

Talking with Amanda, I learned that this session does not have a lead and may be eliminated from the schedule next year if no one steps forward. Over the last several years attendance has dropped for several reasons but I, for one, hate to see it end completely. So, my thought was to bring it up and see what others think. 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Studying Swimming

Recently a couple stopped in to inquire about hearing aids. They had read many articles online. Well, he had read many articles online. He read about hearing tests, different models, and various manufacturers.

The only way to appreciate all the technology in the little device is to try one.

Get a hearing test and then demo a hearing aid.

Will it be perfect? Likely, not. Was the first time you jumped into swim perfect? Likely, not.

Only by trying hearing aids will you appreciate the algorithms that allow you to hear at frequency adjustments in real time. Hearing aids aren't about making everything louder. Hearing aids only increase the specific frequencies that you struggle with. This is why a current hearing test is necessary. We need to fit your loss. We need to help you, and only you, hear your best.

I had a great conversation about the latest technology, but that still didn't help him hear any better when they got in the car.

- © Air Pump Air for vehicle tires is located at the back of the Resort, at the Dump Station. We do not supply a gauge.
- Bulletin Board Any notices to be posted must be brought to the Office. Please use a 3"x5" index card to list items for sale/rent. All other notices must be appropriate size. Bulletin boards are located throughout the Boardwalk and at the Recreation hall and Clubhouse.
- © **Campfires** No Ground Fires are permitted. Above the ground covered fire containers are permitted. If it is an extremely dry season, the Office will post notices regarding campfires
- Canoes/Kayaks They are available at no cost. They are located across from site 67 on the Outer Circle. To sign them out bring your driver's license to the Office. We will hold your license for you to pick up after returning them. Paddles and life jackets are available in the locked shed by the canoes & kayaks. You must be 18-years-old or older or accompanied by a parent to use the canoes & kayaks. There is a 2-hour limit for usage and they are available from 9:00 a.m. 4:30 p.m. daily.
- © **Kayak Racks** To utilize the kayak racks you must sign a contract at the office and lock your kayak on the assigned spot. Any canoes/kayaks found unaccounted for may be disposed of.
- © Laundry Room Located at the Clubhouse. No cash accepted. Credit/Debit card required for use.

- © Car & Boat Wash There is a car, RV and boat wash located by the Maintenance Shop, available on a first-come, first-serve basis
- © Dump Station An RV Dump Station is located in the back of the Resort near the Maintenance Shed.
- © **Emergency Shelter Information Please** check the Bulletin Boards on the Boardwalk and Clubhouse, or our Facebook page for Sarasota County Emergency Shelter Locations. There is an evacuation plan for viewing available at the Office.
- Faxes and Copies The Office will fax your document(s) with a cost of \$1.50 for the first page and \$.50 for each additional page. Please notify the Office if you will be receiving a fax. Incoming faxes are \$.15 per page. Copies are \$.02 for black & white and \$.10 for color.
- © **Fitness Center** The Fitness Center is located on the Boardwalk. You must be 18-years-old or older to use the center. The entry code is with your arrival documents.
- Garbage and Recycling Center The garbage compactor and recycling containers are located at the back of the Clubhouse. We recycle cardboard, newspaper, plastic jugs and clear plastic bottles and glass. Plastic bags do not go into the recycling containers. Please break down all boxes and follow posted directions for the disposal of trash. *This area is only for trash; not furniture, appliances, tires, batteries, etc.* For large items, etc. you can take them directly to the Sarasota County Landfill. It is located at 4000 Knights Trail Rd., Nokomis 34275. Call for their daily hours 941-861-1573.
- © Ice It is available at the Office during business hours for the cost of \$2 for a 10-pound bag.
- Internet Café Located on the Boardwalk. A computer is available to use or bring your laptop for complimentary Wi-Fi. Entry codes are in your welcome packet.
- Mailroom Please verify that your site # is on your incoming mail to prevent any delays. Also, please make sure that your name is listed on the mail; if a package/letter is addressed to Grandma/Grandpa/Pet's name/Etc., your mail may not be delivered. As a courtesy, we do our very best to deliver the mail promptly. Should you desire to obtain your mail at the local post office, the information needed is: Nokomis Post Office; Laurel Rd., Nokomis, FL Rates at the Nokomis Post Office vary from \$17 for 3-months to \$400 for 12-months, variable by the size of your box. Caller service is also available.
- Pavilion The pavilion is a large covered area that is available for picnics, parties, etc. for big groups of our guests. Electricity is available. Sign up on the ONE-TIME ACTIVITIES sheet in the Lounge and give it to the Activities Director.
- Paws Park Pets are welcome, but ALL cats and dogs must be leashed at all times when outside of the Paws Park. Owners MUST pick up after their pets. No pets should be left unattended or tied up outside. No fences or playpens allowed. Pets are not permitted in activity buildings (i.e. Clubhouse, Rec Hall, etc.) pool area or in the bathrooms/showers. Paws Park is open from 8 a.m. – 10 p.m. daily and is located behind the car wash. Pets should not be an annoyance – i.e. "Excessive barking" and unleashed.

Wherever you are, whatever you are doing during this spring and summer season, may all good things come your way. I look forward to "working with you" again in the Fall and winter seasons.



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

Sarasota County Emergency Management Storm Information

The City of Venice held a Hurricane Expo at the end of May. More updates will be provided beginning in June (No major changes expected). Last year at the expo, one speaker noted that we should understand that the damaged caused in our area was not technically caused by a hurricane, but a tropical storm. The top sustained winds recorded here were 74 mph. Though Irma made the top 5 in regard to severity in the 99-storm history of Florida (5th), it was only among the 3 percent of storms that we are estimated to have received over recorded history versus the thirty percent chance the east coast of Florida has of being hit.

PLEASE NOTE it is intentional that there are NO shelters in Venice. Shelters can only be placed in areas that will not suffer catastrophic flooding in the case of a direct hit. It is also NOT recommended to evacuate vertically, as in if you are in a high rise moving to higher floors traps you. In the case of medical emergencies, you have no chance of getting help. Below you will see a list of all the approved shelters for the 2019 Season. All shelters will be pet friendly, BUT you must understand and comply will all requirements (also listed below). Another important thing to do as a hurricane season guest (Any time between June 1 – Nov. 30) is to register for CODE RED. Sarasota County utilizes the CodeRED Notification System - an ultra-high-speed telephone communication service - for emergency notifications. This system allows us to send critical communications to all or targeted areas within the county in case of a situation that requires immediate action. Visit SCGOV.NET and it is located under utilities or you can use the search on the site.

MEDICAL NEEDS PROGRAM

About the program- Sarasota County residents with qualifying medical needs are encouraged to apply for registration as a medicallydependent person (MDP). How to Apply: Submit an application to Sarasota County Emergency Management. Two ways to submit applications: If you only need transportation to an evacuation center complete the located online at https://scgovmedicalneeds.formstack.com/forms/transportation_dependent_registration.

- 1. Complete the *Medically-Dependent Person online app*. Located at https://intwebs2ext.scgov.net/em_forms/ (online applications will stop being accepted at 60 hours prior to expected impact of storm).
- 2. Complete a paper application and fax or mail it to emergency management. This method may delay the processing of your app.(paper applications will stop being accepted at 120 hours prior to expected impact storm.)

BEFORE YOU GO TO A CENTER:

- Locate the water shut-off valve for your residence. The valve is generally on the side of the house nearest the water meter/backflow prevention device or may be inside the garage. Turn the valve to the off position. This will help minimize damage to the interior of your home should a pipe burst.
- Follow the manufacturer's recommendations for turning off your water heater and unplug/switch off the circuit breaker.
- Place an ice cube or two in a sealed plastic bag or small container in the freezer. If the ice cube has melted down from its original shape by the time you return, you'll know the power was off for an extended period and that you should throw out any food.
- Remove loose items, decorative and otherwise, outside the house and in the yard, and place them inside. Even the smallest item becomes a dangerous weapon.
- Alert friends/ family members of your plans and how to contact you (or have an emergency buddy, like a neighbor that you trade plans/info)

Sarasota County Emergency Management Storm Information Cont.

WHAT TO BRING:

- Flashlight (in case your center loses power).
- Your insurance, Medicare or Medicaid cards, driver license or photo I.D.

ENCORE

- Your children's immunization and other important health and insurance records.
- Each family member's medications, along with dosage information and physician's contact information.
- Snacks or special foods.
- Bedding and pillows.
- Book or electronic entertainment items with headphones and chargers.
- Change of clothing.
- Personal hygiene items (including toilet paper).
- Games/comfort items for children.

• Drinking water.

Be sure to label (name and phone number) all equipment and belongings. This will help you receive your items if lost or left behind at the evacuation center. Before you leave your home be sure to leave your answering machine on or a porch light on to make it easier to determine if your electric has been restored.

Assemble a Portable Pet Disaster Supplies Kit:

Whether you are away from home for a day or a week, you will need essential supplies to care for your pet. Keep items in an accessible place and store them in sturdy containers that can be carried easily (duffle bags, covered trash containers, etc.). Your pet disaster supply kit should include:

- · Medications and medical records (stored in a waterproof container) and a first aid kit.
- Sturdy leashes, harnesses, and/or carriers to transport pets safely and ensure that your animals cannot escape.
- Photo of you and your pet(s) in the event you are separated from your pet, having an updated photo with your pet will help validate pet ownership.
- Food, potable water, bowls, cat litter/pan, and can opener.
- Information on feeding schedules, medical conditions, behavior problems, and the name and number of your veterinarian in case you must foster or board your pets.
- Pet beds and toys, if easily transportable.

Note from Edward McCrane, SRQ Emergency Management Chief EM-1: Please share this with your guests. I typically do not worry about the evacuation level for mobile home and RV parks because they are all automatically part of level A and <u>must</u> evacuate. But the proximity to Shakett Creek and the fact that the property is also in primary level A evacuation zone gives everyone *even more* reason to evacuate.
