Quilt Block of the Month:

With this year's Quilt Show now a wonderful memory, it is finally time to announce this year's Block of the Month project. Hooray!

As something a little different from a traditional block of the month, we will be doing a fun and easy pattern by Atkinson Designs called **Hat Hat Hooray** that is a great use for those fat quarters or scraps waiting for the perfect project in your sewing space. It is also a great opportunity to spend some time (and money) at your local quilt store! Note there are no special rulers needed for this pattern!

Details:

- Every participant is responsible for purchasing their own individual pattern. There are no additional fees to join this year's Block of the Month.
- The PDF pattern can be purchased directly from Atkinson Designs for US\$12:

- Your local quilt store may also have a paper pattern or be able to order it for you. If you need some tips on places to call, let me know as I have been keeping my ears open!
- This fun quilt has four main types of blocks: 3 different hat styles and a scarf. Because everyone will want to make a different size, to enter the monthly draw you only need to submit ONE block for that month's selection. No rush and no stress! I even have two 'catch up' months built in!

Quick Tips:

- Do you love the Studio 180 Corner Pop for snowballing corners? I have done the adjusted cutting
 measurements to save you fabric and drawing those pesky lines. Just find me at the November meeting!
- Ziploc Bags are your friend!
 - o Use bags to separate fabric for the different hats, scarf and borders
- Don't forget to use starch or Best Press!
- Quarter Inch or Scant Quarter Inch?
 - Some of the hats have smaller pieces. I have done a sample of the first hat and my quilty tip unless you have a PERFECT quarter inch, lean more toward a scant quarter inch and then you can trim as you go. The pattern provides the measurements of each component to keep your blocks stress free!

I look forward to taking this quilty adventure with you!

Fabric Exchange 2024-2025

The fabric exchange colour this month is Blue, BUT, because everyone was so busy before the Quilt Show, I will also accept Gold strips for anyone who would like to join in and catch up. Please remember, the colours are toned or muddy this year.

Hope to see more join in,

The fabric exchange this year is 2-1/2" strips of toned strips (some people call these colours "muddy"). I will have samples of the colours available at each Guild meeting. The exchange will begin with the October meeting and will go on for 7 months. Some fabric designers who use toned fabrics are Kim Diehl, Kansas Troubles, Jo Morto, Jeanne Horton (Windham Fabrics), Barbara Brakman, Renee Nanneman of Need'l Love, Lynette Anderson.

At the end of the 7 months, I will give you a pattern which can be made with the strips. It will be a lap size quilt and will use all the strips.

Each month you will bring 6 strips in a plastic baggie with your name and phone number written on the front. Registration can be found on the website at:

As we will not be having "in person" meetings for the months of January, February and March, you will need to hand them in at the December meeting and receive them back in April.

The colours for this exchange are as follows:

October - Gold

November - Blue

December - Red

January - Green

February - Brown or Black

March - Cheddar

April - Aubergine or Pink

You will notice some of the months give you alternative colours e.g. Brown or Black can be 6 of one colour or 4 brown and 2 black. I've done this because it's sometimes hard to find some colours.

I hope you will participate in this program - it's fun - it's free - and you will learn to identify toned fabrics.




