

Probus Newfoundland Trip - June 2025

Greetings from the recently "Screeched-In" fledgling Newfoundland citizens! I've never been on a vacation where I had to set my alarm clock for 6:00 a.m. EVERY morning but it was worth it! Departing Toronto on Friday the 13th was daunting enough, but when the plane in front of us lost its hydraulic fluid on the runway, I had second thoughts about going at all! After a short delay, we were diverted to another runway and safely arrived in Deer Lake, Nfld. The next morning, we headed north up the Viking Trail to St. Anthony's, past stunningly high mountains, water falls, tundra, ocean views and even three moose! In L'Anse aux Meadows we had a guided tour of the incredible Viking Village. In Port aux Choix, the archaeological sites from the 60's and 70's provided evidence of its earliest settlers from Maritime Archaic Indians to Eskimos. On our trip southbound, a stop at the Arches Provincial Park gave an absolutely wild windy ocean view of arches carved by the ocean and wind. We travelled to Gros Morne Tablelands which are a unique geological formation and once a part of the Earth's mantle, providing a rare example of





the process of Continental Drift. After a beautiful boat tour of Bonne



Bay Bulls was the site of our whale and puffin tour. This boat ride would have given any roller coaster at Wonderland a run for the money. We saw a mother baleen whale with her calf crest the surface many times and even frolic beside the boat. The island was home to many species of birds including puffins, which I was very surprised to learn are actually very small and only have an orange beak and feet during mating season. The final three days in St. John's were filled by touring the Baccalieu trail, Cupids (where the first English settlement in the Americas was founded), and Hearts Content (where the first transatlantic cable allowed direct communication between the continents). Then off to visit Dildo and have an in-depth tour of St. John's to see the Jelly Bean houses, with stops at Quidi Vidi (pronounced Kiddy Viddy), Signal Hill and Cape Spear. We even got to see a real life-size giant of a Newfoundland dog - so majestic.

Some of us may never get back to Newfoundland, but I feel like we were treated to the best of this island and I was so glad to be part of

We learned that the queens here don't have crowns but they DO have tattoos! These are colour coded each year so everyone knows how old they are!!

Before visiting the extraction room, we walked the infinity path while meditating and chanting along with the owner's dogs! Yes – we howled and there wasn't even a full moon!

The third component was to discover how mead (honey wine) is made and we were offered a sample at lunch (or bought a flight of four!) A quick trip to the shop and another fabulous excursion came to an end!




SMALL TOWN THEATRE: Coordinators Steve Fryzuk & Peggy Kennedy
