Making a Difference

One of the University's more high profile alumnae has been back in the news with her recent appointment to the presidency of the Metropolitan Planning Council. Jean Allard, who was made an honorary member of the UCWBG in November 1990, retired her partnership at Sonnenschein, Nath & Rosenthal (where she was the firm's first female partner) to take on the challenges of this new opportunity.

It would appear that challenge is what Jean Allard thrives on. She looks upon this position as a new learning experience and hopes to be tackling such public policy issues facing the greater Chicago region as transportation, housing, health care, clean air, and solid waste disposal. Her action plan calls for a great deal of coalition building in order to accomplish her goals.

While this may seem like a lot to take on for someone who has already accomplished so much in the legal profession, Allard "cannot fathom not working." In fact, she claims that without the responsibility of work, she would run out of things to do in two weeks.

Allard feels that much of her success has come from bringing the right attitude towards business situations. She advises, "don't take yourself so seriously" and also stresses the importance of responding with enthusiasm to any new opportunity or task.

In addition to a positive outlook, there have also been role models and sponsors who have aided in Allard's success. They have shown her that there are choices available to women, if women but look for them, and that women can strive to do whatever they want as long as they are willing to risk new circumstances.

Allard believes that we should seek out those people who will not hold us back. We should continue to search for challenge and new experiences. Her final piece of advice is "There is no traffic jam on that extra mile." ♪

U of C Highlights

President Bush presented the Medal of Freedom, the nation's highest civilian honor, to University of Chicago President Hanna Gray and nine others, including former First Lady Betty Ford, retired House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill, and baseball great Ted Williams, on Monday, November 18, 1991. Bush said the ten "have enriched our nation, whether as leaders of popular movements, as friends of the common man, or as intellectual giants."

The citation for Gray's award stated "as historian and humanist, teacher and university leader, (she) has assured that young generations learn the fundamentals of our civilization—truths that never bend to fashion."

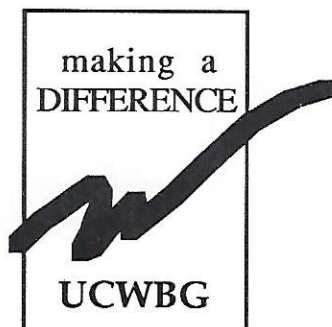
Another recipient was a former University of Chicago professor, Friedrich August Von Hayek, an economist and author of the book *The Road to Serfdom*. ♪

Help Available for Businesses

Want to do something about the unemployment rate in Illinois? You can—by referring companies in difficulty to the Chicagoland Enterprise Center. The CEC is a not-for-profit organization funded by the Civic Committee of The Commercial Club of Chicago. Its mission is to provide pro bono consulting services to companies where job retention and/or job creation may be at stake. Volunteer consultants are drawn from the ranks of the Chicago business community—large and small corporations, accounting firms, consulting firms, law firms, and banks—and are assigned to a client based on the company's specific need(s).

The simplest way to identify potential candidates for the Center's services is to ask the open-ended question "How's business?" of any small business person with whom you come in contact. Suppliers to the company you work for are one group to consider. The independent businesses in the neighborhood where you live are another: the grocer, butcher, dry cleaner, restaurant, printer, contractor, etc. If you are a banker, the businesses you reject as borrowers may be candidates for the Center's services.

Job Search—1990s Style

On January 8, UC2MC hosted an informative event titled "Career Survival in the '90s." The workshop format was targeted to those people currently seeking employment as well as those anticipating doing so in the near future.

The panel consisted of: John Kendzior, professional recruiter for The First National Bank of Chicago; Mike Lynch, partner, Lynch Miller Moore, Inc., an executive recruitment firm; and Kitty Voss, president, The Voss Group, a career counseling and outplacement firm.

While each of the panelists had different perspectives on the job search process, the three areas they all stressed were:

- Know yourself: what you want to do, where, what size company, and at what price.
- Understand the company and its culture. This is at least as important as a match between your skills and those required for the job.
- Networking is the key to success. Suggestions included using the university's Career Resource Center and contacting U of C alumni to ask for introductions to your targeted companies. In today's environment, mailing of

unsolicited resumes was strongly discouraged.

When working with recruiters, it is important to know if they are working on retainer or contingency. Recruiters on retainer have more influence on the final decision and have a long-term interest in a successful match. It was also recommended that you work with as many as possible since they rarely compete for the same position. Recruiters are the most effective when you are honest with personal information, including current salary. Good recruiters will know when you are stretching the truth, which will only hurt your credibility.

However, in dealing with companies directly, the rule of thumb is: he who brings up money first loses. If an interviewer asks how much you are making, you should tactfully avoid answering. One response would be to defer the question until both sides have determined there is a fit.

Finally, while it is better to look for a job while employed, the current environment has significantly reduced the stigma of being unemployed. Many companies are hiring—it's just a matter of finding the one that's right for you. ♪

Coming from the south: Take I-94 north and exit at Dundee Road; drive west one block to Skokie Boulevard, then north (turn right) on Skokie to #240 which is on the west side of the street about one block south of Lake-Cook Road.

Coming from the north: Take I-94 south and exit at IL 43 (Waukegan Road) and drive south on Waukegan to Dundee Road (first light), then east (left turn) on Dundee to Skokie Boulevard (about two to three miles). Turn north (left) onto Skokie and proceed to #240 on the west side of the street.

Coming from the northeast: Take U.S. 41 south and exit at Lake-Cook Road. Drive west (less than one block) to Skokie Boulevard, then south about one block to #240 on the west side (your right) of the street. ♪

In terms of a blueprint for the future, several themes emerged.

- *Develop an outward focus.* There was a strong sentiment that the greatest opportunities for the group lie in looking outward or focusing on a broader activity or "cause." This would lead to greater prominence for the group, and would enhance the UCWBG's effectiveness in providing its traditional benefits; e.g., networking, mutual support, education.
- *Give something back.* Successful people and organizations want structured ways to give something back to the community. There is considerable interest in this in the corporate world and it could be the draw to attract and keep more senior members.

- *Add sizzle.* The UCWBG is a group of energetic, diverse, intelligent women affiliated with the University of Chicago's Graduate School of Business, one of the premier graduate institutions in the world. This message needs to be conveyed in ways (in our mission, in marketing materials, in the media, in every communication) that make people want to become associated with this group of dynamic women.

A wide variety of ideas on how to accomplish these objectives were discussed. Several ideas were further refined by a subgroup of the advisory board and UCWBG President Diane Dahl in subsequent weeks.

Bottom line: the advisory board members felt strongly that developing an external focus to complement our internal programs is a viable long-term strategy for attracting women of power to (and back to) the group. We hope you all agree and will support our efforts in 1992 to position the UCWBG as a sophisticated women's alumni organization with the ability and desire to also give something back... to make a difference. ♀

Eat and Meet at the CHIC

About sixty members and guests attended the 1991 networking dinner held at the Cooking and Hospitality Institute of Chicago on November 7. Members were able to watch their dinner being made through a large glass window while they talked. Tables were set up by industry to enable members to talk to others interested in their field of work or to explore possible areas of employment.

Leslie Abrams, a doctoral student in counseling education at Fordham Univer-

sity in New York, described the survey she prepared addressing the effects of nontraditional career choices of women. The purpose of the study is to look at the question: As roles increase, does distress increase? Specifically, there seems to be a need to examine the effects of multiple roles for women who work in professions which are not traditional for women. There are four questionnaires to be filled out, taking approximately thirty minutes. The responses will be kept confidential

and anonymous. The information from this research may be presented at professional meetings or published in professional journals, without personal identifiable data. Copies of the results will be made available when the study is completed.
