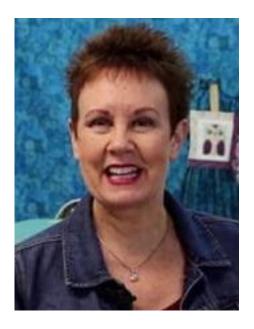
Kim is a teacher and creator of several quilting programs and courses. Kim shares her quilting knowledge through her YouTube channel. Chatterbox Quilts'

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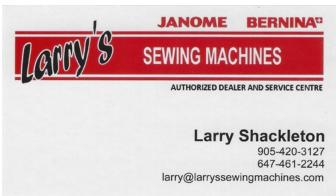


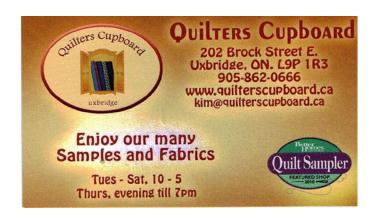


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Show And Share -Anne M & Jean K

- if submitting more than two pictures, please indicate your two preferred quilts or we will choose



Information about the quilt(s). People are asked to either:

- provide a short blurb about the quilt(s) OR
- indicate that they will talk about the quilt(s) at the meeting (note that stories will be limited to one minute per quilt)

Multiple entries welcome, but please use a separate email for each entry. Each submission qualifies for the monthly draw of a \$10 gift certificate from a local quilt shop. In June 2021, there will be a draw that includes all entries for the year. So remember - the more you participate, the greater your chance of winning a prize!
