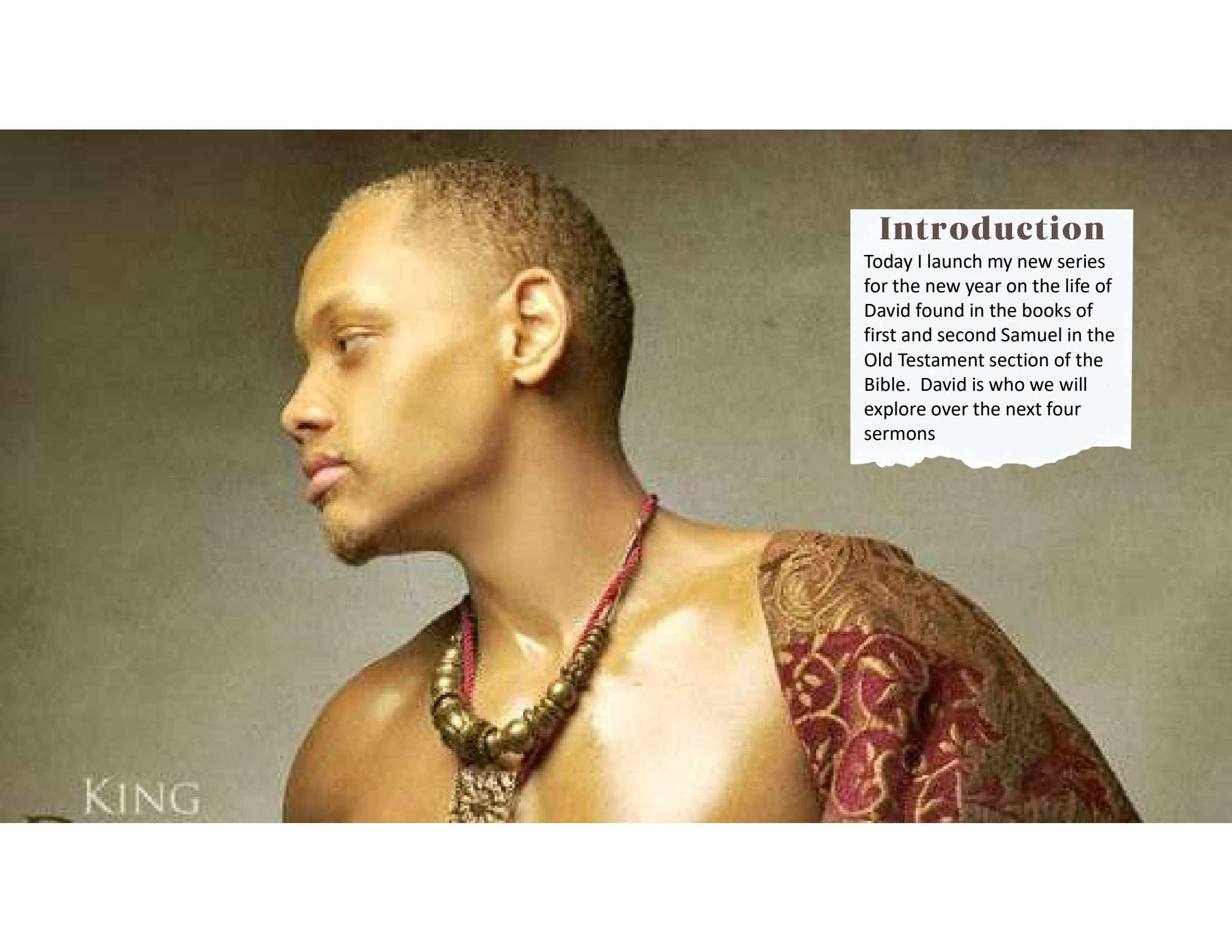

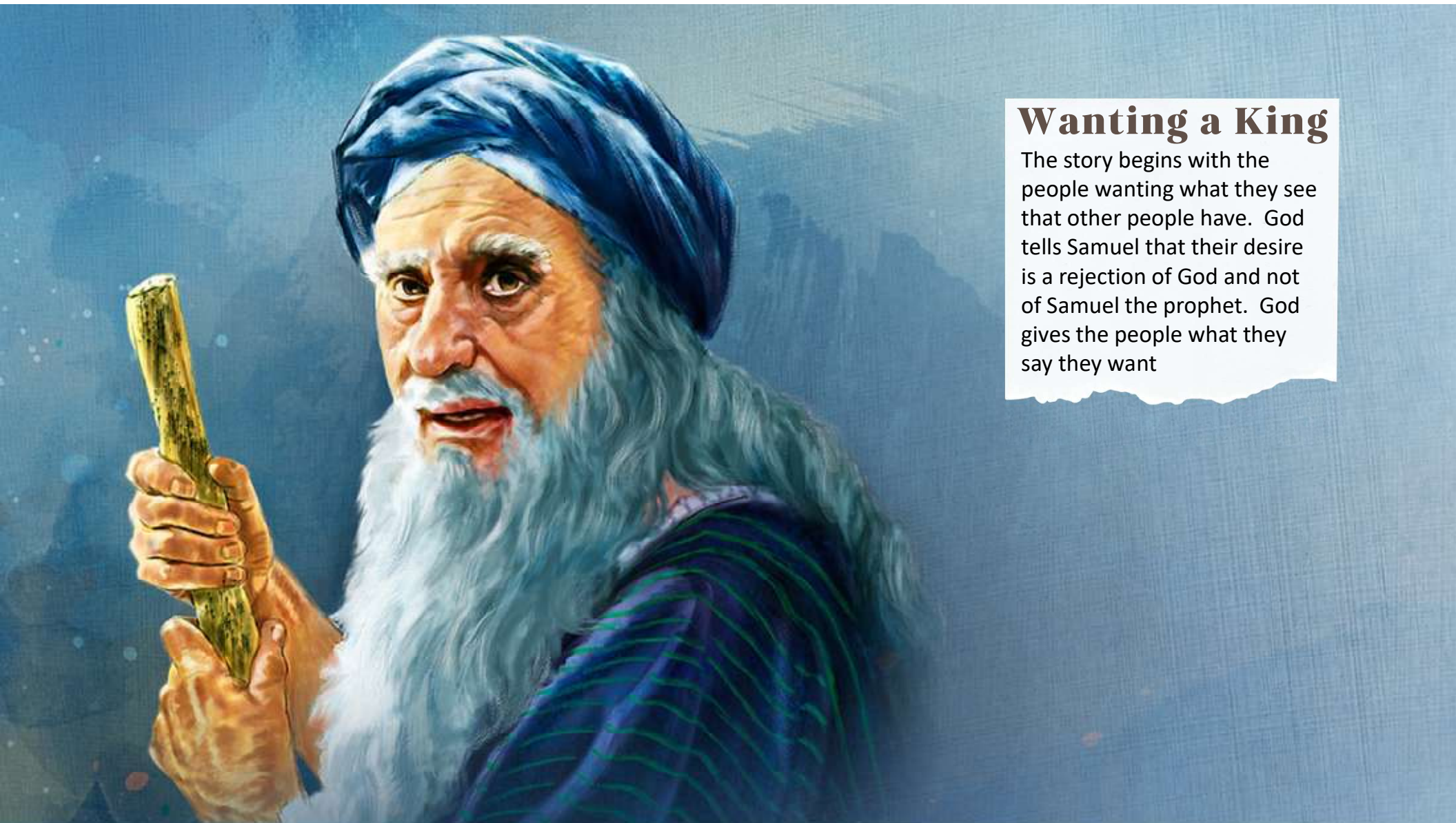

Wanting a King

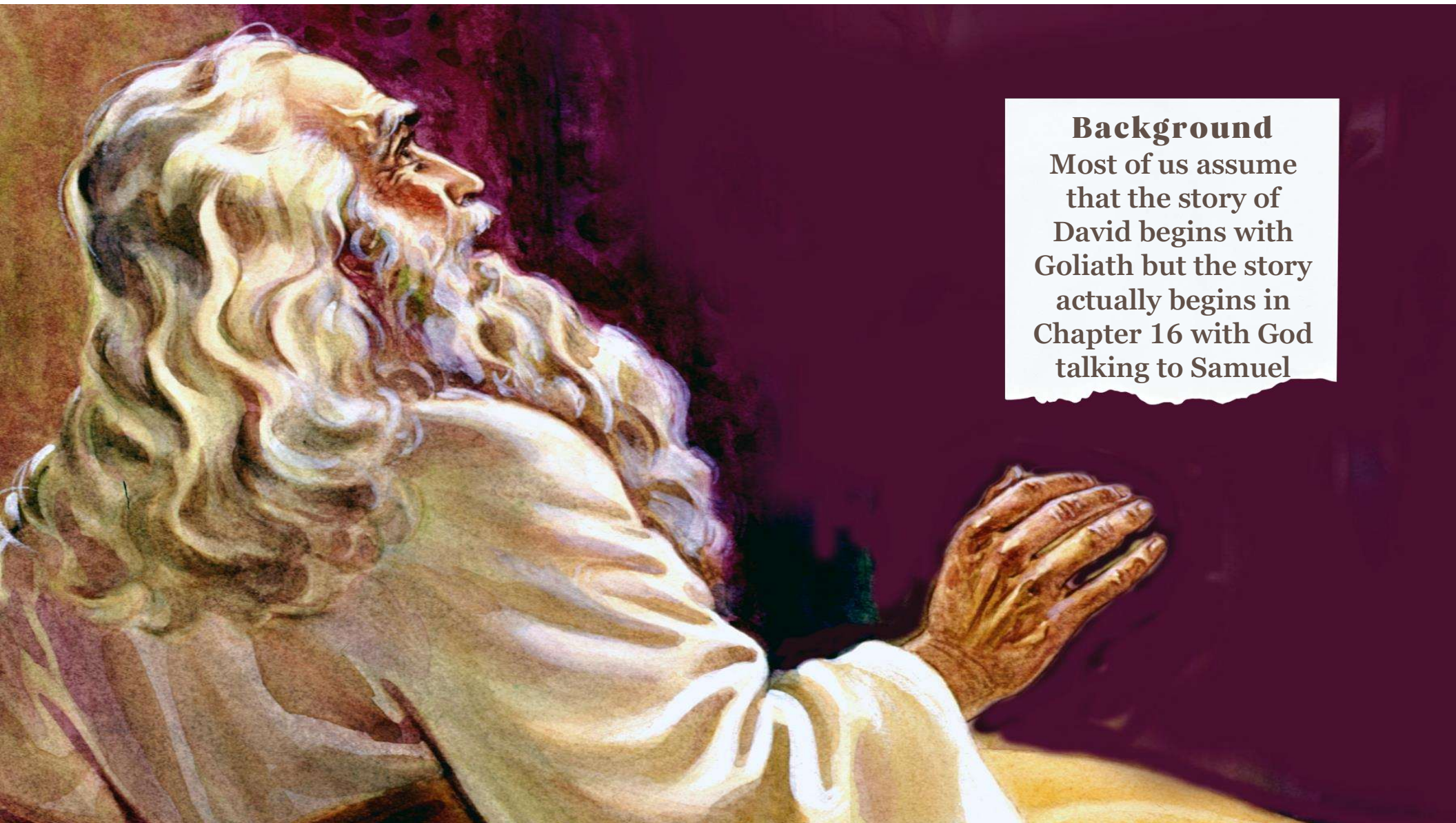

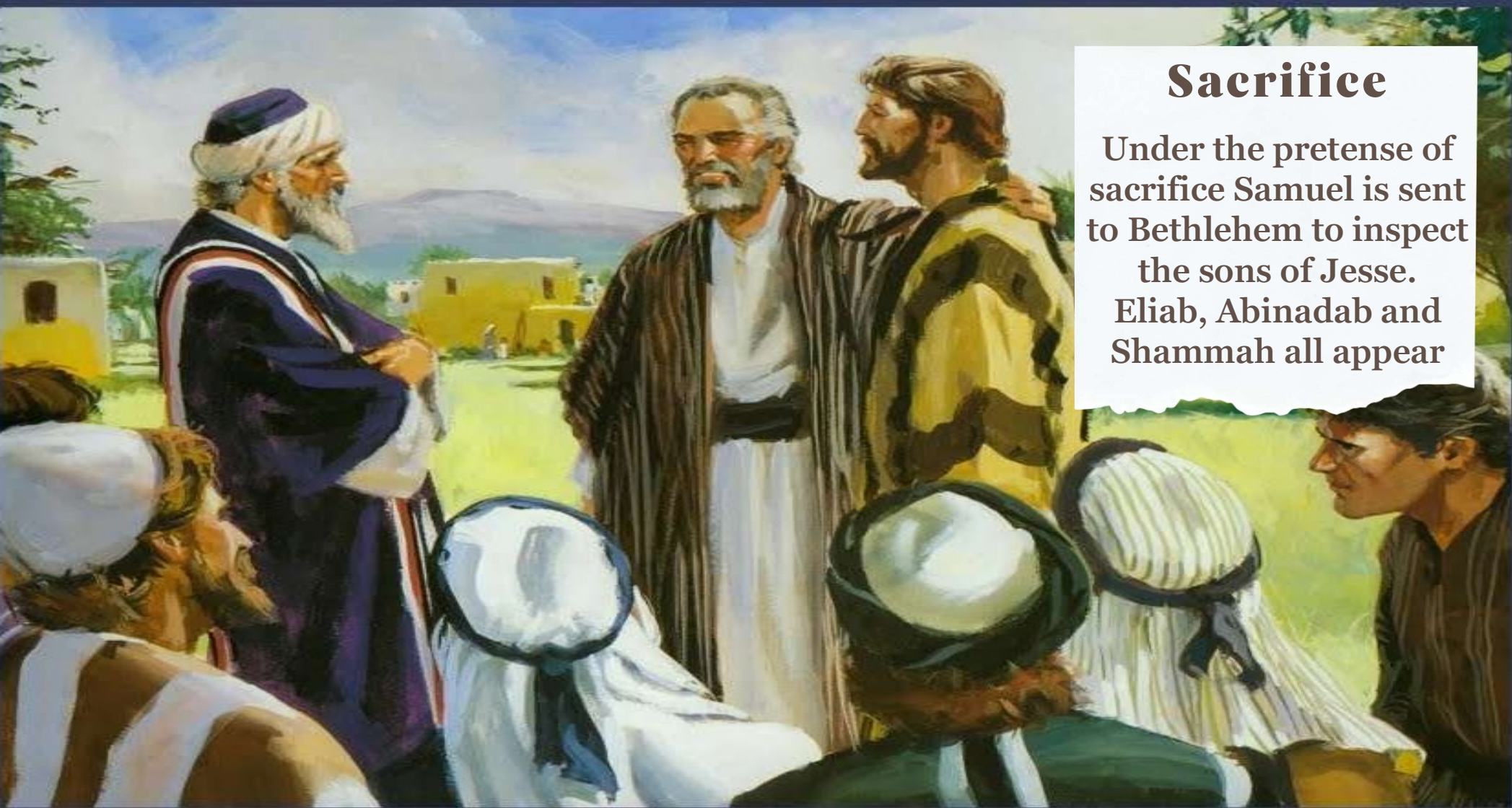
Fear of Saul

Under the pretense of sacrifice Samuel is sent to Bethlehem to inspect the sons of Jesse.

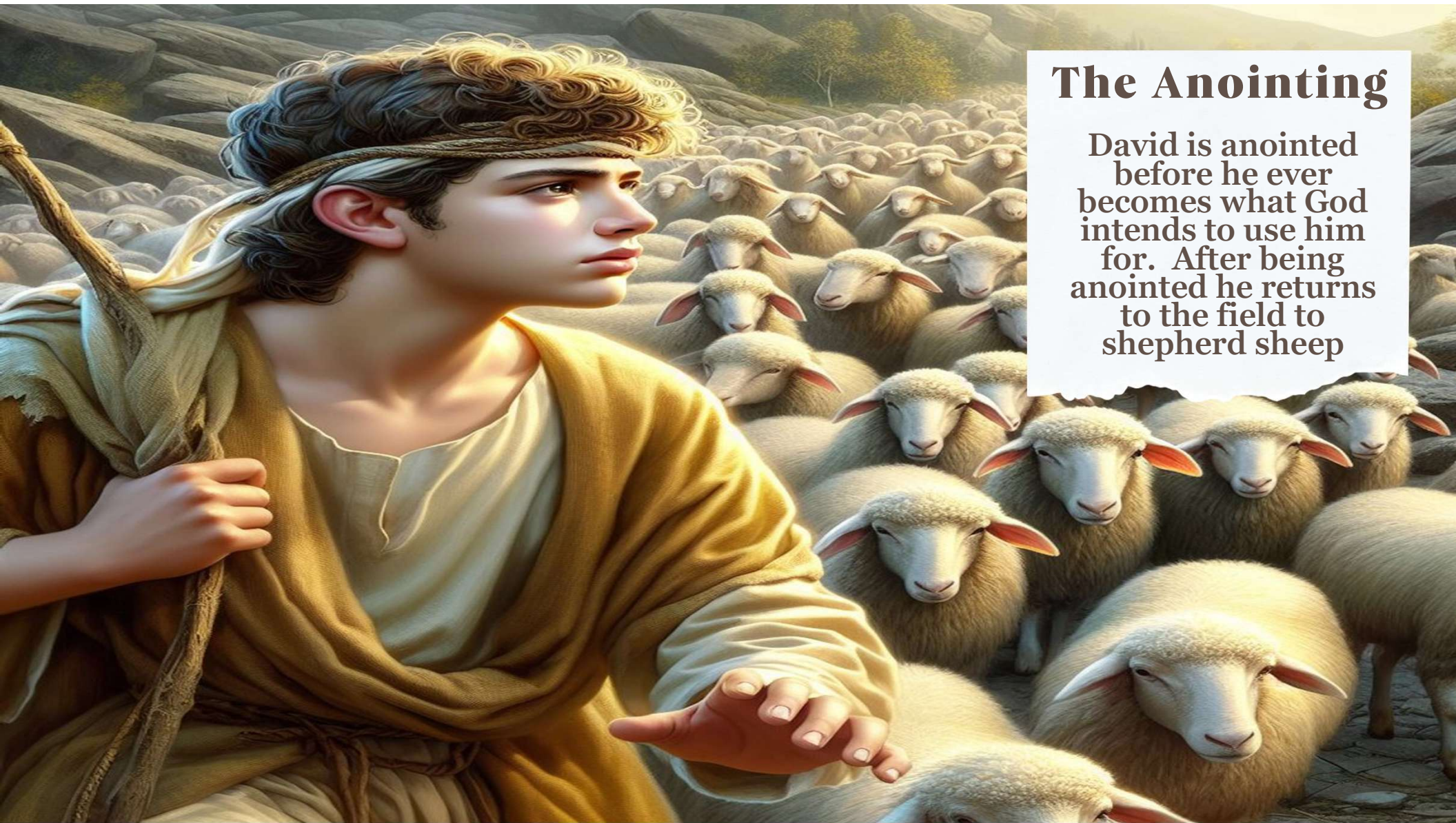
Eliab, Abinadab and Shammah all appear
