The Jours



Historic Mt. Pleasant, Tenn was established in 1824. It was primarily a farming community in Maury County. It wasn't until phosphate, brown rock, was discovered in 1896 that the city became a boomtown. Population in 1890 was 466 and by 1900, it had exploded to 2,000. Today, it's approximately 5,000.

It wasn't until the discovery of phosphate, that many of the homes and commercial buildings were built to accommodate the influx of people and the needs of the community. Several mining companies began to set up businesses to get in on the mining craze. By 1911, there were 15 plants in the area.

John Ruhm, was President and GM for the Ruhm Phosphate Mining Co and educated people in the profitable use of raw brown rock in its application in soil as a fertilizer. You can view his magnificent home in the Pleasant Historic District.

The 'Pleasant Historic District' and the 'North Main Street Historic District' self-guided walking-driving tours feature homes dating back as early as pre-1824 through the early 1900's. During the walk, you will see many homes not listed in the brochure to appreciate and admire as well. Included in the tours, are some of the downtown commercial buildings which are part of the 'Commercial Historic District'. We have such a plethora of historic homes and buildings that are restored/preserved and others waiting for their next caregiver. Our historic homes are the reason so many homeowners choose Historic Mt. Pleasant as their community.

The Pleasant Historic District is the largest identified, undisturbed neighborhood in the City and reflects the enormous economic impact of the early phosphate boom.

All districts are listed on the National Register of Historic Places for its history in the phosphate industry as well as the variety of architectural styles. Historic preservation is important for our city's history and our future.

Breckenridge Hatter House | ca. 1819 205 N. Main Street

Built in 1819, this is the oldest standing structure in Mt. Pleasant. Constructed of cedar logs set on a stone foundation. Ebenezer Smith lived upstairs while operating a Hatter's Shop on the main floor. While not in the historic district, it is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and home to Mt. Pleasant's Visitor Center.



Price House | ca. 1847 209 N. Main Street

Although not in a historic district, it is certainly worth admiring this beautiful home. It was built for Francis Price and his wife, Lavonia Ridley (a well off family with a farm and interest in the phosphate industry). Mr. Price was a merchant in Mt. Pleasant. They owned expensive breeding horses. Unfortunately went bankrupt in 1851.



Bullock House | ca. 1904 405 N. Main Street

This historical home is a Neo-Classical architectural style with Tuscan columns, two corbeled interior brick chimneys and a stone wall around the property. It was built for Robert Bullock, proprietor of Mt. Pleasant Hardware store. He also served as Mayor of Mt. Pleasant between 1916-1924.



Williams House | ca.1938 406 N. Main Street

This Cottage Revival style home was built for C.C. Williams, a farmer and livestock dealer. Built by William Parks and Parks Lumber Company in Lawrenceburg and it is built on the site of Howard Institute.



Cooper House | ca. 1906 407 N. Main Street

This well cared for Bungalow influenced house was built for Robert (Bob) Cooper and his family. He was a merchant at a local grocery store. The porch of this beautiful home seems to welcome you and guests in for an evening of conversation and perhaps a glass of wine.



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This home was built for Mr. Leslie Burnett and Mary Bond Burnett. They raised their four children in this house. Leslie was plant manager for a phosphate plant in Mt. Pleasant. The garage was built in 1925 and is also listed on the Historic Register.



Shofner - Jones House | ca. 1905 411 N. Main Street

This 1905 Federal Revival home was built for D.W. Shofner, founder and President of the First National Bank. The property is surrounded by a stone wall and iron fence. The one-story porch is framed by a pair of columns topped with Scamozzi capitals. Mr. Shofner later traded his home for one on First Ave owned by Dr. Jones.



Brooks-Burnett House | ca. 1905 503 N. Main Street

This charming home is estimated to be built between 1904-1910. William D. Brooks and family were residing in the home in 1910 and sold it to James W. Burnett in 1919 who lived there with his wife and children. Leslie Burnett (son), built a home located at 410 N. Main. James was a plant supervisor for a phosphate company.



Craige House | ca. 1907 507 N. Main Street

This stunning Queen Anne home has so many incredible features. It has a beautiful wrap around porch, an octagonal corner turret with a domed roof and finial. The house was built for hardware store owner, A. W. Craige and his wife Nona Hill Craige. The guest house and garage built later are also on the National Register.



Wilson House | ca. 1912 509 N. Main Street

This two story brick Neo-Classical style home was built for Willie Wilson and his wife Memie and their son, Vance. Willie worked as a farmer. The porch is supported by fluted columns with Scamozzi capitals, an entry pediment and transom over the door.



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Walnut Grove | ca. 1857 510 N. Main Street

A Greek Revival home built by Nathan Vaught for Mrs. Sabra Lawrence. Fire destroyed the original home. The kitchen is in the rear of the house and built in 1824. "Walnut Grove' earned its name from the abundance of walnut trees once surrounding the property. In the 1880's, the home was used as a dorm for the Episcopal School for boys, 'Oley School'.



Ruhm - Clarke House | ca.1900 514 N. Main Street

This Folk Victorian was built for engineer, developer and phosphate company owner, Herman Ruhm. He platted the subdivisions on N. Main and Washington Ave. Dr. C.Y. Clarke later resided here for 80 years. In 1930, the Clarke Training School was named in honor of him for helping secure land and a building.



Harris House | ca. 1930 600 N. Main Street

A great example of a Colonial Revival, this stately home displays a full-length monumental portico supported by Tuscan columns, and an iron cantilever balcony. The home was built for Wiley and Addie Harris and their two sons. He was a farmer and phosphate landowner.



Kittrell Brothers House | ca. 1925 601 N. Main Street

A Bungalow influenced craftsman style home. Both the house and the garage are listed on the National Register.



Hollins House | ca. 1920 603 N. Main Street

A great example of a Craftsman style bungalow. It has a massive central gabled dormer, porch with tapered posts and entry with sidelights. It was built for Robert and Elva Hollins. He was an overseer in a phosphate plant.

Rattle and Snap Plantation | ca. 1842 1522 N. Main Street, Mt. Pleasant

Rattle and Snap is a privately owned home available for <u>tours by appointment only.</u> It was built for George and Sallie Polk. Known to be one of the finest examples of Greek Revival architecture in the U.S. It was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1971.



St. John's Episcopal Church | ca. 1842 6947 Trotwood, Columbia


St. John's Church borders on Mt. Pleasant and Columbia. It was consecrated in 1842 by James Hervey Otey, the first Episcopal Bishop of Tennessee. The church was built by Leonidas Polk and his brothers. Since 1921, services are only held once a year on Whitsunday – the Feast of Pentecost.
