### Welcome to the June Edition of the Bramley Magazine

WELCOME

The Queen will become the first British monarch to celebrate her Platinum Jubilee after 70 years of service on Thursday 2nd June, which will be celebrated with a four-day bank holiday weekend from 2nd-5th June.

Her Majesty's coronation took place on Thursday 2nd June 1953. The one-day celebration took 14 months of preparation and was the only British coronation to be fully televised. Reverend John Morley and James Witchalls share their memories of the Queen's Coronation on p. 7 and p. 13. You can find out about events in Bramley over the Jubilee weekend on pages 12 and 13. There will also be an open-air service on Clift Meadow on Sunday 5th June (p. 5).

Ascending to the throne at just 25, the Queen has dedicated her long life to serving Great Britain, which is certainly worth a four day celebration. The Queen's long reign has seen her visit over 100 countries, carry out thousands of engagements and give Royal Assent to over 4,000 acts of Parliament. The Queen's face has been on the coins of 35 countries, and she has sent over a million cards during her reign to those celebrating their 100th birthdays and their Diamond wedding anniversaries. The Queen has also owned more than 30 corgis and dorgis throughout her reign!

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### **ON REFLECTION**

### Reverend John Morley reflects on his memories of the Queen's Coronation in 1953

You probably need to be 75 or over to have a living memory of the Queen's Coronation in Westminster Abbey on a disappointingly drab summer day, 2nd June 1953. However, the event that day did not disappoint, not just the solemnity of the service in the Abbey, but the processions of royalty - who can forget the Queen of Tonga! -Presidents, military personnel from the Commonwealth and across the world.

In the afternoon, streets and neighbourhoods organised street parties for children, there was bunting everywhere, and many children were given a Coronation mug or a commemorative half-crown - I still have mine. It was the birth of the television age as families bought one of these still-newish devices to watch the day's events in black and white on a very small screen. We shall never see the like again.

But above all, there was a palpable feeling of freshness and hope as this young lady ascended to the throne of the United Kingdom, the Empire or Commonwealth and almost half the world's people. The country and the world were almost a decade on from the most savage war in history. The second

Elizabethan Age was so full of promise, though who could have predicted that in the year 2022 we would be celebrating the 70th anniversary of our 'gracious and noble Queen'.

In a radio broadcast on her 21st birthday on 21 April 1947, the then Princess Elizabeth said, *"I declare before you all that my whole life whether it be long or short, shall be devoted to your service"* and she asked for the prayers and support of everyone. There is no doubt that she has been true to this promise and served all her people with love and faith throughout her long life. During the Platinum Jubilee weekend we shall party and remember and celebrate and no doubt at some stage sing "God Save The Queen". All our church communities will provide an opportunity on Sunday 5th June for us to come together to celebrate this truly unique occasion. You will find details of these services in the magazine.

But this celebration calls for a solid response from the nation and Commonwealth. We should commit to following her example of dedication to all that is noble and true. Writing to early Christians in Philippi, St Paul wrote, 'Whatever is true, whatever is honourable, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is anything worthy of praise, think on these things....and the God of peace will be with you'.

What an undertaking. Her Majesty has truly exemplified this kind of living, even through times of great personal distress. Let us commit ourselves to pray for her now and to follow the example she has set. We have purchased some beautiful booklets called "Our Faithful Queen" which will be available over the Jubilee weekend. They centre around some of the Queen's outstanding qualities not the least of which is her firm and faithful commitment to God which has underpinned her whole life.

GOD SAVE THE QUEEN.

### Bramley Scout Group – Beavers Colony

The Beaver Colony started up again in October 2021, welcoming sixteen new Beavers aged between 6 and 8 years of age to the colony. The Beavers had the opportunity to help shape the group with the creation of the code of conduct, their Lodge (team) name and the group ethos. The group is very lucky to have 6 Leaders alongside our fabulous two young leaders. At Beavers, all the leaders have bird names, Penguin, Owl, Robin, Kookaburra, Toucan and Blue Jay. We also welcomed Gnawman the Beaver teddy, who selects Beaver of the week. Gnawman has his own passport which the children get to take home alongside Gnawman. This way they can showcase their badge work, or hobbies from home. Gnawman loves working with all the children and getting to join in with lots of fun activities such as feeding the cows, riding a motorcycle, or visiting the Opera.

Beavers meet every Tuesday evening term time 5:45 to 6:45pm at the local school. Beavers is run by a group of volunteers ensuring the children (and

### Making life safer for our residents with fire investigation dogs

In 2006 over 50% of fires in the UK were attributed to arson. However, the arrest rate was only 9%, detection rate 7%, and conviction rate just 3%.

So, in 2007 Hampshire Fire & Rescue Service set up the Arson Task Force in collaboration with Hampshire Constabulary. In 2020, the Arson Task Force was hailed as a world leader in arson investigation. In 2021, the arrest rate was 63%, the detection rate 49% and the conviction rate increased to 98% in Hampshire and Isle of Wight. 150 arsonists have been removed from our communities and are serving in excess of 500 years in prison!

Assisting in gaining these remarkable improvements are our four canine detectives, two of whom are pictured. They are trained to detect the presence of ignitable liquids and can get straight to the cause of a fire, quicker and with much more accuracy than a human being. adults) get to have lots of fun, working towards a range of badges. Over the past few months, the children have had lots of exciting opportunities for their badges including the musician, space, and their personal challenge badge. The children are always excited to know which badge they are working towards next. Each week is completely different and led by one of the leaders depending on their expertise. We have "travelled" to space to learn about the planets, performed Rudolph the red nose reindeer in British Sign Language, and completed a range of scientific experiments to earn our Experiments badge.

Beavers also work alongside the local community to provide a range of experiences to the children. Recently we had a visit from our local Police officers. They helped us learn about the Police's role in the community as well as letting the children test out their uniform and police sirens. We met a lovely spaniel named Rocky who works as a scent dog finding things for the police. He loved his ball, which was his reward for working so hard. The following week, we were lucky enough

We have some upcoming exciting projects, for which we will need as much help as possible from our lovely Bramley residents. We are creating a Bee Garden with Clift Meadow and will be appealing for donations of bee friendly plants, as well as some help with the planting encouraging people of all ages. We will also be creating a woodland-style "Jubilee Glade" near the village hall, for which we will be setting up a volunteer work party. Grateful thanks to Sarah Plested, local garden designer and horticulturalist, for her invaluable advice here. We are also hoping to partner with Basingstoke and Deane Council/Hampshire & Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust in a pilot wildlife conservation project.

We have over 150 members in our Facebook group, with a schedule of events and projects planned. We recently held a Bluebell Walk, and a Wilder Walk for Mindfulness. ### **Scout Award**

On April 24th Bramley Cub Leader Harrison Gorst was finally presented with his Queen Scout Award, something that should have taken place in 2019, when he turned 18, but like many things, Covid got in the way.

Chief Scout Bear Grylls presented Harrison with his award at Windsor Castle. Harrison said, "Bear went



round and presented each person with the award by shaking hands and chatting with us. I didn't know what to say to him, so I ended up talking about how our practice expedition ended up in disaster as our path was blocked by a flooded ford during the biggest rainstorm for a decade on Dartmoor! He asked me about the expedition and commended me for surviving.

It was truly one of the best days I've had in scouting. The pageantry is something which scouts rarely get to experience, but we are the only organisation in the country apart from the military allowed to parade in a royal castle! It was a privilege and an honour to represent the organisation, and Bramley Scouts on the day. I would not have had the confidence and resilience to attack the Gold Duke of Edinburgh or Queen's Scout Awards without the effort of amazing volunteers right through my Scouting career. I have chosen to give this back through volunteering myself. I have recently been appointed to the position of Deputy Chairman of Hampshire County Scouts (with over 30,000 young people and adult volunteers), brilliant governance, financial and legal training for when I graduate."

The Queen Scout Award is the highest honour in Scouting and is an outstanding personal achievement for Harrison who joined Scouts as a Bramley Beaver when he was just 6 years old, moving through Cub and Scout sections, then returning to Cubs as a Young Leader at the age of 14. Now at 20 he is a fully invested adult Leader with the Cubs whilst he juggles his time volunteering with his university commitments studying law.

Harrison is passionate about Scouting in general and Bramley Scouts in particular and it's clear that the Cubs in the village benefit enormously from Harrison's commitment and expertise. There is a great team of Volunteers who support all sections of Scouts in the village but there's always room for more.

### **Bramley SpeedWatch**

### **Recent Local SpeedWatch Activity**

Two manned deployments were carried out during May on The Street (opposite Beaurepaire Close, west bound). Details of 26 vehicles were passed onto the police.

The Speed Indicator devices (SIDs) have highlighted some concerning issues during the last month. There were several instances of vehicles travelling at 70mph passing the Village Hall, in both directions. The other concern was that 86% of vehicles were exceeding the 30mph speed limit between Bramley Corner and Tudor Farm.

### Did you know?

Speed limits were first introduced in the UK in 1861 as part of the Locomotives on Highways Act, and limited vehicles to 10mph.

The Locomotive Act 1865 reduced this to just 4mph in the country and an agonising 2mph in the city! Things have moved on!

The minimum penalty for speeding is a  $\pounds$ 100 fine and 3 penalty points added to your licence. If you clock up 12 or more penalty points within three years, you could be disqualified from driving.

Most vans are only allowed to travel at 60mph on dual carriageways and 50mph on national speed limit single carriageway roads. Unless they are car derived which are a type of van that is based on the same platform as cars, and are typically designed to weigh no more than two tonnes when fully loaded. They usually look similar to cars, but without rear windows or seats. Popular examples include Vauxhall Corsa and Ford Fiesta vans. Most vans are not car derived, and subject to lower speed limits than cars. This includes Ford Transits and the smaller Transit Connect.

Mark Anderson.

At the recent fête, from my vantage point of the classic vehicle display, I could see the Speedwatch stand where you could run at the indicator device to record a speed. This reminded me

### News from the Village Hall

Its 'business as usual' at the Village Hall with almost all of our regular users back and some new ones joining us as well. *A Crafty Taste Market* is the latest, held on the fourth Sunday of the month. Come along and take a look.

We've been successful in securing grants for our latest project: installation of solar panels and a battery storage system to help reduce our electricity bills. This is not about going 'off grid' to achieve selfsufficiency but a case of investing in a sustainable solution to reduce our electricity costs by a target of 75%. We have received generous financial support from National Grid with a grant of £10k from their Community Grant Programme and £4k from Hampshire County Council's Parish and Town Council Investment Fund. Three companies tendered quotes for the proposed work, and we have appointed JEM Energy of Fleet, Hampshire as our contractor. This work will start on 25th July and will take about two weeks to

of the efforts of the local Speedwatch team coordinated by Graham White, which continues its good work to educate drivers to the observance of our speed limits. Our urban speed limits are there for a reason and we should remember that we, as drivers, control a lethal weapon under our right foot. In the parishes around us we have recorded speeds of up to 103 mph! The police are now being sent the details of persistent offenders and those vehicles observed speeds of over 60 mph mph.

### **Renewable energy**

The Solar Farm planning application for the land between Bramley and Silchester was rejected by the Borough Council as it was considered to be against policies that protect the countryside and the enjoyment of footpaths, plus potential harm to Roman archaeological remains under the fields. This was a good opportunity for renewable energy generation but totally in the wrong location.

However the Parish Council received a presentation at their last meeting from Loddon Community Energy:-



This is a Community Benefit Society (similar to a Co-op) which is being established in the parishes north

complete. The Hall is less busy during August and much of the work will be external, on the roof of the Frith Room, and disruption to users will be kept to a minimum.

We're already thinking about next year's project! The floor in the main hall needs refurbishment (more than just a wash and wax), and we are currently discussing solutions with some local flooring companies. The work will take at least two weeks in summer 2023 and will mean shutting down the Hall for that period.

of Basingstoke. They will offer shares to the public (individuals and organisations). The money raised will be used to build solar and other renewable generation, initially on the roofs of public buildings. The power will be sold to the site owner at a discount to the general market rate, or exported to the Grid. Shareholders will receive a return of 3-5% on their investment. Any surplus will be used to fund energy efficiency advice, and to support those in "fuel poverty" with grants for insulation etc. They are currently in the final stages of setup, and are already working with a couple of site owners to define specific projects. We will be holding public meetings, and attending events, over the summer and autumn.

few months ago, we asked if any of you had memories of the **Queen's Coronation**. **James Witchalls** has cast his mind back to 1953 when he played a part in that momentous occasion.

At the time of the Coronation, I was 13 years of age, a keen Scout and living within walking distance of Hyde Park in central London. About three days before 2nd June 1953, I was directed to report to a point near the eastern carriageway of the park, together with other Scouts. The whole park had been transformed into a huge encampment to house the thousands of military personnel from around the world who would be participating in the coronation procession. In addition, more than 2000 additional policemen were due to be bussed into London from around the UK. These police officers would be housed in scores of large khaki tents erected near to the carriageway. Each of us Scouts was allocated to a tent which we would be responsible for keeping tidy and clean, a job which I relished.

Activities increased as the big day approached. I had no expectation of seeing any of the procession, but fate thought otherwise! As if by magic I found myself at the roadside.

In front of the huge crowds and the police watching over them. I had a clear view across the processional route between the red-coated guardsmen spaced two yards apart. There were no crowds across the road as the route was quite narrow at this point.

Activity on the route was incessant. A gradual crescendo of cheering indicated the approach of Her Majesty's magnificent horse-drawn golden coach. And what a spectacular sight it was! The coach passed by slowly towards Marble Arch at a steady walking pace, flanked by liveried footmen, only about ten yards from where I was standing. The Queen's attention was focussed on the crowds to her left.

She appeared for a moment to focus on this lone Scout with her gentle smile and wave.

I returned her greeting, albeit with tears streaming down my face. But in that fleeting moment of eye contact a



profound bond of love was sealed, a bond which has never left me.

Her Majesty's early pledge to devote herself to a life of service to her people has been fully apparent over these past seventy years; an inspiration to us all. At that time as a Scout I had already taken seriously my own promise: "I promise to do my best, to do my duty to God and the Queen . . . ". And I have tried to do my best, but count myself immensely privileged to be

living through the reign of such a distinguished monarch. All of us owe a huge debt of gratitude to our most gracious Queen.



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### Probus Enjoys a Twin Visit to Salisbury

The benefits of having an arranged trip to Salisbury Cathedral are the small nuggets of information that evade the casual visitor. As was the case when members and wives/ partners of the Probus Club of Basingstoke visited Salisbury Cathedral and to Arundells, situated in Cathedral Close, the home of the ex-prime minister Sir Edward Heath who is buried in the cathedral.

A guided tour of the cathedral was only able to gloss over the surface, but it was enthralling learning about the foundation of what has become known as 'the cathedral that moved'. The original cathedral shared space with the local garrison but relations soured so much that the Pope gave permission to build a new place of worship. An arrow was fired and where it landed would be the site, but it hit a deer that eventually died where the cathedral now stands.

The foundation stone was laid in 1220 but the 800th anniversary could not be celebrated, as the building was a vaccination centre during the Covid-19 pandemic.

The dimensions and logistics are extraordinary. It took only 38 years to build and used 60,000 tons of stone, 2,800 tons of oak and 420 tons of lead and all this sits on foundations of only four feet. Several rivers pass beneath the building, and the presence of water maintains the firmness of the ground.

This constant supply of water is used in the modern font which is over ten feet across, and has overflowing spouts at four corners clearly demonstrating the style of infinity pools. In opposition to this, is the world's oldest working mechanical clock which has no dials, but rings the hours. For a church of such size, the cathedral does not possess a change ring of bells typically seen in our churches.

Salisbury Cathedral houses one of the four remaining copies of the Magna Carta, signed by King John in 1215. This is on permanent display in the Chapter House.

A short stroll diagonally across Cathedral Close sits Arundells, now known as the Prime Minister's home. It was home for the last twenty years of ex-prime minister Sir Edward Heath and was bequeathed to a charitable foundation set up in Sir Edward's name following his death in 2005.

Parts of the house go back to the 13th century and six architectural periods are visible. It is set in a two-acre walled garden that stretches down to the confluence of the rivers Avon and Nadder, with amazing views back towards the spire of Salisbury Cathedral.

Inside the house has been largely left as it was when Sir Edward lived here, with gifts displayed from world leaders such as Richard Nixon, Chairman Mao and Fidel Castro and many photographs depicting a life spent in politics.

Only taking up sailing at the age of 50, Sir Edward became a successful sportsman. There is a collection of models of Morning Cloud yachts, which is the name most people remember when Sir Edward was the owner and skipper of the winning British crew of the Sydney to Hobart yacht race.

As well as paintings of his boats, the house is decorated throughout with original paintings, some by famous artists, including two by Sir Winston Churchill, L S Lowry and Augustus John. There are beautiful collections of ceramics, glassware and sculptures and treasures from the Far East – including hand painted Chinese wallpaper, and a stunning collection of Japanese woodblock prints. Many bronze sculptures can be seen in an adjoining building with life size busts of Sir Edward Heath and HM Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother.

The house is open from the middle of March to 1st November this year, with guided tours on Tuesdays which provide the visitor with a greater sense, not only about its last inhabitant, but also the great history of this house so connected to Salisbury Cathedral.

### **BEAUTIFUL BRAMLEY**

### he plans for a solar farm have caused a lot of debate among Bramley residents. John Stubbs shares his take on the proposals...

I must admit to a nagging concern upon seeing a lot of the views expressed about the proposals for a solar park locally. Of course, conservation is important, but problems inevitably arise when it conflicts with longer term and wider societal benefits over shorter-term local factors.

In a better world, solar panels and electricity sub-stations would all be located on disused MoD land, vacant slag-heaps and the like; somewhere else, wherever that is. And it'd be really great if someone would negotiate the planning permission, fund, build and maintain these facilities without the incentive of a profit margin. But we are where we are. Just because Bramley and the environs are uniquely insulated from most of the immediate adverse effects of the climate catastrophe doesn't mean we can ignore it: many of us are better able to deal with some changes in lifestyle than populations at large, therefore all the more reason that we should share responsibility for beneficial action.

This is undisputedly the right time to build solar farms. The technical and financial aspects have never been more favourable; over the past ten years the cost of the panels has reduced some 60%, and the efficiency increased by around 30%. The need for extra capacity has never been more pressing. The siting of the plant will change the landscape, just as the advent of field enclosure, scrub and forest clearances changed it for our predecessors. There'll be some losers - I imagine the deer population would likely move away: this might reduce the need for their culling, as at present. The positive side effects include much more favourable habitat for many insects and the like, provided herbicide and pesticide use is controlled. This could enormously benefit birdlife, pollination and the whole range of wildlife dependent upon them. Every day I walk a few miles of Bramley's footpaths, much round the Frith, summer and winter over the past fifty years. There are lots of stretches where I'll usually see no-one: around the rest, perhaps a few dog walkers. Just where are all these folk distraught by the possibility of visual blight?




The loss of productive agricultural land is a factor. However, in previous generations it would have been normal for land to be left fallow for perhaps one year in four: these fields have probably been continuously cropped since those days, using artificial fertiliser and pesticides, at substantial cost to the soil structure. So, it's really more a matter of land management, using land and crops according to different priorities. And look at the crops now around us, a whole lot of oilseed rape and maize: these are much used for vehicle fuels, as is some of the wheat. Fertilising, growing and harvesting crops to convert for diesel, or fermenting alcohol to add to petrol, is dreadfully wasteful of agricultural land. Converting the sunlight falling on a given area straight to electricity is well over twenty times as efficient. Fertiliser production is highly energy consuming, it makes no sense to use it ultimately for road fuels, wasting so much of it when it could be used for food-crops. Another dimension currently very relevant is the security of supply aspect - that's our sunshine, sunshine.

The question of scale is primarily a logistical thing: double the span of a field and you quadruple the area, and all the incidental gear needed is not that much greater. It's the way to get

results, something that is now of the essence. There's been the tendency to point out that well, we've changed the lightbulbs, so that's environmental done then. But no, we've hardly started: much quoted is the increase in the amount of renewable electricity in the UK, though in fact generation is still mostly fossil-gas fuelled. And our overall energy demand is still dominated by transport energy, which is yet around 96% oil-powered. Get out of that: when electric cars take over, where does all the extra juice come from? It's all been left so late that new nuclear power, tree planting, tidal power and the like are pretty much out of the race: they are absolutely essential, but they're not a quick enough answer. Overall, carbon emissions need to be halved inside the next ten years. Kicking the can down the road is worse than useless.

Last year global carbon emissions increased 5.5%. The consequences of exceeding the proposed 1.5 °C global warming figure are dire, but they are still avoidable. Fires, floods, crop failure, refugee crises, water-source wars are directly linked. It's no longer just an imminent threat, it's here. The safe level of worldwide CO2 is 350ppm. As I write, the figure is 420.99 ppm and it really doesn't care whether I can see the Frith or not.

### WHY IS MY CONVEYANCING TRANSACTION TAKING SO LONG?

It is a common grumble that conveyancing takes longer than expected. Buyers are keen to own their new properties as soon as possible but the average transaction takes around 12 weeks from offer to completion. Several factors can contribute to delays:

### Identification

Conveyancers are required by law to verify the identity of clients and the source of their funds. Ensure you have ID documents and proof of deposit readily available at the very start of the transaction.

### Lost Documents

If have carried out work to a property you are selling, get planning and building regulation paperwork together. Check you have your Final Certificates. A surprising number of sellers do not request the building inspector for a final inspection so do not receive their Completion Certificates.

### Lost Title Deeds

Although most properties are now registered with the Land Registry some unregistered land remains, particularly where the property has remained in the same family for many l

years. If you have original deeds, please keep these safe.

### **Missing Rights**

When viewing a property make a point of checking for private access roads and shared driveways, private or shared services such as drainage, and other unusual features.

#### Service Information Packs

Properties that are leasehold or have an estate service charge require these, and they can take anything between 2 to 8 weeks to be returned by management companies. If your property is subject to a service charge, let your conveyancer know early.

### Missing Landlords and Defective Leases

If your property is leasehold or subject to ground rent, ensure you have your latest ground rent receipt or freeholder contact details available.

#### **Finance Problems**

Speak to your bank or financial adviser before making an offer. If you are funding your purchase from savings, check how long it takes to release the funds - a Life Time ISA can take up to 3 weeks to be released. If you are receiving a gifted deposit, you need to provide information on the source of the funds to your conveyancer and mortgage lender, so submit your paperwork early.


#### Search Delays

Most local authorities can return an Official Local Search within two weeks, but some require longer as not all records are readily available. Further searches may be required in particular circumstances like former mining areas or relative to the particular property such as a Highways Search where there are access issues.

Whilst delays can be frustrating, there may be factors outside of your conveyancer's control. It is important that the documentation is correct and complies with legislation to avoid future problems, so you need to be flexible with target dates and review these regularly as the transaction proceeds.








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
