Sherbornes with Pamber

As I write this, the London Marathon has just taken place. Whether you are a fan or not, it is heartening to see an event bring people together in a common purpose and celebration, in a way which brings joy and hope to so many. Well done to all those who took part.

I must say I do like to watch sport of all kinds. There is one aspect of long-distance races however, whether running, swimming, rowing, cycling etc, which baffles me. There are always the 'also rans'; the stragglers; the 'no hopers'. I often wonder why they don't give up when all hope of winning is so clearly beyond them. As a runner gets lapped by the leading group, it must be rather soul destroying to keep going when there is no hope of a prize. Why do they persevere?

In the case of the London Marathon, the answer is surely that the vast majority of runners do not enter to win. Their prize is to complete the race. They are often taking part to raise money for worthy causes, and this is also drives them on but there must be many times when the going gets hard and they think of giving up. Yet, when they cross the finishing line, they are all winners, and they all receive a medal.

The New Testament writers talk of the Christian life as being like running a race and persevering to the end. In this race, just as in the London marathon, all who cross the line at the end of the race are awarded the prize. As Paul writes to his friend Timothy: I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith.*

But just as in a marathon, the going can be tough. Jesus does not promise that his people will be immune from all that this world can throw at them. His followers suffer illness, anxiety, loneliness, fear, and hardship just like everyone else. In addition, Jesus warns them that they can expect to suffer for their faith and face ridicule; prejudice; even persecution. Keeping the faith and running the race is anything but easy at times. Why not just give up? Paul observes of the Galatian church: You were running a good race. Who cut in on you to keep you from obeying the truth? **

The answer lies in the prize at the end of the race. Our prize as Christians is what spurs us on to keep the faith and run the race to the end. Paul continues in his letter to Timothy: *Now there is in store for me the* crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will award to me on that day—and not only to me, but also to all who have longed for his appearing.***

To be awarded the crown of righteousness means that on judgement day, we are made right with God. This is only possible because we accept, that the cross of Jesus is where God's mercy pours down on those who believe. He promises that we are then His children and we, together with His firstborn son Jesus, will inherit eternal life in glory. It is this certain hope which brings us peace in times of trouble and enables us to keep going and to run the race to the finishing line.

# Monk Sherborne Parish Council

Unfortunately, I start this report on something of a sad note with the announcement of the resignation of Cllr Sheila Mellor from the Parish Council. During her time, she has championed the regeneration of the Play Area and was responsible finding the grants and funding, single handed, for the Sky Stepper that was installed earlier this year. On behalf of the whole community the Parish Council would like to thank her for all her hard work and effort.

#### **Solar Farm**

The recent meeting on Wednesday 5th of October was delayed due the sad passing of our late Queen, during which time no Council meetings were allowed. The meeting was opened with an update from Solar 2, regarding their plans to create a new solar farm on the land either side of the road from the chalk pit next to Queens Cottages up to the A339 at Stone Circle.

These plans are at the pre-application stage with B&D Council, who have also requested a couple of additional conditions. Solar 2 intend to hold a full public consultation between mid-February and mid-March 2023 at Monk Sherborne Village Hall prior to the submission of their final planning application in mid-April. This is no doubt going to be a contentious subject with several pros and cons we therefore strongly encourage all residents to attend the briefings when they happen to make up their own minds.

Unfortunately, their website does not contain much information regarding this project at present however they have promised to have this updated in time for the consultation.

### **Village Fete and Play Area**

On a lighter topic against all odds and weather forecasts we had an excellent Village Fete on September4th with large crowds turning out. Last month's Villager contained a report on the event and a nice donation has been made towards upgrading the play area.

One of the Agenda items for the meeting was the Play Area and plans to refurbish it and upgrade some of the equipment. Discussions have been held with 3 specialist companies to gain some ideas from them and get a better idea of the sort of budget that would be required. This turned out to be a significant sum of money and the Council felt with the current financial uncertainty around the economy it would be difficult to ask the community to raise the sort of funding we would require for a total one-hit overhaul. We therefore intend to start by taking one section at a time, starting with the installation of a new slide, to replace the old one that was removed last year, following it being condemned during a safety inspection by B&D.

Grants have been identified and the Clerk was asked to apply for the, this will be augmented by donations from the Village Hall of the small profit made during the Platinum Jubilee weekend along with the profits made from the Village Fete.

### **Meeting Dates**

The other key decision made at the meeting was to move the date of the

Parish Council meeting in future to the first Wednesday of each other month. Starting with next one being Wednesday 2nd of November at 7.15pm, the only date when this will not apply is January 2023 when it will be held on Wednesday 11th. There are a few benefits with this, not least of which it will mean reports and updates from the meeting will be available for the cut-off date for the Villager.

### **Village Resident Wakes**

Whilst not a Parish Council matter it is important to the Parish as a whole. The Village Hall Trustees have made the decision, following the sad passing of one of community, the Village Hall will be available FOC for the wake of any person who lives or lived in the Parish.

### **Village Hall AGM**

The Annual General Meeting for the Village Hall was originally planned for Tuesday 11th October, this has had to be delayed for admin reasons and will now take place on Tuesday 15th of November at 7pm and will be followed by some light refreshments.

We would like to encourage you to get involved, we have a wonderful community, but it does rely on volunteers to help it thrive. Both the Parish Council and the Village Hall vacancies for Parish Councillors and Trustees, from experience you can decide how much you want to get involved from as little as a couple of hours a week, but the important thing is to get involved and have your voice heard.

# Speed Watch in Pamber

The other month a question was raised asking, "What has become of the Speed Watch Group in Pamber". Unfortunately, its demise is two-fold, the first being Covid-19 when the group could not meet, then the loss of the area coordinator due to work pressures. The group is also dependant on volunteers to carry out the monitoring and sadly there are too few of these in the parish to be able to run the initiative effectively.

So, I use this opportunity to call for new and old volunteers who are concerned about vehicle speeds in the parish to contact our Parish Clerk via email at clerk@pamber-pc.gov.uk to sign up. We need at least 6 to 8 people on the list. Once we have a group again the local police will organise some basic training in road safety and recording methods. A minimum of 3 people is needed to undertake a monitoring session, but 4 is ideal. However most importantly the group needs a new Co-ordinator.

This needs someone who is a bit more dedicated to the task as it involves organising the group sessions and processing the collected data to then be sent to the police; again training will be given. If you are willing to undertake this role, please indicate this when contacting the clerk.

Monitoring takes place in spring and summer when it is light from 7 am to 7pm, this catches the commuter traffic in daylight hours. The group also went out at the week-end around 10:00am monitoring traffic going to club meetings.

Although the Speed Watch Group has not been in operation this has not stopped the use of the 2 Speed Detection Devices (SID) we have, I am sure you will have seen them around. Residents in all the 4 villages have commented on their effectiveness in reducing traffic speeds and so they will continue to be

placed around the
Parish. Hampshire
CC Highways have
approved 2 new locations along New
Road in Pamber Green and the SID's
have been placed there recently.

Records from the SID's are sent to the police who use the information to decide on speed trap locations. Not long ago, they set up a trap on the Bramley Road in Pamber End. It was there for less than ½ hour but still caught 3 speeders. I have asked the police for some more information on their operations with speed traps in the area; then in a few months' time, I can share with you the records gathered from the monitoring plus any more information from the police.



# News from The Pambers and Little London



# Probus Hears About A Journey To The Big Hill Across The Pond



Most people have heard of the RAF Mountain Rescue Service but know little about its history and aircraft crashes into high ground due to navigational errors and bad weather. In many cases the crews, although injured, had survived the impact due mainly to slow moving aircraft. However, the remote nature of the terrain coupled with the time taken for the station medical officer to assemble a search party, caused a disproportionate number of fatalities amongst the initial survivors

Today the rescue team is a highly organised professional body whose members, in recent years, also attend civil emergencies. While being regular members of the RAF they are volunteers and attend the equivalent of thirty weekends each year in training. Probus member, retired Squadron Lead Chris Perkins MVO, was a member of the RAF Mountain Rescue Service for several years and he recounted his recollections of a significant training exercise that took place four decades ago.

With today's ease of access to mass travel, many team members may have been fortunate to experience overseas mountaineering in the Alps, Pyrenees or even to the Himalayas. Forty years ago, the situation was very different and the opportunities to mount expeditions to further areas of the globe were extremely limited.

Supported at high level it was agreed that a specialist training exercise would be undertaken to Mt Rainier in Washington State in the northwest of the USA. At 14,410 feet Mt Rainier was a dormant volcano in the Cascade mountains and while on this exercise the expedition members witnessed the eruption of Mount St Helens that caused worldwide disruption to communications and transport.

It was a major project involving a party of 15 personnel, all selected from RAF Mountain Rescue teams in Scotland, Wales and Yorkshire. The majority had alpine snow and ice climbing experience, and many were winter mountaineering instructors.

At that stage in his career, Chris was an Air Traffic Controller based at RAF Valley on Anglesey. During daylight hours it was busy with high intensity jet training for young pilots and provided a 24-hour NATO diversion facility for all manner of aircraft. The long night time hours on readiness in the radar room proved ideal for detailed expedition planning.

In those days before computers and word processers meant that documentation was produced as typed hard copy for signature and dispatched by surface post. Sometimes they were able to use the latest technology of a tele-printer. Frequent telephone liaison with USAF bases accessed their trans-Atlantic military networks and crucial contact with liaison agencies in Washington State. It was necessary to obtain approval for members of the British military to operate within the borders of the United States.

The logistics involved a RAF VC10 aircraft from Brize Norton on a training

flight to familiarise several pilots with airfields across the US, transported the team via Ottawa to Washington DC, stopping overnight, then onwards via Dallas, Colorado Springs, Denver and San Francisco finally to Mather USAF base Sacramento. Instead of the planned lengthy Greyhound Bus journey up the west coast an opportune telephone call with a British Army liaison officer at Fort Lewis, revealed that his next-door neighbour commanded a C130 Hercules transport squadron at the adjacent McChord USAF base, and kindly agreed to fly down to pick up the expedition.

Vehicle hire of a Dodge mini-bus and cargo van awaited the arrival of the aircraft necessary for the movement of the team and equipment. During the two-week journey 2,400 miles were driven. Also arranged was base accommodation, purchase of the latest US Army Special Forces Long Range Patrol rations and appropriate National Park Permits for access and travel. And, importantly, connected the expedition with the Department of Emergency Services in Washington State.

Climatic conditions throughout the expedition were ideal. Daytime temperatures rarely fell below 30 degrees Celsius, and the nights remained clear but cold at height. Such conditions aided the night time ascent of Mt Rainier, however they caused numerous dangers on the descent from opening crevasses, collapsing ice bridges and rock falls.

At the end of the expedition period the party was offered USAF air passage back



to the UK. However, it was decided to revisit the Greyhound Bus option to experience air-conditioned comfort overnight from Tacoma via Vancouver to Calgary. Again, RAF Command came up trumps, providing VC10 aircraft space to Brize Norton via Germany.

The Mt Rainier expedition, four decades ago, gave all expedition members valuable experience of mountaineering,

backpacking at altitude, glacier travel plus proficiency of journeying into vast wilderness areas. It provided the team with improved practices for future emergencies in extremely difficult terrain.

This was a journey of a lifetime only made possible with invaluable military and civilian assistance. Evidence, perhaps, of the special relationship so often talked about between our two nations.

# Life on the Veg - Elm Road Allotment of Lyn Church, SSJ

I was lucky and excited to get a plot on the Elm Road Allotments in 2018 and anticipated enjoying the fruits of my labour and in the beginning there was a lot of hard-labour carried out.

Armed with enthusiasm I set about preparing the ground for planting. I then encountered enemy number one, bindweed, followed closely by slimy and furry critters eager to devour tasty green shoots, as I'm not a chemical gardener. Making preserves is one of the many aspects of having an allotment that I love, making beetroot pickle, pickled gherkins, clove and crab apple jelly, the crabapples being given to me by Penny which were big and juicy with a glorious deep red hue, a Christmas favorite for my family.

sense of humour, plus you will need sturdy footwear, a thermos flask and supply of biscuits and if you are lucky an allotment dog. PI belongs to my daughter and he is always happy to help with clearing up unused fruit and veg.

I must mention that I share the plot with Diane who grows beautiful flowers which makes the whole plot look complete. Having an allotment has provided me with so much pleasure, so if you get a chance to have one, get your boots on and get sowing.

# News from the Hospital

Whilst most of us are acting as if the pandemic is behind us, that would be unwise. Beds are once again filling up with Covid patients. At the time of writing there are 82 cases, with about half coming in due to the virus, and the other half for different reasons but testing positive on admission; in both cases it is the elderly, with many not yet having received the latest booster jab which is often administered with a flu jab. This of course is not helping the hospital bring waiting lists down, with staff absences and patients unable to attend appointments at the last minute. However the backlog remains a priority: at least the numbers of those waiting longest to be cared for are falling, where the plans are for nobody to have to wait more than 52 weeks.

When we look at the hospital's performance, whilst none of us like to be kept waiting in A&E (now termed ED – emergency department), it is encouraging to reflect that our hospital's performance is well above the national average. Similarly, the Trust is fourth in the country when it comes to meeting

the targets for cancer treatments. That said, analysis of the figures for one of the major cancers shows that the referral and diagnostic rate has radically dropped with the advent of Covid. This would suggest that when people eventually seek advice, their cancer may be much more advanced and thus more difficult to treat and with a poorer potential outcome. For this reason, health care professionals are encouraging people who have any concerns to seek early advice, with men often being reluctant to do so.

Many will have noticed the large new building under construction adjacent to the Sherborne Building at the north end of the site. This is for a new 'Cath' lab, currently Basingstoke has only one unit, which has over the years performed some amazing miracles, but with no backup if anything fails. By contrast Portsmouth has four units. These labs are vital for modern heart surgery, such as insertion of stents which have transformed so many peoples' lives. The new unit is planned to open in November. Also,

it is anticipated that Basingstoke will receive its first robot within the next six months which will help with precision delicate surgery, especially with kidney and bowel operations, Basingstoke being one of the leading UK centres for bowel cancer treatment.

Finally, despite all the deep concern about the performance of the NHS, it seems that few are aware that they can become members of the Trust. Membership is free and open to all: patients, their families, friends and carers, hospital staff and everyone who wants to keep in touch with their local hospital service. Not only do members get a regular update from the hospital's CEO, with regular health talks, but they also have the opportunity to select governors to represent their interests to the Trust's management in their local area. The process of applying to become a member is easy and can be accessed from the website www. hampshirehospitals.nhs.uk/membership

# North Hampshire Prostate Cancer Support Group September Meeting



What a privilege to have Prof Richard Hindley, one of Britain's leading urologists, based here in our local hospital trust, as our key speaker at our recent meeting. In an urgent message the previous evening it was explained that he would not be able to attend in person, due to added workload and staff shortages. This gave the Group its first chance to put into operation our new Zoom screen system, which it has recently purchased following the kindness of the Loddon Lilies, a ladies' group from Sherfield on Loddon who have chosen to actively fund-raise on our behalf this year. Once operational the system worked particularly well.

Throughout Richard's talk it became very clear that we are particularly well served locally, as the Trust is one of the leading innovation and treatment centres in the UK, with some of its work having worldwide implications in terms of treatments. Basingstoke continues to punch well above its weight in terms of innovation, and also in undertaking trials of new treatments. Currently it has been selected along with Oxford and

Imperial College to perform UK trials of a new steam treatment system which has shown promise in the US. At the same time the 'Promise' trial (our local Trust is the second biggest participant nationally) is checking whether the quality of diagnosis is still effective in MRI scans if the present method of giving dye injections to highlight tumours are eliminated, which if proven will give benefits of time saving and elimination of allergic reaction with some patients.

Another example of Basingstoke's lead in the treatment of prostate cancer; after University College Hospital in London, Basingstoke was only the second location in the UK to use HIFU (High intensity focused ultra sound) commencing just two years behind in 2006. Richard explained that HIFU is recognised as being less damaging to peripheral tissue leading to reduced side effects especially in potential sexual function. Whilst no trial has been formally run, early indications suggest that over the last 7/8 years the outcomes between radiotherapy and HIFU show no significant difference. It has also been remarkably effective in men with a main tumour and smaller additional tumours with just the main one being treated, regularly leading to the impact of the minor tumours diminishing.

Right from the start, Richard empathised the importance of PSA testing, indicating that this form of testing has radically improved in accuracy and value over recent years.

In his view a screening programme will be implemented before too long. He added that in future MRI screening is ultimately likely to become in the key marker, with the added benefits of identifying the exact size and location of any suspect tumours, enabling accurate targeted biopsies and better assessment of various treatment options.

Following a round of questions to Richard from the floor, there was a very genuine expression of appreciation given to him for giving up time from the operating theatre. Without the support of the Loddon Lilies, this Zoom meeting, which worked so well, would never have been possible.

With prostate cancer now the most prevalent cancer in the UK, it is disturbing to realise that in 2020 the number being diagnosed was about 25% of previous years, with 2021 still only about one third; even this year the level has risen to about 50% of earlier times; this clearly suggests that there are many cases existing yet to be diagnosed, but worryingly with probably much more advanced disease and thus poorer prognosis.

It was encouraging to have a number of members join us for the first time, and it was encouraging, in the light of the support given them, to hear that they want to participate at future events.

# David McIntyre



A warm hello to all readers of the Villager. I was elected in May to join councillors Simon Bound and Jay Ganesh as your local representative at the Borough council. I've been in post for over 5 months now and my intention is to provide regular updates, on news from the Borough to readers.

Firstly, some positive news on efforts, in conjunction with the team at Hampshire and Isle of Wight Roads Policing and the Camera Safety Partnership, where we spoke about residents' concerns on speeding and in particular the excessive speeds we see in our residential areas.

Officers understand our concerns and it is reassuring that road safety is a high priority in our borough. We spent a Sunday afternoon trialling out new mobile camera enforcement sites on the A340, taking into account local information with regards to locations and timings, so that speed limits are

enforced when residents are subjected to those drivers who believe limits don't apply to them. Hopefully, we should start to see the impact of this more positive enforcement beginning to slow down traffic on the A340.

Your three councillors, some wags have labelled us the three amigos, have also been taking advantage of the pleasant weather over the weekends to get out and around the ward reporting potholes to Hampshire County Council and I'm happy to report we're beginning to see these efforts pay off as roads are repaired. If you see us out and about, do give us a wave. Thanks go out to our local MP Ranil Jayawardena and County councillor Rhydian Vaughan for helping us navigate these through the system. Just a reminder to residents, Hampshire County Council's website is actually very easy to navigate and makes reporting a painless task. If we've missed any, do feel free to get involved.

An update on our Local Plan process and housing number. I sat on the economic, planning and housing committee that voted to reject government calculations, which imposed 17,820 new homes on the borough by the end of 2039. I am not anti-development, we do need to build homes for our residents, but they need

to reflect the character of our great borough and respect residents wishes and most importantly housing numbers need to meet our needs and not a centrally imposed arbitrary number.

I am glad to see that our current administration has paid heed to these requests and have paused the Local Plan update process and will now conduct an exercise to determine the true level of local need for housing. As I hear more news on this process, I will continue to keep residents updated.

Finally, with current global issues creating impacts to the UK energy market, the borough council have introduced grants to help those most at need to fund home improvements to help eligible residents make their home more energy efficient, keeping you warm for less and reducing your carbon footprint. If you have a household income of £30,000 or less and your home has an energy performance certificate (EPC) rating of D or lower, you could get improvements including cavity and loft insulation or solar panels for free. Please do contact any one of your local borough councillors for any further information.


