Remembering Heroes

Harry Billinge was just 18 years old when he landed on Gold Beach on the North coast of France on 6th June 1944. He was one of only four from his unit who made it out alive. 75 years later Harry was appointed an MBE for his tireless efforts raising funds for the British Normandy Memorial. In an interview he remarked, "I'm no hero. All of the heroes are dead, and I'll never forget them."



Harry wanted to make sure we remembered them too, heroes who had laid down their lives to win our peace and freedom. In a world still being torn apart by violence, remembering heroes gives us hope. Harry's wife shared that just before he died last year, some of his last words were, "love one another." He never lost his hope.

Hope that is ultimately fulfilled in the Lord Jesus. He showed his love for the world when he died for us on the cross, waging war on sin and death. Declaring victory when he rose three days later, he returned to his Father in heaven, but not without promising he would be back. A promise picked up in Psalm 46, our Bible Reading for Remembrance Sunday.

"He makes wars cease to the ends of the earth. He breaks the bow and shatters

Sherbornes with Pamber/St. Andrews

The Parish has a new vicar, the Revd. Stewart Deering. I've met Stewart a couple of times and he attended our last Parish Meeting. All I would say is that I think the Parish is lucky to have a Vicar of Stewart's beliefs and positivity as its new Vicar. The Parish Council looks forward to working with Stewart going forward.

Parish Office

With the new Clerk now in role the Parish Council are looking to set up a Parish Office in the Village hall. The office would be available a half day a week and would be the first port of call for Parishioners to engage with the Parish Council.

Details need to be finalised and I would hope that dates/times will be published in the next Villager issue.

SSJ Neighbourhood Plan

The final draft of the revised Neighbourhood Plan has been submitted to BDBC and other statutory authorities for their review and sign-off.

Part of this process is a 6 week review for Parishioners to have their views considered.

The Parish Council hopes that you managed to attend the open forum on the 6th October to take a look at the revised SSJ Neighbourhood Plan and to submit your comments on the same.

For those of you who were unable to attend full details of how to get your review comments considered can

The Neighbourhood Plan and associated documents are available for review online at www.ssj-np.co.uk. On the www.ssjnp.co.uk website, you will also find an electronic questionnaire where you can submit your comments.

The view from BDBC is that SSJ will not be required to take any more housing development BUT....

Planning

With the BDBC delay, approximately 1 year, in moving forward with the new Local Plan, this in turn delays the new SSJ Neighbourhood plan.

This delay has seen developers submit a number of applications, two of which impact SSI;

- Weybrook Farm (220 houses)

- Kiln Farm (350 houses)

A formal planning application is about to be submitted for the Weybrook Farm development and the Parish Council understands that the application for the Kiln Farm development is also being developed. These x 2 applications, whilst not directly within the Parish, will have a major impact on the Parish with increased traffic, changes to road layouts etc. For example the Weybrook Farm application includes the following;

- Up to 220 homes (including 40% affordable housing at mix of sizes and tenure incl. First Homes)

- Housing mix of predominantly 2 & 3 bed family houses, with some 1 & 4+ bed homes

- A new roundabout from the Aldermaston Road (A340), including new footway to provide access to two new bus stops

Also Rydon Homes are about to appeal the decision not to give planning permission for the 26 houses at the back of Cranesfield. The zero allocation in the

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revised Neighbourhood Plan will be a key point in fighting this appeal.

Speeding

Like a bad smell this issue never goes away and it seems various motor cyclists use the A340 as a race track late evenings/early mornings.

With the possible new developments at Kiln Farm and Weybrook Farm these developments can only mean increased traffic in and around the village. Combine increased traffic with parking issues along Vyne Road then what is currently an issue on certain days of the week and/or times of day, could get worse.

An attendee at the next Parish Council meeting, Wednesday, 25th October, will be Inspector Paul Freeman from Hampshire police. Inspector Freeman will listen to our concerns and we in turn will listen to his proposals. If you do intend to attend on the 25th October, please be nice to Inspector Freeman, he is but the messenger.

Chute Pavilion

The next six months will see a number of 'must do' repairs to the Chute initiated. A number of these repairs might require the Pavilion to be closed for a short period of time. Further details to be provided as and when the repairs are scheduled.

Lengthsman

The Lengthsman service has unexpectedly ceased. The Parish Council has set up an alternative.

Village Play Area

The Village Play Area continues to be a key topic of discussion and we continue to investigate sources of funding to help with the complete refurbishment of the equipment. We have an offer from Manydown as one source of funding we

are just waiting for the full details. Once again, the Village Hall donated the proceeds of the Village Fete to the fund.

Highways

The state of the roads in the Parish continues to be an item of discussion and since the meeting we are starting to see some marking of potholes has taken place and we wait to see the outcome if any work actually happens. 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Hampshire County Councillor report – Calleva Division Autumn 2023

1.HCC financial planning this autumn

The financial challenges facing the County Council, and local government nationally, are well documented. Each year, it costs more to deliver public services, but the money received from central Government and council tax increases is not enough to meet the extra costs, which results in a deficit. High inflation and growing demand for local services means that in the two years up to the 2025/26 financial year, the budget shortfall is expected to rise considerably to £132m, one of the biggest deficits the County Council has ever faced.

Proposals this autumn set out options for how Hampshire County Council could close this budget gap and comes on top of over £0.6bn of spending reductions already delivered since the start of national austerity. Hampshire is in a better financial position than most other county councils, and while the Authority's finances are stable until 2025/26, future stability relies on central Government fundamentally changing the way that local government services are funded, or reducing what councils are legally required to deliver.

In the absence of any immediate Government action in this regard, Hampshire County Council must plan on the basis of closing the budget gap itself, applying a combination of tactics to help balance the books, including changing and reducing services and delivering only those services which the council must legally provide.

A final decision is to be made by the full county council in November. After this, some proposals may then be subject to furthe more detailed public consultation.

2. Transforming in-house nursing and specialist care

A ten week public consultation is now underway on proposals that would see £173 million invested over the next five to six years to transform and expand the future of nursing and specialist accommodation directly provided by HCC for the county's growing older

population. The proposals recommend concentrating on the delivery of specialist nursing care, complex dementia care and short-term support - to either prevent a hospital admission or support a hospital discharge, so ensuring care could be provided more cost effectively.

The proposals include:

- Winchester and the New Forest
 - modernising and expanding care at existing homes in Basingstoke, Aldershot and Emsworth
 - withdrawing over time from the direct provision of residential care, with the closure of a number of the council's older homes.

The consolation closes on 12 November 2023 with a final decision expected in February next year.

3. Countryside Services -**Parish Pages**

4. Increased payments to local residents hosting **Ukrainian families**

The county council has announced that it will be paying an extra £200 per month to all Hampshire residents hosting Ukrainian guests as part of the Government's Homes for Ukraine Scheme, until the end of March 2024. This takes the monthly

payment to £700, which is above the Government's current guidance for local authorities.

5. Funding to save the UK's rarest orchids


Hampshire County Council has secured £98,000 funding from Natural England to help rare helleborine orchids to thrive. The conservation project aims to create protected habitats for the endangered plants at sites in East Hampshire.

6.New police stations for Hampshire

The Police and Crime Commissioner for Hampshire and the Isle of Wight, Donna Jones, has announced a plan to open ten more police stations and front counters over the next eighteen months, with the aim of increasing police visibility and making them more accessible to the public.

The number of police front counters will increase from 13 to 23, with new front counters in Cowes, Portsmouth Central, Park Gate, Petersfield, Totton, Ryde, Yateley, Eastleigh, Cosham and Gosport.

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
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Beau's Blog

Probus Hears About Thelwell



Readers, probably over the age of thirty-five, when the name of Thelwell is mentioned, will remember iconic subjects of small, fat, hairy ponies ridden at full tilt by alarming young ladies. Indeed, the Thelwell pony has become part of the English language.

But, as speaker Tim Craven explained, Norman Thelwell's range as a cartoonist went far beyond ponies and included fishing, gardening, house hunting, motoring, sailing, dogs, cats, farming, stately homes, children and country pursuits, all given the Thelwell treatment. There was much more to this artist than first appears as the speaker went on to outline.

Life for Norman Thelwell had started in lowly circumstances, born into a terraced house near Birkenhead, he just had a natural affinity for drawing. A pencil sketch of a self-portrait created when he was only ten demonstrated his skill. Joining the army at eighteen in 1941 his artistic talent kept him away from hostilities, even when in India he became involved in producing the

Victory magazine which prevented him from action in Burma.

His time in the army enabled him to develop cartoon illustrations of military life. He came to recognise that selling a picture to a magazine was worth more than a month's army pay so it dawned on him that there could be a living to be made using his artistic talent.

Formal artistic education at Nottingham and Gateshead schools of art was followed by a degree at Liverpool School of Art so it was natural that he became an art teacher. He persevered with expanding freelance work until it reached such a level that he decided to go completely freelance as an artist. He worked in this manner for Punch Magazine for twenty-five years during which time he produced over 1,500 cartoons and sixty front covers. National newspapers were another outlet for his work.

Tim Craven was the curator at Southampton City Art Gallery when, in 2001, he received a phone call from Mrs Thelwell about the conservation of water colour paintings. By this time Norman Thelwell was outside the mainstream of being a public figure and had lived for thirty-five years near Romsey in Hampshire, so Tim was eager to become involved in conserving the extensive work of this local worldfamous artist.

There was a large quantity of paintings to consider but what became apparent was that while cartoons had made him famous having published 32 books, selling over two million copies which had been translated into several languages and earned him a good living, it was his interest in painting landscapes that was his real passion. The quality of work was so good that Thelwell's country scenes could sit alongside those of the greatest English artists.

Thelwell was very much an adopted countryman and did his best to support the protection of rural England and especially the Test valley fighting against gravel extraction. There have been several exhibitions of Thelwell's artwork, showing his various styles that were curated by Tim Craven with one exhibition attracting 64,000 visitors. Today, a century after his birth, it is still

possible to use Thelwell's images for many types of merchandising opportunities, so the drawings of his small, fat, hairy ponies continue.








At the concert held in St Andrew's Church, SSJ in early October an amazing £300 was raised to go towards the cost of repairing the stained glass window in the church.

Martha interrogated her guests as to whether they had remembered to bring a recipe with them. No? Well no

Martha was ten years older than Jane, and Jane apparently adored her, perhaps in the early days but as the years went on possibly not quite as much when latterly Martha may have overstepped her remit as good friend and possibly housekeeper, and told Jane what she thought of titles to Jane's books which Martha felt were

matter, they still had a few days before she and the Austens moved away so could deliver in the next day or so.

prohibiting her from being published. Indeed, Martha considered herself to be very much a part of the Austen family especially when her sister married James, one of Jane's brothers.

Then tragedy occurred. Jane's Father died at a similar time to Martha's Mother, which left everyone in great financial straits. Reverends, deceased or otherwise, were not known for their wealth. However, another brother of Jane's, Captain Francis Austen, came to the rescue when he invited them all to go and live with him and his new wife Mary, a widow with five children, to keep her company during his absences at sea.

Jane died in 1817 but, at the age of 62, Martha married the now widower Captain Francis, thus becoming a true Austen.

Speaker Jane Glennie was thanked by Pat Burt for giving such an entertaining and informative snapshot into the lives of Martha Lloyd and Jane Austen.

News from the North Hampshire Hospitals Trust

The Lucy Letby case has hit national headlines and must be a real concern for prospective parents locally: could this be repeated in our own hospital? It is reassuring to note that not only is the mortality level regularly reviewed, in fact each death case is reviewed, but the Trust has in place arrangements to prevent a similar situation happening here.

In addition the Trust is ensuring all staff are able to speak up, however junior they might be, which was a major factor in the Letby case.

Patient safety and care is a top priority for the Trust, and whilst it may not be helpful for those admitted for urgent treatment, the Trust will shortly be adding a YouTube video to its website which will be of real value to those being admitted for elective procedures. This video covers a wide range of issues, including making sure one understands what is being said by staff, preventing side effects, such as falls or blood clots and infections, to being willing to ask for help when needed. At the same time the Trust is working hard to instil a patient caring culture in all staff, and as the citations for many of the 'Wow' awards confirm (awards to staff for going well beyond normal expectations), we have some amazing examples of this.

By now most people are aware that a new hospital is planned locally with public consultation anticipated in the near future. Lord Markham, Parliament Under Secretary for Health and Social Care, recently visited Basingstoke to help understand the need for change. He met with both staff and patient representatives and was able to give the assurance that as the plan for a rolling renewal of hospitals across the country had been developed with wide crossparty involvement in Westminster, any change of government would be unlikely to affect the programme.

He went on to explain that the planned construction methodology was to undertake considerable work off site, using a bring to site 'pod' system. Not only did he highlight the benefits this gives to future flexibility of layout as healthcare needs change over the years, but this method also gains from better cost control, faster construction and cost savings from standardisation, as well as protection from programme delays from adverse weather. He further emphasised that by spreading the programme over a long period, for example about 20 years, this would enable suppliers to invest appropriately with further productivity gains. He stressed that based upon benefits now achieved by Trusts with new hospitals, full digitisation of patient information was already improving productivity.

It is now widely recognised that the NHS is in crisis, its current budget is nearly one third of all the money the Government collects from us in taxation, and many don't see additional funds as making any improvements. With many now opting to go private, whilst there is real concern that public health provision will decline, it shows that those better off are prepared to spend more on their health.

For example:-

• Does the NHS need radical surgery? For example, do we in this country need to move more to the continental system with nominal charges for its use – clearly with some mitigation for those less well off?

- Does it need to be split into more manageable units?
- How do we fix primary care where each GP surgery is a private business, because to become a partner, capital is required to purchase a share – not something young doctors with high student loans have in abundance?

As mentioned above, it is planned that the public consultation for the new hospital will start shortly. Whilst there will be some negative comments on the options, the Trust will really appreciate positive suggestions on how the options might be improved. It is however hoped that many more people engage in the consultation than the under 300 people who participated in recent governor elections which covered a population approaching 200,000!

Likewise, the election of governors will be taking place starting at the end of October. Governors represent patient interests to the hospital management, so this is a vital role. Why not become a Trust member? This not only entitles you to vote, but it will also give you more up to date information and help you to play a part at this critical time. North Hampshire Prostate Cancer Support Group

As a matter of interest our local group is now one of the largest in the country, with so many men now being diagnosed with the disease, and in fact dying of it, anything we can do to publicise the group's work will hopefully reduce suffering for many.

Pillar boxes – hardly an interesting subject for a talk one might think, not so when Tony Cross spoke to the Group at the September meeting. He explained that prior to the introduction of the penny black it was the recipient who paid the postage. The problem with that was that some of those doing the final delivery ended up carrying a large amount of money, making them an attractive target for robbery. When first established, one had to buy one's stamp and hand in the letter over the post office counter - hardly convenient. It did not help that the first stamps were neither pregummed or perforated, having to be separated by the post office using scissors. He also pointed out that British stamps are unique in that they do not carry the name of the country. It was apparently the Belgians who originated the first post boxes followed by the French.

The first post boxes in the UK were introduced by Anthony Trollope, initially in 1852 with four boxes in Jersey as an experiment, followed by two in Guernsey a year later. The first boxes had vertical slots, with again the oldest still existing in the Channel Islands. So were all boxes of a set standard? Tony was able with slides to show that to be far from the case, with different colours in different places, for example those in Cyprus being yellow from when we ran the island, and the Channel Islands in dark blue. Surprisingly Eire has retained the pre independence boxes, many with GR for George 5th cast in their face, but they are now painted green. He also showed the development of dual boxes for town and country, and even a multi use version – phone box/ stamp dispenser/pillar box, whilst in the Falklands, an old ammunition box has been requisitioned.

Initially there was no standard design to the boxes, however in 1857 a design competition was established with the economy version option becoming the first standard, which normally also included the makers name. This was then changed a few years later to a hexagonal shape initially painted green – however users experienced difficulty locating them so red became the colour of choice with ultimately Vermillion being today's chosen colour. However the hexagonal shape proved more

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expensive to produce and so the round shape was adopted. That did not stop other boxes appearing, in walls, with lampstands on top, with signs, and even fixed to poles.

With the introduction of a standard one might think that conformity ensued, not so! Liverpool as a city introduced its own design in 1863, of which 2 boxes still remain, and a box outside one of the Cambridge colleges is topped with spikes – allegedly to stop students from using to box for a leg up over the wall when climbing back into their college out of hours.

The second part of the meeting was allotted to the incontinence team from the hospital, who with assistance from Essity, part of a major worldwide paper producer, are researching the impact of surgery and prostate treatments on male incontinence and sex life, with many members signing up to participate in the research at the meeting. The chairman finished by mentioning the progress of the 'Bins for Boys' campaign and the PC UK testing programme of home urine tests for microscopic blood inclusion – potentially an early sign of health problems to come.

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
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
