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
can have a more normal existence.

Secretary

This person is responsible to take, produce, and electronically distribute the Executive Meetings' minutes. Typically, the Executive Committee meets on the fourth Wednesday of every month except July. Currently, we have been meeting using Zoom. The president of the guild will establish the meeting schedule in August. If the secretary is not available to attend a scheduled meeting, it is their responsibility to find an alternative person to take down the minutes of the meeting.

Another important task which falls under the Secretary's portfolio is that they are responsible for managing the Guild's email account by forwarding messages to appropriate members. Regular mail also falls in this person's docket. The guild post office box is in Oshawa near King and Park. The mail should be emptied at least once a month, prior to the executive meetings, and distributed accordingly.

You may also be asked to attend an officers' meeting once or twice a year. These are called by

the president on an as required basis. Computer skills are required for this role. A working knowledge of word processing software is required for documenting the minutes.





Membership

The Membership Convenor is typically one of the first members a guest meets. A smile and friendly face are very welcoming to our members and guests.

The convenor is responsible for compiling our membership information using an Excel spreadsheet. To ensure members are current, the convenor ensures members have registered and paid dues prior to adding them to the current member listing. If meetings are in person, the convenor may receive payments on-site. If payments are sent by e-transfer or cheque, the convenor records information on payments by email.

Maintaining the email address list on our Gmail account, and ensuring it is current and up-to-date is also part of the job. Other duties include ordering badges for our members and reporting on membership numbers to the executive.

This position requires working knowledge of Excel and email. The Membership Assistant can help with the learning curve as well as provide ongoing assistance with the duties.

Once we are meeting again in person, the Membership Convenor is required to attend each meeting or arrange for a representative to represent them at the membership desk.

Program

The Program Convenor selects and arranges the main features for our monthly meetings, except for December and June. The proposed invitees are submitted to the Guild's Executive Committee for approval. Using word processing software and email, a contract is drawn and shared with all parties. This contract and a payment request form is then submitted to the Treasurer to arrange payment to the presenter.

The Program Convenor ensures all equipment required by presenters is available on meeting night. If these guests are speaking virtually, assistance is available to the convenor. With in-person meetings, the Program Convenor is to be there to greet the presenter and help with setup and take down if necessary. The Program Convenor also is responsible for introducing the guest speaker to the guild and thanking them after their presentation.

Community Outreach

Can you see yourself leading a group of quilters who produce what is needed for our guild to support our community? This has typically been a committee with a leader who would be the Community Outreach Convenor. At least one helper is also needed to assist the Convenor.

Community Outreach is an especially important part of our guild. This group prepares and tracks quilt kits, sorts through donated fabric, and distributes finished items to approved charities in the Durham region. The necessary supplies for this team may be kept in the Guild's storage unit or in someone's home. If you would like to be involved in this rewarding position, we would love to see this work continue. The current bins have been sorted and are in our storage unit just waiting for you.





Website

The Website Convenor is responsible for maintaining the guild's website. The convenor is also responsible for adding new features as approved by the Executive. You need to be able to create and edit documents on the computer. The website platform is provided, but the knowledge of editing documents in a word processor or other program will assist you in editing the website.

Social

Once we are meeting again in person it would be nice to have a Social Convenor to ensure we have refreshments and treats at our meetings. The equipment for hot beverages is currently in the storage unit and could be kept at the convenor's home if preferred. Treats are provided by members. The convenor creates a sign up for members to indicate which month they will bring refreshments.

Show & Share

The convenor arranges for the display and presentations of all materials brought to the meetings by members. If virtual meetings continue, ideally the convenor will create a power point presentation and share it at the meeting. Assistance on how to do this can be provided if necessary.

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
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
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
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How Ida Holdgreve's Stitches Helped the Wright Brothers Get Off the Ground





Just for today I will have a quiet half-hour all by myself and relax. In this half-hour sometimes I will think of God, so as to get a little more perspective into my life.

Just for today I will be unafraid, especially I will not be afraid to be happy, to enjoy what is beautiful, to love, and to believe that those I love, love me.
