Officer Espejo,

Actually, the longer the case remains open, the more we enjoy the calm before we will have to deal with the next wave of Yax's unique communications, however, please forgive the delay, one of my staff has been out of the office (surgery) so my clinical hours have gone up to over 100 this past week.

During our meeting, you stated Yax claimed that he is still owed compensation for a month's worth of work he performed for our company. Again, for the record, that never happened, and we are arguing many if not most of his assignments were never completed - not a matter of quality of work, but literally never performed. Please understand, Yax could not remember yesterday ... so meetings and verbal discussions were a waste of time. I ultimately made sure he entered everything into his daily log ... a diary ... then when I referenced the task, discussion, etc., I had to reference the date in his log so he could look it up to see that he had indeed been assigned the task. A very sad situation and not an effective working mode for a medical clinic.

When I was in law school, it was a criminal felony to make false claims on a criminal complaint.

Attached are 3 documents:

#1: The bank records reflective of the payments to Yax. The timing and payment amounts are reflective of his requests and the timing of the terms (\$3,400/month contracted compensation - if he showed up for work on regular business days - he missed 3 working days in the 2nd month).

#2: Also, the letter I sent to Yax's attorney. I cringe at the thought that we may file both criminal and civil cases against Yax and his mother. We generally take the high road on such issues to "just be done" with the situation, but Yax is certainly a special case. Speaking as a medical researcher and someone who has dealt with him over the past several months, I am concerned that this man should not be on the street without formal social/medical oversight. A 25 year cocaine addiction results in profound changes in brain chemistry.

#3: Research Paper on cocaine addiction. The following is an excerpt...

"One of the primary mechanisms of cocaine action is its ability to block presynaptic dopamine transporters which results in an increase in dopamine levels in the synaptic cleft resulting in euphoria and reinforcement of the administration of cocaine. Once the dopamine transporters are blocked by cocaine, most of the dopamine in the synaptic cleft cannot be recycled via reuptake. Consequently, long-term repeated cocaine exposure inhibits dopamine transporters and consequently causes depletion of dopamine concentration and dysregulation of dopamine signaling in the brain. Neurochemical actions of cocaine also lead to an increase or a decrease in intracellular activities,

especially the synthesis and degradation of phospholipids, in the reward-related brain regions which are associated with learning and memory. These changes in the brain might contribute to the deficit of brain functions observed including memory and cognition loss."

I will forward more supporting documents ASAP.
