To be voted on May General Meeting

The Board of Directors have proposed a change to the by-laws that will be brought to the general membership meeting in April. The proposed changes are as follows:

Article III, No. 7 – remove entire item

Article IV, No. 4 – amend the lifetime membership to include an annual \$25.00 maintenance fee after the first year.

Article V, No. 1 – update the day of the monthly membership meeting to Wednesday

Article VI, No. 7 – Remove the requirement of 2 signatures on checks.

Article VII, No. 2 – amend the number of directors on the board to a minimum of 3, but no more that one per hundred.

MEMBER REVIEW— MagnetoSpeed Sporter Ballistics Chronograph

For this month's product review I wanted to highlight one of the products I use year round and have found it an indispensable part of my Predator hunting tool kit The *MagnetoSpeed Sporter Ballistics Chronograph*. I purchased a Caldwell chrono years ago, and while I've been happy with it, some of the downsides of it send me looking for a more consistent option what would still fit within my budget. Retailing right at the \$179.99 mark I had to try this one out (www.scheels.com)

The MagnetoSpeed Sporter Ballistics Chronograph is a barrel mount chrono that fits barrels up to 1" and works with muzzle brakes and flash hiders. While not made to work with hot suppressors, I found it to work reliably, remembering to keep the suppressor cool so as not to melt the mount. The Magneto Speed chrono uses electromagnetic sensors instead of optical sensors, so it is NOT reliant on a perfect angle of the sun, it can be set up from the bench, and it won't blow over in the wind or trigger false readings when the party next to you at the range decides to do a magazine dump.



The Sporter model comes in a small plastic box, roughly twice the size of a normal box of 223 ammo, so it's small enough to fit in my ammo bag along side an extra box or two of ammo, and I've found the size convenient enough that I end up bringing it on most trips. Being an analytical and accuracy minded guy, I check my reloads year round to gather data on pressure changes in all environments. I've found it very convenient as well when comparing different loads in different guns. As an example, I know the 52gr hollow points fly an additional 200fps out of my bolt gun versus the same round in my semi-auto with similar barrel lengths. When shooting at distance, that's a significant enough difference to have to adjust for elevation when that rock is giving you the stink eye from 500 yards.

Powered by a regular 9v battery, it's as simple as strapping it on the end of the barrel, tightening the strap with the nut, and letting 'er fly! I did find my setup worked best on the middle of the three sensitivity settings, and once I got set, I got very consistent readings, with errors being rare. No more frustrations with loading 10 test rounds and getting 8 errors like I had gotten on the Caldwell, or finding out that the sun that was working perfectly in the morning has now shifted



and now it's decided now that it doesn't want to work without additional fine-tuning and adjustments.

While adding anything to the barrel normally sends accuracy out the window, I found that even with the Chrono attached, accuracy was still excellent, and point of impact change was much less than anticipated.

The Sporter has multiple memory options for shots strings up to 12 rounds, but being spoiled by the Caldwell and it's IPhone integration and photo documentation, I found it a little difficult to retrace the patterns and ended up tracking the individual shots on a legal pad, but that also made it easier to switch rifles and reloads and still retrieve the accurate data. When compared to the Caldwell, I found the velocities to be approximately 10-12 fps faster, but attributed that to being a true muzzle velocity where the Caldwell is 5-7 yards downrange.

Pro's of this little unit are plenty, it's super easy to use, easy to carry and can be set up almost instantly anywhere you may be at, so I find I bring this unit out on a regular basis. Its accurate, doesn't require you to go downrange, doesn't require a tripod, and does not require the shooter and the chrono to be on level ground or shooting perfectly horizontally.

Cons mostly fall under the basic budget chrono guidelines, so digital integration with other devices is not possible with the entry level unit. But if you're looking for a basic chrono that is easy to use, consistent and easy to fit in your ammo bag, this may be just the unit for you!

My Unit 10 Early Rifle Cow Elk Hunt

I put in for unit 10 since my friend Kevin has a cabin just northwest of round mountain. We apply for the early and late cow hunt in unit 10 and got drawn for the early hunt in mid October. It's nice to sleep in a bed and this year the wood burning stove got some use. We paid the \$50.00 access fee to hunt on the Big Boquillas ranch.

I started my hunt Friday morning near where I had shot an elk several years ago near a stock tank. No luck this year so I looked for bedding areas on flat areas of north facing slopes. No luck again. About mid afternoon I decided to sit near a stock tank. There was a steady cold wind in my face where I sat about 40 yards from the waters edge. Nothing happened until sundown when a lone bull came down for a drink. He bugled on his way to the tank and when he laid down at the waters edge.







I started Saturday the same as Friday.

No luck seeing elk going to water early and no luck finding elk bedding areas later in the day. Since I saw the bull come down for a drink I sat in the same spot I sat on Friday afternoon. At sundown a different bull and 6 of his girl-friends came down for a drink. I put the crosshairs behind the shoulder of one of his girlfriends and shot. All seven elk ran away on the trail they used to get to the tank. I didn't see one drop but about 30 seconds after my shot I heard what sounded like difficult breathing. I didn't want to possibly bump the elk so I waited a few more minutes as it was getting dark. Fifty yards from the water was my elk! The 7-08 shooting a Hornady 139 grain GMX bullet did the job. I used my 7-08 since it shot the solid copper bullet very well being in condor country.

The saying that the work starts when they hit the ground is very true. I was by myself and it took just over 2 hours to get her loaded in my truck. This hunt was special to me since I shot my elk the day before my 60th birthday. I butchered her Sunday morning in my garage being very happy with my day early birthday present!



2nd Annual Eddie Murdock Memorial Turkey Hunt By Tommy M

The 2nd Annual Eddie Murdock Memorial Turkey Hunt was a tough one. Very dry conditions and the birds weren't very cooperative.

The hunt was held in New Mexico, opening day was April 15th. Some hunters began at a different camp and joined Ricardo and myself at our camp late Saturday. One bird was taken at the other camp. In all, there was 15 people in camp from Saturday night until Wednesday, then everyone left but me. No birds taken during that time.

I hunted through the following Sunday. There were birds in the areas in the morning where Ricardo and I hunted. Called in one real close, but it came and went without either of us seeing him. We later concentrated on an area where there was water, birds roosted nearby, dominated by a loud, raspy hen. The toms did what she said and eluded us every day. We jumped a bedded bear one morning in the dark on our way in to setup. A herd of 10 elk was seen almost every day there, 2 different days coming in to drink while we were setup calling. Wolf tracks were found over our incoming footprints on the road on our way back to our vehicle. Also turkey tracks and strut marks on the road on top of our tire tracks.









I continued to hunt the water after everyone else left. The toms were gobbling every morning, but gave me the slip every time after getting orders from their hen. One day I had 24 birds come in, all hens except there was 1 young jake that was awkwardly trying to strut with all the hens he was with. He only had a button beard. I saw 1 bearded hen, only had a 2 inch beard.

Sunday was going to be my last day, so I decided to go back to the water in the evening to see if these toms were hitting the water late in the day. It was a good call as they came in about 5:30, 2 toms gobbling and 5 hens yelping in chorus, also playing grab ass with each other.

I was caught off guard when they showed up suddenly, as I had rolled over on my left side and elbow, trying to get some feeling back to my rear-end. I was next to a large fallen tree, the birds showed up on the other side. I couldn't sit upright or the hens would see me. They were only 20 yards away. They all started walking away, towards the tank, so I slowly raised the shotgun over the log and aimed at 1 of the tom's. It was a very awkward shot, and I missed! I took a better aim as they were running around anyway, and shot the tom solidly. By then the other tom ran off, along with the hens.

But hey, I got 1 of them! He weighed a little over 18 pounds and had a 9 inch beard.
