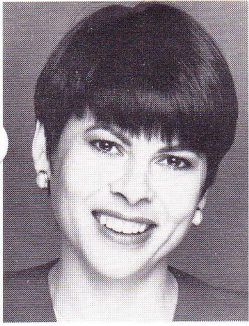

Tales from the Workplace Special Assignment

Special work assignments usually offer special experiences. Like the time I cooked new hamburger sandwiches as part of a promotion for a fast food chain or ran catering triage behind the scenes of a professional golf tournament. These out-of-the-office jobs opened my eyes to real assembly-line production and the unglamorous side of glamorous events.

My most recent special assignment was no less special. Unlike previous experiences, this assignment wasn't part of my career-development. This assignment was part of life development. After my stroke-impaired Mother fell and broke her kneecap I filled in as a health aide on the special needs floor of an assisted-living facility.

By 9 a.m. I promised to never complain about my real job again. Ever try to dress someone who is wheelchair bound? What about moving someone in a leg cast from bed to chair, comfortably? How do you convince your Mother you know what you're doing after you've fallen on top of her during transfer?

The facility's breakfast routine was anything but. Staff moved people to seats. Residents moved seats. I helped Mom eat, cut Eileen's bacon, and filled juice glasses.

Lunch tested my integrity. I couldn't pretend Mom's plate of pureed cheeseburger and fries looked or might taste good. Mom taught me never to lie so I had to agree with her decision to reject the plate. She also taught me not to be greedy but her limp smile indicated she didn't care if I bent the rules by snaring an extra butterscotch pudding dessert that day.

The noon bell chimed and lunch was over. Over at noon. The afternoon loomed with nothing to do but what I could invent to do. I haven't had down time on the job in years. What would we do?

I quickly brainstormed. The ice cream social? Yes, but that was three hours away. Go back to the room and look at family photos. Again? No, it upset her when she didn't remember people and upset me when we had to play the dead or alive game. We could take a spin around the floor. Too dangerous. My wheelchair steering abilities were not up to snuff for any serious touring. Elizabeth's slipper-clad feet were proof of that.

Then, just when I was ready to convince myself that Mom needed a nap, Naomi invited us to her house for some music. Holding Mom's leg at a 90 degree angle to her body, I parallel parked the wheelchair into a prime spot by the television in the activity lounge. Holding on to the pillow supporting her leg she said, "This is fun." Wiping sweat off my upper lip and noticing it was only quarter past noon, I questioned her concept of fun.

Naomi loaded Lawrence Welk into the VCR and we were transported to a musical tribute to Cole Porter. Mom, whom I've never known to sing or dance, started to hum and tap her cast bound toes in the air. Naomi knew all the lyrics and conducted her audience like a choir.

I sang along during the second viewing of the tape, that is when I wasn't helping Sam find his room, stopping Steve from setting off the alarm or dancing with Agnes. During the third viewing I settled into a great conversation with Frank about his days in the RAF. Frank said I was scrumptious. Mom told him to go away.

Post ice cream, bingo, dinner and another sing-a-long, my brother relieved me. Mom asked when I'll be back to work tomorrow. I must work in another city tomorrow, I explained. She assured me: "You can work here, they'll let you." I'm sure they would, but I'm not sure I could handle it. I tell her I don't work here, I just visit. She's not fooled and neither am I. What I did was work—work of a special kind for the most grateful of clients.

ly stressed principles, pragmatics, and attitude. She shared details on some of her client relationships.

After an early career as a food chemist, Ms. Gucwa launched Technology Management Associates as a paper-based secondary research provider, focusing on technical and marketing areas. She sought to develop long-term client relationships and provide conceptual analysis and strategy.

Joanne provided three guiding principles to building a successful business: 1. use tech tools; 2. extend one's reach; and 3. remember that quality is a seven letter word.

In terms of technology, Ms. Gucwa uses e-mail to reduce her firm's international phone and fax charges by over 90 percent while dramatically facilitating remote collaboration. She found e-mail invaluable for remote collaboration on a recent rush project. E-mail enabled near instantaneous exchange of text ready for revision and "live" spreadsheets ready for further "what-if?" analysis. Joanne favors investing in high tech tools such as communication, software, and hardware, to leverage expensive human labor. She prices on a project basis rather than on an hourly billing basis in order to realize cost efficiencies of superior technology.

Joanne extended Technology Management's reach by going cross-industry, cross-application, and cross-border. With clients on five continents, Joanne encouraged seminar participants to seek international business. She noted that some foreign countries and clients value technology and market knowledge more than US firms. Responding to concerns from attendees about not knowing foreign languages, Joanne stressed the preponderance of English on the Internet and in business.

Understanding that quality is a seven letter word means accurate communication with the client. Quality also means delivering value to the client in a responsive yet independent manner, developing multiple resources to execute projects, assuming one's role as educator with the client, partnering with the client and collaborators, and being true to one's self.

Clearly ethics and a sense of self are important to Joanne Gucwa. She mentioned that her firm will not engage in industrial espionage, described as "the extreme case of competitive information" and uses contractual language to that effect. She urged participants "to thine own self be true". A self-described "wild woman", Joanne showed a real zest for her work, vowing to work at least until age 82—"for a minimum of another 30 years!"

Inge's fascinating case study will illustrate some major business benefits that human factors engineering can contribute. Focus on Elder Care: Caring Across Generations

As Julie Danis wrote in her column in this issue of *The Exponent*, caring for elderly relatives and/or friends is something we are bound to encounter at some point in our lives. For many of us, this situation will occur sooner rather than later. Reality suggests that because of our gender, the role of caretaker and giver most often falls upon our shoulders.

The UCWBG is sponsoring a two part series on aging entitled "It's All in the Family". The seminar will focus on providing care for elderly adults, as well as addressing the emotional needs of the caregiver.

At the first session on Saturday, October 4, "Caregiving Across the Miles or Across the Halls", June Ninnemann, L.C.S.W. will speak and answer questions on aging and providing care to the elderly. Ms. Ninnemann's background includes working in home healthcare, serving as a nursing home consultant, and working as Director of Social Work at two Chicago hospitals. June founded her own business, Care Plan which serves the needs of older adults and their families, in particular those families involved in long distance caregiving.

The first session will begin with a discussion on dementia and degenerative diseases. Ms. Ninnemann will also discuss

how family members may make informed decisions for appropriate care. Secondly, the session will provide a brief introduction to available resources and where to seek additional information. Lastly, the first session of the series will introduce the concept of power of attorney and the importance of designating someone with the power of attorney in caring for elder adults.

The second session, scheduled for Saturday, November 15, will discuss the emotional aspect of caregiving for the elderly, entitled "Am I Alone in This?" The discussion will focus on the not so uncommon feeling of being overwhelmed when responsible for managing and/or providing care for a parent, relative or friend. The session will address the ability to negotiate successfully "sharing the care" within one's family group and how to set healthy limits on the demands made by the person for whom one is caring.

Our presenters will be Janet Strong, M. Div. and Director of the Center for Older Adults, Mary Denny, R.N. M.S., and Judith Schneider. Ms. Schneider holds a Masters in Counseling Psychology. She has been a psychotherapist for over 20 years in hospitals and counseling centers. Ms. Denny is a certified Geriatric Nurse Practitioner and has a Master's Degree in Gerontological Nursing from Rush University College of Nursing. She worked at Rush-Presbyterian-St. Luke's Medical Center from 1980-1988 as a geriatric rehabilitation nurse and in community-based nurse man-

UCWBG mothers from the Western suburbs gathered at the home of Jeanne Kennedy, in Elmhurst, on June 17 to discuss Survival Strategies. The group shared ideas on a number of family, household chores, parenting, leisure and mental well-being topics. Here are a few of our findings:

The sweetest "quick dinner" suggested was popping Mrs. Fields' Freezer Cookie Dough into the oven (!). Other "quick dinners" included cereal, frozen chicken nuggets, and ice cream novelties.
