## Another Blockbuster Non-Profit Networking Event!

This year's Non-Profit Networking event was held on November 4th at the Chicago Museum of Contemporary Art. After last year's success, our hopes for another great event were high, but all expectations were exceeded! The event was sold-out this year with over 310 attendees. Board Chairman, Presidents and Executive Directors of 61 non-profit groups participated in order to meet and network with potential board members and volunteers from among the professional community in Chicago. Along with our UCWBG membership, invitations were extended to the GSB Club, the entire U of C community, the Financial Women's Association of Chicago and the Professional Women's Club of Chicago. Additionally, our thanks go out to the international law firm Sidley Austin Brown & Wood who participated for the second year in a row as an event sponsor, offsetting a portion of fees for the event.

The MCA proved to be a stunning backdrop for this year's event. MCA Associate Director Greg Cameron and his team and Wolfgang Puck catering worked very closely with the UCWBG team led by Gail Luxenberg, VP – Programs, to make this event a success. Prior to lunch, the non-profits displayed their literature, manning tables in a mini tradeshow to facilitate the networking. Many connections were made, and the conversations continued over a luncheon set amidst the dramatic galleries of the MCA.

The keynote address was delivered by noted philanthropist and business leader Penny Pritzker. As president of Pritzker Realty Group, she oversees all of the Pritzker family's non-hotel real estate investments. Ms. Pritzker is also founder and chairman of Classic Residence by Hyatt, the senior living affiliate of Hyatt Corporation. She serves on the boards of Hyatt Corporation, Hyatt International, Marmon Group and the Wm. Wrigley Jr. Co and is on the Executive Committee of the Real Estate Roundtable, the Program Committee for the Economic Club, the Dean's Strategic Council at Stanford Law School and member of the Advisory Board for Stanford Business School. Recently, she was elected to the Harvard Board of Overseers.

Penny Pritzker is active in the arts and education. As former chairman of the board for the Chicago Museum of Contemporary Art, she has been instrumental in helping the museum realize its mission to engage and stimulate a broad audience in our community with the experience of contemporary art and culture.

During her tenure as chairman, the MCA found its current Executive Director and also moved into its new world-class facility in 1996, creating a cultural landmark for Chicago and providing an ideal situation for the public to interact with contemporary art and artists. Penny has recently become involved as a board member for Chicago's newest charter school, the Young Women's Leadership Charter School. YWLC is the only all girls public school in Chicago and the fourth in the nation.

Focusing on math, science and technology, YWLC was created to help girls succeed in fields where woman are under-represented and to close the gap in technology-related careers that exists for women, especially minority women.

Penny shared with the audience some of her insights gained through having served on various non-profit boards and committees over the last several years. She related that upon moving to Chicago in 1985, a number of groups "came calling" for her involvement. Eager to meet people and get involved in the community, she said "Yes." (and "Yes," and "Yes"...). In hindsight, she feels that both she and the non-profits would have been better served by a more thoughtful match-making process; as she laughingly put it, "a match made in heaven" rather than "a blind date from hell!" Penny commented that she felt at the time that she had become over-extended and was not able to contribute in as meaningful a way as she would have liked.

Her projects have covered a wide variety of industries, including financial services, petroleum, manufacturing, high technology, professional services and healthcare.

As a member of the GSB adjunct faculty, Susan teaches an MBA course on leadership in the evolutionary economy and leads a seminar titled "Strategic Leadership: Changing the Reality for Executive Women" in the Executive Education's Women's Leadership Forum. Formerly, she was an adjunct professor of management at the Kellstadt Graduate School of Business, DePaul University, where she taught change management and organizational behavior. She is also a guest lecturer at General Electric's Crotonville Corporate Training Center and at INSEAD in Fontainebleau, France.

# President's Letter

## Dear UCWBG Members,

As 2002 comes to a close, I think back to last year at this time when we established our strategic initiatives and specific goals for this year. I am delighted to report that we have achieved much.

This year, we succeeded in creating an environment where members built successful leadership connections, increasing the visibility and influence of the UCWBG, and positioning the organization for the future.

**We increased networking and connection opportunities for GSB women.** Through our high profile events we created an environment that offered networking opportunities and encouraged interaction with recognized leaders and professionals.

- In January, through her inspirational talk on *Leading from Where You Are (And Who You Are)*, Cheryl Francis, board member of Hon Industries and Lands' End, set the stage for a year themed "Building Leadership Connections".
- At our Annual Tea in April, Sheila Penrose, President of The Penrose Group, reminded us that values are a foundation and a source of strength.
- In May, the UCWBG joined with the Professional Women's Club of Chicago for a first time joint networking luncheon that exceeded all expectations with over 170 women participating.
- At the 2002 GSB Management Conference, the UCWBG sponsored a panel session on *Building Leadership Connections: Charting New Career Paths*. Kathy Flanagan, UCWBG VP Leadership, facilitated the discussion with panelists Hedy Ratner, Laurel Bellows, Margaret Johnson, and Robin Sheerer.
- In August, "A Night at Ravinia" provided an opportunity for our members to network and build connections in a more informal setting.
- In November, for the second year, we hosted the *Serving on Non-Profit Boards* luncheon, where Penny Pritzker provided advice selecting, serving on, and leading boards. Again, this event provided the means for UCWBG members and friends to contribute by sharing their expertise and business assistance with non-profit organizations.

## We strengthened our ties with the University.

- In January at our Annual Meeting, Dean Snyder expressed a real interest in our work and our partnering with the GSB.
- We strengthened our relationship with the GSB by supporting recruitment of women and fostering an alumnae network for employment opportunities. We participated with the GSB in welcoming new students, hosted prospective students at our events, and offered career advice to current GSB students.
- Our networking helped tip the scale in favor of the Chicago GSB for several prospective students, contributing to the highest percentage ever of female students in the incoming class.

## We increased the visibility and influence of the UCWBG.

- Our programs this year have helped make the UCWBG a recognized leader and champion of businesswomen's issues within the alumni community, University community, business community and the women's community.
- The capabilities of our web site, [www.UCWBG.org](http://www.UCWBG.org), have been dramatically improved. Over 1,000 hours of design, programming and implementation efforts have resulted in the establishment of a completely overhauled Web presence that

provides an interactive environment where current organization information and access to member services, including job listings, and events are made available to the membership on a highly cost effective basis. We will continue to capitalize on this tool to expanded membership recruitment and retention, to offer increased information and services to our members and to realize cost savings through reduced administrative expenses.

## We sustained a growing, financially sound organization that is professional and leading edge.

- We grew membership levels, created financial strength through corporate sponsorship, and developed an audit to maintain the highest level of integrity.
- Realizing that leadership is an important dimension of women's success, we implemented the Leadership Initiative Program.
  - The UCWBG played a key role in the development of a seminar entitled "Strategic Leadership: Changing the Reality of Women Executives" offered by the GSB's Executive Education Department. This course focused on the development of frameworks and tools to help leaders improve the odds of success for their organization and to create an environment receptive to women's unique strengths and values.
  - In February, we launched our first mentoring circle, which focused on leadership issues and explored how a group of women can provide mentoring on this topic to each other and to the group as a whole. Based on the success of that circle, and in order to offer the opportunity to additional UCWBG members, we expect to offer this experience again next year.
  - In March, the "Five Steps to Optimal Work-Life Balance" workshop guided participants through a value-based assessment of the balance in eight key areas of their life. They examined their assumptions, beliefs, support structures and boundaries, and learned to set value-based goals toward living a balanced and fulfilling life.
  - In June, nationally known rapport builder Lillian D. BJORSETH presented "Breakthrough Networking: Building Relationships That Last." That interactive workshop helped participants learn how to build their credibility, how to create a powerful verbal business card, how to work a room, and how to read and adapt to others' networking styles to increase career success.
  - In September and in October, Melissa Giovagnoli led workshops on *Networking: Building Relationships & Opportunities for Success*.

Our success this year is due to the involvement and support of our members, the legacy of our past board members, and the dedication, passion and efforts of our 2002 board members.

I want to thank the board for achieving our collective goals. I would also like to thank our advisory board and all UCWBG members for their support.

It has been a privilege and pleasure to work with all of you and I am very proud of our tremendous accomplishments. Your support was invaluable and I appreciate your dedication, leadership, ideas and friendship.

I wish all of our members happy holidays and look forward to the continued success of the UCWBG and to serving as Immediate Past President in 2003.

## Have you logged into our web site lately?

Over the past 10 months, more than 1,000 hours of design, programming and implementation efforts have resulted in the establishment of a completely overhauled Internet presence. The current design provides an interactive environment in which you can access member services and information regarding events quickly and easily.



Our goals are ambitious. We are continuing to focus on establishing a sense of “place” for the membership — a source of relevant and meaningful news and information (technology developments, real world applications of class room theory, roundtables, etc.), a learning environment that celebrates personal choices, creates a nurturing atmosphere and provides professional support. We want it to be a comfortable and entertaining venue in which to exchange ideas.

We’ve come a long way these past few months. Let’s take a short tour of the highlights.

## Check out the programs and initiatives of the UCWBG.

Many of you expressed a strong interest in networking opportunities and the UCWBG has responded by providing a variety of interesting and useful programs. Penny noted that her own preferred style of working – “I like to roll up my shirtsleeves and really work hard to help solve a pressing problem” – dictated the type of involvement she sought going forward. She stressed that finding the proper fit between yourself and the organization is critically important for both of you to benefit. She encouraged self-reflection on two key points in order to find this fit:

First, what is it that really matters to you? Makes you angry? Brings you joy? What has the ability to bring tears to your eyes? What are you willing to fight for? In a word, what is your passion? In a world that offers so many compelling causes with which you can become involved, you must find the one or one(s) that mean the very most to you personally.

Next, as Penny did, you must evaluate your own work style and preferences for how you want to contribute. Team member or solo contributor? Fighting fires or tending to the rhythm of day-to-day needs? Running the show or following someone else’s lead? You have to find a fit that allows you to do what you do best.

Additionally, Penny emphasized the importance of doing due-diligence to understand the organizations you are considering. She likened this to choosing a paying job. The potential board or committee member (you!) seeks to connect, share ideals, make a contribution, work hard, have fun, and – just maybe – be appreciated for their efforts. The non-profit needs volunteers of duration and intensity. That is, volunteers who will share the mission, have the skills to carry it forward, and follow through to do what they say they will do. In order to find the best fit, Penny urges you to meet the board and directors of the organization, attend meetings, and, most importantly, compare your expectations with theirs before you sign on.

Penny shared stories of her experiences as a political fund-raiser, chairman of the MCA and as a board member for the YWLCs to

illustrate the benefits and pitfalls of serving in the community. In particular, she pointed out how fulfilling and rewarding it can be to serve an organization that combines your passions, such as hers for contemporary art, with a need for your business expertise. “Once you make those sparks fly, you’ll be addicted.” In addition to making new connections and honing your skills, serving on a non-profit board can provide you with a “piece” that might otherwise be missing from your personal and professional life.

Penny closed with the thought that working with non-profits has its rewards, but it also has its end.

“If you’ve been diligent in your research, and thorough in evaluating your motivation for serving, you’ll find an organization where you’ll be happy contributing — and they’ll be thrilled to have you — for a good long while. But most board positions aren’t lifelong assignments, so there will come a day when you need to move on.” She pointed out that, just as you would in any other part of your professional life, you must have an exit strategy. You must recognize when you have made your mark, or are ready to stop contributing, or have stopped having fun, and you must be ready to move on. Penny related how she has changed her involvement with the MCA, because they are facing new and different challenges now. She has found a new role for herself, contributing in a different way, but still with a good fit between the MCA’s needs and her own.

Serving on a non-profit board or committee is “a personal relationship for both parties.” By doing your homework and finding the right fit, “that’s when sparks fly, real work gets done, and the fun happens for everybody...when the feeling is mutual.”
