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# 2021 Year in Review: Highlights

As we start a new year, the Board would like to take a moment and reflect on progress made in 2021. We met regularly to discuss, plan and carry out the duties of the association. The Board developed and disseminated a survey and evaluated results from 90 respondents. A report of the survey results including key takeaways was produced and distributed to homeowners. Thank you to all participants. We received important feedback that has been very helpful in our efforts to provide value, enjoyment and support to the neighborhood.

The following highlights some of our work in 2021 utilizing the survey report categories.

## **Participation and Social Activities**

### **ANNUAL MEETING**

- Some respondents showed a desire to participate in an Annual Meeting. The Board implemented one on Aug. 17 to provide an opportunity for those who wished to attend per the bylaws.
- The meeting allowed neighbors to build community, meet others in Wood Valley, receive updates on association activities, and have community discussion.
- We greatly appreciate the Meridian Township Fire Department and Officer Heinemann for attending the meeting, providing updates, and allowing children to explore a fire truck, ambulance and police vehicle. We are grateful for their continued services and support of our community throughout the year.
- Culver's frozen custard and children's activities were available.
- Attendees were also invited to bring non-perishable food donations for a neighborhood food drive. The food collected was donated to the Haslett Food Pantry housed at Haslett Community Church.

#### Public comments included:

- Reminders about the association bylaws regarding boats and recreational units. Some types of recreational vehicles may be in violation with Meridian Township ordinances.
- Home care tips such as removing tree limbs and vegetation that may be blocking sidewalks.
- Ways to stay more connected to other close neighborhoods, and our greater area.

### • Please continue to follow the bylaws. Remember we are all a reflection of our neighborhood.

- Residents are encouraged to dedicate time and resources to ensure their homes are well-cared for.
- If a resident has an issue with speeders, noise complaints (e.g., barking dogs, fireworks, loud music) or parking complaints, they are encouraged to first discuss the matter with all parties involved.
- If no resolution can be safely obtained, we encourage residents to explore appropriate next steps such
  as filing a complaint with Meridian Township for code violation, or contacting the police at their nonemergency number.
- The Board is available to consult with homeowners in non-emergency issues as to what next steps may be available based on what organization has authority to intervene. In places where the Board can assist, such as sending out reminders or letters, we can do so as the Boards deems appropriate.

# 2021 Year in Review: Highlights

## **Participation and Social Activities**

### COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES

- Homeowners were interested in a variety of community events.
   The top activities included a community garage sale, a picnic/ice cream at the park and a winter or holiday activity.
  - The annual garage sale was held June 18-19. The Board placed newspaper and online ads, and set up neighborhood signs.
  - An ice cream social was part of the Annual Meeting on Aug. 17.
  - Holiday activities were offered for Independence Day, including neighborhood home decorating with goodie bags provided for children in the park.
- Thank you to all those who participated in these events.

## **Community Enhancement Ideas**

### PARK IMPROVEMENTS

 Some homeowners included feedback on enhancing the park area, such as cleaning the overgrowth and possibly adding a playground.

#### Park feedback:

- Homeowners noted and expressed a concern with overgrowth in the park. Some residents shared that the pathway in the common area was closing in. Board members surveyed the areas and worked with Cherithbrook to clear overgrowth and widen the path.
- Thank you to homeowners for comments regarding lawn and snow removal issues.

#### • Playground research:

- The Board researched liability insurance costs, maintenance upkeep, and the number and proximity of local playgrounds available in our area.
- Given this research, the Board has determined it would be in support of adding simple play equipment to the park such as soccer nets to increase physical activity opportunities.

### **Community Enhancement Ideas**

### ENTRANCE SIGN LIGHTING

- Homeowners included comments on the survey regarding the types of lighting that could work best.
- Board members researched lighting types and then tested several to determine the best approach.
- The Board has determined that two sets of warm solar lights for each side work best for illumination of the sign and aesthetics.
- Lights are being purchased and installed.

The Board focused on updating communication methods and providing information on a variety of topics through different modes.

### WEBSITE REDESIGN

- Our association website, <u>woodvalleyhomeowners.com</u>, was rebuilt and redesigned this year.
- Additionally, the Board took over ownership of the backend of the website from a prior third party vendor to reduce website costs, and oversee necessary updates and security of the platform.

### NEIGHBORHOOD NEWSLETTERS, SURVEYS AND REPORTS

- In 2021, the Board was excited to utilize a survey, newsletters, and reports to provide homeowners with information and receive valuable input from residents.
- For example, some survey respondents indicated that they would like to know about community events, so township resources have been included as links on our website and in the newsletters.
- Additionally, it was reported that some homeowners were not aware of the closed neighborhood Facebook group. In response, it has been promoted on our website and in newsletters.

### WELCOME LETTERS TO NEW NEIGHBORS

- We were pleased to welcome many new homeowners to the neighborhood this past year.
- We updated our letter to include cards for free family meals from Culver's as a welcoming gift.



## Important Reminders: Bylaws and Deed Restrictions

The following are friendly reminders that are relevant for the current season:

#### **Recreational and Commercial Vehicles**

The Wood Valley bylaws and deed restrictions do not allow for any type of recreational or commercial vehicles to be stored in driveways or on properties for any extended period of time, even if they are behind a fence. In addition to the Association's bylaws and deed restrictions, the parking and/or storing of certain types of vehicles, including boats and recreational units, utility trailers and/or containers, may also be in violation of Meridian Township ordinances. Parking automobiles or any other type of vehicle on lawns or illegally is strictly prohibited under Township ordinance.

#### **Neighborhood Park and Common Area**

The neighborhood park and common area is open to all Wood Valley residents for family gatherings or social events, fishing, hiking and other outdoor activities. Please note that residents are responsible for cleanup. This includes cleaning up after pets.

Dogs must always be kept on a leash per Township ordinance, including in the neighborhood park and common areas. Please be mindful of the property boundaries of homeowners whose properties border the park/common area. A boundary map is available on the Association website at <u>woodvalleyhomeowners.com</u>.

#### **Additional Notes**

Wood Valley residents may file a complaint with the Township if they believe a homeowner is in violation of a Township ordinance. The complaint may be filed by name or anonymously. To do so, go to the Meridian Township home page at <a href="www.meridian.mi.us">www.meridian.mi.us</a>, click on the "Government" tab at the top the page and then select "Code Enforcement" inside the drop down box.

If a resident has an issue with speeders, noise complaints, such as barking dogs, fireworks, loud music, or parking complaints, they are encouraged to first discuss the matter with the parties involved. If no resolution can be safely obtained it is suggested that residents contact the police at their non-emergency number: 517-332-6526. Always call 911 in emergencies.
