Fabric Exchange 2024-2025

The fabric exchange this year will be 2-1/2" strips of toned strips (some people call these colours "muddy"). I will have samples of the colours available at each Guild meeting. The exchange will begin with the October meeting and will go on for 7 months. Some fabric designers who use toned fabrics are Kim Diehl, Kansas Troubles, Jo Morto, Jeanne Horton (Windham Fabrics), Barbara Brakman, Renee Nanneman of Need'l Love, Lynette Anderson.

At the end of the 7 months, I will give you a pattern which can be made with the strips. It will be a lap size quilt and will use all the strips.

Each month you will bring 6 strips in a plastic baggie with your name and phone number written on the front. Registration can be found on the website at:

As we will not be having "in person" meetings for the months of January, February and March, you will need to hand them in at the December meeting and receive them back in April.

The colours for this exchange are as follows:

October - Gold

November - Blue

December - Red

January - Green

February - Brown or Black

March - Cheddar

April - Aubergine or Pink

You will notice some of the months give you alternative colours e.g. Brown or Black can be 6 of one colour or 4 brown and 2 black. I've done this because it's sometimes hard to find some colours.

I hope you will participate in this program - it's fun - it's free - and you will learn to identify toned fabrics.

- At the end of the day, we had 16 lap quilts ready to bind. A productive day indeed.
- Special thanks to Tracey for her expertise and time. She also donates the studio fees to our program. It's a great partnership.
- Make sure you sign up for our next day at Whirls 'N Swirls it's always a great time and it certainly supports a great cause. Sometime later this year...
- "Make placemats please!" we said and placemats you certainly made!
- The call to make placemats for Durham Community Care for the fall and holiday season was made this summer to our guild members.
- Do you know how many completed placemats were returned at the September meeting? 197
- Do you know what our goal was? 150 placemats by the end of November!
- Want to make some more? Or forgot to bring your donation? Please bring them to the October meeting.

What is a WALKER BAG (WB) you may ask...

- It's a bag that has a handle made to be attached to an actual "walker" for people with mobility challenges.
- They are made of heavier fabric than quilting cottons and are loved by everyone who receives them.
- Typically, they are donated to long term care facilities.
- We had a few kits for WB's at the last meeting and members took them all. We will have more at the October meeting. Come and get 'em!

Things your Community Outreach Committee (COC)) wants you to know:

- We spend WAY too much time measuring quilts. When donating a quilt or quilt top, could you attach a piece of paper, with a safety pin, that would have your name and the quilt's measurements?
- If you work on one of the COC's kits, please make sure to complete the tag. Put your name on whichever, and all, steps you completed. And, thinking of point above, if it does not have measurements, please include those on the tag.
- If you are planning to make a quilt out of your stash for COC, please request a label ahead of time so that it may be sewn into the binding.
- We LOVE fabric! BUT what we love even more is GOOD QUALITY QUILTING cotton. At the moment, we are low on neutrals that could be teamed with the fabric we have on hand tone on tone, that

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type of thing. Again, if you know the size of the piece of fabric you are donating, identify it on the bag, a piece of tape, etc.

- If you are given fabric for the guild's COC, please, please, go through the boxes or bags before dropping off to us. We have had surprizes in the form of evidence of critters in boxes in the past. If the donor would have opened the box, they would have seen the same thing as us and not passed it on to us.
- Also, if you have donations of other things than quilting cotton, please reach out to the COC with the guild's email, so that we can say ahead of time, if the items are needed or not. We don't want to be the dumping ground for all things no longer needed! That's the treasure table!

We're happy to report:

- Over the summer we donated quilts to the following organizations: Pregnancy Help Centre, Muslim Welfare Homes, Extendicare Oshawa, Hillsdale Terraces, and Denise House.
- We received a thank you letter from Denise House, which has been included in the newsletter.
 - If you have contact information for another local organization you feel could use some quilt love, please send the COC a quick email via the Guild's website.
 - o Maybe a group you know could use a quilt for a raffle? We have some of those too!

We want you to know that we have Paul Row of The Precision Edge, who sharpens knives and scissors (etc.), is a vendor at the quilt show. He will be coming to our meeting on October 7th for advance pick up of any items that need sharpening and he will return them at the quilt show. Here is the information he has sent us:

I sharpen fabric shears, \$15, pinking shears \$20(still working on getting better at these, no charge of course if I can't get them sharpened perfectly). If anyone needs, I sharpen all salon shears, \$20, thinning shears \$30, clipper blades \$10. Many other items as well if people are interested.

I'll bring tags for attaching to customers items as well.

- 5) We will also sell the clear plastic bags needed to submit quilts, for 25 cents if you do not have your own.
- 6) A helpful and gentle reminder is to go over your quilt with a sticky lint roller (both front and back), as well as take a quick look for threads that need to be trimmed.

As a show committee we all thank you for your dedication and determination to make this a great quilt show!

See you Thursday October 17th for Show set-up starting at 12 noon, as well as Friday October 18th and Saturday October 19th!



THAT'S ALL FOLKS!

How to Make a Quilt Hanging Sleeve - One Example - Durham Trillium Quilters' Guild

- 1. Measure the width of your quilt: measure along the edge that will be the top when hanging.
 - a. Example: Quilt is 84" wide at the top of the quilt
- 2. Obtain material that is 9" wide by the quilt width plus 1" to use as the sleeve (Figure 1). This can be a single fabric or sewn together from multiple pieces.
 - If this is temporary, it can be any supporting fabric that can support the weight (e.g., muslin, bed sheet, etc. but not knits or very light weight material).
 - b. If it will stay on the quilt, use a quilting fabric that you like!
 - c. If pieced ... recommend sewing down the seam edges so the rod doesn't catch on the seam when being inserted.
 - d. Example: for the example quilt that is 84" wide, create a strip of fabric that is 85" long by 9" wide.



- 3. Finish the raw ends
 - a. On each end, fold in the short edge (wrong sides together) by $\frac{1}{2}$ inch and press.
 - b. Fold the short edge in 1 more time, so the raw edge is now enclosed, and press again (Figure 2).
 - c. Topstitch 1/8" from the edge to hold down the folds.



- 4. Fold the strip in half lengthwise, with WRONG SIDES together. Stitch a ½" seam along the long raw edge (Figure 3). NOTE: having the wrong sides together makes it so you don't have to turn the tube inside out later. (Sorry, I sewed with white thread so it is hard to see! I drew a line on the image, part way, for clarity.)
- 5. Position the tube with the seam on top in the middle. Press the seam open and the tube flat (Figure 4).



- 6. Create some slack in the sleeve so there is no "bump" on the front when hanging:
 - a. Turn the sleeve over so that the open seam is on the bottom.
 - b. Fold up ¼" to ½" along one edge of the hanging sleeve tube and press to form a nice crease (Figure 5).
 - c. Be consistent choose either ¼" or ½" (or something in the middle) and stick with it for the entire length of the sleeve.




- 7. Attach the hanging sleeve to the quilt as follows:
 - a. Position the sleeve along the top of the quilt, approximately ¼" from the top, with the seam of the sleeve touching the back of the quilt. The edge fold should be facing up (Figure 6).
 - b. Use the original fold crease line on one long side and the new crease from the previous step, as the "sew lines" of the sleeve length. This will have a flat part against the quilt, and a "bump" of the sleeve sticking up from the quilt. You can open the fold to make it easier to sew (Figure 7).
 - c. Attach the hanging sleeve to the quilt go around all 4 sides both long sides AND short edges (sewing the short edges of the seam makes it much easier to get the hanger into the sleeve)
 - i. If sleeve is to be temporary, it can be basted down or attached with safety pins.
 - 1. NOTE: If attached with straight pins, people could get hurt and quilts with sleeves attached with straight pins WILL NOT be displayed at the quilt show.
 - ii. If sleeve is to be permanent, attach to the quilt using a whipstitch or a blind stitch.
 - iii. In either case,
 - 1. Be sure to catch the batting in the stitches/pins to make the stiches secure and not put undue stress on the backing.
 - 2. Take care that the stitches/pins don't show on the front of the guilt





How to Fold a Quilt for Quilt Show - Durham Trillium Quilters' Guild


- 1. Lay the quilt out flat, with "right side of the quilt" facing up, and back with label facing down.
- 2. Fold the quilt by bringing the top of the quilt up and over to meet the bottom of the quilt, resulting in the hanging sleeve being on top, and the fold being parallel to the hanging sleeve.
 - a. See Figure 1. In this example, green is the hanging sleeve



- 3. Fold again in the same direction, by bringing the fold up and over top of the hanging sleeve. The folds are parallel to the hanging sleeve.
 - a. See Figure 2.



- 4. Determine which corner on the bottom of the quilt has the quilt label. Leaving that side edge down, fold the quilt by bringing the opposite side over to the edge that has the quilt label.
- 5. Fold again, in the same direction, bringing the edge with the quilt label up and over the quilt to meet the last fold. This results in the quilt label being on the top of the folded quilt.
 - a. See Figure 3. The quilt label is in red.
- 6. Place the quilt into a clean/new CLEAR plastic garbage bag. (individual bags can be purchased from guild at the guild meeting on Oct 7). DO NOT USE A BAG YOU WANT BACK OR THAT IS NOT 100% CLEAR.



- 7. Bring the quilt to the quilt show on Thursday October 17 between 1:30 pm and 3:00 pm.
 - a. Location is Forest Brook Community Church, 60 Kearney Drive, Ajax, L1T 4N2
 - b. If you cannot bring it during that time, please find a friend to do it for you. Ask the executive for help if needed.
 - c. See the registration table. **DO not just drop off see the registration desk to obtain a receipt, as** quilts will not be returned to persons unless the receipt is provided.
- 8. Participants (or designates) are responsible for picking up submitted entries at the close of the show on Saturday October 19 between 5:00 and 5:30 p.m. The person picking up entries MUST bring the receipt provided when the item was dropped off, or the item will NOT be released. NOTE: when coming to pick up items after the show, please wait outside until 5:00 to give the volunteers time and space to take down the displays and have all items ready.
