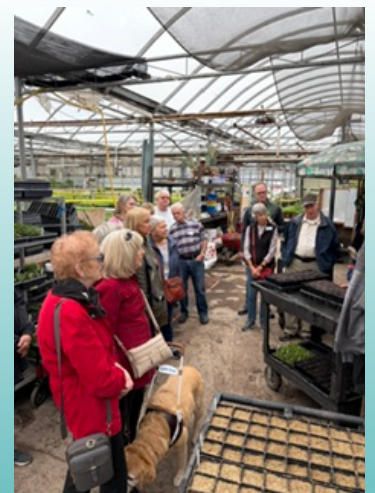
From Your Social Committee

Thursday, May 7

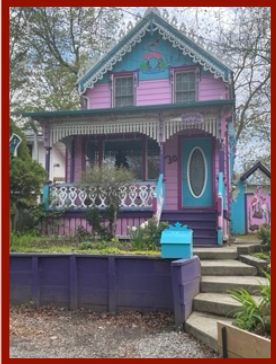


On a beautiful sunny morning, a group of Probus members embarked on another great Mary Morton Tour to visit a "Tulip Pick" farm in Niagara-on-the-Lake. Although it had rained heavily the night before, we were able to "tiptoe" through the tulips to experience the vast array of colours and shapes of flowers. I will quote directly from the TASC Tulip Farm website so as not to get the statistics wrong:

This isn't a small field with a few rows of flowers. TASC is Ontario's largest tulip farm, featuring:

**3,000,000+ tulips
55 acres of fields
100+ varieties**

When you step into the farm, it's not just "nice." It's overwhelming in the best way possible. Rows of colour in every direction. Different varieties opening throughout the season. It feels massive - because it is.



Included in the price of entry, we were allowed to select 10 tulips to have wrapped to take home. Our

bus was definitely "flowerful" once everyone got back on for the next stop.

Lunch was at Betty's, a lovely restaurant set up for bus groups, and we ordered our meals immediately. Service was quick, the food choices were great (fish & chips, roast beef dinner or chicken parm), the food quality was excellent and the pie selection for dessert was too extensive to mention here! Next was a quick stop at Magnotta Wines for a taste and to pick up wine to go. 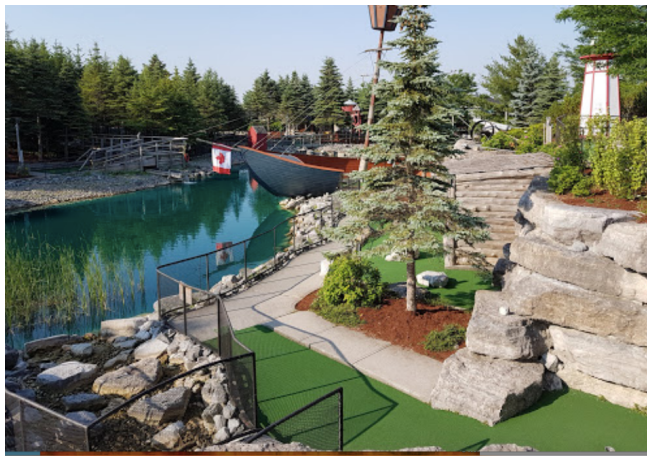

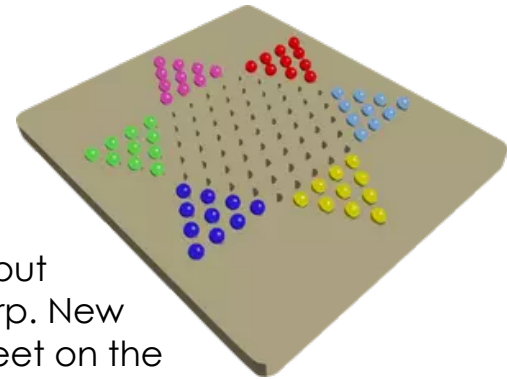
AGE GETS BETTER WITH WINE: Coordinator Anne Gauvreau
