Zoom Meetings - Laura B

The DTQG continues to meet remotely, using the Zoom platform. Because there have been connection and "audio" issues, we thought we'd include a short article on Zoom meetings in this newsletter.

Connections. Some people have encountered difficulty in joining a Zoom meeting. It is important to ensure that you regularly update your Zoom app. Zoom puts out regular updates for the app to improve security, and it will not allow you to join a meeting if your app is too old. It is highly recommended to update the app ahead of time, so you are not delayed in joining the meeting. If you are on a mobile platform, you can go to your app store, search for the Zoom app, and select update.

If you are on a computer, you can run the program and it should prompt you. For more help on how to update the app, click here.

Courtesy. When on a Zoom meeting, it is sometimes easy to forget that our microphones and cameras are capturing what is going on around us. Please select a

quiet location with minimal background noise and activity to join in the meeting. In terms of video, it is often fun for other attendees to see your pet joining in as they pass by, but as we've seen online, it is not so great to see another household member walk by in the background in just a towel (or less).

Please consider your background when setting up the camera.

In terms of audio, background noise can be quite a problem. For example, if you have the baseball game (or soccer or football or ...) on in the background, or someone else is nearby talking on a phone or talking to other household members, the other meeting at-

tendees can hear it. This extra noise makes it very hard to hear the speaker. It is good practice to mute your microphone when you are not speaking.

The host CAN mute you if you have lots of noise that is interfering with the meeting, but it can take time for the host to figure out who is causing the noise, and everyone would greatly appreciate it if you self-mute when not speaking.

General Help. Zoom has a lot of articles on how to do various things with the meeting platform. Their help centre can be accessed on line by clicking here. Or - if you need help or want to try something, the executives are happy to set up a test meeting where we can chat and try things out. Send in an email to the guild with your request and we will get back to you.





October 11 Zoom Meeting - Lina S

Speaker: **Kim Caskey**Topic: **World Wide Whispers**

The project is called World Wide Whispers. In a nutshell, it's a bit like a child's birthday party game where the leader starts by whispering a sentence in the ear of the next participant and then continues around the room, evolving and changing from the original sentence.

Five countries participated in this World Wide Whispers project, Team Scotland, Team Ireland, Team Netherlands, Team USA, and Team Canada. Each team started with the leader of their country (Kim for Team Canada), using an original photo as inspiration to create their piece, then photographing that finished item, and sending that photo and artist statement to the next person on the team. The next team member then used that photo as their inspiration to create a piece, photographed it and sent it along to the next person, and so on, and so on.

Team Canada is comprised of 13 members, a representative from each province and territory. The completed collection has been presented and exhibited around the world. Kim will introduce you to each artist and their unique piece of this magnificent team project. Kim says:

"I have been sewing and creating my whole life! My mother introduced me to sewing at age five. In those days, kids were required to be of age six by December 31 to enter grade one and since I missed that deadline by just five days, my mom needed something to entertain me!

"I learned patience and

techniques from my mom in those early years which allowed me to sail through the fiber and fashion parts of Home Economics classes in Junior and Senior High (the cooking segments were not so successful!) I learned to knit and embroider from my Grannie, learned advanced garment construction from my mom, and picked up cross-stitching, crochet, tatting, and rug hooking along the way. Following high school, I received

professional training in dressmaking and tailoring, completing the NAIT diploma program of tailoring.

"I began my quilting study with Earthly Goods Quilting (Premiere Quilt Shop, Edmonton, Alberta), in February 1992 – quite accidentally. My mother was unable to attend the Rotary Cutting class she was registered in, so I stepped in to fill her spot. I was immediately drawn to the wonderful samples and beautiful cotton and it wasn't long

before I was hooked on quilting."

By 1994, Kim was instructing classes and workshops. She has taught for guilds and groups all over the world, thanks to her international quilting connection.

Kim began hosting Quilt and Textile Tours in 2014 (Celtic Quilt Tours) to Ireland, Scotland, France, Iceland, Wales, England – and most recently – Japan! As soon as travel is safe again, she will be back on the road with 2022 tours to Newfoundland, Ireland/Scotland, and France and a special tour to Italy is in the works for 2023!

Through these international quilt and textile tours, Kim has met quilters from all over the world, which has provided unique opportunities of collaboration for projects like the World Wide Whispers collection, which she will tell us about at our October 11 guild meeting.

Secret Santa - Laura B

This year, the DTQG is offering members a chance to participate in a Secret Santa program. Members who sign up to participate will be randomly assigned another participant, for whom they will be a "Secret Santa." The "Secret Santa" will give their "giftee" a Christmas gift (valued between \$15 and \$25) that will be opened during the December guild meeting. After opening the gift, the "giftee" will try to guess who was their "Secret Santa."

To help with gift selection, each Secret Santa is given the quilting likes and dislikes of their

"giftee" as well as an example of a gift that the "giftee" would like to receive. Gifts can be made or purchased, at the discretion of the Secret Santa, and are to be valued between \$15 and \$25 (excluding shipping). Gifts can be purchased new or given from the Santa's stash IF the item is new/unused and the value of the gift is appropriate. Secret Santas are encouraged not to be "scrooges" by giving a cheap item (e.g., a dollar store mug) or a pile of leftover scraps (unless, of course, the "giftee" has indicated

that they'd absolutely love a bag of such scraps). Each participant is giving a gift and getting a gift, and they should all be of similar value.

The plan is for gifts to be mailed to the "giftee," but if the "giftee" lives locally, they can be delivered if desired, so long as you can preserve the secrecy of who is giving the gift (e.g., ring the doorbell and run, have a friend drop it off for you, or drop it off to the giftee's neighbour and ask them to deliver it next door for you). If mailing the Secret Santa gift, please use the DTQG PO Box as the return address (Durham Trillium

Quilters Guild, PO Box 30575, RPO Stevenson King, Oshawa ON L1J 8L8) so that the "giftee" cannot tell who sent the gift from the package label, yet there is still a return address so the gift will not be lost if there are problems delivering it.

If you wish to participate, please fill in the registration form, and be sure to fill out the questions regarding YOUR quilting/ hobby preferences AND your mailing address, as these will be given to your Secret Santa. Registrations must be received by 5 PM on Friday, October 22 (the form will disappear after this, so be sure to register ON TIME). Members who sign up will be provided with the quilting preferences and address of your assigned "giftee" by Friday, October 29. It is recommended that gifts be mailed by November 19, so that they arrive before the December 13 guild meeting.




Fabric Basket - Jacqueline H


OH MY GOODNESS - I can hardly imagine how much fabric you have set aside for the fabric basket! As you set aside your scraps, remember that most people like them to be about the size of your hand or bigger.

If you have an overabundance of fabric basket scraps you might consider placing them in a zip lock bag and dropping that off in the fabric basket. I have learned some of our members love the challenge of piecing with tiny scraps. Again, please place them in a zip lock bag before distributing at our next guild meeting.

If you are considering using your wee little scraps for a dog bed, I made one last spring for our dog. It was the shape of a rectangular prism. I used a stiff corduroy for all of the sides. Sorry, I don't have a pattern - I just used good math.

Idamay Janet Dalgleish-Coates

1935-2021

Janet, of Oshawa, passed away peacefully at Case Manor Care Community in Bobcaygeon on July 24, 2021.

Janet enjoyed a rich and varied career as an elementary school teacher, graphic and fibre artist, teacher of the arts, and as host and producer of the weekly series "The Imaginal Tree" which examined the creative process at work in the Durham Region on Rogers Cable 10 from 1979-1999.

Janet was honoured over the years for her work as a volunteer. Janet received the Oshawa YMCA "Woman of Distinction" Award in the Arts category in 1982 for Durham Region. She was also awarded an Honorary Life Membership in the Oshawa Art Association in 1982. In 1992 Janet received the Lescarbot Award from the government of Canada for her support of the Arts. Janet taught needlelace, quilting, fabric collage and her work is included in the Robert McLaughlin Gallery Permanent Collection in Oshawa. Janet was predeceased by her **loving husband Gordon Coates** in 1993. She is survived by her brother Jim Dalgleish and his wife Barbara Dalgleish of Bobcaygeon. Janet will be greatly missed by all who knew her and not just by those of us who knew her

through quilting. I knew her first when she would teach the occasional class at "The Olde Silver Thimble." A lovely woman, very generous with her time and knowledge. A great friend to many guilds where her donations were always anonymous. When I retired the spring of 2016, I couldn't wait until the fall when I would be able to join Janet in the classes she lead with the Oshawa Seniors. She would provide countless documents (I have four very large binders) that she had created from her years of teaching with regards to different quilting techniques, templates from Marti



Michelle that she would charge each of us only \$5-\$10 and we daren't offer to pay the actual price as she would be offended.

At the end of each session, her students would gift Janet with flowers and gift cards to her favourite restaurants (Red Lobster and Swiss Chalet), and I discovered that she loved dark chocolate with burnt almonds (I would leave two large bars at her spot each session) and she told me she would have a piece of the bar each day as a special treat to herself. Indeed, Janet was a very special lady.





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
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


















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Block of the Month 2021-2022 - Kate H

Hope that you will join us for some fun!!




Morale Officer - Jacqueline H

Have You Heard? Quilt Retreat is ON

Yes, it's finally true! Due to declining COVID outbreaks and after evaluating additional information provided by Elim Lodge, the guild executive has decided to proceed with our fall retreat.

However, following the health and safety protocols prescribed by the Province of Ontario and the local health unit is strictly required.

You must be a DTQG member in good standing for 2021-2022 (registered AND paid), and you must be double vaccinated for more than 14 days prior to the registration deadline of **October 19**, to be eligible to attend.

 Thursday, November 4, from 10:30 AM through Sunday November 7, 2021

Cost per person:

- \$375.00 for 3 nights|10 meals

- \$260.00 for 2 nights|7 meals (must pay in full at time of registration).

Internet access for the weekend is included.

Availability will be on a first registered AND PAID, first served basis.

In order to successfully initiate our retreat, we require a minimum

of 20 participants to a maximum of 30. Each attendee will have his/her own single bedroom, and the premium for single rooms has been waived.

Elim Lodge requires that you provide your proof of vaccination at the Lodge office BEFORE you enter the chapel or dining room. You will also be required to provide contact tracing information.

How to sign up: Click on the link above or go to the guild website and complete the online form under Workshops/Retreats tab, then send your payment by e-transfer to dtqguild@gmail.com. Be sure to put "Fall Retreat" and your name in the e-transfer comment so we know what the payment is for. We have set a deadline of October 19 for all registration and payments to be received.

Important: Due to COVID-19 restrictions, there will be no snack table in the front hall. You may bring snacks to share with your pod. Coffee and tea will be provided. Please bring your own cups, bottled water, or water cup. Paper cups will not be provided.

You will be required to wear a mask while you are walking around the chapel, but not while seated at



your own sewing station.

In addition, you must wear one in the dining room, except when you are eating and drinking. These protocols are set by the Province of Ontario and are not negotiable, nor will protesting be acceptable.

You are allowed to bring small portable irons to use at your station.

Meals: Meals are served in the dining room, plated, and everyone receives the same meals. If you require a special diet, you will be required to bring your own meals which can be heated up in the dining hall by the Elim staff. Note: fish will not be on the menu!

Refund policy: if you cancel within 14 days of the retreat start date, you get 100% refund. If you cancel within less than 14 days, your refund will be less the meal portion which is in accordance with Elim's refund policy as they order food two weeks ahead of the retreat, and that must be paid for.
