He had designed greenhouses for Queen Victoria and through a series of events, submitted his design for The Great Exhibition of 1851; an international trade fair which would host people from all over the world

greenhouses provided design inspiration for Paxton. It highlighted the technological advances of the Industrial Revolution using iron and 600,000 panes of glass. It was 1848 feet in length and over 108 feet tall. After the exhibition from May - October, it was removed from Hyde Park as it was built as a temporary structure.
