Even if you don't think you have changed your skill level in the last year, I can guarantee that you are more skilled in every area of quilting that you realize. It is probably easier for you to put colours together, your stitching is more precise, your pressing is better, and your ability to innovate has popped up in unexpected ways.

The confidence you have developed in creating your quilts and other projects has flowed over into other areas of your life and perhaps with some self-reflection, you will see a greater ability to be strong for yourself and others. Pretty amazing results from putting a couple of pieces of fabric together on a continual basis. You should be very proud of yourself.

Jan 20's Sew Day was the first time I sat and sewed for quilting since April 2021. I put the rest of organizing my sewing area on hold, and finally sat and created. What a wonderful release it was! From Jan 20 to Feb 20, I completed 11 tops which totally surprised me. Looking back, I think the reason



I was able to complete them was because I stopped worrying about what other people may think of them, and stopped thinking everything had to be perfect. I started asking myself "What if...?" "What if I put those colours together?" "What if I took that panel and that bundle of fabric and created something from that?" If it looked like yuck, I knew I could always spend some quality time with Jack and do something else.

As I relaxed, I found it was easier to put colours together and to come up with different types of patterns to use. I was also able to relax when my 3:00 AM math did not work out the way I thought it should. Eventually, I did find a use for those 32 extra HST's I made...

As humans, as quilters, as people living in North America, we have a strong tendency to be very hard on ourselves and super critical of the things that we do. We have been taught to fear the word failure. It used to be that we were encouraged to try something for the "halibut" because we could always learn something from it. FAIL is First Attempt In Learning. We aren't supposed to be successful at things right off. There is no learning in that, no innovation, and no growth.

This journey of life is supposed to be one of continuous learning and to create joy while doing it. It


makes life so much better for us and others if we relax our expectations of success and focus on drawing out as much as we can from each experience. Even spending time with Jack can be good as it gives us time to think about how we can fix what we did.

Be proud of what you have accomplished these last few months (couple of years). I have heard so many stories of new patterns done, new skills learned, new friends made, innovative ways created to keep connected with those you know and care about, and so many who have helped their communities by making masks, quilts, and other things that have helped others have a better life. All while learning new protocols of how to behave in public so we could keep others safe. We have done awesome and are coming out the other side of this pandemic stronger, wiser, and in many ways, happier than we were in February 2020.

It is going to take some adjusting to the more open ways of life that are coming. Vice President

We are looking for an individual who has leadership skills and is excited about our guild's goals.

This candidate needs to be willing to spend two years in the Vice President (VP) role to then move into the President's role, and finally, move into the Past President position (two years in each position).

As VP, you will assist the current President as required, including coordinating facilities for all meetings and special projects, organizing greeters for meetings, and new member orientation. The VP is also a member of the Nomination Committee.

Newsletter

Are you a communicator? Do you enjoy desktop publishing?

This person will set deadlines for convenors who contribute content to our guild's newsletter monthly. Once all is received, the fun begins!

Including the artwork from the Advertising convenor, the newsletter is created to keep our members informed of all the opportunities our guild provides.

The newsletter is also submitted to the Website convenor to have it uploaded for members to access.

Members are notified via email when the newsletter is available online.

Block of the Month

This is an opportunity for a member to facilitate a Block of the Month project for interested members to take part in.

Once you have selected your project, it is presented to the Executive Committee for their support.

You can determine how and when this project will be communicated and distributed to members. The costs associated with the project are covered by the participants.

Program

The Program convenor selects and arranges the main features for our monthly meetings.

The proposed invitees are submitted to the guild's Executive Committee for approval. Using word processing and email, a contract is drawn and shared with all parties. This contract and a payment request form is then submitted to the Treasurer to arrange payment to the presenter.

The Program convenor ensures all equipment required by presenter is available on meeting night. The convenor will introduce the speaker, help them set up and take down, and thanks them after the presentation.

Website

The Website convenor is responsible for maintaining the guild's website. The convenor is also responsible for adding new features as approved by the executive.

You need to be able to create and edit documents on the computer. The website platform is provided, but the knowledge of editing documents in a word processor or other program will assist you in editing the website.

Fabric Switch

This is a fun way to get members involved in an activity. You would determine what fabric, size, and colour the member would be exchanging.

The exchange typically is done monthly so at the end of the year the member has enough fabric to sew a quilt top. It would be open to any member who wishes to participate, and the cost is covered by the participants.

Membership Assistant

The Assistant to the Membership convenor would do just that assist the Membership convenor as needed.

This may include helping at the membership desk, compiling a membership list, providing new members with name badges and documents that tell them about our guild. You would also become the Membership convenor next year.

Backing Charts

Thank you, Susan S, for submitting this link from GE Designs. It's a super handy guide to help determine how much fabric is required for backing a quilt. What I love about this resource is it is a downloadable file that is easy to print off. Because a computer is not always available when you're busy with your quilt.

Free Quilt Patterns

What better way to celebrate International Quilting Month and specifically March 19's Quilting Day than with access to a bunch of free patterns to tickle your sewing needle?

There are all kinds of projects here, so be prepared to do some web surfing as you click through the various projects, from Baby quilts, to Jelly Roll, to Seasonal. There's a bit of everything here.



HSTs from a tube of fabric? Yes, you can. Check out this video for the tutorial, and empty your scrap basket even faster. The possibilities are endless.

2022 DTQG President's Challenge - Debbie K

Hello wonderful members of DTQG. As I mentioned in our February 14 guild meeting, I have a new challenge for you. We, as an executive, know that over the last two years, many of you have collected pieces of material for the Fabric Exchange. That thought is a little intimidating and now verging on terrifying. We can only imagine how big of a bag (truck) you will need to bring all that fabric in to exchange. So many members have been super productive these past two years, so many quilts, so many small pieces of fabric left over.

I happened to watch a Missouri Star Quilt Company (MSQC) video a couple of weeks ago that got my imagination going on how to help with three (or more) different areas.

First, by reducing the amount of fabric you have waiting to go to the Fabric Exchange. Second, by helping the Cuddle Quilt program, as you learn a new (or refresh an old) skill. And third, reducing the amount of fabric going into the landfill by creating a new fabric from something that maybe was going to be thrown away, all while saving money because you are using something you already have.

So, I came up with the idea that for the rest of the year each of us can make 12.5 inch square





crumb blocks. Crumb blocks are created by taking your small pieces of fabric and stitching them together, pressing as you go. (Terri has found that pressing the seams open makes it easier to work with.) Continue to add fabric until you have something that can be trimmed to a 12.5 inch square block. All the blocks will be collected when we have our Fabric Exchange Day sometime in the future and the blocks will be given to the Cuddle Quilt program to turn into lovely quilts.

I have started mine. I must warn you it is quite addictive doing these blocks. I am also not using small pieces yet. I found some cut off rectangles, triangles, and other larger pieces, and have been building around them. I also have been doing a few at a time which helps when you are using a long strip of fabric. I also appreciate the size because they fit perfectly in one of those flat project boxes from Michaels (the scrapbook ones).

So far, I have completed 20 of them and they all started out as cut offs and leftovers from other projects.

I found the process of playing with the fabrics, experimenting with different colour choices, and seeing how adding a piece of fabric on one side or the other really helped create a design. It became play time, helped me relax, created joy inside, and freed me up to experiment without worrying about too much precision. After all, if it is a bit too short, just

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add another piece of fabric on.

I am hoping you will join me in creating something new from scraps. One of the mandates of our guild is to encourage learning, developing our craft, and helping our community. This challenge will help fulfill this directive. Click on the four posted links to videos that do a much better job of explaining how to do a crumb block and a slab quilt. Have fun with this and maybe if we get lots of these blocks done, it will make Jacqueline and Retta's job with the Fabric Exchange much more manageable when we are finally together in person. Thank you and I am looking forward to seeing the blocks you create.

Note that speaking about the quilts will be limited to one minute per quilt at the meeting. Don't forget - each submission qualifies for the monthly draw. I'm looking forward to receiving photos of your beautiful and inspiring projects.


We are now 83 members strong! Welcome, Kim B, our newest member.

We have an outreach quilt making program with prizes coming up!

Andrew has been hard at work creating bundles for the proposed Jelly Roll Race. Above is a photo of the 13 Jelly Rolls created so far. Pictured below is one of the flimsies Maria made from an extra roll. In working out the measurements, we have found that 26 strips of around 40 inches or so will create a 32 x 57-inch quilt top.

Once these finished tops are returned, we will cut them in half

and add a border to create a 45inch quilt.

March 19 is the day for our race, as it is International Quilting Day.

There are three options for those who wish to sign up for the Jelly Roll Race:

- those who won't make a quilt top, but will donate a Jelly Roll
- those who will join and sew, but need a Jelly Roll
- those who will join, and will use their own Jelly Roll (making sure they are "regulation" 26 strips of 2.5 x 40

inches – we will work under the honour system) Please register with Jacqueline

H with whatever option you choose for the race. Participants who need a fabric bundle for the race can call either Kate H (Oshawa) or Deb W (Whitby) to arrange for pickup of your Jelly Roll.

EVERYONE who finishes sewing a Jelly Roll top will win a prize in the Jelly Roll Race! Prizes will be awarded in the form of pre-cut Fat Quarters, taken from the guild's Community Quilts' stash. Winners can pick up their prizes from Kate H (Oshawa) or Deb W (Whitby) in exchange for their completed quilt top. The number of Fat Quarters a winner gets depends on where the person places in the race. For example:

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As you can tell, the more people who enter the race, the larger the top prize will be! The faster you finish, the more Fat Quarters you will get!

Remember to cut the first 40inch strip in half to allow for offset seams. Also, sewing strips together with a diagonal seam will add to the overall effect of the finished top.

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
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

New, Quick Applique

For those of you that hate machine applique, this video may change your mind. Laura Coia from Sew Very Easy goes over how to use a special thread as a new, quick way to get your applique shapes in place with very little fuss.

Organize for Piecing

Carol Doak has published a new book on foundation paper piecing. In this video, she goes over a number of tips that she uses to keep things organized and ready for successful piecing. While it is a little bit of a commercial, you have to at least check out the quilt she has hanging over her sewing desk. It's very pretty.

Vintage Sheets 4 Quilts

Bind Quilt with Backing

Thanks, Debbie K, for sharing this video on a cool binding technique. Lisa Capen uses the backing from her project to do the binding in a really unique technique. This method is super easy for smaller projects like quilted postcards and mug rugs. The corners are mitred, too! Who knew a kid's glue stick could make this method so magical? I'm so impressed.

Self-binding Placemats

If you recall, we had Kim Jamieson-Hirst of Chatterbox Quilts as one of our guild presenters last year.

In this video, Kim goes over a wonderful way to produce a placemat that ends up being bound by its backing fabric. She does a couple of steps that I wasn't expecting, but it makes sense in the end. The result is a beautifully mitred placemat for any table.




