Sherbornes with Pamber

As I write this, Boris Johnson has apologised for attending a party in the garden of 10 Downing Street in May 2020 during the first lockdown, stating that he believed it was a work event and that it didn't break any rules his own government had put in place. There is currently an inquiry underway. As some of you reading this will be only too painfully aware, over the past two years I have taken a number of funerals in which the bereaved wanted a service in church and would have anticipated a large number of guests, but in the end had to have a graveside service or a small service at the crematorium without any singing. That is just one example of the restrictions under which we had to live. There has therefore been considerable anger directed towards Boris Johnson. Who knows whether, by the time this lands on your doormat, he will still be the Prime Minister? The contrast with

the example of the Queen, the 70th anniversary of whose accession to the throne falls on 6th February, couldn't be clearer. Who can forget the images of Her Majesty sitting alone in a pew at the funeral of Prince Philip last year? My intention is not to engage in party politics here, but rather to highlight our desire for leaders with integrity.

The problem of leaders creating rules which are burdensome to others but which they fail to keep themselves is nothing new and it is something about which Jesus cares deeply. In Matthew 23.2-4, Jesus says: "The teachers of the law and the Pharisees sit in Moses' seat. So you must obey them and do everything they tell you. But do not do what they do, for they do not practise what they preach. They tie up heavy loads and put them on men's shoulders, but they themselves are not willing to lift a finger to move them." Jesus himself is the perfect example of a leader with integrity. Jesus taught, "Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who ill-treat you (Luke 6.27-28). This is

precisely what we see Jesus doing even as he is being crucified. Luke 23.34: 'Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." Jesus also taught his followers: "You know that those who are regarded as rulers of the Gentiles [non-Jewish people] lord it over them, and their high officials exercise authority over them. Not so with you. Instead, whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wants to be first must be slave of all" (Mark 10.42-44). Jesus practised what he preached. He continues: "For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many" (Mark 10.45). The gospel accounts of Jesus' life culminate in his death on the cross to pay the price for all who trust in him for their failure to love God with all their heart, soul, mind and strength, and their neighbour as themselves.

Furthermore, we owe the anger we feel when leaders impose rules which they fail to keep themselves to the fact that our society has been shaped for the best part of two thousand years by the message of Jesus. We know that leaders should be different. Come along to one of our services or get in touch to find out more about Jesus who is the one leader with integrity worth following.

PARISH COUNCIL

I hope you all had an excellent break over the holidays and on behalf of the parish council I'd like to wish you all a very happy new year. Here's hoping 2022 is the year we shake off the last remnants of 'the virus' and look to what the future brings.

Planning

As the chairman so rightly pointed out in his previous article, this is always a contentious issue. The new Local Plan was discussed in detail at the parish council meeting on the 15th December and it was encouraging to see so many parishioners attend.

We are very lucky to have Cllr James Rowley as part of the team, having worked for most of his working life in planning, in councils throughout the South of England. Cllr Rowley will be leading the work that the parish council undertakes to ensure we are in the best shape possible when BDBC look to firm up their preferences.

Chute Recreation Ground

The parish council have put in a lot of hard work over the last year with the aim of improving the play facilities for older children. We can almost see the light at the end of the tunnel, we are in the final stages of the Rural Development Programme for England (LEADER) funding application and, fingers crossed, we will have a successful decision made by the end of January 2022 that allows us to hopefully have shovels in the ground by this summer.

Chute Pavilion

The parish council are in the process of getting internet installed in the Chute. Whilst the Chute bookings are healthy, installation of the internet can only be a good thing, hopefully through the provision of a good, strong internet provision we can look to widen the services and business that we could hope to attract.

Platinum Jubilee June 2022

It's now only 6 months away. Both Thursday, 2nd June and Friday, 3rd June are official Bank Holidays. The parish council will have a detailed forecast of events produced soon, after the events of last year it'll be good to all get together for a beer / lemonade / bbq on the village green.

Tree-bilee

In parallel to the actual Jubilee celebrations, the PC are arranging to commemorate this occasion, hopefully led by the Rev. Newman.

Community Fibre

The parish council are in dialogue with Hampshire County Council to try to dig us out of what appears to be a case of the village slipping between the cracks when it comes to the rollout of ultrafast broadband (for those technical types, Fibre to the Property [FTTP]). In a nutshell, FTTP would enable homes and businesses in the village to potentially realise internet speeds of up to 1 Gbps.

Unfortunately, in what appears to be a case of departmental oversight, the format for assessing whether a property was liable for FTTP grant funding had lumped in all properties in the postcode sector of RG24 9. This meant that the village itself was being counted with the new developments over in Popley Fields and we didn't come above the line when it came to determining actual needs against current provision.

The good news is that the Department of Culture, Media and Sport have

acknowledged that 'postcode sectors' produce these anomalies, the bad news is that Hampshire County Council underestimated the impact on the county and there isn't enough money to do all 'anomalies'.

This is where we're hoping you can help. If you want faster internet, please e-mail broadband@hants.gov. uk explaining that you're aware of the parish council's efforts in trying to tackle the lack of ultra-fast broadband within the village. Any supporting usecases / evidence / passion you can bring to bear will only help bring attention to our plight to the people that control the allocation of budget.

The Shop

Always good to see the number of folk, both parishioners and non-parishioners using the Shop.

An additional notice board has been installed at the side of the shop (facing Cranes Road). At the moment, being quite small, it only contains the footpath map for the local area, but we would like your feedback on whether you would rather see village notices, etc or are you happy with just the map on display.

The PC are working with the shop owner in order to facilitate external cold 'warehouse' storage for the shop that will facilitate inventory management simpler.

General

Until any further guidance is provided by the government, the PC will still be meeting on the last Wednesday at the Chute Pavilion each month. The meeting start time is 7.30. COVID safe arrangements are in place, we ask that masks are worn unless exempt and hand sanitiser is provided for use when entering the chute.

It would be good to see more parishioners at these meetings.

Gentle reminder - the meeting agenda is published 7 days before the meeting so any specific item you want the PC to discuss in the meeting needs to be with the Clerk prior to the 7-day cut-off.

Monk Sherborne Parish Council

Whilst 2021 was challenging, it was also memorable in that the new village hall was completed and opened in December. The Village Hall committee deserve all our thanks for a fantastic job well done.

2022 is going to be very exciting with the Queen's Platinum Jubilee in June. The Parish Council are going to purchase two small ornamental trees to be planted in the playground area to mark the occasion.

Flagpole, Flags and village signs - A new flagpole has been purchased, to be sited next to the new village hall and also a Winchester flag (for Hampshire) to go with the existing two flags. Thanks to John McSoley, who has agreed to be the Flagmaster for another year. The village signs have been cleaned and Cllr. Paul Cave repainted the fingerpost and refurbished the plaque behind the post, commemorating the Queen's last Jubilee. Our thanks to Paul for undertaking these vital jobs within the parish.

Playground - Now that the village hall construction has finished, the council is looking to refresh the playground. The mound on which stood the slide has been removed and the slide removed. The survey that we ran last year gave

some good guidance on what residents feel they want from the playground. It has to be remembered that this space is used by the village for events and so layout has to be considered carefullymore on this in future.

Flytipping - There had been a number of fly tipping incidents within the parish. Residents are reminded to report via the online reporting system if spotted (https://www.basingstoke.gov. uk/flytipping.)

Residents are reminded of the importance of reporting anything suspicious within the parish via the 101 local police number.

Planning - There are 6 planning applications currently awaiting decisions from Basingstoke and Deane and can be viewed online on the Basingstoke and Deane Planning applications website. The Parish Council have been made aware of a potential application for a solar farm on land up past All Saints Church and next to Weybrook Golf Course. A screening assessment has been submitted to BDBC Planning and we are advised that the applicants wish to hold a public meeting within the parish where parishioners can obtain further details and ask questions. We

will advise you of the dates as soon as we are advised.



The new Monk Sherborne Village Hall finally opened on 16th December 2021. It has all the up-to-date facilities you would expect including a wellequipped kitchen, high-speed wifi, Sonos sound system and projector & screen - with a lovely view onto the playing field. It is proving to be very popular already, with regular sessions such as Yoga, Pilates and Upholstery as well as for children's parties and other private functions. 

Local news centres on proposed planning developments at Cottage Farm, New Road, Pamber Green, 21/03789/ GPDADW. There are two current applications for 9 dwellings and 5 dwellings respectively and both require separate submissions to be sent in from interested parties. Comments can be made on the Basingstoke & Deane planning portal or in writing to the Planning Department, Council Offices; Pamber Parish Council lodged an objection to a proposal for 3 dwellings at Rosebank, Aldermaston Road, Pamber End; a future public meeting will be held in respect of the proposed solar farm in Little London. It is hoped there will be events organised to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. Pamber Forest

Advisory Committee met in November for the first time in two years with 2021 highlights including red kites nesting in the forest and raising chicks, otters in Inhams Copse, nightjars setting up their territories; butterfly and moth species seeming to be occurring further north than before presumably due to climate change; Ash dieback is present but not too prevalent at the moment; volunteers are working whenever possible within covid guidelines.

Other local news - I understand work on the new Tadley LIDL Supermarket should begin in early 2022. Reports have been received yet again of men selling door to door with items from Lakeland and Wilko claiming to be on work release from prison. Thefts from sheds and garages and of dogs are again taking place. Take care, keep premises locked and possessions secure.

Hampshire County Council – Calleva Division

1. Roads update

Highway operations are continuing as normal during the Plan B restrictions.

Statistics have been published by Hampshire Highways for last November. In that month 406 emergencies were attended, 21,173 square metres of carriageway were resurfaced, 18,436 gullies and other drainage were cleared and 7,295 potholes were fixed. In addition, they also coped with Storms Arwen and Barra, keeping the roads clear of fallen trees and other vegetation, debris and excess water.

General road problems should be reported online at http://www.hants. gov.uk/transport/roadmaintenance/roadproblems. Emergency issues on the highway can be reported outside of office hours by calling 101. In any emergency where there is a danger to life, call 999.

Going forward, Hampshire County Council has agreed to put extra "recurring" funding into highway maintenance, equating to about £7 million per year, from April this year.

2. Severe weather

At the time of writing, we have had some very cold weather and so road gritting is high on the agenda at the moment. When we do have freezing temperatures forecast, the Hampshire Highways' fleet of salting lorries head out, focusing on the main roads first. If you're driving behind a gritter please keep well back and be patient - as they do their job to help keep you on the move. You can see the priority salting routes at https://maps.hants.gov.uk/

highwayssaltroutes/. For the young at heart, all our gritters have names (derived from a children's competition) such as Snowbi-wan Kenobe, Gritty Gritty Bang Bang, the Blizzard of Oz, Gritter Garbo and so on.

Many of our roads and lanes are not on the priority routes but you will be aware of the blue grit bins provided by HCC across the area. These are filled with salt for community use throughout winter. They're particularly useful for smaller roads or on the pavements. A small amount of salt from these can make a big impact on frozen and icy surfaces. One tablespoon of salt (20 grams) is sufficient to treat one square metre of road or pavement surface.

If you spot grit bins that are empty or running low, do contact Hampshire County Council for replenishing. This can be done either online at https://www.hants.gov.uk/transport/roadmaintenance or by emailing roads@hants.gov.uk. Parishes are in any event advised to check these.

3. Support for vulnerable households

Hampshire County Council has received £7.124m from the Government's Household Support Fund to support households in need with food, energy and water bills, as well as wider essential costs and housing costs. The county proposes to deploy this funding (which must be spent by 31 March 2022) through its "connect4communities" programme.

The programme includes support for free school meals in holidays and half terms, support with utility bills, community pantries giving access to discounted food and community grants, which could be used for example to assist unpaid carers.

Details can be found at connect4communities.org where it is possible to apply for community grants, and at HCC's online directory (connect4communities | Family Information and Services Hub (hants. gov.uk) which will also be a useful resource for families and individuals in need of food and fuel support.

4. New Year resolutions

A new 12-week weight management programme has been funded by Hampshire County Council for residents who want to achieve a healthier weight. Offering free professional support either in-person, through regular online meetings or via a mobile app, Shapeup4life Hampshire is available to anyone with a body mass index (BMI) of 30 or above and combines exercise and food choices to make positive lifestyle changes rather than a prescriptive diet. News from the NHH Hospitals Trust

A lot has changed since I last wrote but the biggest news effecting our local hospitals is undoubtedly the governments COVID booster vaccination drive. On being 'stood up' to be directly involved, the Trust in 72 hours – planned, staffed and opened a major vaccine hub with a capacity of approximately 950 people per day. If you are eligible but have not had a booster yet and want to book your jab please do so, it can really make a difference! This can be done either by calling 119 or online: Book or manage a coronavirus (COVID-19) vaccination - NHS (www.nhs.uk)

The other big national news story is that of the overall pressure the NHS is under; including ambulances having to wait outside emergency departments for extended periods. It is reassuring to know that Hampshire Hospitals have coped comparatively well, though of course there have been exceptions and work is ongoing to further minimise it.

As always, the big issue is having free beds for those that need them, at present roughly 40 to 50 beds are occupied by people suffering from Covid. Yet again it re-enforces the wisdom of taking up vaccinations as and when offered. At present the level of flu patients has not yet risen as expected, however the hospital is likely to need to open up two additional wards for COVID patients in January, adding to the pressure on other services. If the pattern from London is followed it is also likely that an increased number of NHS staff will need to self-isolate.

In a piece of good news, our urgent and emergency care team were recently reviewed by the CQC and were rated very positively for quality of care, safety, and commitment to continually improve. To achieve this in spite of record demand and rising COVID is testament to the incredible hard work they put in, day in and day out.

Catching up with the backlog to elective procedures, in spite of massive efforts, remains an ongoing challenge. Overall the Trust is making progress, even accepting patients from other Trusts to help them with their longest waiting times. Sadly,

the level of cancer referrals has risen significantly on pre covid levels, including an increase in cases where the disease has significantly advanced. Despite the increase in referrals the hospital is meeting most of its national target times for treatment of cancer patients.

Finally a few snippets. Anyone who has recently visited the hospital will have noticed the rapid progress in the construction of the new Cath Lab alongside the Sherborne Building. The new consultation document on data protection indicated this area is currently surrounded with too much red tape, so watch this space. The unions are very supportive of the staff vaccination programme. The plans for the new hospital are progressing behind the scenes, providing input to the national infrastructure plan. The Trust's recent meetings with local councils working towards a common strategy have been very encouraging.

North Hampshire Prostate Cancer Support Group News

Wow, what an address we had when Jaana Jeffery the Macmillan Supportive Care Lead attached to the hospital came and spoke to us at our recent monthly meeting. She explained she was not going to do any formal presentation, but the time she spent with us was no less impactful. She started by identifying her own background as a dietician, with her role within the hospital being to provide supportive care to cancer patients.

Having recently carried out an extensive survey of patients, she found that the key need patients identified was psychological and emotional support, this being listed as the most important by 90% of respondents with more guidance on treatment options as the next most important need. This information created a lively discussion as many feel the NHS, with its high focus on metrics for everything, is rapidly loosing sight of the fact that it is a 'SERVICE' so should not be considered as primarily for the benefit of those who work within it,

rather and most importantly all need to recognise that patients are people, not just numbers to be processed! It was encouraging to members of the group to know that our key aims of providing emotional and psychological care for our members, as well as insights into different forms of treatment from a patients view point, align so strongly with Jaana's survey results.

Jaana went on to outline how supportive care as provided by Macmillan extends the whole pathway, from the GP onwards, and is there to help in a variety of ways, such as life style and diet, financial aspects, employment as well as occupational therapy, relationships, and very importantly symptoms' management. Whilst it may not be immediately obvious for a dietician to be involved, she highlighted for how example changes in diet can be of real help following radiation treatment.

Started over 100 years ago, the charity Macmillan Cancer Support is one of the biggest UK charities, and as Jaana explained, in addition to the roles previously outlined it also plays an active role in advising Government, funding local issues and also supporting special projects. For example it helped the Breast Care and Mastectomy Association of Great Britain, which would later become Breast Cancer Care . With prostate cancer now the most prevalent form of cancer in the UK, could we perhaps see the charity becoming more involved in this field in the future?

With such a lively session, members were delighted that Jaana has offered to come again sometime in the New Year – we clearly have another treat in store!

Royal British Legion Bramley and District Branch



We have all heard stories of people leaving a small fortune to their pets but is this possible and what about our furry friends themselves?

Whilst it is important to make provision about what should happen to your pet after you die, making a specific gift of money in your Will to your pet would result in a failed gift.

Claire-Marie Selwood, a solicitor in the Private Client Team at Phillips Solicitors,

Don't forget your pet when making your Will



explains why: "The Law treats pets as personal possessions so you cannot leave a legacy in your Will to your beloved pet. After all, pets don't have bank accounts!

It is quite common for pet owners to pass away and not leave their pet with a home to go to but there are steps you can take to ensure your pet is looked after.

It would be unwise to assume that close relatives or friends will look after your pet, without discussing it with them first. Caring for a pet is a huge commitment and you would be imposing an obligation on them to care for your pet for the rest of its life, not to mention the financial obligation.

One option to consider is if you know someone who is willing to look after your pet, you could leave that person a sum of money in your Will for this purpose.

So there is no misunderstanding about the purpose of the money, the wording in your Will must be clear, which is why we often advise our clients to write a letter of wishes to accompany their Wills. Whilst this document is not legally binding, it can be a useful guide to inform others how you would like your pet to be cared for. You should be aware that if your chosen carer later decides they can no longer care for your pet there is a risk they may still retain the legacy and spend it how they choose.

Another option to consider, particularly if you do not know anyone who could look after your pet, is to leave a bequest to a charity. You can direct whether the charity should care for the pet or find a suitable alternative home instead. Some animal charities offer after death arrangements for pets.

A final option would be to set up a trust and leave money to trustees to look after your pet. Once your pet has died, the trust would come to an end and any money left over can go to your chosen beneficiaries.

Probus Gets Behind The Scenes of Eurovision Song Contest





Over the years watching the Eurovision Song Competition you probably wondered about the voting pattern of various countries. Gordon Lewis, the speaker at the latest meeting of the Probus Club of Basingstoke, knows that your suspicions are correct. The winning song being voted on by all the countries, is influenced by politics of the day and PR pressure through parties held at the highest social level.

And Gordon Lewis knows what he is talking about because as a journalist he had attended eight Eurovision Song Competitions over the years and had seen these influences at first hand.

Song festivals had long existed in Europe – for example the Sound of Music film showed the situation in Austria in the late 1930s. After the conclusion of WW2, the European Broadcasting Union was set up in Switzerland to help popularise television. At their 1950 AGM, held in Torquay, it was considered that a song festival to find the best song in Europe would help relationships. Current technology prevented this idea progressing until 1953 when the BBC succeeded in broadcasting the Coronation to our neighbouring countries of the Republic of Ireland, northern France and the low countries.

Advances in technology meant that in 1956 the first Eurovision Song Competition was held in Lugano, Switzerland. Seven countries took part but was it a coincidence that the winner was the host country where the headquarters of the European Broadcast Union had been established to bring harmony to viewers?

The speaker gave many examples of how countries vote for the top award of *douze points*. Greece always supported Cyprus claiming to be because of a common language but in 1999 the free choice of language meant that many songs are sung in English. Geographical and historical connections as seen between Norway and Sweden, Russia and Azerbaijan due gas and oil. While UK and Ireland used to support each other but not so in recent years.

The dreaded *nul* points will always be the case between Serbia and Slovenia because the latter country was the first to break away from the old Yugoslavia which led to the Balkan disaster. Armenia will not support Azerbaijan because of a border dispute and France does not support UK perhaps because of the Hundred Years' War. 2003 saw UK receiving nul points because of anger in EU that Britain had entered the Iraq war. Georgia will not vote for Russia because of their invasion and eventual withdrawal but was disqualified from the 2009 competition because their song was about shooting President Putin of Russia.

Direct political influence happened when General Franco needed to boost the tourist trade to Spanish beaches and enlisted the assistance of President Tito of Yugoslavia. Cliff Richard singing *Congratulations* was the clear favourite but was beaten by one point by Spain's entry *La La La* that contained 120 repeats of the title. There is little merit in the winning song, which was instantly forgettable, but political ends were met.

Circumstances can also influence the result. In 1974 France backed out because it was the funeral of President Pompidou. The Italian entry had been expected to win but those countries expected to support the French entry then had to vote for another song and the unlikely winners from Sweden was a group named ABBA with the song *Waterloo*. The rest, as they say, is history.

Such political influence goes back a long way to 1959 when Pearl Carr and Teddy Johnson sang the UK entry *Sing Little Birdie Sing*. Teddy was at a bar when he overheard Italy and the Netherlands agreeing not to vote for the UK entry. This, you will recall, was a song contest with the aim of bringing countries together.

UK last won in 1997 with the song *Love Shine A Light* by Katrina and the Waves. While the backing group, the Waves were British, Katrina is American. She came to live in England as a child when her father was stationed here in the US Airforce.

In recent years some non-European countries have been allowed to participate. Israel and Australia are examples. This is because they are full members of the European Broadcasting Union which allows their entry. New Zealand are upset because their associate membership fails to permit their entry which means they lose the ability to promote their country to the watching millions.

In 2022 the competition will be hosted in the Italian city of Turin. No doubt the same influencing and politicking will continue unabated - after all the Eurovision Song Competition would not be the same without it.


