

Parks on the Air



Parks on the Air is about enjoying ham radio and having fun! You can participate in POTA from the shack, while out mobile, portable or by activating a park near you. The only limit to your enjoyment from POTA is what you set upon yourself.

Most hams who participate in POTA start off as a hunter. This is a good point to start because the hunter doesn't have to submit a log. You can keep a log on your own but you obtain credit for working a park based on the activator. If the activator doesn't send in their log then the contact isn't credited for you. I personally keep a log of both hunting and activating parks.

You will find as you work more in POTA you will work the operators multiple times. They enjoy getting out and activating parks. You will begin to know people by their call signs, even sometimes remember their names, the way the operate and where they operate from.

You can contact the same station multiple times per day but only once in each park. If the activator changes bands or modes you can work them again and it isn't considered a dupe. You can work single side band, cw, fm and many data modes. So the number of contacts you might make in a single day can really be a lot. Some stations only operate one mode or the other.

When a station is activating there is a spotting page to help all parties out. By using the spotting page, a hunter can see who is operating, what parks are active at any given time, bands and modes. A spotter is important so that the activator can work as many people as possible. Sometimes there is no cell service in parks so it really helps out to spot another station. Only activators get spotted. As a spotter, I normally will include a signal report and my state. This helps out other stations to quickly determine if the station is strong enough for them to work a new one. Not all activators use the same antennas. So you may have two people spotted in the same state but one station is real loud and the other is marginally weak.

POTA has a page for scheduled activations. Activators will post where they plan to activate, what bands they will be active on, times they may be on the air and which modes they plan to activate on. There is even a facebook page for POTA and NC POTA. If you use apps on your phone or tablet go look at SLACK. There are several different areas covered on SLACK. You will find antenna information, spots information, a POTA swapmeet among other things.

There is no reason for anyone who is interested in hunting parks on the air not to have a good time doing it. Requirements are a valid exchange. Then move on to the next station.

Dom NC4XL and myself have had great success in operating POTA. We set a goal for our activations. If we make the goal great! If not we try to figure out why we didn't make it. It could be propagation, activation time of day where maybe the bands were not open yet or did we pick a day with a major solar flare. As you operate you will figure out things that make it easier and more fun. If you have a question call Dom NC4XL or myself...we will be glad to help out if possible.

30 Years Ago in CFARS David KI4W

I wrote a newsletter article as others did to honor our good friend Chuck KJ4RV who became a silent key in August of this year. I sure miss my friend as I am sure a lot of you do as well. I titled the article 30 but after submitting it the title was not published at the top of it. Throughout the article I used the number 30 numerous times. I now have over 30 years of being an active member of CFARS. The key word in that sentence is active. I hope most of you can add that descriptor as it applies to you. We need you to be an active member, not just a member. However me encouraging you to be active is not the focus of this article so on to the subject at hand. If you are a member of the ARRL you receive QST every month. QST has a monthly column titled "100, 50, and 25 Years Ago." That article highlights the content of QST 100, 50, and 25 years ago. I thought I would tell you about what was going on in CFARS 30 years ago. I hope you will enjoy this walk down memory lane and those of you who were there 30 years ago will have fond memories as I do of those who are no longer with us and all the good times we shared then and now.

In November of 1991 the President of CFARS was Perry N4LBB and the Vice President was Fred New KN4SS. Fred is no longer with us but he was a great friend who was the first to be to head up our Volunteer Examiner team. Fred also served on the Spring Lake Board of Alderman for one term. Fred would also invite you to come over and hang out on his back porch. The ones of us who are still around will remember this and get a chuckle out of it. The recorder in 1991 was Fred N4ZCG and the Newsletter Editor was Pat N4UGH who has served us for years as our leader of CFARS VE Team. Fred N4ZCG served as the Sunday night net control for our Evening Net in those days. Our Secretary/Treasurer was Bill KD4XC who like Fred KN4SS is no longer with us.

In November of 1991 CFARS had 164 members according to the Membership Chairman, Sandy KC4TBQ. Bill KU4W(sk) who was our long time Repeater Trustee reported that our repeaters were fine but there had been some illegal bootleggers on our repeaters. Dorothy KC4NJA(sk) who was our Health and Welfare person reported Sarge N4DDV was under the weather and she had sent him a card. Sarge N4DDV is no longer with us but one thing you could count on Monday through Friday mornings was that Sarge would open up the early session of the Possum Trot around 4:00am. Bill KU4W reported that 20 members had turned in logs for the October Ten Ten CW Contest. Unfortunately we will never see those numbers again but we can always hope. In those days we would not get the results of the contest until just before the ssb contest in February when the Ten Ten News arrived by mail, yes by mail just like the CFARS Newsletter did in those days. While on that subject the newsletter was done on a typewriter and then taken to somewhere like Office Depot where copies were made. The pages of the newsletter were then put together and stapled and then taken to the post office for mailing. There was a lot of work put into getting the newsletter out and still is but in those days if you want a firsthand account of the effort involved ask Mike KN4XP as he has been there and done that.

At the November meeting of CFARS the election of officers to serve in 1992 was held. Mike KN4XP, our current Newsletter Editor, was elected President. Kelly N4EWG(sk) was elected Vice President. We sure do miss Kelly our long time Possum Trot Net Manager. Bill KD4XC was elected to continue serving as Secretary/Treasurer. Jim KC4JAN(sk) was elected to serve as Recorder. Jim KC4JAN was always referred to as January Jim. Bill and Jim were great guys and we sure miss them.
