A remote community in Pakistan's Battagram region became the focus of the world's attention several weeks ago when a cable car with eight passengers was left dangling 900 feet above a deep valley when two out of its three cables snapped. Totally helpless, the group relied on a dramatic rescue effort involving commandos rapelling from helicopters and locals using a wooden bed frame to construct an elaborate pulley system. Amazingly, it worked, and 12 hours later all seven students and their teacher were safely back on solid ground.

While most of us won't have faced situations quite as extreme as this, we all reach points in our lives when all we can do is cry, "Help!"

Christianity is often characterised as a "crutch", a kind of extra help for those who need it to get through life. As we continue to explore Philippians in the Bible this term, we're discovering that Christianity was so much more than that for the Apostle Paul. For him, as for all Christians, the person at the heart of Christianity, Jesus Christ, is not just the one we lean on when life gets hard. Christ is everything: he made us, loves us, rescues us, forgives us, transforms us, and promises us a future that will be better by far than anything this life offers.

As we celebrate Harvest this month, we follow centuries of tradition of giving thanks to God for his provision of the food that has been produced that year, acknowledging our reliance on him. We will also be using the month ahead to renew our focus on prayer with some new opportunities to gather to pray across the parish – again acknowledging that we rely on God for everything. Sherborne St John Parish Council

Local residents will be aware that the village has been under some pressure from speculative developments over the last couple of years. The Parish Council therefore took the decision last year to review and update the Neighbourhood Plan, which had been approved in 2017. This is one of the best ways we can ensure that the character and separate identity of the village can be safeguarded.

What's in the Sherborne St John Neighbourhood Plan, you may ask? It outlines a set of policies and proposals that will guide the development and growth of our community in the coming years. It covers a wide range of topics, including the design of housing, heritage, open space, access to the countryside and environmental conservation.

One important aspect of the Plan is the proposal for a Local Gap between Sherborne St John Village and Basingstoke Town. This policy aims to preserve the distinct character and identity of our village, preventing urban sprawl and maintaining a clear separation between our community and Basingstoke.

Last time in the Neighbourhood Plan, a small housing site was allocated at Sireburne Close, with the new village shop. This time, we are not looking for new housing allocations in the village, but wish to strengthen our policies including protecting local green spaces, heritage areas and maintaining a 'local gap` from Basingstoke. We will also have a design code to try to ensure that if developments do occur in the right

places in the village, their design and appearance will be in keeping. This approach was well supported by most residents who responded to the initial consultation undertaken back in January.

Things are moving on now. The consultation for the Regulation 14 Sherborne St John Neighbourhood Plan is here! From Monday 25th September 2023 till 6th November 2023, the Neighbourhood Plan will be available to comment on for a period of six weeks. This is a crucial opportunity for residents to comment and help us shape the future of our village.

Throughout the consultation period, there will be several ways to provide your comments and feedback. An online platform will be available on the designated website, where you can view the documents and express your thoughts. Additionally, printed forms will be available in key locations such as at the village shop and Village Hall, alongside paper copies of the Neighbourhood Plan itself. On Friday October 6th 7.30-9.30pm, there will be open evening at the village hall.

Let's seize this opportunity to support and shape Sherborne St John's development to reflect our shared vision and values and to ensure our village remains a wonderful place to live and work. Don't forget to visit the website, review the Plan, and give us your valuable feedback. The website details are available from the Parish Council Website (see www.sherbornestjohn-pc. gov.uk/The_Neighbourhood_Plan).

Hampshire County Councillor report – Calleva Division October 2023

1. Schools

Residents may be aware of the recent news story regarding schools in England due to close imminently as a result of their buildings containing unsafe concrete: School buildings in England to shut over concrete safety fears - BBC News

No Hampshire school is being closed. Cranbourne College in Basingstoke is the only site where RAAC has been identified among Hampshire County Council's maintained schools. Temporary works have already been undertaken to one section of the building to make sure it is safe and another area has been taken out of use since the beginning of the year, however, the school is expected to open as normal at the start of the autumn term.

Meanwhile, the council is encouraging families to do all they can to support regular school attendance for their children from the beginning of term. The first few days back in school are especially crucial in paving the way for a successful year. Attendance rates are improving locally, but are still not back to pre-pandemic levels.

Educational specialists advise that attending school every day, unless unwell, is best for children to ensure that the solid foundations for their future education and employment can be laid. It is also one of the best ways of protecting a child's mental and physical health. The County Council's website provides advice and guidance on school attendance including parental responsibilities and what to do if a child is unwell or expected to be away from school for a long period of time.

2. County deal and the local economy

The proposed county deal, with the councils across Hampshire and the Isle of Wight seeking substantial devolution and funding of £1.14 billion from Central Government in return for a more combined structure, will not be proceeding after Southampton, Portsmouth and the Isle of Wight sought a separate deal. The leader of Hampshire County Council, Councillor Rob Humby, regretted the outcome, commenting that the deal could have made a significant contribution to Hampshire's economic recovery, by stimulating economic recovery, regeneration and business growth.

Separately, the government has announced that the core functions of Local Enterprise Partnerships (LEPs) will transfer to local authorities, including HCC, from April 2024. LEPs are non-statutory, business-led partnership bodies that are responsible for local economic development in England. They bring together the private sector, local authorities, and academic and voluntary institutions to help boost the local economy and drive growth.

3. Solar panels for homes schemes - Solar Together

I have mentioned this scheme before, whereby residents can join in the bulk buying of solar panels or batteries for their homes, which both reduce energy bills and boost local renewable energy generation. A new round has opened and residents have until 27 October to register their interest online, for free and without obligation - www.hants.gov.uk/ solartogether.

4. Roads

Hampshire County Council has pledged to spend an additional £7.5m a year over the next three years to fix thousands more potholes. This is on top of the £13.5m currently being spent a year on reactive pothole and road defect repairs. Progress is already being made, with road defects being fixed at a record rate in May and June alone, 19,697 potholes and other problems were repaired and 33,671 square metres of surface design and micro asphalt was laid.

In separate news, two pupils at Basingstoke secondary schools have triumphed in a competition to name two County Council gritters with the winning vehicle names being Elvis Spreadsley and Grit of Thrones.

5. Covid-19 vaccinations

A Covid-19 vaccine programme was started last month as a precautionary

measure following the identification of a new Covid-19 variant. It will be offered to those most at risk from winter illness, including all adults 65 years old and over, front line health and social care workers, carers aged 16 to 64 and pregnant women. An annual flu vaccine will also be available at the same time, where possible.

6. Vaping


Following an increase in young people experimenting with vaping, Hampshire County Council has pledged continuing support for a series of education and enforcement measures to tackle the increasingly pressing issue of teen vaping. In total, 20.5% of children nationally have tried vaping, up from 15.8% in 2022 and 13.9% in 2020.

Steps include writing to families of children in secondary schools with information about vaping to highlight the risks and the support available; redeveloping education and awareness schemes to encourage behaviour change and to reduce uptake; Trading Standards carrying out enforcement operations to deter underaged sales of vapes and tackle illegal vapes.

In other news on vaping, Hampshire residents can now recycle vapes at any Household Waste Recycling Centre, helping to avoid disposal in general waste, which is a fire risk. HWRCs can accept all types of vapes. The guidance is not to dismantle them before disposal, unless the batteries can be safely removed for separate recycling.

Single-use vapes contain lithium-ion batteries which can catch fire if broken. This is an increasing problem across the country. In Hampshire, the County Council estimates one fire a month on average in a waste truck or waste facility can be attributed to a battery, faulty electrical item or disposable BBQ. A battery was the suspected cause of a significant fire at the Portsmouth Materials Recovery Facility in 2021 which closed the site for three months.



News from the North Hampshire Hospitals Trust

It is now widely known that funds have been allocated by Central Government for a new hospital for our area. However, to get to this point the Trust has been involved in an enormous amount of work, and we have been greatly helped early on by being able to recruit to the team a very experienced project manager. Just one example of the work our Hospital Trust had to do to demonstrate the case for a new hospital was to quantify the ongoing maintenance and running costs associated with the present buildings quite an exercise in itself. Not only is the insulation poor, with largely single glazing throughout, but as many will know there have been repeated issues with failure of many of the services and some of the older equipment, as well as water and sewage leaks.

New hospitals with ducted air conditioning systems are much better placed to install the latest air purifying systems involving high performance filters and UV sterilisation -the latest building regulations now set down requirements for air quality. With many pandemics arising out of airborne infections, such systems help in minimising spread. When this form of transmission became known as the principle route of transmission during the Covid pandemic, our hospital had to resort to a multiplicity of costly individual, and often noisy, air purifying units located close to patients. When we examine the figures, our hospital trust has the most critical estate maintenance backlog of any trust in the southern region and is the 11th worst in the country! So 'YES' this work has all helped show that we really do urgently need a new hospital.

For those who would like to keep more informed about what is going on behind the scenes, one easy way is to become a member of the Trust; not only does this provide regular monthly updates by the Trust's CEO, but it also enables members to vote for their choice of governor. Governors are publicly elected with the aim of representing the interests of people in their area to the hospital management. To register as a member go to https:// www.hampshirehospitals.nhs.uk/ membership Typically governors have come from a medical background, but with the prospect of the new hospital, could it be time for some to be chosen with a wider range of skills, giving the team of governors a better insight into the detail of the changes ahead and ultimately better input into getting the new hospital that local people need?

Another benefit of Trust membership will be early notice of updates as the programme for a new hospital progresses towards public consultation. The aim of this very extensive

consultation is to listen not only to people's concerns, but to identify areas both needing further work and also of potential hitherto unforeseen opportunities. In addition to the extensive work being undertaken by the Trust, Hampshire County Council, whose remit includes transport, is reviewing how this might be best adapted to fit the big changes being considered.

The NHS is struggling, despite the potential treatments which are currently being developed and the move to more online working with its potential cost savings. It is not that our clinicians are lacking in skills, or that we spend less in the UK than other developed nations, but sadly our health outcomes now put us well down the international league table. Many other developed countries have chosen not to adopt our 'Free at the point of use' approach. Is this something we also should be looking at, perhaps slanted towards those better off, irrespective of age, paying more, with those working and often struggling with the costs of young families, benefitting from a lower NI levy? Might we be more thoughtful with such a change as to how we then use our treasured 'Health Service'?

Probus Hears About the Changing Face of Basingstoke

This was presented as an illustrated talk to the Probus Club of Basingstoke, by Derek Anthony, the Chairman of the Friends of the Willis Museum, which is based in the old town hall in Basingstoke's market square.

People have lived around Basingstoke since the Neolithic period, 4,000 years ago, followed by Iron Age settlements and considerable Roman inhabitations being close to the important Roman town Calleva Atrebatum, known today as Silchester. In its heyday the Roman town had around 10,000 inhabitants and its amphitheatre could accommodate 7,000 spectators.

Following the Roman withdrawal from Britannica the population in the area declined so that as recorded in the Domesday Book of 1086 there were only around 200 people in what is today known as Basingstoke and which it noted had a weekly market. It continued to slowly grow as a market town with the Basingstoke canal, which connected eventually to London via the River Thames, being opened in 1794, having its wharf in the town centre.

By 1823 there were seventeen coaches each day stopping in Basingstoke en route to and from London with six inns catering for the passengers and horses. At the Top of Town, the Wheatsheaf in Winton Square and the Red Lion on London Street still exist. The George in the Market Place is today Zizzis the Italian restaurant. There was a decline this activity following the arrival of the railway in 1839.

Thomas Burberry opened his business in Basingstoke in 1856 with the town having 4,500 people. With his invention of the water-resistant fabric, Gabardine, and then the design of the Trench coat, these formed the basis of a company that is today a worldwide luxury brand.

A little later, in 1898 John Thornycroft built a factory on the western outskirts of the town and started manufacturing steam vans and then petrol driven cars up to 1913. Thereafter the company concentrated making buses and commercial vehicles becoming a major supplier to the British army in both world wars which culminated in the Mighty Antar tank transporter. Vehicle production stopped in 1969.

Much earlier, in 1711, Henry Portal, a Huguenot immigrant, started making paper, initially at Beare Mill in Whitchurch and then from 1718 at Laverstoke Mill in Freefolk. The river Test, a clean chalk stream, ran through the site which was used for the next 200 years for paper making, specifically for bank notes. The company then opened a new paper mill in Overton, along the same waterway, which only ceased production last year.

Laverstoke Mill is today used to produce Bombay Sapphire gin and is a popular tourist attraction.

At the start of WW2, the population of Basingstoke was only 13,000 but this almost doubled to 25,000 by the end of hostilities. With the post war London Overspill plan Basingstoke grew rapidly from the 1960s and today is home to a substantial array of world-famous companies.

These businesses required employees who needed homes which has meant



considerable housing developments, both social and private. This continues apace with much house building to the west of the town close to junction 7 of the M3 motorway. Pressure is on to reduce future developments to allow central services to catch up with the increasing population. Will Manydown ever see the planned four thousand houses?

Basingstoke town centre changed dramatically in these latter years, much to the chagrin of some older residents. There were changes to the highways and the demolition of much of the older properties to make way for a new road system and the new pedestrianised, shopping centre. This was built in three phases, The Walks, The Malls and Festival Place which was opened in 2002.

Today the borough's population is around 186,000 and is the largest settlement in Hampshire without city status. With many employment possibilities, good recreational facilities, two theatres, cinemas, many restaurants and substantial green spaces it is no wonder that in a survey by a national mortgage company, Basingstoke was placed in the top fifty best places to live in the country.

The Borough Council rightly promotes Basingstoke as "Amazingstoke". There are many senior residents who possibly disagree, much preferring the character of the old town.

He said of Nat King Cole's voice: he was the 'best friend a song could ever have'.

Less obviously well-known artists were Sonny Burke, a bandleader and

songwriter who wrote The Lady and The Tramp, sung by Peggy Lee, probably a song we are all familiar with. Jimmy Van Heusen wrote and recorded for Frank Sinatra, 'Come Fly With Me'. We were not denied the wonderful recital of Louis Armstrong (Satchmo)'s "Coloured Waifs' Home" and another, written by Johnny Mercer - "Save the Bones for Henry Jones", a vegetarian, the song


