# Sherbornes with Pamber

Earlier this year there were warnings in the news that Christmas could be cancelled due to a combination of the ongoing effects of COVID-19 and Brexit. Turkeys were reported to be in short supply. The possibility of toy shortages was raised as a result of a combination of longer shipping times, congestion in ports and a lack of lorry drivers. Avid readers were alarmed to hear of paper shortages threatening the availability of books.

Some of our treasured traditions don't go back particularly far. Turkeys were first brought to Britain in the 1520s and the earliest written record of turkeys is attributed to Archbishop Thomas Cranmer. He wanted to stop gluttony amongst the clergy so only allowed one bird to be served per dish. Turkeys were big enough to provide more meat so clergy didn't need more than one bird. Henry VIII is reported

to have been the first monarch to have turkey for Christmas, and the former royal chef has revealed that the Queen enjoys turkey for Christmas today. Turkeys remained quite expensive for the next couple of centuries, and in the north, people might buy beef if they could afford it, or in the south. However, turkey became more popular at Christmas through the Victorian era. You might recall that in A Christmas Carol, a reformed Ebenezer Scrooge sends Bob Cratchit a large turkey. At the beginning of the nineteenth century, Christmas was hardly celebrated. Many businesses didn't consider it to be a holiday—remember Scrooge before his encounters with the ghosts of Christmas past, present and future. Gift-giving had traditionally been a New Year activity. Prince Albert popularised the idea of the Christmas tree from Germany, and other traditions that emerged during the Victorian era include the Christmas card and Christmas cracker.

Even if we end up not being able to keep our Victorian Christmas, the reason for Christmas still remains. Jesus Christ was born over 2,000 years ago. If that hadn't happened, we wouldn't have a holiday to be anxious about. He who was one with God the Father in eternity, through whom and for whom everything was made, became flesh and lived among us. He came as the king God promised who would bring blessing to the world. He came as a doctor for the spiritually sick. He came to seek out those who have wandered from God. He came into the world to save those who had rebelled against God, ultimately by going to his death on the cross. He came to give us life in all its fullness.

At the time of Jesus' birth, it is easy to imagine that empty shelves would have been a familiar sight because so many people had gone there to register for the census. When Jesus was born, Mary and Joseph had to lay him in a manger. His birth was celebrated by shepherds in a field. We do not need our Victorian traditions to celebrate Christmas. However we are able to celebrate it this year, let's remember the reason for Christmas. To help you do that, you are warmly invited to our Christmas services. Christmas hasn't been cancelled.



# SHERBORNE ST. JOHN

#### PARISH COUNCIL



BDBC are in the process of updating the Local Plan which determines the number of dwellings to be developed from 2024 - this will also mean an update to the current SSJ Neighbourhood Plan.

This new Local Plan will impact SSJ as the village will be expected to take a development, or developments, in support of the Plan.

The schedule for the development of the plan can be found at the following site

https://www.basingstoke.gov.uk/LDS

(There is also a lot of ancillary information about the plan, site maps, etc. at the same site)

As far as the current number of possible sites then the following summarizes those sites, some are BDBC led, SSJ004, SSJ011 and RO001, the others developer submissions.

• SSJ004 - Land west of Marnel Park 300

• SSJ011 - Weybrook Golf Club 350

 RO001 - Land adjacent to Weybrook Golf Course 38

No decisions are made yet, the strategy will be firmed up by March and may be finalised after the elections in May 2022. The Council would welcome the Parish's views on these sites in shaping the next stages.

There are x 6 other sites that have been put forward that will impact Sherborne St John

**SSJ001** Land to the north of Cranes Field Sherborne St. John

SSJ003 Vidlers Field Sherborne St. John

**SSJ005** Land at Carpenters Down Sherborne St. John

**SSJ006** Land North of Cranes field Sherborne St. John \*

SSJ007 Bob's Farm Sherborne St. John

**SSJ008** Allotments at Cranes Road Sherborne St. John

**SSJ009** Allotments at Elm Road Sherborne St. John

**SSJ010** Land adjacent to Manor Road / Elm Road Sherborne St. John

YOUR VILLAGE NEEDS YOU - It is vital that everyone in the village comments

and where necessary objects to these proposals. You have until the end of the year to object but if you can let us know your views at the parish council (include contact address) we can try to include these within our representation to the borough council that we intend to submit in December.

#### Defibrillators

We have x 2 defibrillators located in SSJ; one at the Chute and one at the Village Hall.

You don't need to be trained to use a defibrillator - anyone can use it. They are simple and easy to use and you don't need any training. There are clear instructions on how to attach the defibrillator pads. It then assesses the heart rhythm and will only instruct you to deliver a shock if it's needed. You can't deliver a shock accidentally, the defibrillator will only allow you to shock if it is needed. However...the defibrillator has to be used in conjunction with CPR. Are you confident that you would be able to administer CPR and know when to then use the defibrillator? St John Ambulance run a 2 hour training course that can be delivered at the Chute or the Village Hall If nothing else you will get to understand why the Queen song, "Another One Bites the Dust", and "Nellie the Elephant" are key to the process!







# Fabia's Story

Salve!

It's Fabia once more from the Roman villa at Manor Farm. This time I thought you might like to hear a little of life at the villa. Actually, we have quite a comfortable time here. We keep horses, cattle, pigs, sheep and goats so we have plentiful supply of draught animals, meat and milk. We supplement our meat supply with red and roe deer which our menfolk hunt in the local forests. We also keep hens and the cockerels are known for their prowess in the cock fights staged at Calleva. Like your farms in the 21st century we also have cats and dogs around the place. We tend to prefer small dogs, similar in size and shape to Jack Russell terriers that you are probably familiar with.

We grow barley, wheat, cabbage, broad beans, parsnips, carrots and peas. In order to increase the fertility of the clay soils that are found just to the north of us, chalk is dug from numerous pits in the area and spread on the land. Of course in the 3rd century all of this has to be done by hand and the chalk is transported on horse-drawn carts. Some of these pits, such as the one alongside the footpath that runs west from Rookery Farm in Monk Sherborne are still a feature of the 21st century landscape.

We are fortunate that we live in the area between the Silchester to Winchester road and the Silchester to Sorviodunum (Salisbury) road which in the 21st Century is known as the Port Way. These are important roads along which goods imported to, or manufactured on, the South coast are transported to Londinium (London). This means that all sorts of high quality household goods are available in towns such as Silchester which are at the intersection of these roads. For example, we have rather a lot of the black burnished pottery that is manufactured in Poole. We also have a decorated table top made of shale that was mined in Kimmeridge.

We do try and keep up with the latest technology. Currently, our water is drawn by hand from a well but my father has plans to install a force pump at the bottom of the well like the one he saw recently on a trip to *Calleva*. Previously I mentioned that we are renovating the North East wing of the villa and the newly installed underfloor heating or *hypocaust* is almost complete and ready to use for the first time. With winter fast approaching we are looking forward to a much cosier time this year.



# WOMEN'S FELLOWSHIP

Just as in October, a substitute speaker had to be found for the November talk, but we were fortunate to have Mrs Jill Daniels to bring us 'Through the Keyhole' and the open-ing slide featured a modest keyhole in a green door. Although she had spoken to us several times before, Jill was understandably nervous as this was her first engagement for 20 months but she gave us a wonderful tour through some five centuries of our history. The keyholes belonged to six stately homes, Woburn Abbey, Hardwick Hall, Chartwell, Shaw's Corner, Avebury Manor and Hatfield House and we were given an illustrated tour and interesting titbits about each.



Woburn Abbey in Bedfordshire, has been the home of the Russell family, Dukes of Bedford since Tudor times. An 18th century Duke paid the Venetian artist Canaletto £80 for 8 pictures. A visit by Victoria and Albert meant much redecoration and the 19th century Duchess Anna is credited with inventing afternoon tea. In the 20th century death duties forced the family to open to the public and the family gave guided tours in person.



Hardwick Hall in Derbyshire, 'more glass than wall' was the creation of Bess of Hard-wick, whose four husbands made her the second richest woman in Tudor England. Bess was a noted needlewoman and her granddaughter

Arbella Stuart had a strong claim to the English throne.



Chartwell in Kent was bought by Winston Churchill for £5,000 in 1922 as a country re-treat where he painted and learnt bricklaying as a relaxation. The cost of works to the estate eventually meant friends had to provide donations so the National Trust could take it over after his death.



The front door of <u>Shaw's Corner</u> in Hertfordshire, the home of George Bernard Shaw, proved to have the keyhole shown at the beginning of the talk. A modest Arts and Crafts house, also donated to the National Trust, Shaw lived there from 1906 to his death in 1960. He had a writing shed which could be turned to face the sun.



Avebury Manor in Wiltshire is an early 16th century manor house, another National Trust property. Unlike the other houses, Avebury had no famous inhabitants, but in 2011 the Trust decided, in conjunction with the BBC, to produce a TV series 'The Man-or Reborne' creating rooms decorated in five different styles, including a Queen Anne bedroom, a 19thC dining room and 1920s sitting room. The public could interact with the artefacts, washing up in the kitchen, or trying out the Elizabethan bed.



Hatfield House, Hertfordshire was built in 1611 by Robert Cecil, chief minister to James 1st. The Cecil family had originally lived at Theobalds a nearby estate, but the king decided he preferred it to the old Hatfield Palace, the childhood home of Eliza-beth 1st and a swap was arranged. Robert was buried in the parish church and the ornate tomb shows him in life and also in death, in the form of a skeleton. Robert em-ployed John Tradescant the plant hunter as his head gardener and there is a figure of a gardener holding a rake on a newel post of the great staircase at Hatfield House. The house also holds the Ermine portrait of Elizabeth 1st. A later Cecil, the 3rd Mar-quess of Salisbury served three times as Prime Minister during the reign of Victoria.

Jill's slides showed beautiful houses, their contents and also their beautiful gardens.

Mrs Daniels was thanked by Lynne Kerr who said that her 'test drive' talk had been a delight and had been particularly impressive for being delivered without notes.

# Notes from Rural France



A visit to Aubeterre sur Dronne.

This may look like just a large lump of white rock but its surprising contents were hidden from view for many years by a large rock fall after the French Revolution and only discovered again in the 1950's after part of the road collapsed and revealed the secret within.

Despite the Boss's sighs and ambivalent attitude his reluctant agreement to visit was met with gleeful excitement as the Mrs has a lifelong interest in old relics...... The village is one of the Plus Beaux Villages de France (most beautiful). Aubeterre is named after the white limestone (chalk) cliffs overlooking the village and is derived from the Occitan language Alba Terra meaning white earth. The river Dronne flows around the village. During the 100 year's war in 1346 the village was taken by the English and subsequently

change hands seven times between the French and the English – "yes" or "oui" their heads must have been spinning. Declining the invitation to accompany her, the Boss resigned himself to finding the nearest bar to wait for the Mrs, faintly hoping that some of the inhabitants would have picked up a bit of English from the 14th century.



The surprise inside this massive white cliff is the church of Saint Jean, the largest subterranean church in Europe, hewn from solid rock in the 7th Century and enlarged in the 12th Century by Benedictine monks. At its highest point the stone columns are 20 metres deep copying the method

of carving such buildings from top to bottom influenced by those in Cappadocia in Turkey, with a solid stone carved staircase and galleries high above to look down on the reliquary similar to the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem. It has had many lives since its first inception: - a place to conserve religious artefacts after the Crusades. It has been a necropolis with 170 tombs carved in the stone floor with heads pointing to Jerusalem, also a parish church the oldest part of which has a baptismal pool in the floor with a Greek cross carved at the bottom probably between the 4th and 9th Centuries and much later a cemetery until this was stopped for public health reasons. At some point during the French Revolution it became a Saltpetre factory supplying gunpowder to the Revolution. One wonders if an explosion during this process was the cause of the rock fall which hid this incredible secret for centuries.

By the time the Mrs eventually emerged after soaking up the ambience of past life, history and intrigue from this awesome edifice which its monolithic architecture the Boss had learnt French and was well into his second glass of wine......

The speaker this month was Bridget Britten from the Royal National Lifeboat

Institution who, with the aid of slides, videos and some amusing anecdotes, gave a history of the organisation from its inception in 1824. There had been some sort of lifeboat services in a few locations since the late 18th century but once the RNLI was formed coverage improved. In 1854 lifebelts were introduced; 1884 saw the distinctive flag designed; 1890 saw the first steam powered lifeboat and in 1905 the first motor powered one went into service. Service throughout the two world wars and the regular introduction of the most up-to-date boats and equipment along with the introduction of river and beach patrols has all meant over 100,000 lives being saved during the last nearly 200 years. In 1891 the RNLI was the first charity to have a public collection and as a voluntary organisation has to continually actively fundraise so to help Bridget brought a selection of items

The next meeting is on 1st December when we are having a "Story Tale Christmas" from Fiona Birchall along with a Christmas buffet. The first meeting of 2022 will be on 5th January when Barbara Cummins will be telling us about her "Cycling in Different Counties".

# North Hampshire Prostate Cancer Support Group

A Prostate Cancer 'Awareness' event was held in the town centre in October. Armed this time with a TV and excellent PCUK videos, the team had considerable success in putting out awareness literature, to such an extent that despite having planned ahead and with us having ordered extensive additional stocks, we nearly ran out. It was with sadness that many of us observed that although some men in the critical age band declined interest, we were encouraged that a growing number now seem to be aware of the benefits of regular 'check ups', and to catching any disease early. We also of course gained the attention of many women as well, with the implied threat to their men that the issue was not going to be left unaddressed, and they had better act or there was trouble ahead! Inevitably when attending such events, one hears some heart rending stories, perhaps the most tragic for us on the day was to hear of a 23 year old, who had developed the disease!

At our monthly gathering in October, now face to face with a growing number of attendees, we had a fascinating talk by David Cullum, a local resident who has spent his whole life working for the Met Office: his talk was titled 'The Air We Breathe'. He started by highlighting how it had all started with Vice Admiral Robert Fitzroy. For those who may not know Fitzroy had become a member of the illustrious Royal Society, and his push

for weather forecasting led to him being tasked in 1854 with collecting weather data at sea. Subsequently he become deeply concerned that sailors were going to sea without an awareness of impending dangerous weather. It was the same Fitzroy who as captain of the Beagle took Darwin on his famous voyage of discovery round South America. David even brought with him a very early hard backed book of weather readings from around 1870 for us to view.



David started by posing the question, does air weigh anything, going on to explain its weight and then the typical gases of which it is composed, and how they have been changing in recent years. For those who take an interest in the weather charts showing

isobars, David demonstrated how the mid point between high and low pressure works out at 1013 millibars. He went on to highlight the main gases in our atmosphere with the different percentages, giving the importance of the three main greenhouse gases of water vapour, CO2, and methane, and explaining how ozone which provides a UV barrier enables life on earth to survive. David highlighted his concern at the recent rise in CO2 levels - which with a chart explained that the previous time such levels had been reached the earth was 2/3 degrees C warmer and sea levels 25 -30 metres higher. In a further table he displayed showed the main producers by country, with China significantly ahead of any other, and the UK only contributing about 1%. A lively round of questions followed, although David had to admit defeat when asked what COP26 stood for!

For those interested, COP stands for Conference of the Parties, and is attended by countries that signed the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) - a treaty agreed in 1994. The 2021 meeting held in Glasgow was the 26th meeting, which is why it was called COP26.




