Make sure to bring paper and something to write with along with a favourite beverage so we can all toast together a successful year of creating and being a community together.



Fabric Basket - Jacqueline H

OH, MY GOODNESS! I can hardly imagine how much fabric you've set aside for the fabric basket!

If you have an overabundance of fabric basket scraps, you might consider getting a roll of adding machine paper from the dollar store (usually 3-inches wide is a good size). Then use the scraps to flip and sew along the adding machine paper roll. I personally use 12 – 15-inch pieces of the roll, so that I can ensure that my project remains straight.



How to Make 16 Half Square Triangles at One Time

This is a pretty cool trick when you need a lot of HSTs in a hurry or maybe you just need a lot of HSTs. Check out Amy Smart's video, but here's an overview of her demonstration. Click on the diagram to go to the video.



Step 1: Determine the finish size for your HSTs and calcluate the dimensions needed to make all the blocks 1 inch bigger.

Example: For 4-inch finished HSTs, all the solid grid lines would be 5 inches. The total horizontal line would be 20 inches (5 inches each section), and the vertical lines would be 10 inches. Each diagonal line would also be 5 inches.

Step 2: Ensure you have enough fabric for your calculated dimensions. Put two fabrics right sides

together and lay them down with the lightest colour on top.

Step 3: Starting with the grid, lightly draw the "Figure 8" diagram on the lighter of your two fabrics using the dimensions you calculated. Pin securely.

Step 4: Sew a 1/4 inch away from the solid lines in a "Figure 8" as illustrated by the dashed lines. Sew diagonal lines only on either side.

Step 5: Cut the HSTs apart on the solid lines.



Click on the photo to learn how to make this Yankee Block with HSTs

Step 6: Press and trim to desired size.

There should be no bias seam issues using this method.















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Thanks for the Good Times - Author Credit Withheld by Request
