Model A Acres & Tyrone Mills - Oct. 3







On Friday October 3, a hungry bunch met at Haugen's for lunch and the start of what was to be a most interesting day. Around 1:00 pm, we set off courtesy of our own cars for the 30 minute drive to Model A Acres (or 40 minutes if you were actually driving a Model A as were John & Lorraine). The attraction is situated on a 10 acre farm between Enniskillen and Tyrone. We were met by the owners, lan & Luverne, and, after introductions, lan began leading us on an interesting and informative walking tour. It seems lan was very interested in Ford Model A cars (thus the name) and, over the years, had restored no fewer than 7 cars. He still has a Model A hot-rod on display and an A pickup in his garage.

After so many Model A's, Luverne decided she had had enough of them and suggested lan find another hobby. Another interest of lan's was aircraft from the World War 2 era, so why not build a few life size models with which to adorn his property? Somewhere about this point in time, lan's hobby took a unique turn as he decided he would build the fuselages from whatever free materials he could lay his hands on. His material of choice has become the sides of above ground pools. These are thin metal, easily cut and shaped, and easy to bend over the supporting framework. Ian did not rule out any other materials and so his aircraft are comprised of parts from his daughter's swing set, a washing machine, BBQ, propane tanks, bowling pins, etc. His collection now includes WWI (aka Snoopy's) Sopwith Camel and the Red Baron's Fokker DR. From WWII there is a Spitfire, Messerschmitt, Hurricane and others. Also now included in the collection are a Willys Jeep, Sherman Tank, U-Boat and full sized steam locomotive. Not only did lan build all these items, but he is a walking encyclopedia as to the history of each and every one of them.

Our tour ended back at the house where Ian & Luverne thanked us for coming and we set off for our next attraction, Tyrone Mills, situated a few minutes' drive away. The mill was built in 1846 and has been in operation ever since. While it has been a saw mill, flour mill, grist mill and cider producer, it is now solely a flour mill. The water driven mill is now home to a bakery selling all manner of pastries, donuts, etc. and of course many different kinds of flour made on site. While we had originally planned on also visiting Archibald's Estate Winery, just a few minutes away, the necessity to relax and sample ice creams took precedence and Archibald's was saved for another day.




REDUCING MY FOOTPRINT: Coordinator Brian Keeling


