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


ing we can get together in the Spring. Until then we will continue to have Sew Days and impromptu get togethers.

#### Criteria for Posting an Upcoming Event/Activity - Sharon M

Over the last year, the executive has determined that a process was needed to communicate upcoming events/activities identified by a member.

The information below outlines the criteria and process to follow when an event/activity comes to a member's attention. The preferred method of communication is our newsletter which is published monthly. If the event is time sensitive, an approval process will be followed with the intent to minimize the number of emails sent to members.



I trust that this new procedure will assist in the communication of events/activities that are of interest to our members.

#### **Criteria for Posting an Upcoming Event/Activity**

- 1. The event/activity is determined to be of interest to the members.
- 2. The newsletter is the preferred method to communicate the upcoming event/activity.
- 3. The member identifying the event will receive no financial gain or personal advertising if posted in the newsletter or through the guild email.
- 4. Approval will be required to send notice through the guild's email account.
- 5. The event can also be announced at a virtual or in-person guild meeting.

#### **Process for Notification of Upcoming Events/Activities**

- 1. An event is defined as an event/activity that would be of interest to guild members.
- 2. It can be an in-person or virtual event.
- 3. The newsletter is the preferred method of notifying members of an event.
- 4. The member who wishes the event to be published in the newsletter will send all the information to the newsletter convenor. It will be published in the next monthly newsletter.
- 5. The newsletter submissions deadline dates are available on the DTQG website.
- 6. If the event is time sensitive, a request can be made to have the information sent through the guild's Gmail account.
- 7. The request will go through an approval process.
- 8. All the information for the event needs to be emailed to the President.
- 9. The event will be reviewed by the President and one other officer of the executive.
- 10. You will be notified by the President as to the status of your request.
- 11. When approved, the event information will be sent by the President to the Secretary or designated person who has access to the Gmail distribution list.
- 12. The approval process will be completed within three business days or sooner, if possible.

- Kraft Dinner or (mac and cheese) with onions and tomatoes, served with an accompanying salad.

Note that speaking of the quilts will be limited to one minute per quilt at the meeting. # **Comfy Cases Project**

Nobody likes to be in sick in a hospital. For children, it can be super overwhelming. Comfy Cases is an organization that is working to help make hospital stays more comfortable for youngsters, particularly those diagnosed with serious illnesses.

Launched in 2020, this
Canadian non-profit organization brings volunteers together to stitch fun, colourful pillowcases for children with cancer or other life changing illnesses. As a program of Ontario Parents Advocating for Children with Cancer (OPACC), they are dedicated to improving the quality of life for children and their families.

Comfy Cases expanded their reach to all children under medical care in hospital who need a smile. Please listen to this **clip** of an interview with a Child Life Specialist about the impact of these pillowcases on the children and their parents.

The organization learned recently that it's not only the ill child who needs support. Here's a note received just a month ago from a Child Life Specialist in a Toronto hospital:

I also wanted to let you know that some of the pillowcases

that are plain (on the large part of the pillow), I have been using for a special legacy building activity when a parent will likely not survive their illness. I trace the parent's handprints onto the pillowcase and give the child the pillowcase so that they can feel connected to their loved one while they are apart, and even after death.

With the mother's permission, here's a photo of a "Legacy Pillowcase" prepared for her four-year-old daughter. The mother is in ICU and her child can't visit at

this time. The words are what the mother would say to her daughter at bedtime.

Please ensure that the fabric is 100% cotton and the pillowcase should be sewn with finished (French) seams.








Comfy cases are not just for children, they bring comfort to their families, too

#### Canadian Provincial Wildflower Quilt Pattern

Designed by Sandra Small Proudfoot for the moderately experienced quilter, this pattern first appeared in the August 1985 issue of Canadian Living Magazine under the name "Bower of Flowers." At that time it consisted of 12 patterns representing the native plants specifically designated as provincial and territorial flowers. In the intervening years, the Purple Saxifrage for the Nunavut Territory was added, and Quebec changed its flower to the Blue Flag. Patterns for all 13 current, official floral emblems are included in both the digital and physical versions of the quilt.

The quilt pattern is available as a **digital download** (print it yourself) or as a folded pattern, sent to you in the mail.





#### **Hourglass Block**

I'm with the author of this article. I love shortcuts. Amy Smart goes through her experience of producing a video on the set of the Missouri Star Quilt Company with MIsty Doan.

She also goes over a great technique to create blocks that can be used in a variety of projects. Flexibility is awesome!

#### Something New

You don't have to own a Bernina sewing machine to follow along with this in-depth tutorial. This is a totally new project if you are all caught up on all your UFOs.

The block is called "Bride's Bouquet" and it looks like it can get pretty fancy. I think I'll put this one on my bucket list, especially since it involves "Y" seams.

#### Something Curved

Here's a unique mini quilt project that gets curvy. Apparently, there's a bit of improv involved with this, but the results are fab!

#### **Frugal Patterns**



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
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













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#### Quilters Are Wonderful People – Kay K

At the time of my call late July, Ontario was still locked down, so I wanted to ensure I could make appointments for us at a couple of quilt shops. Thankfully, the restrictions lifted just before her August visit, and we headed out to Appleseed Quiltworks in Lindsay. That was fun...and expensive.

The next day, we were still excited about our purchases from our previous outing, and the freedom of being able to shop again without appointments or line-ups on the sidewalk. Together, Miss W and I made plans for our next fabric excursion. My brother-in-law also had a shopping agenda, so we wanted to make sure we accom-

modated his desires as well.

With promises of "this will be a quick trip" to my brother-in-law, we headed out to the Ultimate Sewing Centre. Miss W had purchased a really cute quilt pattern the day before, and now she was trying to find the fabric for her new project. We hummed and hawed over what would be her feature fabric, and then we set about trying to choose complimentary fabrics to help highlight the main one.

Shirley came by and gave us a few helpful suggestions, but we still were not getting anywhere fast. We pulled bolts off the shelves, and kept evaluating the "matchiness" of various colours. Finally, another shopper spoke up. "No! Put that green away, the undertones are too yellow. Here, try this one instead."

Her recommendation was magical, the colours fell inline. Our mystery shopper continued to go through what we had selected.

"This one is good, don't care for that blue, and why don't you try this red?"

This woman had quite the artistic eye! Of course, we had to introduce ourselves. Nurse S was retired, but is currently helping out in a long-term care facility due to the pandemic. She had us in stitches with her funny commentaries. "I've finally found a cat to match my dog!" she declared

as she continued to pull fabrics to coordinate with Miss W's project. Finally, Nurse S said, "I think you need to go to Annie's."

"Aren't they closed now?" I asked. It was after just after 3 pm.


"Oh, it's ok. I'll call over and have them stay open for you."

After checkout and grateful good-byes to Ann and Gail, we ended up at the McDonald's for a cool drink and an energizing chat, with Nurse S footing the bill.

What an incredible experience. I will remember this outing for a very long time. Quilters are wonderful people. It's amazing to me that people will still take the time to help out complete strangers. While we admired her flair for choosing coordinating colours and fabrics, we loved Nurse S's kind and giving heart most of all.
