes to predator calling....and to answer the above questions, 1) not sure exactly, 2) probably and 3) perhaps.

Things have certainly changed in predator calling even since I joined the Club some 30 plus years ago. Predator calling's popularity has just skyrocketed in some areas of the country and the Coyotes in some areas really seem to know when someone is hunting them, even when you are doing the Basic's. Call it "Coyote Survival 101 in Today's World." Some members are still bringing some critters in though. Are they doing something different than the Basics? Well maybe and maybe not. We Americans are spoiled rotten compared to many in the world. We have clean water, instant fire, already cooked food, even a military that protects us. Yet many take these facts for granted. Well I am betting that in most instances of a slump in your calling success, that somewhere in your tactics or calling, we may be taking something for granted.

The Coyote is a smart & very adaptable animal that has flourished & spread East despite even the Government being at war with it here & there throughout the years. It doesn't have to have meat to survive like the wolf. They can live on melons, oranges, grasshoppers, mesquite beans, juniper berries. That is adaptable! They say that when the world ends & man is wiped from the earth that there will be 3 critters left. The cockroach, the rat and the coyote!

What could we be taking for granted? I have come up with a short list that includes scouting, body & clothes prep, your approach, your stand set-up, calling sounds & making the shot count. Let's take a look at each. Scouting ... The members or teams that we have that consistently do the best have done some pre-season scouting period. They might also do some inseason scouting, regardless it's been done. How many areas have you scouted for predators? Sometimes calling without scouting is like fishing in a fishless pond & your results are probably not going to be good. Body & Clothes Prep... Properly cleaned body and clothes can only help in my mind. I don't want to get into the washing and care of your cloth here as you can read that elsewhere. Smoking up is one way to help disguise your smell. Make a fire, when you only have coals left put green vegetation relative to the area on the coals then put your clothes (not your face mask) in the thick smoke. Remove before the flames start. I've heard that you'll spell heavenly of the vegetation that you use. Your Approach... This is the one that most of you take for granted over all except pre-season scouting. You are hunting the hunters, predators that kill for a living, critters that have superior noses, sight and hearing. So why do you talk out loud or start coughing when you wake up or have headlamps & flashlights bouncing around when it's still dark and you are going to walk away from the truck for your 1st stand. Be conscious of the noise that you are making. Don't bang things around looking for this & that in the morning, do that the night before. When walking in, don't just walk, try to walk quietly. If walking in a noisy section, move to a quieter section. Don't just bust though brush when you can push it aside and walk quietly through. You are hunting critters with wild dog ears and are supposed to be trying to get in undetected. Whisper, load your firearm quietly, etc.. Imagine for a moment that you are the coyote that makes a living out there. How many times a month do you here this same scenario? You here a vehicle approaching, that's ok, a lot of vehicles pass by only this time the vehicle stops! You may/may not here footsteps, then there is a period of silence. You howl to make you buddies aware. When here come the distress sounds. 98% of the time it is a rabbit distress. It begins then goes quit, again & quit. You know the routine, so you ignore or go down wind & smell humans, yuck! The sounds stop. You here humans taking & the vehicle leaves. Six hours later, the scenario repeats itself, then five days later again. In between, there are door slams, people talking, hand & electronics distress bunnies, shooting and that stinky humans smell. Some of your buddies are never seen again. Other have had bad experiences & try to pass on **not** to go check certain sounds. The word gets around. Remember that the coyote is a smart & very adaptable animal. Stand Set-Up: Set-Up where you can see, preferably with clear shooting lanes. By this I mean have a clear open front view. Sit in front of vegetation not behind and sit in the shadows when you can (let your camo work for you). An elevated position also usually helps as long as you aren't sky lined. Calling Sounds: In order for a coyote to come to a call, they have to be completely fooled. It is January & only the survivors are what are left out there. Most have probably heard it all. Many have had close calls from humans. In some cases, the rabbit distress may scare coyotes as they have been conditioned to associate the sound with danger. Other sounds to use, the lip squeak, distress rodents, fawn, cat, bird, something different. I bet that that coyote vocalizations are part of these successfully caller's tricks. Of course, your approach and watching downwind also play into this. Making the Shot Count: Those that consistently do good Practice, Practice, Practice and know their firearm, period. How often do you Practice?

JAVELINA CHALLENGE-CALLING by Eddie M.

Arizona, New Mexico and Texas are blessed with a unique critter called the javelina. For those that do not know the javelina or collared peccary is a pig-like animal that in the U.S. is found in Arizona, Texas and New Mexico. It is considered one of the ten big-game animals found in Arizona. Usually found in herds javelinas are known for their unique musky smell that comes from a gland on their back. The animals can even sometimes be located by their smell. This gland comes off with the skin when the critter is dressed. Javelinas have a very good sense of smell and can also

hear very well. There eyesight, though they can see, is not so good. This makes them a perfect stalking animal. If you can be quiet and keep the wind in your face, you can stalk quite close. This is why they are so popular with the archery, handgun, and muzzleloader crowd. You do not need a rifle to get one though rifle hunting is also popular. The most popular way to get one is to climb to a high vantage point, put your binoculars on a tripod and sit on your butt and glass until you find them. Finding them is usually the hardest part about hunting them although you do still have to make a successful stalk. Another way to be successful is to use a predator call as they will also respond to the sound one way or the other. When responding to a call, the javelina can approach quite close. They seem in most instances to keep coming as long as they hear the sound. Once the sound stops, they often also stop. That is why I like to keep calling until I get them where I want, then stop calling and take the shot, be it with weapon or camera. Approaching the call is one response. The other response is to move away from the call. Although I have seen herds of javelina respond and approach the calling sound from over a mile away there sometimes seems to be about a 50 yard rule. If you spot a herd and they are within 50 yards, when you blow the predator call, here they come! If they are at 51 yards and you blow that same call, there they go! Keep in mind (and this is so true) THERE ARE NO HARD & SET RULES IN PREDATOR CALLING. Now having a herd or individual move away from you is not always a bad thing. I remember a rifle hunt where I glassed up a herd of javelina just 1/3 of the way down from the top of the mountain. By the time I made it up there the herd had bedded down somewhere on the other side of the rocky draw that I was in. Using the predator call, the herd responded not by approaching, instead they reluctantly got out of their beds and moved to go to another area that wasn't so noisy. When a herd strings out the back javelina are usually the ones that are the bigger boars. One of those boars didn't get to make the trip with the rest of the herd. On another hunt, I remember heading straight to the brushy backside of a waterhole that I had seen javelina tracks on the year before. I called that brush and immediately had a big boar javelina come rushing out of the brush getting within 4 steps before turning and disappearing back into the brush a little farther down. The whole episode was so quick that I had no shot. A few minutes later I repositioned myself and called again. This time a herd of javelina came walking out of the brush. I went quiet and waited until the back part of the herd came out and shot a different boar with my .222 Rifle. I am sure that you have noticed that I was using a rifle in the last 2 stories. January 1st begins the archery javelina/deer season in Arizona. I have killed 3 javelina during the archery season. This archery hunt is a good one especially when it is cold. Both the mule deer & the Coues whitetail bucks are rutting now & can often be observed while glassing. January is just too busy for me anymore what with the Club Hunt & the Multi-Club Hunt both being in January then duck season ending on the 27th.

February has both a H.A.M. and Rifle Hunt. On my one pistol kill hunts, former PVCI member Hal L. & I were drawn for Unit 36B. Hal was the 1st one to connect on a long 50 yard plus shot. Mine came later the next day. A herd was spotted, a stalk was made, & I used the predator call to see what would happen. A big boar javelina showed up but he came and once I stopped calling left too fast for me too get a shot. I later stalked (in my sock feet) the same herd and dropped that boar with my 41 Mag. right next to a bee hive. It took me 45 minutes to grab the javelina by the back legs and run down the hill away from the bees. That javelina was probably my largest to date. Using the predator call on javelina can have its uses.

There is a certain amount of prestige associated with being a Phoenix Varmint Caller Officer or Board Member & you will go down in history as having been elected. The PVCI Presidents especially not only have a place in history but there can also be some FAME that goes along with the position. This is after all a fine Club that is known. If you would like to nominate someone, anyone to be elected into this "Special Group" please do feel free to do so when the nominations are opened at the next few Club Meetings. You are of course more than welcome to also nominate yourself. Here is a brief breakdown of the positions:

President: The Head Honcho, the Main Man. Responsible for running both the regular club meeting & the Board of Directors Meeting & shall direct the activities of this Club.

Vice-President: Assist the President in running meetings & business, also in charge of meetings if President absent.

Corresponding Secretary: Responsible for all club correspondence with the outside, the press, the other clubs, etc. He shall keep a complete file of this correspondence. Also presents documents prior to mailing for Officer & Board approval & submit proof of all mailings. This person needs to have some PVCI letterhead in his possession. This person assumes the President's position in case of emergency or the absence of both the President and Vice-President.

Recording Secretary: Accurately records all club minutes at both the regular and board meetings. These minutes contain among other things, the type of meeting, date and place and time of the meeting, a list of the officers and directors present plus any motions or amendments. Keeps this record in a safe place and is able to furnish past minutes if needed. **Treasurer:** Receives all dues and other funds coming into this club then deposits them to this club's account immediately upon receipt. Keeps accurate records of all receipts and disbursements and is able to render an annual financial statement. Also prepares a monthly report that is entered into the club's minutes during the meetings. The Treasurer keeps the Club's checkbook &

he/she pays all the bills incurred by the Club including rent, trophies, locker, mailbox, etc. & responsible for the club's non-profit status & records. The President, Vice-P. & Treasurer shall be authorized to sign checks, two signatures being required. **Board of Director Member(s):** Must be able to attend two (2) meetings per month, the regular and the board. Votes on issues discussed at board meetings. Also helps in planning and organizing club events, helps decide on the direction of the club and usually chairs at least one committee for the major club events. The Board of Directors is a 3-year term. All of the 5 officer positions are 1-year terms.

Success can be measured in many ways, which is why it is different for different people. For some, just being out there is enough & this is true in some respects. However we were going on a Monthly Scramble or Club Hunt where we were competing against others & we needed to harvest something to be successful. Otherwise I'm sorry, (who are you trying to fool?) we just wouldn't be successful unless we did. Listening to the weather forecast, we chose the desert to hunt.



The hunters were Ken E., Donnie V. and myself Eddie M. Friday evening found us gathering wood for a fire, preparing the places where we were going to sleep (Ken and I on the ground, Donnie on a cot, brrrr) & all getting ready Now for the hunt tomorrow morning. The idea was to the banging around now so that we didn't have to do it in the morning & the next morning it pretty much worked out. After quickly turning off the alarm clock, I dressed & quietly woke the others. Many callers say something out loud when you wake them. Why do you do that? We are hunting critters with dog-ear hearing. The idea is to roll out of bed, get dressed, grab your shotgun & quietly walk out to do a stand. Human voices talking, opening noisy coolers, banging around trying to find clothing or calls or digging out your ammo, closing doors repeatedly as you get items from the truck, noisily loading your AR or shotgun, etc., these noises are just not needed. Come on, we are trying to be quiet. Shucks I don't even like the lights inside the vehicle or worse on your head, in your hand or worse of all on top of the truck being turned on. How far out do these lights shine? Usually the

critters already know that we are there. What we don't want them to know is that we are up & about, do we? Well we were pretty good; the only crimes against quietness were that both said something out loud when awakened & only one person had to search for one forgotten item.

Since Ken drove he got to call the very desirable "1st stand of the morning." After walking a ways we were set-up & Ken was calling. He called & had some quiet time, then called some more & had more quiet time, then called some more. I'd say a good 15 minutes went by, I'm watching the downwind when BOOM, followed by another BOOM & I think at least one more BOOM, the silence was broken! Ken had called in a coyote that had become fixated on his feathers decoy. He had knocked the coyote down & every time it moved after that, had sent another shot its way. Harvesting something on the 1st stand is usually a very welcomed event!!! We thanked God, accepted the gift & kept hunting. Let's do it again!

Donnie was the next person to call in a critter. It was in the vicinity of where he and Ken had called and missed a fox the month before. The country was steep up & down brushy canyon country with lots of rock. Perfect for foxes & maybe even a bobcat. Donnie hadn't been calling too long when the sounds of the call were replaced with a single BOOM from his shotgun! He had seen the gray fox come from up high across the canyon. It came on & disappeared into the canyon bottom. The next time Donnie saw the fox, its face & shoulders were peering at him through the brush, close. The shotgun blast knocked the fox all the way back down to the bottom of the canyon. I volunteered to go down and retrieve the critter.

According to the pictures Donnie called & I harvested the next gray fox however I cannot remember the circumstances? That was Saturday's harvest, 1 coyote & 2 foxes. We skinned all the critters, Donnie skinning the last fox by lantern light.

Sunday found us up early, both guys saying something out loud when awakened again (smile). Nope take that back, Ken was already awake. We dressed, whispered about where we had heard the coyotes howling during the night, checked the wind & walked out to make a stand. The way the turn taking went Ken once again called the 1st stand. He used his Psycho Tweety to eventually call in & drop a coyote. Later that morning next to some farm country I called in a coyote that Ken shot from his ladder. The last coyote was harvested in the evening, Donnie calling & yours truly dropping it with a single shotgun shot! We ended the hunt with 4 coyotes & 2 gray foxes, enough for 3rd Place in the competition. 1st & 2nd had 8 critters each. JANUARY CLUB HUNT by Mark S.

This season is going by really quickly, only 2 more Club Hunts after this! Tim and I saved this area for January due to it being one of our best Bobcat spots and we wanted the fur to be prime! Forecast showed a bit of rain mainly overnight on Saturday...so we headed to our spot in search of cats! The trip ended up being pretty slow going as far as numbers of predators called in but was a great time in the end! I'll recap the 4 stands where we had animals respond.

The third stand of Saturday had us calling some slightly broken country in the flats. Tim was calling down in a cut and I was posted back behind overlooking the area with my AR-15. He ran through a few distress sounds and around the 10 minute mark I saw a Coyote come from our left and he was headed to a small ridge that would allow it to see the source of the sound. Just before it was getting to Tim's angle, I moved sticks and woofed the Coyote to a stop. The well placed 55gr Spire Point made the Coyote spin and he ran about 60 yards before expiring. I was able to watch the round hit just above the front leg, a double lung shot. He was your average sized desert male at about 23lbs.

We had 2 more dry stands and the last one put us near a tank and the confluence of a few washes. With nothing showing we decided to walk in further and call another stand. This

area is always loaded with Bobcat sign, so we had to give it another call. We crossed the main wash and posted up 50 yards up on the flats. With the sun to our backs Tim sat behind me to gain a different perspective and it paid off big time! I focused to my left and began calling. I worked through bird distress and different rabbit distress sounds, even mixed in some Coyote yelps. Right around 20 minutes in I hear Tim lip squeak a couple times! I very slowly scanned my area and came up with nothing moving! Knowing that it had to be a cat I just froze in place and got back on the call. After a few minutes with Tim not shooting and not seeing anything myself I turned slowly and saw Tim standing up. He motioned that there was something in the tiny depression of a wash next to me. I SLOWLY turned and stood up as Tim advanced and all of a sudden, a Bobcat sprung up just feet away and made a mad dash for the thicket! Tim ran a wide circle in hopes of giving me a shot and I began squeezing off rounds of Winchester Varmint X BB's as I saw the flashes of the cat through the brush. Just as I would shoot I would lose sight of the cat and then it would reappear a few bushes over running at full tilt! My very last shot before it was going into thick cover connected and I slowed it down enough for Tim to catch up and put the finishing round into the head with his .22 pistol. What a stand! Tim explained that the cat just slowly walked all the way in from my right side all the way across the flats and tucked into the wash just to my side where it disappeared from his view. In the end that cat ended up just 10 steps from me without me ever seeing it.

We did a bunch of dry stands the rest of the day and only had luck on the second to last one. We were driving to get to a cluster of tanks in hopes of calling something out but on the way there was a very fresh pile of scat in the road so we stopped and made a stand. It was in the middle of 2 small washes that had fairly thick cover in points. I set the e-caller out West of us on a dead tree upwind about 40 yards. Tim posted up on a ladder watching South and I stood watching the North side. I started with a rabbit distress loud and proud trying a new sequence due to the lack of luck during the past few hours. Within 3 minutes Tim's gun sounds off and it is met with a loud crack on an animal! He whispered to me that it was a Bobcat and I couldn't believe it! We kept calling but couldn't get anything else to show. That cat had to have been already walking in that section we



setup in as Tim said he watched her just walk in from the direction of the wash on his side very similar to the other cat earlier in the day.

We spent the night in a tent, and it rained most of the night. The next morning, we made our way to a spot where we have had good success with Coyotes in the past and hiked in before shooting light. Due to it being dark we misjudged the stand location and found ourselves about a half mile off. We made the best of it and hiked in a bit more for a better view on that stand. We sat up about halfway on a big hill to gain a good vantage, both armed with rifles. Tim sat just a bit higher than me to have a different perspective and I began calling. I called for quite a while before the Coyote showed up almost downwind. Tim and I saw his movement at about the same time, and we moved to get on him. I didn't know he saw it since he was up above me. As I moved the Coyote looked up at us and paused. I got the scope zoomed and the crosshairs settled as quick as possible thinking it was going to turn and run. To my surprise the Coyote started coming towards us again and when I attempted to stop the Coyote it didn't work. I simply followed the walking Coyote and with it coming right towards us at 100 yards I let a round fly just under the muzzle of the critter. It met its mark and the Coyote simply tipped over in place!
