Moving on to Perfection: The Bride of Christ

Lesson 1 For week ending April 5, 2025

As members of The Church of God, we are called to a higher purpose, to be the Bride of Christ. This divine calling requires us to strive for perfection, preparing ourselves for the marriage of the Lamb. Our journey towards perfection is guided by obedience and the leading of the Holy Spirit. Let us explore what is required to reach this goal and how we can support one another in this sacred endeavor.



Key Text: *"Let us go on unto perfection; not laying again the foundation of repentance from dead works, and of faith toward God"* (Hebrews 6:1).

1. Obedience to God's Word is Essential for Perfection.

- Obedience to God's Word is the foundation of our journey towards perfection (Revelation 14:4). As we align our lives with the teachings of the Bible, we become more like Christ. Part 1: Running the Race with Endurance

Lesson 2 For week ending April 12, 2025

As we embark on our journey of faith, we are reminded that we are part of a long-distance relay race, carrying the baton of God's Word passed down through generations. The writer of Hebrews encourages us to run with endurance, keeping our eyes on Jesus, the champion who initiates and perfects our faith. Let's explore how we can run this race with endurance and pass the baton to the next generation.



Key Text: *"Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith. For the joy set before him, he endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God"* (**Hebrews 12:1-2 NIV**).

1. We are surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses who have run the race before us.

- The writer of Hebrews lists many individuals who lived by faith, such as Abel, Enoch, Noah, Abraham, Sarah, Jacob, Joseph, Moses, Rahab, Gideon, Samson, David, Samuel, and others. These individuals are part of a *"huge crowd of witnesses"* who have run the race before us and now await its completion (Hebrews 11:39-40). We have had many men and women of God who have run faithfully in the history of The Church of God. Discuss what this passage says about this race and the concept that it will not be complete without us. This should inspire us to run in our day with endurance to finish the race.

2. We must throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles.

- Just as runners strip off unnecessary weights to run more efficiently, we must rid ourselves of anything that hinders our spiritual progress. Sin can easily entangle us and slow us down, so we must be vigilant in identifying and overcoming it (Colossians 3:8-10). What are some things in your own life that may be hindering your spiritual progress? We must each embrace the importance of our part in the race and not let anything hinder us from running.

3. We must run with perseverance, the race marked out for us.

- The race of faith requires perseverance and endurance, as it is not a sprint but a long-distance journey. We must stay focused on the path God has set before us and not be discouraged by obstacles or setbacks (James 1:2-4). Even though there are times when we are weary, we must keep running. In perseverance there is great reward. Consider the importance of your continual connection to the Lord in this race as you read Philippians 4:13 and Galatians 6:9.

4. The race is won by fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith.

- Jesus is our ultimate example and source of strength as we run the race of faith. By keeping our eyes on Him, we can endure hardships and remain steadfast in our faith (Philippians 3:13-14). We want to see forward momentum. This happens as we daily run the race with faithfulness looking to the Lord Jesus Christ for strength and inspiration. In what ways can you keep your eyes fixed on Jesus in your daily life?

Part 2: Passing the Baton to the Next Generation

Lesson 3 For week ending April 19, 2025

As we continue our journey of faith, it is essential to remember that we are not running this race alone. We are part of a relay team, and our responsibility is to pass the baton of God's Word to the next generation. There will be a generation that runs the final leg of the race, bringing it to completion. Let's explore how we can effectively pass on our faith and ensure that the next generation is equipped to run their race.



Key Text: *"These commandments that I give you today are to be on your hearts. Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up" (Deuteronomy 6:6-7 NIV).*

1. We must teach God's commandments diligently to our children.

- In The Church of God, we have been blessed with great understanding of many of the great treasures of the Bible. It is our responsibility to pass on the knowledge and inheritance of God's Word to the next generation. We must be intentional in teaching and modeling God's commandments in our daily lives (Proverbs 22:6). In a relay race there is a time at which both runners run together. It is a careful passing of the baton so the next runner can carry on (II Timothy 3:14-15). Talk about this important transition in the race and the important part both runners play in the continued success of the race.

2. We must talk about God's Word in every aspect of our lives.

- God's Word should be a constant topic of conversation in our homes, workplaces, and communities. By integrating God's Word into our daily lives, we create an environment where faith can flourish (Joshua 1:8). This is the reason God chose Abraham to be the father of nations; it was due to his unwavering faith and obedience, and because God knew that Abraham would teach his children and household to follow the way of the Lord (Genesis 18:19). In what ways can you make God's Word a central part of your daily conversations and activities, and how can you actively mentor and encourage the next generation in their faith journey?

3. We must model a life of faith and obedience to God.

- Our actions speak louder than words, and we must live out our faith in a way that inspires others. By demonstrating a life of obedience to God, we set an example for the next generation to follow (Philippians 3:17, I Timothy 4:12). Notice that Paul encouraged Timothy, at a young age to carry on as an example of the faith.

4. We must encourage and mentor the next generation in their faith journey.

- It is essential to provide support, guidance, and encouragement to the next generation as they run their race. By mentoring and investing in their spiritual growth, we help them develop a strong foundation of faith (II Timothy 2:2). Mentoring allows us to share our experiences, wisdom, and lessons learned, ensuring that they are well-equipped to face the challenges of life. It fosters a sense of community and belonging, reinforcing the idea that we are all part of God's family. Moreover, it helps build their confidence and resilience, enabling them to stay steadfast in their faith. How can you actively mentor and encourage the next generation in their faith journey?

1. We must run with purpose and discipline.

Such fulfillments serve as a testament to God's ongoing work and divine orchestration throughout history. Prophecies may also have spiritual fulfillment as is the case with the restoration of the Temple as a type of the restoration of the Church (Acts 15:13-17, I Peter 2:5).

4. Testing and Applying Prophetic Messages

- All prophetic messages must be tested against the Word of God and the guidance of the Holy Spirit to ensure the church remains true to God's will and avoids false prophecies. I Thessalonians 5:20-21 and I John 4:1 emphasize the importance of discernment, urging believers to test all prophecies to maintain the church's mission and teachings. Prophecy guides the church in living according to God's will. When applied to our lives, prophetic messages can help us grow spiritually and fulfill our divine purpose. Believers should use their prophetic gifts in accordance with their faith, contributing to the church's overall growth and edification (Romans 12:6-8). Encourage one another and pray together for these gifts to be given throughout the church, seeking God's movement and guidance in your local congregation.

- The writer of Hebrews expresses frustration with believers who remain spiritually immature and need to be taught basic principles repeatedly. Mature Christians should be able to discern right from wrong and apply God's Word to their lives. It's like learning to ride a bike; once you master the basics, you can explore new paths and adventures. How can we move beyond the basics of our faith and embrace deeper understanding and application of God's Word (Hebrews 6:1-3)?

2. Spiritual maturity is not determined by physical age.

2. Rest as a Time for Renewal:

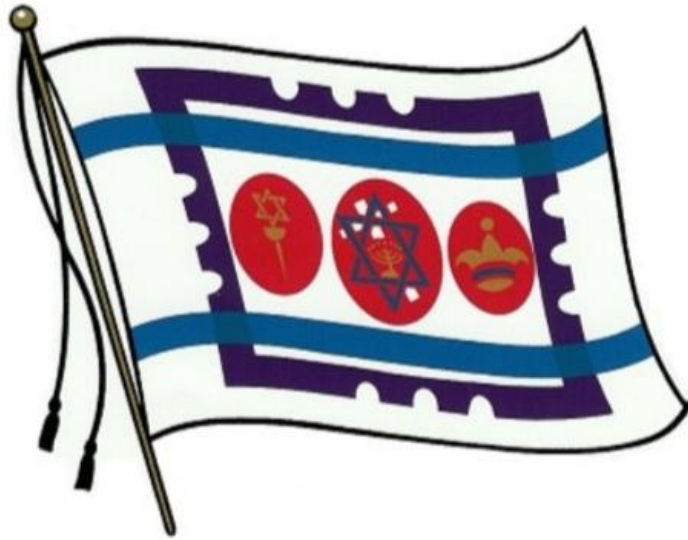
