

From the Pastor's Desk:

It takes some people longer than others to put away their Christmas decorations. I've known some people who pack up Baby Jesus on December 26, and some who don't get around to the task until mid-March.

Either way, it's important for all of us to realize that Baby Jesus grew up. In our worship services since the conclusion of the Christmas *season* (twelve days beginning on December 25 and running through January 5), we have seen the adult Jesus being baptized in the Jordan River by John the Baptizer, and we have encountered him on the beaches of the Sea of Galilee as he called his first disciples.

Soon, we will travel with Jesus into the desert wilderness of Judea where he was tempted to team up with the devil to accomplish the mission for which he had been born. He rebuffed the devil by quoting scripture opposing each tempting proposal. There are no shortcuts to bringing about God's will on the way to the Realm of God.

While we carry Christmas in our hearts all the year 'round, we do move on from our festivities to the serious business of following in Jesus' footsteps. This includes the important matters of the church's Annual Meeting, electing church officers, and planning our mission for the new year.

We are guided and strengthened for our mission by the rhythms of the church's liturgical calendar. On February 18, Ash Wednesday begins the Season of Lent. We tend to stereotype Lent as a harsh period of self-denial — testing our faith by giving up something we enjoy. While 'fasting' is one of Lent's disciplines, it's accompanied by prayer, Bible study, alms-giving (that is, generosity toward charities, especially those that serve the poor), and repentance (which is more than sorrow over our sins, but also taking a new direction in life). These disciplines of Lent are not tests of faith but tools of introspection by which we evaluate the quality of our lives and our devotion to God's loving intentions for us. Through these disciplines, we may emerge from Lent with greater clarity of purpose and deepened resolve to follow the way of Jesus.

Yes, Baby Jesus did grow up. He put away his toys and



Council Meeting

Unapproved Minutes

Meeting was called to order by Moderator Susan. Pastor Barry offered the opening prayer.

The agenda was approved without change or additions. Darlene moved to approve the minutes and Deb Kuhn seconded the motion. Motion carried unanimously.

FINANCIAL REPORT: Office Manager Joann Boggs reported a shortfall and had to seek funds from the Davis Fund to pay the bills. Joann noted this happens quarterly when the property insurance bill is due. Other than that we are going along fairly well. Joann told Council she was pleased to see how close our income came to meeting the budget in 2025. Good work.

PASTORS REPORT: Pastor Barry reported he continues to call on elders and is happy to report that Kass is now able to come with him. Open House at the parsonage is planned on January 17, from 2-4.



GROUP & COMMITTEE REPORTS: Endowment report from Susan noted the balance in the account on 12/31/25, was \$40,582.26. Office Manager Joann noted there needs to be a change when money is withdrawn so it goes directly to the building fund not to the general fund. Pat Walker suggested the Endowment people meet in a special meeting following the Council meeting.

FIDELS GROUP REPORT: Darlene reported the Christmas Tea had good attendance but the Tea time following was not so good. Fidelis folks are giving thoughts about going forward.

No Memorial Committee report.

There was no Old Business.

Under New Business Joann Boggs told Council the property insurance has increased for 2026. Increase was from \$8500 to \$10,220. The budget that was approved at the Budget meeting will need to be adjusted to show this increase. This need will be addressed at the Annual Meeting on January 25, 2026.

SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE has been in touch and will meet when there are requests for scholarship funds. There was a discussion about Church use for graduation parties. John Henderson made a motion NOT to charge our church families for church use for a graduation party. Mike Murphy seconded, motion carried.

SAFETY PLAN for our church was presented by Mike and John.

Details such as bar locks, exit signs, knowledge of location of fire extinguishers and other items were discussed. Mike reiterated this is a living document and subject to change whenever necessary. Mike will boil this writing down and present such as an overview which he hopes to provide to the congregation on Sunday, January 18th. Mike and John hope this plan is ready for approval or amendment and approval at the Congregational Meeting on January 25th.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE reported that Phyllis Boggs has accepted the nominations for position of Vice-Moderator for our Church Council. Phyllis was in attendance and the Council welcomed her and thanked her for stepping up to this role. Blessings Phyllis.




Heart attacks affect women differently


Women may experience different symptoms than men. These include pain in the back, arm, neck, or shoulder; nausea; fatigue; shortness of breath; and vomiting.

MINUTES OF 146TH ANNUAL MEETING CUSTER COMMUNITY CHURCH JANUARY 25, 2026

The meeting was called to order by Moderator Susan Merchen. A quorum was declared and Pastor Barry offered prayer.

The unapproved minutes of the 145th Annual Meeting were approved as presented. Motion to approve by Joann Boggs, second by Darlene Bergeron, motion carried.

The unapproved minutes of the Annual Budget meeting were approved as presented on motion by Pat Walker, second by John Henderson, motion carried.

Moderator Susan declared all reports were included in this annual report and were there for all to read. She did not offer to read them to the attendees.

There was no Old Business to come before the group, so discussion moved to new business.

Under new business Joann Boggs noted the need to adjust the budget to note the increase in property insurance rates. The budget had been approved using prior year insurance premium. After approval of the budget at the November 16, 2025 using the current premium amount, the church was notified of an increase in premium. Mary Myers offered a motion to increase that line item in the budget to reflect the new premium amount. Darlene Bergeron seconded the motion. Motion carried.

NEW BUSINES: John Henderson led a discussion of a Safety Plan that has been in the works for some time. As John and other committee members explained other thoughts came to the surface and nothing was really accomplished. Kathy Johnson moved that all members review the plan that was provided and share those thoughts with committee members. John Henderson seconded Kathy's motion and it passed unanimously. There will be more on this item later. It does need to be noted that Mike Murphy was the original architect of this plan and has worked

diligently on incorporating new thoughts. Pat Walker noted that this writing is very fluid and is subject to change if change is needed.

The slate of new Council Members and terms of office as noted in the Annual Report booklet were presented by Moderator Susan. Nancy Smith moved to approve, Kathy Johnson seconded and the motion carried.

Endowment Committee members who will serve new terms were presented with terms of office. They were approved as presented. It was noted that the Endowment Committee elects its own officers.

Delegates to conference and Black Hills Association were presented and approved by unanimous vote.
