Letter to the Editor

There was a horror film on Channel 41 late on Sunday 18th February "The Black Torment". Older villagers who were in the Parish in 1963 will remember it. I was in my first year of secondary school. Mr Pound was head master at Sherborne St John Primary School. My younger brother was in Mrs Watmore's class there.

The film was made mostly at the Vyne House, also in the gardens and in Morgaston Woods, and a short scene at St. Andrew's Church. It wasn't a very good film – with no-one especially famous in it. The leading lady was Heather Sears (she died in 1994). It was filmed in late autumn – no leaves on the trees.

It was first shown on TV in the late 1960s – although I remember it differently to how it was shown on Sunday night! One can see how film makers change things - the Fordyke family appeared to walk from St Andrew's then seconds later walk through the gate of the Vyne to the house as if the church was closer. Their horses seemed to be stabled in what are now the nursery gardens. The chase on horses through Morgaston Woods was speeded up - horses can't run that fast, especially among the woodland tracks. That was before the 1987 hurricane when there were hundreds more trees in the woods. I don't suppose many villagers ventured into Morgaston Woods before the general public were allowed to roam around them, as it was still private land back then. Being a villager since the early 1950s there wasn't much of the Parish we kids hadn't explored (much to the annoyance of farmers and gamekeepers - but most of us did no harm!)

Of course The Vyne has changed a lot since 1963. The bridge over the lake

collapsed during the 1987 hurricane – not during the war as some think. I can remember walking over that bridge in the 1970s

Very few of the people now in Sherborne St John were here in the 1960s – I'll be 72 this year. I wonder where my classmates from the Primary School are now...... Raymond Ayres lived in one of the cottages opposite Gales Garage. Graham Butler lived at 4a Spring Close. He became a Royal Marine and played trumpet in the Royal Marines band. Last time I saw Graham we were 15 years old. Richard Stroud became a policeman and then a care home manager. His father was the gardener at Cleeves for Mr Hill-Wood and the Arsenal Football team used to come to play charity matches at the Chute Recreation Ground against our village team.

There were others in the class at school – Gillian Wiggins, Susan Moate, Wendy Seyfried, Heather Monger and Philip Loader (who moved to Baughurst). Stephen Mears used to live at the Swan pub – they moved to Wych Lane Farm and both Stephen and Phil Mears went into heavy haulage. Phil's lorry can still be seen locally carrying bulldozers and military vehicles.

I remember once at Secondary school asking our geography teacher Mr Upton why did we need to learn about Malaysia – as none of us would ever go there? Air travel was not common in the 60s. Sadly Mr Upton emigrated to Canada and died young. I wish I could have told him that in 1982 I went to Malaysia and Indonesia – who'd have thought it in the 60s!

Improved Paths



Keep a note of your readings and share them with the practice so they can be put on your record..



Comings and Goings

For reasons best known to himself, Dan Faulkner, the new Parish Clerk decided that the role was not for him.

I'm very pleased that our Locum Clerk, Mel, is back in the role, albeit as a Locum, and will remain so until we can find a replacement Clerk.

Adverts have been placed in the relevant journals and on the relevant web sites.

Parish Office

With Dan stepping down our plan to open up a Parish Office is on hold.

However there is a new SSJ Post Box at the Village Hall entrance, to the right of the Village Hall post box.

All Parish Council post will be directed to that post box.

If parishioners want to communicate with the Parish Council via hard copy, then please use the post box.

Speedwatch

We are in constant communication with Hants CC and the local police as to what can be done to reduce the current issues re: speeding vehicles impacting the village, both through and around.

We have had a couple of visits by one of the three Hants Police speed vans but they always seem to park in the wrong location despite being given specific locations as to where best to park, outside Armstrongs, near the 30 mph limit going north and near Cleeves going towards Basingstoke.

By the time this article is published, Paul Freeman, the Safer Roads Unit Team Lead, will have presented to the PC what he thinks are the best options might be for SSJ.

One option is to make the speed limit through the village 20 mph but as this will be at Parish Council's expense and is not enforceable then there seems little point doing so.

Potholes

What to say? - the number and severity of potholes and the general state of the roads in and around the village have gone from bad to worse.

HCC are facing a budget shortfall of £132million by April 2025 so HCC are looking how to trim their spending. My guess is fixing potholes, etc. will not be at the top of any revised 'shopping list'.

Planning

Cranesfield, 26 houses - Rydon have appealed the BDBC decision to reject this application. The appeal hearing has been postponed - watch the SSJ webs sites for a new date.

We've yet to receive any date re: further decisions/next steps for the planned developments at Weybrook Golf Club (200 houses) and the additional houses at Kiln Farm (350 houses).

SSJ Neighbourhood Plan

The revised SSJ Neighbourhood Plan has been submitted to BDBC and has been reviewed by BDBC and the other mandatory consultees e.g. adjoining councils and the National Trust, etc.

I am pleased to say that there have been no major issues with the plan, except of course by developers who want to development the strategic gap between SSJ and Basingstoke.

The delay to the current planning appeals work in our favour. The longer they are delayed the further the Neighbourhood Plan progresses. It's important to note that the allocation of new houses to SSJ from BDBC as part of the new BDBC Local Plan is zero so if we can get the Neighbourhood Plan put to bed before these appeals are heard then the zero allocation would help us fight any appeal

Council Meetings

We have decided to reduce Parish Council meetings from monthly meetings to once every two months.

The minimum legal requirement is 4 meetings a year.

We are putting in place processes that will allow to us to legally conduct council business via e-mail

If however there are circumstances where we need to meet an extraordinary meeting will be convened and parishioners informed






Some advice on what to do with books we cannot take. If a book is tatty, put it in your black dustbin (not in the green recycling bin).

Free Garden Surveys To Help Wildlife Flourish



People across the borough are being encouraged to help their gardens to nurture wildlife and cut carbon with top tips and advice from Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council.

Residents can now book a free plant and wildlife garden survey with the council's Green Team, which launched last summer to help people adopt more sustainable lifestyles in support of the council's climate and ecological emergency declarations.

Undertaken by its sustainability specialists, the team's surveys involve looking at the number, type and variety of plants present, for easy sources of food and water for insects and animals and if there are safe places for wildlife to live and hibernate.

Once the hour-long survey is complete, the findings are then used to help create a guide with actions and ideas for how people can support and enhance nature by encouraging native plants and wildlife in their gardens.

This could include providing seeds and water for birds, letting areas bloom with bee-friendly flowers, planting shrubs and putting hedgehog highways in fences so wildlife can move freely between neighbours' gardens, then into local parks and beyond.


Cabinet Member for the Climate and Ecological Emergency Cllr Chris Tomblin said: "We are lucky that animals like the Dartford warbler and great crested newt and insects like the white-letter hairstreak butterfly currently call our borough home, though climate change and habitat loss are increasing threats to these and other species.


"But your garden doesn't need to be a fully-fledged nature reserve to be a safe and attractive place that helps our native wildlife to thrive and plants to grow.

"Whether you're willing to dedicate just a corner of your garden or you're happy to let it all go wild, I encourage you to book your free survey for tips and ideas how you can nurture a garden that encourages wildlife and captures carbon to help tackle climate change too."

With the unanimous support of its councillors, the council declared a climate emergency for the borough in 2019 and an ecological emergency in 2021.

The Royal British Legion

"When you go home,
Tell them of us and say,
For your tomorrow we gave our today"

These familiar words, known as the Kohima Epitaph, are inscribed on the memorial of the 2nd British Division at Kohima in north-east India where one of the greatest battles of WW2 was fought from 4th April to 22nd June 1944. It was the turning point of the Japanese advance into India and claimed the lives of 18,857 British and Indian army lives and 53,000 Japanese; moreover, it showed that the Japanese army could be beaten and gave a boost to allied troops.

The inscription can be found on many War Memorials in Britain, the Commonwealth and the US. Although

specific to the Battle of Kohima, it is now used as a way of remembering all who died in both world wars and other conflicts as a reminder of the great price that has been paid for such peace and freedom as we enjoy today. The words are a central part of our Remembrance services and are also recited at the end of all our RBL meetings.

Free solar panels to help power local organisations





Local businesses, community organisations and groups could save hundreds of pounds a year on their energy bills and cut local carbon emissions by having community-owned solar panels installed on the roofs of their buildings for free.

Following Solar Appreciation Day yesterday (Monday 11 March), Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council is shining a light on three community energy societies powering forward plans to increase the amount of renewable energy generated in the borough.

Using a £17,000 grant awarded by the council last autumn in support of its climate emergency declaration, Calleva Community Energy, Test Source Community Energy and Loddon Community Energy are working together to develop and launch new rooftop solar panel projects generating zero-emission electricity.

Entirely run by local people, the three not-for-profit organisations buy solar panels and offer to install and maintain them on the roofs of suitable non-domestic buildings, such as offices, industrial units and community centres, at no charge to their owners.

The renewable electricity generated by the community-owned solar panels is sold at an agreed rate to the organisations using the building. The community energy society that funded the panels receives an income and any surplus is reinvested into schemes such as further solar panel projects and energy-saving advice for local people.

Cabinet Member for the Climate and Ecological Emergency Cllr Chris Tomblin said: "If you own or work from an office, warehouse or community building, you could save money on your energy bills and help tackle climate change by letting one of our community energy societies install solar panels for free on your roof.

"The electricity you'd buy from these not-for-profit organisations is likely to be cheaper than your current tariff and, in buying locally generated energy, you'll also be more protected from sudden price increases caused by international events and market fluctuations."

Calleva Community Energy currently owns and operates 18 rooftop solar panel projects. This includes a scheme at Calleva Park in Aldermaston that has generated over 2,800 megawatt hours of zero-emission electricity over the last decade, which is estimated to be enough to power over 100 homes every year.

Test Source Community Energy is currently working on plans to crowd fund a solar panel project in Overton that could generate over 64 megawatt hours of renewable electricity each year, estimated to be enough to power 23 homes.

And Loddon Community Energy has recently established Greener Homes Bramley, a successful network of local champions helping people save money on energy at home with free advice including on habit changes, insulation and solar panels.

The council declared a climate emergency for the borough in 2019, which included setting an ambitious target to work with communities and businesses towards achieving a net zero carbon borough by December 2030.

To encourage the owners of largescale buildings, such as offices and warehouses, to have solar panels installed, last year the council commissioned a borough-wide study to determine roofs that could be suitable for panels and the power they could generate.

The council is providing free reports with the results for each building to those who own or rent these properties along with information about funding options, including grants, that could help to pay for solar panels.



Members were held spellbound at our March meeting, listening to the speaker, Sarah Roberts, telling us of how after her mother's death, she discovered a box of notebooks and diaries all hand-written. Fast forward another 17 years later during Covid, when Sarah decided to start reading one notebook entitled "That Summer"; she read it at one sitting.

The tale briefly told of her mother's life (aged 7 in 1941) in war torn Portsmouth, and how she and her parents and siblings - a family of seven - were evacuated to Hungerford "just for six months" (so they just took only the bare essentials of clothing and necessities). They were initially billeted along with other families at

Church House. During this time Mother "Hilda" continued to pay rent on their council house in Portsmouth, for six months because the "war wouldn't last for long", but when they were offered family accommodation with no sharing at "Inglewood Cottage" in Kintbury, the decision was made to give up their Pompey home which was quite a wrench, but money was tight. Grandad "Fred" had been invalided out of work at Portsmouth Dockyard with asthma and was unemployable, so they had to make do and mend, and grow as much of their own produce as they could.


Inglewood Cottage was clean, freshly whitewashed and spacious, with only the barest of necessities, none of which would be considered "mod cons" nowadays. No bathroom, a well in the scullery floor, a big black cooker range and a loo at the bottom of the large garden. This was a playground haven for the three children who attended school. A large apple tree played a prominent part in food and incomegenerating, plus some gardening for veggies by Grandad, plus lilac trees, syringa and laburnum. Best of all, they now had their own furniture, and the bonus of no air raid sirens, no Andersen air raid shelter, no bombs and no bombed-out ruins.

So Sarah's story continued and those of us who could remember were transported back to the "good old days" of the innocence of childhood freedom in the countryside, making up games and amusing oneself.

So there the family stayed for eleven years with the older sister working at the local flower mill. "Grandad Fred" whose health had somewhat improved, worked in the office of a small factory, and the only son of the family, Ken, eventually went off as a Bevan Boy to work in the coal mines in Wales. Finally they returned to Portsmouth.

The chapter which really "tickled me" was the list of shops in Kintbury during the 40s and early 50s:- 5 food shops, 2 butchers, 1 fish shop, a barber, a coal merchant with hardware, a newsagent, an "outfitter" which sold shoes, a baker, 7 (yes SEVEN) pubs, 3 sweet shops, a school, a church, a doctor's surgery and a post office as well as regular and frequent services into Newbury on either the bus or the train.


