

Really try to be in line at the Campground with your fish by 5:30p.m. We will measure & count the fish, then prepare them and have our Wonderful Potluck, then award the prizes and do the campfire thing (anyone have marshmallows?) until we go to sleep. Remember we ALL must be out of the Campground by 1:00p.m. on Sunday! WHERE: Woods Canyon, Willow Springs & Bear Canyon Lakes & their tributaries with the Official Camp Location being inside the Woods Canyon Lake Campground at Crook Campground, Pavilion B.

We will start with a limit of 1 prize per person so if the same person has both the longest fish and the longest stringer, he/she will choose their prize first and the 2<sup>nd</sup> longest fish gets the 2<sup>nd</sup> prize. **NOTE: All fish species in these lakes are eligible for the Contest.** 

ENTRY FEE: None, however a general fishing license will be required to participate. This is NOT Free Fishing Day. The

The trout limit is 6 fish. Only boats w/electric motors on Woods Canyon. Gas-powered 10HP limit okay on Willow Springs. P.S. In addition to the prizes for longest fish, smallest fish & longest stinger, there may be other prizes. Do bring an extra frying pan, fish batter, aluminum foil, etc. to help with getting the fish fried. Many consider the Potluck Meal the BEST part of the day, eating & mingling with the others. \*\*\* DIRECTIONS to Camp Site\*\*\*Coming from HWY 260, At the top of the rim turn onto the FS 300 "Rim Road." Continue to the Woods Canvon Lake Road turnoff (FS 105) and look for the Camp Road (the first road on the right) probably within 350 yards from FS 300. The Crook Campground, Pavilion B Group Camp Site is on the left after the Camp Host.

Can you believe that it will soon be that time of year again? Time to head north and clear/maintain the See Canyon Trail, a Forest Service Trail that **our club has maintained since the 1960's!** What is the **PVCI** Trail Clearing? The See Canyon Trail FS184 is a hunter/survival trail that runs from the top of the Rim near Promontory Butte down to Christopher Creek & is used by many hikers, hunters, horse riders, etc. Basically, instead of taking the roads all the many miles around to get off the Rim and to the bottom, this Trail will get you off the Rim in only 3.2 miles!



#### GETTING AN ARIZONA BLACK BEAR ON YOUR WALL

PRESEASON PREPRATION. by Eddie M.



Observing black bears in the wild, especially your first time, whether you are watching them feed on a hillside or you watch your first bear coming to the call, will almost assuredly be an unforgettable moment! As I write this article, it is very hard for me to believe that the early Aug. 9th bear season is instable of 8 and beauty and the better Aug. 22th beauty and the effect of 10



just shy of 8 weeks away and the better Aug. 23<sup>rd</sup> bear season just shy of 10 weeks away! In some ways bears hunting reminds me of spring turkey hunting in that there are many that purchase tags yet few that actually get to touch one and bring one home. If you really want to bring an Arizona black bear home this season, it is very possible, however you need to prepare some things and if possible, also do some early

scouting. I would start my preparations NOW! Black bears live in Big, Rough Country! The way I hunt, you will need, at some point, to be able to get from Point A to Point B in this country, often carrying quite a load. You need to be in some sort of shape to do this or you can really get yourself into trouble! I cannot stress this enough! I remember killing a bear once just before dark, some 6 miles in the Wilderness (where we went James S.). I was alone & I can remember that I ate a cold can of mini raviolis waiting for the moon to come up so that I could see. It took me all night to skin, quarter & prepare the meat for transport. I remember the pack was so heavy that when standing next to it, I couldn't lift it straight up with my arms. Instead I had to lay down & get my shoulders in the straps, then stand up in order to walk out. Once I made it to the truck, I went home, called some people for help, took a shower, then drove and met the 3 guys that thought they might help. Right back to the Wilderness we drove, then packed up & walked back in. Only one of those 3 guys made it all the way back to the bear. The country was just too rough. I had to leave them where they stopped, with their pack & provisions mind you & pick them up on the way back out. I eventually got some sleep however it was a long 48 hours. I truthfully believe that I would've been a lot faster not calling for any help!

I would start with preparing your body. Losing some weight is one of the best things that most of us could do. Also exercising a few times a week, running or running in place somewhere and doing some weights (they call this working out). Many say they are working out, then go to the gym and train and many can do miles on regular terrain. Well bear country has mountains and hills, and there is a BIG difference between regular miles and mountain miles!

Your rifle and/or bow preparedness should probably be next. For rifle hunters, do shoot enough gun. Yes, a .22-250 or .243 will kill a bear but really! I say that the .270 should be the bare minimum for shooting bears with the .30 calibers, 7mm Mags, etc. being an even better choice! Do go to the rifle range and do zero your rifle to be dead on, not at 100 yards (this isn't the East), instead zero to be dead-on, dead center at 200 yards! With my .270, I want to be dead center at 25 yards, then I move out from there. Using 130 grain bullets (they have better ballistics than the 150's), I can kill a fox at 4 steps or shoot a close cottontail in the head or kill a doe antelope in Wyoming at 300 yards by holding the crosshairs of my 4 power scope dead center. Of the bears that I have killed or seen die; I can think of 4 that took 2 rifle shots instead of 1 shot to kill them. Two of those were shot in the lower leg first and two of those were shot in the shoulder first. My first bear I shot in the shoulder at less than 10 yards after a stalk. It went down then got right back up on two legs going around & around biting at where it got stung. The next shot was through the lungs after it went on all fours to get out of there. Rifle hunters shoot your bears through the lungs if you can as the shoulder shot often just takes out one leg and a bear just like a coyote can still cover ground on 3 legs! Archery hunters, practice both long and short shots. Bears can be stalked and/or called quite close. Stalking a feeding bear is almost like stalking javelina, their smell & hearing being excellent, the eyes being their weakness. Bears do have bigger teeth though! I 'm not a fan of punch cutter broadheads, I like fixed blades like the Rocky Mountain Razor, Thunderhead, Wasp, etc.

The way that the seasons are structured anymore, there is almost no excuse for not finding bears before the seasons start although the early Aug. 9<sup>th</sup> season might be an exception. In most instances, the best time of year to see a black bear in the Arizona wilds is from about mid-August to mid-September. Find the food they are eating, manzanita, acorns, prickly pear fruit and you will find the bears. This is primetime! Many of the seasons nowadays are set to protect the bears at this time of year with either no season or with a low female harvest limit, the archery hunters being an exception. We have much good bear country, maybe too much! It can be easy to get overwhelmed figuring whether to hunt a unit while open or go scout a different unit before the opener? The way the hunts are set up with the female harvest being the controlling factor, many of the better units will probably only be open a week & some of those that are supposed to open again at a later date, just might close for the rest of the year! It is often better to just learn a unit or two or three & concentrate on them. If the season doesn't open until later or closes early during primetime, perhaps you could go in anyway & scout with a camera, ignoring the other units.

NOW is also the time to find a taxidermist! Talk to them, many are also hunters, want you to succeed & may be able to steer you here & there. Talk about skinning also! What cuts to make for a rug, shoulder or full mount. Do you case skin a bear for a full mount or cut it down the upper back? What do they want you to do? Don't forget a butcher also. Finding the taxidermist & butcher now instead of trying to find one after the kill is common sense. Make your shot count! Good luck!







