

He asked what we charged for the quilts and could hardly believe it when I said we "give" them to recipients who are in need. The manager went on to tell me that he thought this lovely gesture would mean a great deal to his residents as they often feel forgotten.

This conversation transpired just before Valentine's Day, so I picked up some chocolate hearts and delivered five lap quilts immediately. I explained that they were made with love and we hoped they would bring comfort to the recipients.

That day, I drove home with a huge smile on my face, knowing we had made a difference! Thank you for your support of our Cuddle Quilt program.

Speaker: Susan Jensen, Fibre/Textile Artist | Topic: Branching Out


Growing up with creative parents, Sue was exposed to many pastimes as a child, including needlework, sewing, painting and woodwork, but not quilting.

This is an opportunity for a member to facilitate a Block of the Month project for interested members to take part in.

Once you have selected your project, it is presented to the Executive Committee for their support.

You can determine how and when this project will be communicated and distributed to members. The costs associated with the project are covered by the participants.

Vice President

We are looking for an individual who has leadership skills and is excited about our guild's goals.

This candidate needs to be willing to spend two years in the Vice President (VP) role to then move into the President's role, and finally, move into the Past President position (two years in each position).

As VP, you will assist the current President as required, including coordinating facilities for all meetings and special projects, organizing greeters for meetings, and new member orientation.

The VP is also a member of the Nomination Committee.

Newsletter

Are you a communicator? Do you enjoy desktop publishing?

This person will set deadlines for convenors who contribute content to our guild's newsletter monthly. Once all is received, the fun begins!

Including the artwork from the Advertising convenor, the newsletter is created to keep our members informed of all the opportunities our guild provides.

The newsletter is also submitted to the Website convenor to have it uploaded for members to access.

Members are notified via email when the newsletter is available online.

Program

The Program convenor selects and arranges the main features for our monthly meetings.

The proposed invitees are submitted to the guild's Executive Committee for approval. Using word processing and email, a contract is drawn and shared with all parties. This contract and a payment request form is then submitted to the Treasurer to arrange payment to the presenter.

The Program convenor ensures all equipment required by presenter is available on meeting night. The convenor will introduce the speaker, help them set up and take down, and thanks them after the presentation.



Website

The Website convenor is responsible for maintaining the guild's website. The convenor is also responsible for adding new features as approved by the executive.

You need to be able to create and edit documents on the computer. The website platform is provided, but the knowledge of editing documents in a word processor or other program will assist you in editing the website.

Membership Assistant


The Assistant to the Membership convenor would do just that - assist the Membership convenor as needed.


This may include helping at the membership desk, compiling a membership list, providing new members with name badges and documents that tell them about our guild. You would also become the Membership convenor next year.
























Ukraine Fund Raiser - Lina S

Scrappy Quilt Pattern - by Lynn P

We're so lucky. One of our members (Lynn P) created this quilt top and has written out her pattern for us. Here's what she shared to make this beauty:

This pattern can be made to any size you choose. I chose 4" finished blocks for my quilt top, and it measures 60" x 45."

You will make:

- 83 four patch units
- 68 half square triangles
- 14 V-block blocks (I made mine with the Deb Tucker V-Block ruler)

Four Patch Units:

Cut 332 – 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " squares using a variety of different fabrics.

Sew these together, making 4 patch units, using your preferred method, until you end up with 83 four patch units.

Half Square Triangles:

Cut 5" x WOF white strips (depending on how wide your WOF is, you will need 4 or 5 strips). You need a total of 34 white 5" squares.

- sub cut strips into 5" squares
- · cut squares once on the diagonal

Cut 5" x WOF black strips (depending on how wide your WOF is, you will need 4 or 5 strips).



You need a total of 34 black 5" squares.

- sub cut strips into 5" squares
- cut squares once on the diagonal

Make a total of 68 half square triangles, using your preferred method.

V-Block Units:

You will need a total of 14 "V-Block" units. I used the Deb Tucker V-Block ruler to create these units. She has excellent videos posted on her website that explain how to use each of her rulers. If anyone needs help with using the ruler, feel free to reach out to me, and I will help you.

So, if submitting more than two projects, please indicate your preferred two or I will just randomly select them. our participants.


It is our sincere hope that you all enjoy your prizes and know that your work will be turned into wonderful quilts for our Community Outreach program.


Quirky Quilters Tips - Jacqueline H



Fabric Basket - Jacqueline H

Two ideas to help get a handle on your fabric basket.

- 1. Sort it by colour (so that when you hand in your scraps (that are the size of your hand or bigger), they will be easily turned into charity quilts based on their colour.
- 2. Our very own Terri F showed us how to cut scraps into 2 x 3.5 inch pieces. Gather a random 32 of these. Make the 12.5 inch block as shown.



Use a scant ¼ inch seam. Seams should never meet when adding new pieces. If they do, you are adding your pieces to the wrong side, so rotate it 90 degrees. Up to Step 5 achieves a 9.5 inch block. Add another set of 3 pieces sewn lengthwise to the top and bottom (6 total), then a set of 4 pieces to the left and right (8 total) to achieve a 12.5 inch block.



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
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
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

How much fabric do I need for the binding on my quilt?

- Measure around the 4 sides of the quilt e.g. a 46" x 52" quilt (46 + 52 + 46 + 52 = 196).
- 2. Add 15" to step1 for start, finish and corners (196 + 15 = 214).
- 3. Divide step 2 by 40 (the usable width of most fabrics) for the number of strips needed (214 ÷ 40 = 5.35) rounding up to the next whole number i.e. 5.35 = 6 strips.
- 4. Multiply width of binding strip usually 2½" x 6 strips = 15" fabric required. Convert to centimetres, 15" = 38cm. Purchase 40cm (or 50cm to allow extra for shrinkage).

TIP: 1"=2.54cm

Folding a Quilt

It's best to go to the experts when you want to learn to do something properly.

Aislinn, Jenny Doan's grand-daughter-in-law, is the expert at Missouri Star Quilt Company when it comes to keeping track of, folding, and storing the multitude of quilts the company produces.

Check out the YouTube video to learn about Aislinn's great technique for folding quilts for storage. Now, if only I had a large, library room to put everything in. Hmmmm.

Matching Seams

This article is about matching seams BETWEEN sewing machines. I don't have more than one machine, but many of you who have been sewing a lot longer probably have a collection going.

I can see how it would get tricky when you use one machine regularly at home, but you take a different machine to retreats perhaps. This article outlines tips to ensure your seam allowance remains consistant between your machines. Her technique is easy to do.

Stitch & Flip Technique

I wish I had come across this article before I worked on our 2021 Mystery guilt.

I think my Snowball Block would have turned out a little better. So now, I have to find a way to practice this little technique to see if it really works. At least, I like the theory.

Squaring Up Tips

Squaring up a ton of blocks can be daunting. Some people like to trim. I'd rather be sewing, personally. So if I have to play with the rotary cutter, I'd like to get it over with as quickly and painlessly as possible. And yes, hand sanitizer really does remove the Sharpie marks. Now you're curious...

Selvage Quilt
