When the United States entered the First World War in 1918 the women of South Carolina figuratively rolled up their sleeves, and went to work to support their state and their country. At this time, the average woman in the state lived in a rural setting, worked in agriculture or as a domestic worker. Women in the middle class were still largely living in rural areas or small towns, and working in agriculture or in textile mills. During wartime women not only participated in more jobs so men could go fight, but women from South Carolina enlisted to aid the war effort. They served as nurses, drove trucks that delivered supplies and drove ambulances that transferred the wounded. Not only

did women step into wartime roles such as manufacturing everything from textiles to tanks and airplanes, but they also found work as secretaries, nurses and in the world of academics, with some women going into higher education to earn Ph.D. degrees. They also concentrated their efforts towards things like raising money, selling war bonds, and getting the word out about food, which the government urged citizens to grow at home so more farm-produced goods could go to soldiers



fighting overseas. In spite of the fact that women lost factory jobs after the war to returning veterans, they ultimately gained ground in the working world, as they retained jobs in some areas such as nursing, telephone operators, stenographers. They benefitted from a growing government and economy, and shortly after the war enjoyed another big benefit - the vote.





The next time you want to visit a great military museum, why not take the short drive to Pooler Georgia and visit the National Museum of the Mighty Eighth Air Force. The National Museum of the Mighty Eighth Air Force preserves the stories of courage, character and patriotism displayed by the men and women of the Eighth Air Force from World War II to present. Among the many World War II exhibits are aircraft including a B-17 Flying Fortress bomber, a model of a Messerschmitt Bf 109G fighter, and a 3/4-scale model of a P-51 Mustang fighter. Aircraft on display outside include the B-47 Stratojet, MiG-17, and F-4 Phantom II from the post-WWII Cold War era. Last month, the museum announced that it would be receiving a B-24 from the Barksdale Global Power Museum.

Military Anniversaries in August

August is a significant month for military anniversaries and observances. Key dates include the US Coast Guard's establishment on August 4th, Purple Heart Day on August 7th, and the Marine Forces Reserve Birthday on August 29th. Additionally, National Airborne Day is celebrated on August 16th.

August 4th:

US Coast Guard Birthday. This day marks the anniversary of the establishment of the US Coast Guard in 1790.

August 7th:

Purple Heart Day. This day honors those who have been wounded or killed while serving in the US military.

August 16th:

National Airborne Day. This day commemorates the first official Army parachute jump in 1940, recognizing the nation's airborne forces.

August 29th:

Marine Corps Reserve Birthday. This date marks the establishment of the Marine Corps Reserve in 1916.










1775 - United States Military Services

In 2025, the United States military is commemorating several significant anniversaries. The most prominent is the 250th anniversary of the U.S. Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, all founded in 1775:

- June 14,: The 250th anniversary of the U.S. Army.
- October 13,: The 250th anniversary of the U.S. Navy.
- November 10,: The 250th anniversary of the U.S. Marine Corps.

A Blast From the Past



Back in 1902, this was the Pawleys Island Railroad — owned by the Atlantic Coast Lumber Company out of Georgetown, SC. Vacationers heading to Pawleys would first ride the train to Georgetown, then cross the Waccamaw River by ferry to Hagley Landing. From there, it was a short two-mile ride by rail to reach the sandy escape of Pawleys Island, SC



In the summer of 1929, long before the bridge connected Georgetown, SC to the Waccamaw Neck, folks crossed the water the old-fashioned way — by ferry. This one, The Pelican, made the ten-minute trip across Winyah Bay to Alderney Landing in Pawleys' Island, SC. On the Fourth of July that year alone, The Pelican hauled 264 automobiles and 962 passengers across the bay. Can you imagine the buzz? Families packed into Model A's, farmers in overalls, visitors hoping for a breeze — all waiting patiently to board. The Seashore Road ended at the water's edge near Alderley Plantation's rice fields. From there, The Pelican did the rest. It wasn't just a ferry; it was the thread tying two communities together — until 1935, when the first bridge finally rose from the water and changed the journey forever.

The Veterans Affairs office assists all ex-service personnel with financial compensation claims including but not limited to:

- Hospitalization
- Training
- Insurance Benefits

These services are extended to eligible dependents, including parents, widows, children and orphans of ex-service personnel.

If you need support for a specific mental health problem - or if you're having problems sleeping, controlling your anger, or readjusting to civilian life - you are not alone. You don't need to be enrolled in VA health care to get care. To access free VA mental health services right away:

- Call or walk-in to any VA Medical Center anytime, day or night
- Call or walk-in to any Vet Center during clinic hours

If you have questions about enrolling in VA health care, please contact the VA via phone at 1-877-222-VETS (1-877-222-8387) Monday - Friday, 8:00 AM to 8:00 PM EST. Veterans with hearing loss are asked to use the TTY phone number 1-800-877-8339.

Newly separated service members can expect three calls from qualified VA Solid Start representatives over the first year of separation. VA will attempt to contact you several times around 90, 180 and 365 days post-separation, so make sure your contact information is up to date in eBenefits.

VA Solid Start representatives will not ask you for financial information and will only discuss topics you are comfortable with. Remember that phone scammers often target Veterans, so always be vigilant and protect your financial information when talking to someone you don't know over the phone.
