OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Our Roots

Established in 2002, Community Links (South Lanarkshire) is an independent Lanarkshire-based Community Anchor organisation. For more than two decades, we have worked alongside local people to encourage participation, strengthen community voice and support community-led change that is sustainable, meaningful and rooted in local priorities.

We engage and empower residents across South Lanarkshire to play an active role in local decision-making, take part in learning and development opportunities, and help build stronger, more connected communities.

What we do

Drawing on 24 years of experience, we continue to deliver community development, consultation and engagement activity for adults, young people and children. Our work also supports environmental improvements, community safety, food and community cafés, recycled IT equipment provision, digital inclusion and climate action.

Our activities include:

Engaging communities and involving local people in decision-making, reinforcing the importance of local democracy.

Building community capacity through Asset Based Community Development, Participatory Budgeting and co-production.

Facilitating consultation and events using creative communication methods, supporting Community Planning Partnership objectives and helping local networks to grow.

Encouraging volunteering by recruiting, training and supporting local volunteers to deliver services and create opportunities for their communities.

Supporting digital inclusion to increase access to education, health services, employment opportunities and online confidence.

Sharing accessible information so individuals and communities know about the services, support and opportunities available to them.

Developing representative engagement that helps shape local services and improves quality of life for people and communities.

Strengthening environmental responsibility by embedding our environmental policy, encouraging climate action and promoting sustainable choices across our communities and workplace.

SIGNIFICANT ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Our 24 years of experience show that communities respond positively to working with an organisation they know is impartial, independent and committed to representing local voices.

Much of our work focuses on data zones within the lowest 5–15% of the Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation (SIMD 2020), ensuring support is targeted where it can make the greatest difference.

Community Links (South Lanarkshire) helps ensure local opinions, ideas and concerns reach service providers. We work with and for local people, creating opportunities for communities to influence services, shape decisions and improve quality of life for themselves, their families and their wider communities.

As a community-led anchor organisation, we continue to grow our asset-based community development work, with safety, kindness and a warm welcome at the heart of every activity. Local Area Networks in Blantyre, Hamilton and Larkhall continue to bring people together to share ideas and develop solutions to local challenges. With community involvement, we monitor and evaluate services and develop new wellbeing, creative, physical and mental health initiatives. By building on people's strengths, our embedded workers help communities create activities they want, safe spaces where positive connections can flourish, and opportunities to build confidence through learning, volunteering and shared experience.

Through our Asset Based Community Development and Participatory Budgeting work, neighbourhood plans known as Our Place Our Plan (OPOP) continue to progress in Hillhouse, Udston and Burnbank, and Strutherhill and Birkenshaw. Enthusiastic local working groups are driving this work forward. A total of 403 people cast 1,209 votes in Hillhouse, Udston and Burnbank securing £27,900 of Participatory Budgeting funding; similarly, 667 people cast 1,785 votes in Strutherhill and Birkenshaw securing £18,600 to deliver grassroots initiatives for the benefit of their communities.

SIGNIFICANT ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE (Continued)

Our work on Participatory Budgeting, both locally and nationally, continues to contribute strategically to Scotland's broader Participatory Budgeting movement. We do this through active involvement in formal networks and events, while applying the knowledge gained to effectively promote and deliver Participatory Budgeting activities within South Lanarkshire for the benefit of communities.

We continue to provide services that help us stay connected with communities while addressing income inequality, reducing isolation and strengthening social connection.

We successfully delivered all activities planned in our grant agreements with South Lanarkshire Council and the Scottish Government's Investment in Communities Fund. These funds allow us to continue our commitment to providing meaningful mitigations to the cost of living crisis, including high energy costs and food poverty, all the while fostering climate awareness.

Funding from National Lottery 'Awards for All' enabled us to create and deliver the Community Links Climate Action Festival — a vibrant week-long programme that brought climate action to life in fun, inclusive and educational ways. Activities were designed for all ages and culminated in a free family fun day attended by more than 300 people, bringing families, partners and the wider community together in celebration.

Our Winter Warmer Event provided local households with a wide range of winter essentials, offering practical support to individuals and families while promoting sustainable choices, energy-efficient resources and climate-conscious action.

During Lanarkshire's Climate Action Hub's Festival we delivered our ever popular 'Make a Meal of It' project and 'Silly Science' activity for children, in addition to our climate action awareness sessions at our local community hubs.

We continue to provide and to support local community organisations to provide weekly Hubs — where local people have access to social and recreational activities, free food, informal advice, including recycled and energy saving devices and a variety of outreach services.

Hamilton Health and Social Care Forum continue to involve and support the communities of the Hamilton locality in the development of health and social care services particularly where services are being redesigned at primary care levels. This is achieved through hosting regular six weekly meetings, the sharing good practice and open dialogue highlighting current key issues and our participation in appropriate consultations. Our main aim is to ensure that the communities help shape the future of local health services in a meaningful way.

The 2nd edition of the Forum's Positive Pathway to Mental Health and Wellbeing booklet continues to be a valuable resource for communities and partners alike.

Our networks continue with partners: South Lanarkshire's Community Engagement Team and other South Lanarkshire Council resources; NHS Lanarkshire; VASLan and other third sector partners.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Principal funding sources

Community Links (South Lanarkshire)'s principal funding sources for the year under review were South Lanarkshire Council's Community Engagement Team; Scottish Government's Investing in Communities; and National Lottery-Awards for All.

Self-generated income for service and consultation provision equated to almost 3.3% of total income.

Future Developments

It is our belief that our collaborative and co-operative approaches as an Anchor organisation will allow us the capacity to manage the challenges ahead.

We are committed to expanding and enhancing our services so we can better support individuals and communities. Our focus will continue to be on improving health, social and economic outcomes, while ensuring Community Links remains relevant, responsive and effective in working with and for our communities.

Community Engagement and Community Development in the first instance, for the capacity to work alongside communities, is a vital process with our Community Planning partners. We aim for a longer-term sustainable core income whilst continuing to deliver on existing work, responding to local priorities.

We will continue to work to attract income from Trusts and other funders. Additional promotional activities will be reviewed and considered to enhance future income generation opportunities. 'Keep the Beat Alive' will also be a part of our strategic direction in relation to the Partnership Agreement between Scottish Government and the voluntary sector.

Staff mental health and wellbeing are fundamental to a healthy, productive and inclusive workplace. As an employer, we are committed to a culture of care, open communication and practical support. This includes mental health resources, work-life balance, flexible working arrangements, private health insurance and regular opportunities for staff feedback. By investing in wellbeing, we aim to create an environment where everyone feels valued, supported and able to thrive.

Addressing environmental issues and tackling climate change is a key priority across all our activities. We are committed to recruiting local people or community members who are passionate about climate action to help drive this forward.

We have had the privilege and pleasure to be based at the beautiful premises at Clydeview in Blantyre courtesy of a lease agreement between Asda Estates and South Lanarkshire Council. Sadly this lease arrangement has come to an end after 20 years. We will continue to seek our forever home within our areas of service delivery, however in the meantime we are working from temporary premises. We will keep our communities and partners updated as we progress through the year ahead. Thank you to all who helped make our last twenty years based here so productive and meaningful whilst serving our wider communities.

Reserves policy

Owing to the nature of the operation, funds would generally be retained within, and maintained for individual projects, however where the income for each project has been self-generated, the Reserves are held centrally, and have been provided to cover future operational costs.

The free reserves, i.e. those not tied up in fixed assets nor relating to restricted funds, as at 31st March 2026, amounted to £111,613. The Board of Directors made the decision to review the reserves policy and reduce these reserves to maintain a minimum of three months' running costs including potential statutory redundancy payments.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing Document

The charitable company is controlled by its governing document, it's Articles of Association, and constitutes a company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

The principal activity of the charitable company in the year under review was that of organisational and administrative support to the communities in South Lanarkshire to include promotion of community participation utilising: the Asset Based Community Development Approach; undertaking local consultation and the provision of appropriate services for income generation to support the sustainability of the organisation.

Organisational Structure

The organisational structure is made up of 5 Directors who are volunteer community representatives. This ensures that board decisions are community driven. During the year to 31st March 2026, the charitable company employed 6 staff made up as follows:

- 1 Chief Officer
- 3 Officers (Business and Development Support)
- 1 Community Development Officer
- 1 Community Development Worker

Community Links (South Lanarkshire) is an accredited real Living Wage employer who voluntarily signed up to ensure their employees and any subcontracted staff can earn a wage which is enough to live on.

Wider Network

Community Links (South Lanarkshire)'s core funding is from South Lanarkshire Council's Community Engagement Team, and Scottish Government's Investing in Communities. The continued support received from our funders and partners is very much appreciated.

Community Links (South Lanarkshire) are members of SCVO (The Scottish Council for Voluntary Organisations) and VASLan (Voluntary Action South Lanarkshire), both organisations provide support, training, networking and opportunities for Community Links (South Lanarkshire) to contribute to the Scottish voluntary sector at local and national level.

For the year ended 31 March 2026

I report on the accounts of the charitable company for the year ended 31 March 2026, which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Statement of Financial Position and the related notes.

The charitable company's trustees, who are also Directors for the purposes of company law, are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. Independent examiner's statement

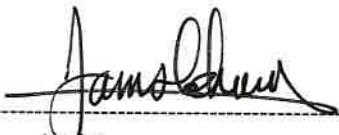

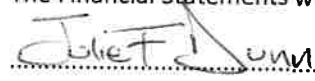

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except for investments which are included at market value and the revaluation of certain fixed assets and in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), and the Companies Act 2006.

Community Links (South Lanarkshire) meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

Incoming Resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Resources Expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributable to particular headings, they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. The charity is not registered for VAT and therefore all expenditure is shown gross.

Tangible Fixed Assets

The charity operates a policy of capitalising tangible fixed assets that have an original cost exceeding £5,000. Any assets with a value lower than £5,000, are expensed through the Statement of Financial Activities.

When applicable, depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off the assets over their estimated useful lives.

Office Equipment	25% straight line.
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Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the Directors.

Restricted Funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objectives of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.
