Editorial

Damage to St Andrew's Church Window

I am sad to report that the stained-glass window behind the altar in St Andrew's church has been damaged. There are several holes in the window and a ball bearing was found inside the church. We therefore believe this damage to have been done on purpose. There was also damage to the outside tap and a downpipe. The damage has been reported to the Police.

The church is not only our place of worship; it is a historical building that has been part of our community for over 900 years. It will require specialist skills to repair the stained glass, and although we are making an insurance claim there will still be a significant cost to the church, which is reliant on donations from the congregation to maintain the church buildings.

The PCC Standing Committee are investigating the possible installation of motion sensitive lights and CCTV to ensure that we have evidence for any future incidents, but this will add to costs.

Could I please ask that villagers walking past the church remain vigilant, and if you notice any nuisance behaviour around the church buildings or the churchyard, please report this to the PCC or the Police on 101. Thank you

#### PARISH COUNCIL

#### **Kiln Farm**

As in last month's Villager the main topic of concern for the Village is the proposed development of Kiln Farm with 350 houses. The Parish Council sincerely hopes that many of you reading this have already sent in your objections to Basingstoke and Deane BC. The Parish Council has also been working with the same consultant for the Neighbourhood Plan to produce a report to support our objections.

If you have not sent your objection as yet – we urge you to do so – its not too late.

At the time of writing we have not had any further details of the possible development of Weybrook Farm – if we do we will let you all know.

As a village we really do not wish to be joined to Basingstoke, to lose our individuality, our community and our identity as a lovely village we are all very happy to live in.

#### **Neighbourhood Plan**

Following the consultation exercise in January, work is nearing conclusion on

the 1st draft of the review of the NP, which is due to be submitted for initial comments to the local planning team at Basingstoke later in April. Once these comments are received & included, the draft plan will be submitted for the Reg 14 consultation stage by the summer, to be followed by further local consultation before its finalised.

We have commissioned and completed specialist reports on landscape/key views and the local gap, heritage and protecting the conservation area, with support from planning consultants ET Planning using Locality grant funding. Local volunteers have produced a wildlife ecology report. A design code is to be produced by AECOM which will accompany the plan, seeking to ensure that future new development is more in keeping with the character of the village. The plan will include stronger policies on heritage, protecting local greenspaces, the landscape and the maintaining the local gap between the village and Basingstoke.

On housing, we are subject to pressure from a number of speculative sites at the moment. We expect that the NP will help to protect the village against speculative development, but much also depends on the selection of major housing sites within the Local Plan by the borough council, which is due out in Autumn this year.

#### **The Kings Coronation**

An event which has not happened for 70 years is about to occur – I am of

course referring to the Coronation of King Charles III on the 6thMay 2023, especially as very few of us remember the last one.

#### The Village extends its warmest Congratulations to our new King and Queen Consort.

On this occasion most of the events are in the Village Hall and in Sherborne's Social Club over the Coronation weekend, the Parish Council having decided not to hold its own events for a number of reasons including affordability and confliction with other organisations.

One Neighbourhood -You may have noticed a number of "One Neighbourhood" signs around the village. The first meetingwas a success with over 60 attending and a few local "road" groups have been set upwhich will run themselves.

It is lovely to hear about that happening, it strengthens our local community atmosphere.

## Camino de Santiago de Compostela (goes through Monk Sherborne!)



The body of Saint James was 'found' buried in northwest Spain about 1200 years ago and has been venerated

ever since - especially in Medieval times and, increasingly, in recent times. A large cathedral was built there and it has now been declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site. 'Santiago' means 'Saint James' in English.

In England, in the year 1121 King Henry I issued an order to build a great royal Abbey in Reading - and it was enormous, becoming one of the largest Abbeys in Europe; however it did take around 200 years to complete. King Henry died on 1st December 1135 and was buried in front of the altar; Thomas Becket consecrated the Abbey in the year 1164 (building still continued). Reading Abbey was confiscated by King Henry VIII in 1539 and used it as a desirable royal residence. Subsequently the Abbey fell into ruins which were heavily used in building defences during the English Civil War when Reading was besieged by Parliamentarian forces

Pamber Priory was first proposed in the year 1110, and it was sufficiently complete for it to be consecrated by Bishop William Giffard in 1128 (note that it is now approaching its 900th anniversary).

The St James Way (the English part of the pilgrim route to Santiago de Compostela) commences at Reading Abbey, comes through Silchester and Bramley and then through Pamber Priory and the footpaths of Monk Sherborne on to Worting and, finally, Winchester and Southampton. Pilgrims could divert to Portsmouth to catch ships for the onward journey to North France or all the way direct to North Spain.





## Sherborne St John History Society



#### **20th CENTURY CORONATIONS**

The local newspaper, then called the Hants &Berks Gazette, reported the festivities held in the villages for the Coronations held in 1902, 1911, 1937 and 1953. Parish Council Minutes also give us some detail.

Planning for King Edward VII's Coronation was fraught with difficulties. Originally planned for 26 June 1902 it had to be postponed due to the King's illness, just 2 days before. An abdominal operation was performed on the King on a table in the music room of Buckingham Palace. While the King was recovering a Service was held on the 26thwhich many of the foreign dignitaries attended. They then went home so the Coronation on 9thAugust was a British only event.

In spite of the delay in proceedings the Gazette reported that in SSJ 'the festivities were not on an elaborate scale, but what was done was done well'. There was a church service which 'was well attended, high and low, rich and poor mingled together to celebrate & thank God for the recovery and crowning of the King.' This was followed by a tea in the Schools for 160 children and then all went to the cricket field for competitive sports – 'a very happy and successful day'.

Local celebrations for the next Coronation, of King George V, in 1911, were much more elaborate. The SSJ School Log book reported that the Schools were closed for a week from 21st June. Funds of £100 were raised and two committees were formed. The Gazette reported that the General Committee was led by Mr Chute of the Vyne and Mr Hammond, the school headmaster. There was a separate Ladies committee.

Invitations were sent to every house. It isn't clear how many workers were given time off, but after a short Service at the cricket ground everyone processed to Vyne Farm where '400 villagers sat down to a meal of roast and boiled beef, roast mutton, salads, bread, cheese, beer and mineral water'. Sports were held at The Vyne and tea was served at 4pm for 650 villagers each of whom were presented with a souvenir mug and plate. It was then the turn of the schoolchildren to put on a show which included Morris dancing. The celebrations ended with the Hook band playing for dancing and a finale of fireworks on the far side of the lake.

We don't have such a detailed account of the 1937 Coronation of King George VI. The celebrations seem to have been confined to a parade of children in fancy dress alongside decorated prams and bicycles walking from the Square to the recreation ground where there were competitive sports, maypole & folk dancing. No mention of food except for chocolate bars given to the children.

There will be a fair number of villagers who can recall the 1953 Coronation. Much effort was put into planning for events to be held on Saturday 6th June. Committees were formed in the preceding September to organise fundraising, entertainment etc. The W.I. was asked to organise the catering. The Parish Council minutes are particularly

detailed. £12 was allocated for souvenir mugs – these were to be given to the 123 children at school by Lady Chute prior to the Coronation. Teas were to be provided for the old people at an expected cost of £25 allowing 2s per head, other adults to be charged. A tea caddy was to be given to old people unable to attend. The football club agreed to organise the sports, Mr Paxton the fireworks and Mrs Lobjoit the community singing. Bramley Camp were asked to arrange for tents and seating. The Basingstoke British Legion band agreed to play.

There was a two day holiday for school children and on the actual Coronation day there was judging for the best decorated house competition. They probably didn't look their best in the dull and wet weather. The main village celebrations were held on the following Saturday which was 'a bright sunny day'. It started at 1pm with a parade of decorated vehicles in Manor Road. Does David Duffin remember winning 1st prize for his bicycle?

In SSJ, as in previous celebrations, there was then a procession from the Square to the recreation ground, where after a short service conducted by the rector, Rev J Vallance, a fancy dress parade was held. Tea was provided then the sports began. Community singing and dancing featured in the evening which culminated with a grand firework display at 10pm followed by a Scouts campfire.

The celebrations were judged as very successful with many volunteers contributing. Mr F Webber as Hon. Sec. was particularly applauded in the parish magazine for his work and enthusiasm.

## Hampshire County Councillor Report Calleva Division

#### Parking and Traffic Management

On 1 April 2023 the responsibility for Parking and Traffic Management services reverted from B&DBCto HCC.

Requests for new parking controls such as yellow lines, disabled parking bays and access protection markings will henceforth be handled directly by the County Council. Yellow lines and other waiting restrictions can be requestedat: traffic.management@hants.gov.uk.

You can now report a parking contravention online on the Hants website. This is apparently proving to be a popular feature. To see this feature please visit our parking pages online.

From 1 April 2023, new on-street residents' parking permits will be digital, rather than paper based, although current permits will remain valid until the date of their expiry. All new permits issued by Hampshire County Council will need to be applied for via MiPermit, which will allow residents to apply through an app, online, or over the telephone.

Responsibility for off-street car parking will remain with the Borough Council except for Durngate Car Park in Winchester which is already managed by the County Council.

#### 2. Budget provides £6m extra funding to pothole repairs

In March the persistent wet weather created further deterioration in road surfaces. This has been frustrating as February was not as bad as forecast and Hampshire Highways were getting on top of the situation following a very wet and freezing January. Let's hope we have a drier month in April! I can assure you that Hampshire Highways are working round the clock to assess, prioritise and fix potholes. Please continue to report road defects on the website, we really appreciate it.

In the Spring Budget on 15 March the Chancellor announced a further

£200m for the National Pothole Fund to help local communities to tackle potholes with £5,954,400 confirmed for Hampshire.

This is welcome additional funding. But the twin challenges of ongoing materials inflation and ongoing severe weather (almost certainly exacerbated by climate change) means that substantial further funding is still needed. We will continue to make the case to Government for further funding and a multi-year settlement.

### 3. Create a Local Nature Reserve

On 20 March 2023 DEFRA and Natural England updated the guidance on declaring a Local Nature Reserve. It is now much easier for Parish Councils to make a declaration. This is a great opportunity for Parish Councils to contribute to Nature Recovery whilst engaging members of the community of all ages in a worthwhile project which leaves a lasting legacy for generations to come.

#### How to declare a local nature reserve:

To declare your site as a LNR, first you should contact Natural England by email: consultations@naturalengland. org.uk or telephone: 0300 060 3900.

You'll be asked to formally declare your LNR by sending a draft declaration document - you can use this declaration document template (MS Word Document, 26 KB). It must be signed by the relevant local authority committees, have a map showing the boundary and a management plan detailing:

- ownership of the land
- any agreements or partnerships
- why the LNR site was chosen
- · aims and objectives
- biodiversity management and environmental education
- community participation, access and visitor management
- costs and funding arrangements

Following the consultation you will be asked to send the final declaration document to Natural England, signed by the relevant local authority committees.





Festival of Transport, Sunday 14th May 2023, Basingstoke Memorial Park
The History of The Festival of Transport



The Festival of Transport has been running in Basingstoke for 30 years. The Festival was originally established by the Thorneycroft Society, set up, by the previous employees, of this major manufacturer of lorries & cars in Basingstoke for over 75 years until it's closure in 1969. Situated where Morrisons is now located, Thorneycroft's manufactured commercial and military vehicles and supplied specialist vehicles for both World War 1 and WW2, 'The Might Antar' used by the military from 1940 as the standard Tank transporter, will be on show at this year's Festival.

Less well-known is Thornycroft's brief foray into car manufacturing, when, from 1903 to 1912, the firm produced high-quality cars at its Basingstoke factory.

For the last 5 years the Festival has been run by Basingstoke Deane Rotary, initially in collaboration with the Thorneycroft Society & Basingstoke & Deane Borough Council but now completely independently, but we still get help and support from the society members.

Over the years the show has grown enormously and is now one of the largest shows in the South of England, not just cars, but all vehicles, buses, lorries, vans and motor bikes, The exhibitor numbers are quite exceptional with some 900 cars, commercial vehicles, tractors and static engines occupying the War Memorial Park, behind the Civic Offices, in the town centre.

Last year in wonderful weather conditions it was estimated that 20,000 people attended over our 5-hour opening period.

## Probus Hears About the History of Newbury Racecourse





Those readers who have not had the pleasure of an exciting day at Newbury Racecourse the talk by Probus Club member David Wickens shed some light on many interesting facets of our local horse racing course.

The Jockey Club, formed in 1750, licensed horse racing and controlled all matters that became known as "the sport of Kings." The first record of racing in the area was in 1805 when heathlands


and country estates of the landed gentry were used, with this style continuing for a century.

The present course was the vision of Kingsclere trainer John Porter, who had fortunate connections with King Edward V11. After several designs had been rejected, finally approval was given by the Jockey Club to build the course mainly to his design. The cost was £57,240 with the first race meeting held in 1905. The course was recognised as having many original features for the owner/trainers, horses, jockeys and members of the public.

During both world wars racing was suspended, however the racecourse played an important role for the military with a variety of uses and especially in WW1 when it was used as a prisoner of war camp for captured German soldiers. Over the years Newbury has had several important Flat and Jump races and is recognised as one of the "Top Ten" courses – attracting many famous horses and jockeys from all over the country to compete for big prize money.

Redevelopment of the racecourse started in 2010 with new facilities financed by the sale of land for housing and apartments on and around the course together with a children's nursery, hotel and gym. The venue is also used for outdoor Pop concerts and was selected as a vaccination centre during the Covid pandemic.

## Basingstoke Festival

Basingstoke Festival will return this summer to bring the best of the local, national and international arts to residents and visitors, running from Friday 23 June until Sunday 9 July.

The free family-friendly festival, based in Basingstoke town centre and across the surrounding borough, will give audiences the opportunity to experience and take part in outdoor dance, circus and street theatre performances in unusual places.

A show which will engage all the senses, *Eau de Memoire* from Francesca Baglione, as Miss High Leg Kick, will be interactive and fun, celebrating the rich experiences and memories evoked by our sense of smell.

The festival will also be supporting home-grown local talent. This includes Proteus Theatre Company performing Shakespeare's *The Tempest* and Fluid Motion premiering a new show *The Greatest Show on Earth*, where audiences will be able to immerse themselves in the natural world to improve wellbeing. Scratchbuilt Productions' *The Fairy Finders Trail* will take audiences through town centre green spaces on a magical adventure and Junk Jodie's new show for children *SEA-TACULAR* will highlight the importance of protecting seas and rivers from plastic pollution.

Leader of Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council Cllr Simon Minas-Bound said: "The festival will span three weekends and offer something for every member of the family.

"With local, national and international acts performing across the borough, it's an opportunity to explore and participate in circus, dance and street theatre on your doorstep. This will be another event that proves Basingstoke and Deane is a great place to live and visit.

## Women's Fellowship

The April meeting Talk was given by Mr Jeff Evans on The Questionable History of the Quiz Show. Mr. Evans is himself a renowned quizzer and question setter, joining in teams alongside such champions as Paul Sinha, Anne Heggarty, from The Chase, and Kevin Ashman and Pat Simmons from Eggheads.

The first quiz show appeared on the BBC in 1938, called Spelling Bee, which was eighteen months before the general quiz show came into being. However, with the onset of World War Two the quiz show was stopped for over seven years when, in 1946, the show was taken across the Atlantic to New York by Alistaire Cook, the wellknown writer and presenter of Letter to America. Back in the UK, London was the main venue and this began to cause problems when would-be contestants from all over the UK wanted to apply but were unable to travel to the studios. Manchester was the first provincial city to host quiz shows and became the Quiz Hub. Jeff Evans gave the (true) story of Bridge End - any wanna-be contestant had to put the front page of the Radio Times in their window on a given day when the TV crew was in town, and a crew member would knock on their

front door and possibly give them a slot on the quiz show.

The 1950's, '60's and 70's saw a huge increase in popularity of these quiz shows, with ITV in fierce competition. An issue the BBC had was the quality of the prizes, or amount of money given away, as it was considered inappropriate to spend the licence-holders' fees on such questionable matters. The ITV and other burgeoning commercial channels did not have this problem as their advertising fees more than covered the ever-sophisticated and expensive prizes.

Quizzes became more and more complex, and the quiz masters had to not only give out the questions but be a general entertainer to keep the studio audiences, radio listeners and television viewers interested. Michael Miles compered Take Your Pick throughout the '60's, until he died in 1971. Eamonn Andrews, Ted Moult and Hughie Green all became popular compères, with shows such as Double Your Money, Name That Tune and Mastermind.

The BBC, ever mindful of the level of prize money, introduced games where the coveted prize was a Trophy - such as University Challenge and Brain of Britain.

Hostesses were introduced in the '60's and provided a stepping-stone for some actors, namely Amanda Barry and Dame Maggie Smith, who both started out as a hostess. One popular hostess was Monica Rose, a London girl who was mischievously outspoken, so much so that she was given her own Guest Hostess slot.

With the millennium came a change in the Quiz Show. Much higher sums of money were on offer, the studio audience was more of a feature and of course women were becoming popular contestants. Judith Kepple was the first person to win £1 million on Who Wants to be a Millionaire, which took two years to be won.

Such is the popularity of the quiz show, they can be accessed any time of the day or night, on a number of channels.

Mr Evans was thanked for his most interesting talk by Pat Burt.

The next meeting on the 2nd May will be a talk on The Amazing World of Magic.

Meetings start at 2pm.


