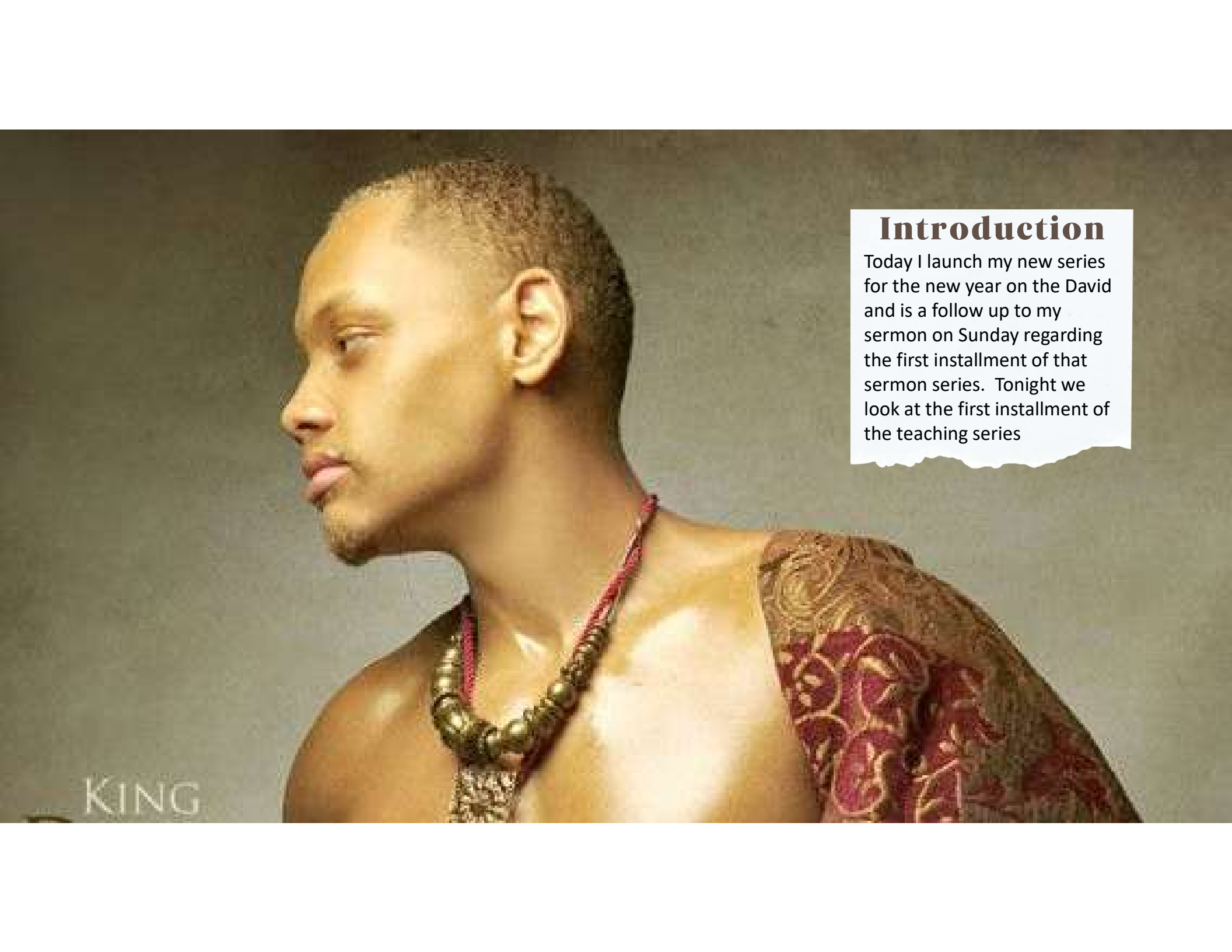

Introduction

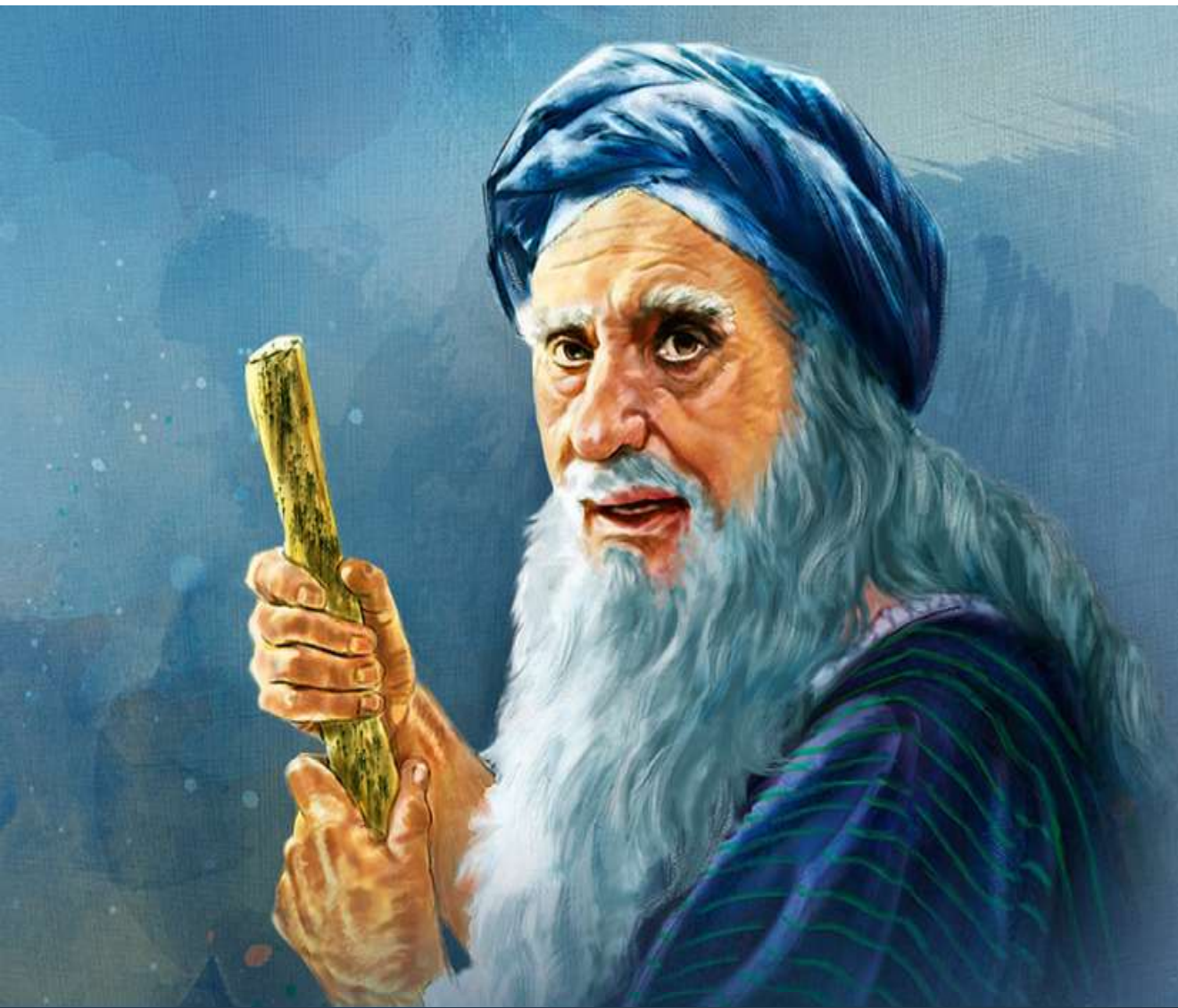

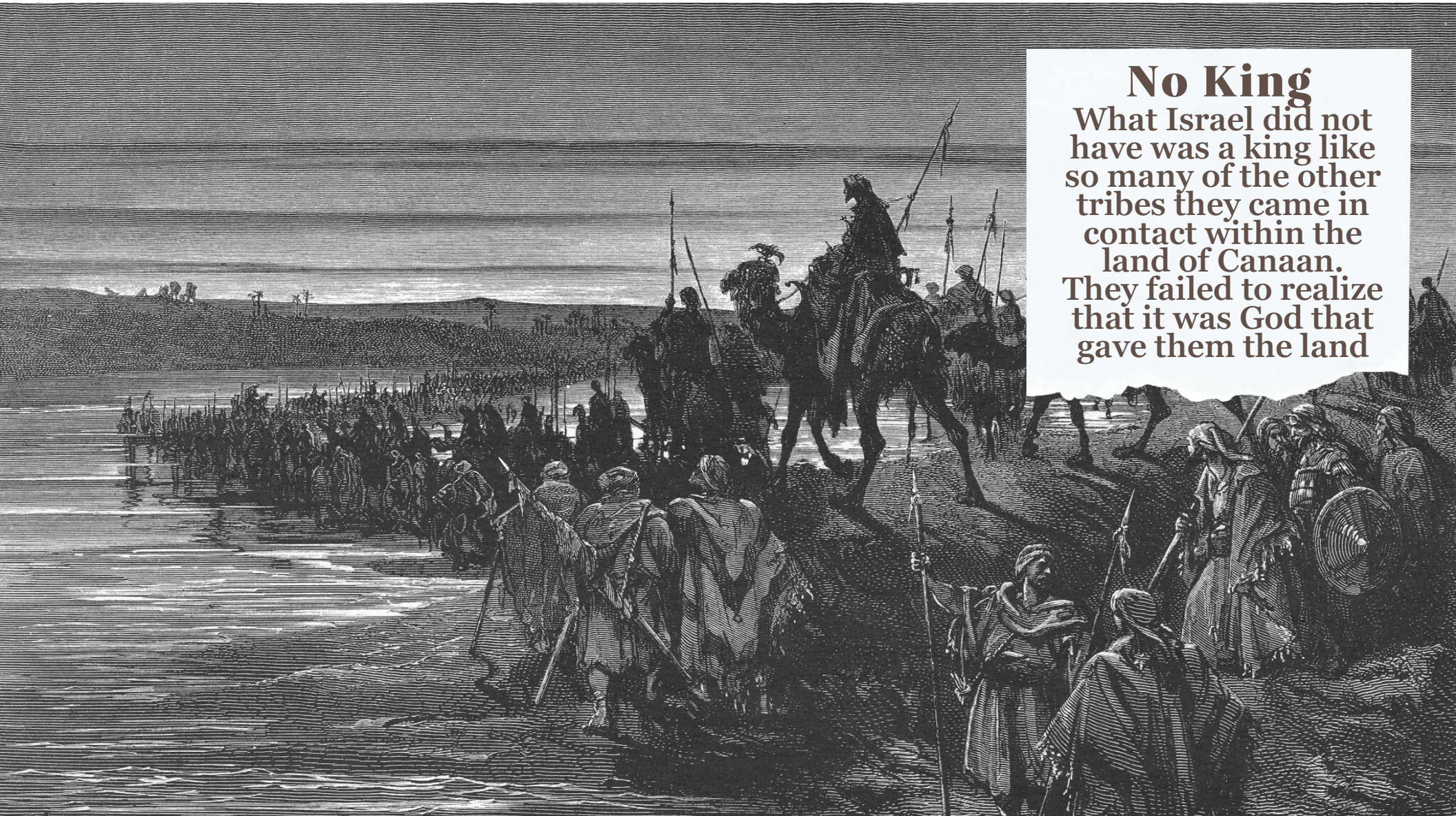


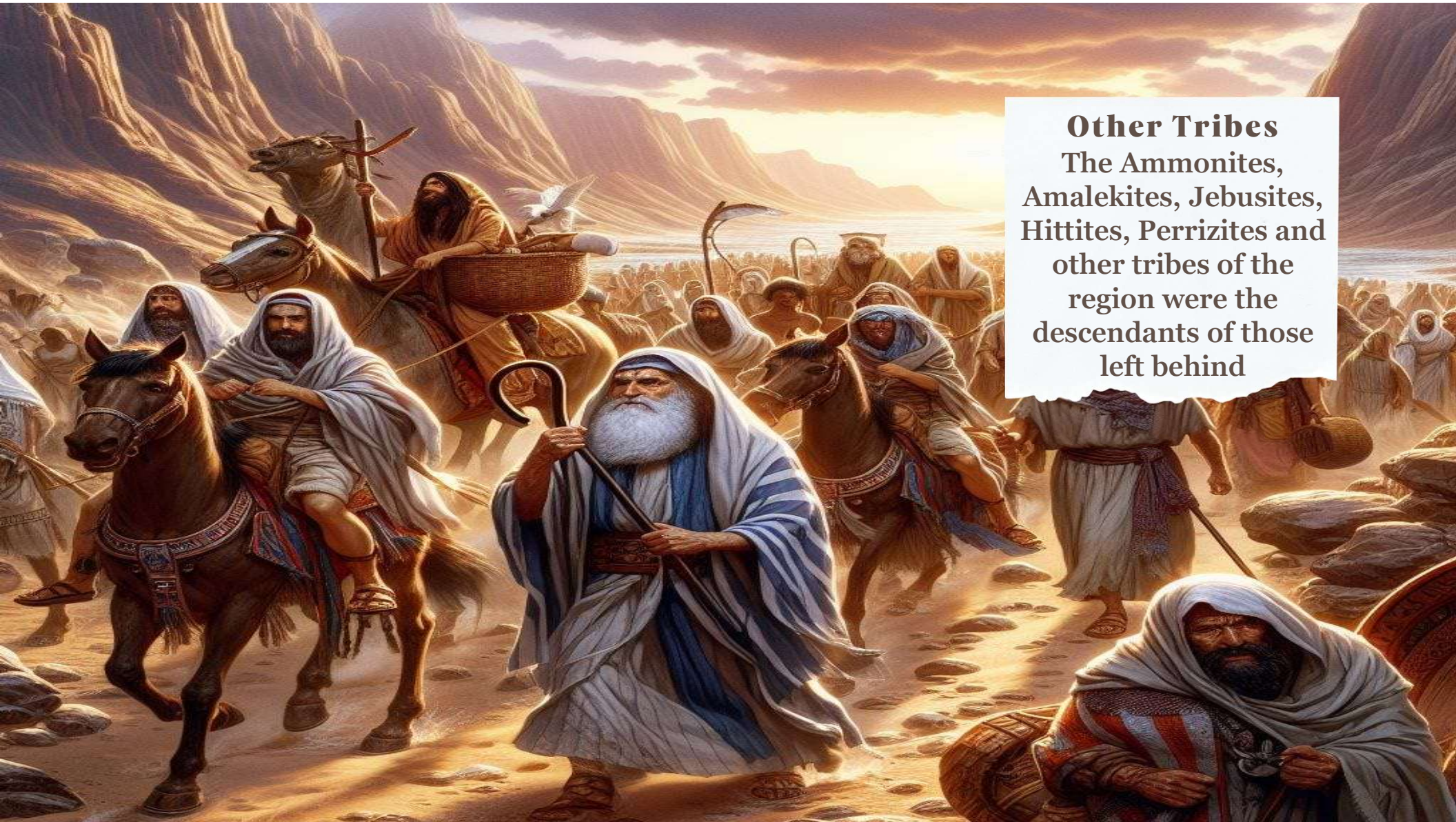

The Ammonites, Amalekites, Jebusites, Hittites, Perrizites and other tribes of the region were the descendants of those left behind



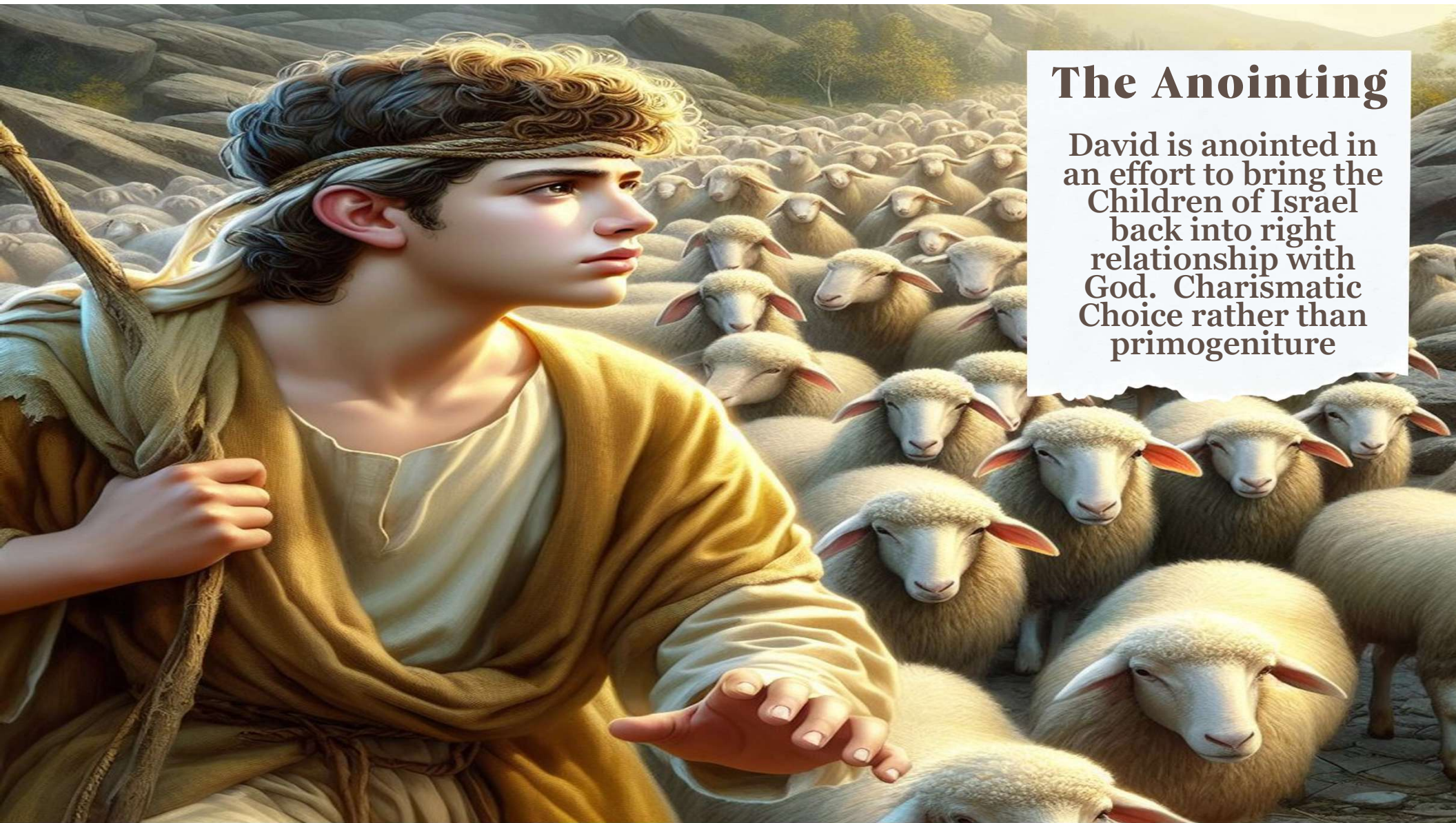
God was King

Saul

King Saul was an example of God's permissive will rather than his preferred will. It is meant to show that there are times when God will allow us to have our way



The Anointing

David is anointed in an effort to bring the Children of Israel back into right relationship with God. Charismatic Choice rather than primogeniture
