



FOOTPATH AND FOOTBRIDGE UPDATE

For the last 3 years I have been involved firstly in the formalities to get the footpath through the garden centre site dedicated as a public right of way and then to explore all the options for both a temporary and permanent solution to the crossing of the River Tame. This resulted in monthly update reports in the Diary, but I am afraid that this will be the last one for a while!

I had a very amicable meeting with Mr Dad, Oldham's Director of Environment, in May but was unable to get his agreement to Oldham accepting the maintenance and liability for any of the temporary bridge or steppingstone options. We cannot go ahead with a proper standard accessible bridge because Newbank Directors will not allow access - and don't even want the bridge replacing. Whilst Mr Dad's response was disappointing, it was not unexpected. However, he recognised the strong community involvement with this project, and he promised that Oldham would start the formalities for replacing the bridge, including negotiating with Newbank, next financial year instead of 2027/28. This would give a realistic chance of installing the bridge in 2027/28 and was the minimum I had hoped for as it should stop Newbank creating further delay to the project. However, despite assurances from Mr Dad, I am not yet convinced that Oldham has the legal powers to force Newbank to allow access onto their land to carry out the work. Oldham does have power to enter into a voluntary agreement, but let's see what happens.

I will therefore have to wait until next April to start chasing Oldham officers again and hope that by then they will be able to give me quarterly progress reports.

I therefore record my thanks to all the bridge designers, contractors, material and equipment suppliers who have given me such help to develop the various proposals and particularly to the Environment Agency who were prepared to waive the usual licence

requirements. There is of course a spin-off for DVC in that they will not need to make funding bids or seek planning permission! I still keep an eve on the site and noticed that an unofficial steppingstone crossing had appeared. It was washed away at



New Year but is back again as the photo shows. It looks a bit 'iffy' and I would think that wellies are essential!

Finally, I will also be keeping an eye on another footbridge being dealt with by Oldham at Brookdale Golf Club, Failsworth. This crosses the River Medlock and Oldham will be using Polydeck recycled plastic as an alternative to timber. This bridge is years behind programme (allegedly due to issues that don't apply at Dobcross!) and is due to be installed in July. Recycled material could be an option for Dobcross but when I checked prices it was a bit more expensive, although this would be offset by reduced maintenance. Kevin Lawton

Nature Notes

During the warm, dry weather in April this year, there were quite a lot of white butterflies on the wing. There are four common species in this area, two of which are quite easy to distinguish: the orange tip, although it is only the males which have the orange tips to their wings, and the green-veined whites, which do indeed have green veins on the undersides of their wings. (The English names of butterflies and other insects tend to be predictable – I recently discovered a rosemary beetle, living on – yes – a rosemary bush!)

The other two white butterflies are called, even less imaginatively, the large white and the small white. I find these two difficult to distinguish unless one of each helpfully settle next to each other, so that I can see the difference in size. Because they both lay their eggs on plants in the cabbage family, gardeners tend to lump them all together as 'cabbage whites'.

Back in April I had a couple of large broccoli plants in my garden, which had overwintered from last year. One day I noticed a colony of a few dozen tiny caterpillars on one of them, which soon grew into much bigger caterpillars. They were greyish green, speckled with black, and stayed clustered together as they munched though one leaf at a time. In the interests of biodiversity, and because I was already growing new broccoli plants, I decided to sacrifice the affected plant and see what happened.

I'm happy to report that in a couple of weeks, the caterpillars had disappeared and the plant had been robust enough to survive. I don't know whether the caterpillars had gone off to pupate somewhere, or whether some hungry bird had enjoyed a feast, but I may discover later in the summer if a new generation of white butterflies emerges.
